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

Tree planted this week in memory of Jamail Johnson

An oak tree will be planted in memory of Youngstown State University student Jamail Johnson during a ceremony at noon, Tuesday, May 3, on the campus core.

The event will take place near the "Rock" on the south side of Kilcawley Center.

Johnson, 25, died Feb.6 during a shooting at a house located off campus. His funeral service was held in YSU's Beeghly Center. He was a member of Omega Psi Phi fraternity and was to graduate from YSU this month.

"This tree will be a lasting reminder for generations to come of an exceptional student who positively influenced so many in such a short time," YSU President Cynthia E. Anderson said.

"It is also a reminder that all of us – in every city, every college and university campus across the nation – must rededicate ourselves to do what we can to ensure that such senseless violence does not happen again."

Omega Psi Phi, Woodrow Wilson Middle School and the YSU Student Government Association will dedicate a plaque in Johnson's memory. The plaque will be placed adjacent to the tree. The tree has been donated by the Campus Beautification Initiative in partnership with members of Omega Psi Phi.

After the tree planting, the YSU Office of University Development, Office of Student Diversity and the YSU Student Government Association will sponsor a Peace Rally and reception adjacent to the tree dedication site. Student groups will have display tables regarding non-violence and peaceful solutions.

Johnson's mother, Shirlene Hill, and father, Earl Johnson, are expected to attend the ceremony.

Education professor wins Faculty Innovator Award

With the rising cost of textbooks, one Youngstown State University faculty member is helping to offset the costs by substituting textbooks for the latest technologies and strategies in learning.

Lauren Cummins, associate professor of Teacher Education, is among only 10 faculty members statewide to

receive the 2011 Ohio Faculty

"Ohio's economic competiveness is built on the strength of its higher education system and keeping access to that system within reach of Ohio families," said Eric Fingerhut, former chancellor of the Ohio Board of Regents. "The faculty we honor have, with their dedication and hard work, helped make it easier for students to succeed in ways that will make them, and Ohio, more successful in today's knowledge economy."

In two distance-learning courses she teaches, Cummins uses VoiceThread and PBWorks Wiki, 2.0 technologies that provide critical analysis and interaction opportunities to students. VoiceThread applies multimedia resources while the wiki program lets a group set up and contribute to pages in a collaborative effort.

Cummins uses photo images on VoiceThread to complement concepts from the course. Students view the images that relate to a concept and respond to questions for each by either typing an answer or posting a recorded voice message via computer microphone or telephone. In addition, the wiki tracks student posts throughout the semester on a given topic. Students not only post their own research to the wiki but also comment on and expand their classmates' findings and add videos, podcasts and other links to better communicate their ideas.

The digital material employed in Cummins' Methods and Theories in Early Childhood Education course saves each graduate student \$121 in textbook costs.

Cummins acknowledges another advantage in using the technologies.

"Both are effective ways to engage students in the process of inquiry-based learning, taking them several steps beyond just covering the material and asking them to be responsible researchers," she said. "Textbooks shouldn't be the focus for all learning, but the springboard where learning begins. Information in and of itself is not learning."

Cummins received positive feedback from students of the distance-learning courses and plans to continue using the digital teaching methods in future classes. This semester, she added another 2.0 technology to the class, Webspiration, which challenges distance learners to work collaboratively to create a mind map of concepts taught.

Dance Ensemble concert features modern, hip-hop, tap

The Youngstown State University Dance Ensemble presents its annual spring concert 7:30 p.m. Thursday, Friday and Saturday, May 5, 6 and 7 at 7:30 p.m. in Bliss Hall's Ford Theater.

Under the artistic direction of Christine Cobb, faculty member in the department of Theater and Dance, the concert will showcase 13 dance pieces of modern, hip-hop and tap genres.

Tickets are \$3 for YSU faculty, staff, students and senior citizens; \$8 for general public. Tickets may only be purchased at the door.

The YSU Dance Ensemble, a sanctioned student organization sponsored in part by Student Government, accepts members via an audition process in the fall semester.

"The students who audition and are accepted into the YSU Dance Ensemble put countless hours into practicing their discipline," Cobb said. "They also learn the basics of running a student organization since they must elect officers and participate in activities. The spring concert is the culmination of their year-long efforts."

One of the featured pieces of the concert is "Dance and the Spoken Word" of Wallace Stephens' poem "Sunday Morning." Conceived by Associate Staff Designer W. Rick Schilling, and choreographed by Katie Torba, this dance performance of a poem shows the persona of the narrator in Stephen's poem as a woman who, caught between a dreamy- sleeplessness and breakfast-time consciousness of a Sunday morning, questions the nature of supernatural religions. Biblical imagery mixes with pagan imagery.

Guest artist Melinda Planey is currently on staff at DANCE Cleveland as administrative coordinator and is a recent graduate of The College at Brockport, in Brockport, N.Y., where she earned master of Fine Arts degree in Dance Performance and Choreography as well as a Graduate Certificate in Nonprofit Management.
