More than 230 students are currently enrolled in YSU's College in High School program. College courses in chemistry, biology, English, math and other subjects are taught right in the students' own high school, giving them a jumpstart on earning a college degree. Students who take advantage of the program can save money on tuition and shorten how long it takes to earn a degree.



Schroeder, who manages the CHS program at YSU, said she plans to hold the video contest again. "The odds were pretty good this year," she said. "I think there will be more entries next year. These students are amazing."

State mathematics meeting on campus next week

Prominent mathematicians, faculty and students from across the Buckeye State will come together Friday and Saturday, March 25 and 26, as Youngstown State University hosts the Spring Meeting of the Ohio Section of the Mathematical Association of America in Kilcawley Center.

In addition to presentations, undergraduate students will compete in a problem-solving competition. A student pizza party sponsored by YSU's Pi Mu Epsilon chapter and a banquet will also complement the two-day event.

Major addresses will be presented by Jennifer Quinn, associate director for Interdisciplinary Arts & Sciences at the University of Washington-Tacoma; Doug Ensley, professor of Mathematics at Shippensburg



University; Don Hunt, chair of the Department of Mathematics and Statistics at Ohio Northern University; and Gordon Swain, professor of Mathematics at Ashland University. The presentations will cover various topics dealing with graph puzzles, invariants, parabolas and lines, and linear recurrences.

Undergraduate students from Ohio Section institutions are invited to enter the inaugural Leo Schneider Student Mathematics Competition on the first day of the meeting. The problem-solving contest involves a 10-question series of calculus, algebra, probability and analysis problems. Cash prizes will be awarded to the top three teams. Dubbed "the leading national watchdog of state and local economic development subsidies," LeRoy won the Public Interest Pioneer Award in the late 1990s and has been writing and consulting for state and local governments, labor-management committees, unions, tax and budget watchdogs, environmentalists, and public official associations for more than 25 years.

In 1998, LeRoy founded Good Jobs First, a national policy resource center that promotes government and corporate accountability in economic development and growth. Providing best practices information in state and local job subsidies, the organization works with others in the areas of research, communications, training and consulting assistance. LeRoy has led the organization's work on smart growth and tax increment financing.
