

II Financial report for the first 7 month's school operation,

The operation for the school for the first seven months, that is, from July 1, 1932 -- Feb. 1, 1935, the school has a surplus of \$6010.63. This six thousand is made up of the following figures:

V Shall we organize a Department of Education?

A committee was appointed by the Chairman of the Board to ascertain the feasibility of establishing a Department of Education for the second semester of this school year. Due to the Tinancial condition of the Young Men's Christian Association it is not deemed advisable by this committee to organize a Department of Education for this semester. An endeavor has been made to ascertain the number of students who either transferred to other college or new students who did not enter because we do not have an Educational Department.

According to this estimate we have, therefore, lost \$1500 income which would have not only paid the cost but which would have shown an excess of \$300. Shall we make plans for the establishment of a Department of Education for the school year 1955-34?

VIII Policy on Rental of the Auditorium.

The committee which was appointed by the Chairman of the Board decided that the rental charge for use of the school auditorium should be raised from \$10.00 a night to \$15.00 during the week; and \$20.00 on Saturday nights. This new price schedule has been put into effect the second semester.

IX Statement concerning delinquent tuition.

The committee mentioned in item #8 was likewise given authority to act in the case of those students delinquent in the payment of tuition. The following policy was adopted:

Endeavor to secure cash whenever possible; if absolutely impossible to secure cash, then take secured notes for the balance of student tuition. No student would be allowed to enter the second semester who had not satisfactorily taken care of the payment of the first semester's tuition.

There was a balance of \$4881.90 on outstanding accounts on February 1st, 1933.
