

Rich Center presents Temple Grandin May 17

Temple Grandin, a renowned animal scientist and one of the world's most accomplished people with autism, will present a free lecture 7 p.m. Tuesday, May 17 in Stambaugh Auditorium in Youngstown.

In advance of the appearance, free screenings of the award-winning HBO film "Temple Grandin" have been scheduled for:

- **12:30 p.m. Tuesday, April 5,** in the McKay Auditorium in the Beeghly College of Education at Youngstown State University.
- **1:30 p.m. Sunday, April 10,** in the Butler Institute of American Art on Wick Avenue in Youngstown.

The lecture and film screenings, sponsored by YSU's Rich Center for the Study and Treatment of Autism, are free and open to the public. While the lecture is free, tickets are required. Tickets can be picked up at the information desk at Kilcawley Center and at the Rich Center, both on the YSU campus. Tickets are also available at Franklin Pharmacy in Warren, Salon at Creekside in Canfield and Inner Circle Pizza in Poland.

"Temple Grandin and her life is an inspiration for everyone with autism and those that live with, work with and care for people with autism," said Georgia Backus, director of the Rich Center. "This is a unique opportunity to hear her story and understand the struggles of individuals with autism and how to overcome them."

Grandin, diagnosed with autism in 1950 at the age of three, has been featured on national news shows ranging from National Public Radio and 20/20 to Larry King Live and The Today Show, as well as national publications such as *People* magazine, *Forbes, U.S. News and World Report* and the *New York Times. Time* magazine included Grandin in its 2010 *Time* 100, the magazine's annual list of the 100 most influential people in the world.

Also last year, Grandin's life was documented in an HBO film that won seven Emmy awards, including Best Made-for-Television Movie, Best Director and Best Leading Actress. The film also recently won a Golden Globe Award for Best Actress.

Grandin is a professor of animal science at Colorado State University. She earned a bachelor's degree in psychology from Franklin Pierce College, a master's degree in animal science from Arizona State University and a doctoral degree in animal science from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign.

Asthma Awareness Patch Project at YSU April 30

Youngstown State University's Bitonte College of Health and Human Services is teaming with Akron Children's Hospital of the Mahoning Valley to offer a program to help local Girl Scouts and their leaders learn more about asthma.

The Asthma Awareness Patch Project will be held on Saturday, April 30, in YSU's Beeghly Center and is open to Girl Scout troops in Mahoning, Trumbull, Columbiana and Ashtabula counties. Scouts completing the program will earn an official Asthma Awareness Patch. Two sessions will be available. The morning session is for Scouts 11 to 17 years of age and will be held from 9 a.m. to noon. The afternoon session is for Scouts 5 to 10 years of age and will be held from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m.

"The program is intended to empower Girl Scouts and leaders to take charge of their health, involve them in asthma-related activities within their communities, identify those with asthma and provide them and their families with the tools needed to control this chronic respiratory condition and live full, active lives," said Terry Volsko, YSU assistant professor of Health Professions. YSU faculty, the medical director and asthma educators from Akron Children's Hospital of the Mahoning Valley and staff from the Girl Scouts of North East Ohio will train Girl Scouts and leaders from troops of all ages to assist the girls in earning their asthma awareness patch. A complimentary parking



pass and a healthy snack will be provided to Girl Scouts participating in the program.

The program was developed in 2005 by the Girls Scouts of America, American Lung Association, American Academy of Allergy, Asthma and Immunology and the Asthma Coalition of Long Island.

The local program is funded by a grant from the YSU University Research Council Grant and the American Respiratory Care Foundation Ventilator 5K Event Community grant.

As part of the program, YSU faculty, doctors, nurses and respiratory therapists will conduct a study on how well the Asthma Awareness Patch program helps scouts learn about healthy habits and asthma. Participants will complete forms indicating what they learned during the program.

English Festival features Queen's Thief author

At the Festival, students listen to authors and participate in various sessions, including collaborative workshop activities, impromptu essay writing, dramatic or artistic performances, book discussions and language arts competitions.

Sustainable food program scheduled for April 13

The American Studies Program at Youngstown State University hosts "Roots and Relationships," a program about sustainable food issues and practices, at 6 p.m. Wednesday, April 13 at The Lemon Grove Café, 122 W. Federal Plaza, in downtown Youngstown.

"Roots and Relationships" will show clips from several documentary films, including *What's Organic and Organic?, Ingredients*, and *Chicago's Food Deserts: A City in Transition*. Representatives from Lamppost Farms, Goodness Grows and the Mahoning Valley Organizing Collaborative will discuss sustainable foods, focusing on organic farming, the benefits of eating locally-produced food, and the Mahoning Valley's limited access to healthy foods.

Food sustainability is an increasing problem in the United States, and many local organizations are working to counteract the problem. Through discussion, the event hopes to educate and promote the production and consumption of local and organic foods as well as address the lack of healthy food availability in Youngstown.

Kasey Johnson, co-coordinator of "Roots and Relationships," said it is important for the people of Youngstown to become conscious of these issues. "Food is a necessity," Johnson said. "It matters where that food comes from and how it affects our bodies and our communities. Creating meaningful dialogue among members of the community and local organizations will educate people to make better food choices and spark interest into the issues we face in our city."

Renowned guitarist featured in concert

Youngstown State University's Dana School of Music presents a guest artist recital featuring Florian Larousse, winner of the 2009 Guitar Foundation of America Competition, at 8 p.m., April 12 in Bliss Recital Hall on the YSU campus.

Larousse, at the age of 22, has wowed audiences on multiple continents and won numerous prizes in a number of international competitions in France, Germany, Hungary, Portugal, Spain and the United States. His performance at the Jose Tomás Competition (Spain) earned first prize and the Audience Choice Award in addition to resulting in a tour of Spain to 10 different cities as well as a recording contract. In 2009, he won the Koblenz International guitar Competition "Hubert Kapel" (Germany) and later that year won the coveted first prize of The Guitar Foundation of America International Artist Competition. His win at the 2009 GFA International Concert Artist Competition will result in a 9-month concert tour in the United States, including a performance at Carnegie's Weill Recital Hall in New York, as well as a number of concerts in Brazil, Canada, China and Mexico.

Born in 1988, Larousse began studying guitar at the age of eight, later continuing his studies at the prestigious National Conservatory of Paris. After four years, he graduated with highest honors in classical guitar. That same year, he entered the Conservatoire Supérieur de Paris.
