



Spring enrollment up 31 percent since 2000



Enrollment continues on the upswing this spring semester, up more than 400 students from last spring semester. Since 2000, the number of students on campus during the spring semester has increased by 3,381, or 31 percent.



Dana strengthens research with new musicology lectures

The Dana School of Music is turning up the volume on research, led by a new lecture series that's sparking increased student interest in music history.

"A good deal of Dana research in the past has concentrated on composition and music performance," said Michael Crist, Dana director. "But now we're also focusing more on academic research and connecting with outstanding music scholars."

An important part of the new research push is the Dana Musicology Lecture Series. Launched last semester and sponsored in part by the Ohio Humanities Council, the series invites distinguished musicologists from across the country to YSU to speak on a variety of topics, from Igor Stravinsky's neoclassic style to music and fashion.

"There was a need for it," said Ewelina Boczkowska, assistant professor and director of the lecture series. "We have a strong

concert tradition here at Dana. We want to build on that now by adding a cultural program."

The lecture series, which is free and open to the public, got off to a roaring start last fall with Tamara Levitz, professor of musicology at the University of California Los Angeles. Levitz' talk on Stravinsky ignited such discussion that it turned into a public forum, Boczkowska said.

Crist added that students came away excited: "A lot were talking about changing majors to music history; one student has since applied to UCLA for grad school where Levitz teaches and another is planning to visit her over spring break."


The lecture series continues this semester with talks by two Ohio musicologists. Brooks Toliver, professor of music at the University of Akron, spoke Feb. 10 in Bliss Hall. A leading scholar on the relationship of music to nature, he presented "The Alps, the *Alpine Symphony* and Environmentalism: Searching for Connections." Mary E. Davis, associate professor of music at Case Western Reserve University, is scheduled for April 1 at 4 p.m. in Bliss Recital Hall and will discuss topics from her book, *Classic Chic: Music, Fashion and Modernism*.

Boczkowska said she hopes Ohio music scholars will create a research circuit, connecting YSU to nearby universities and bringing in new audiences, while national scholars featured in the fall will broaden discussions on music scholarship.

Also contributing to Dana's research push is the Dana Research Society, a student organization that encourages student research and involvement in music history and film. Boczkowska, faculty advisor for the society, she she notes a difference in the group since the lecture series started. "Students are more engaged now," she said, "and it translated into a more solid framework for the group. Members are committed and coming out of it with research ideas of their own." Many students plan to present original research at QUEST this semester.

Boczkowska earned her Ph.D. in Musicology from UCLA in 2009 and specializes in film music with a focus on music as a site of collective memory in Polish film. Teaching a range of topics in 19th- and 20th-century music, she also explores issues of memory, place and cultural identity.

WCBA gets \$188K for Emerging Markets Initiative

YSU's Emerging Markets Initiative, designed to help students and Mahoning Valley businesses learn about and take advantage of opportunities in growing overseas markets, has received an \$188,000 federal grant to continue and expand the project.

With the award, the EMI has received three grants from the U.S. Department of Education over the past five years totaling nearly \$550,000.

"This grant further cements YSU's and the Williamson College of Business Administration's leadership role in international business in northeast Ohio," said Betty Jo Licata, dean of WCBA, which operates the EMI.

Started in 2005, EMI is part of the YSU Center of Excellence in International Business, which also includes the Williamson Center of International Business and the Ohio Small Business Development Center at YSU.

"The EMI is a perfect example of the university's and the college's mission to serve students and the local community," said Rangamohan Eunni, associate professor of Management and co-director of the EMI. "The Initiative provides the education and resources needed for our students and businesses to succeed in the ever-changing 21st century global business environment."

EMI is designed to internationalize the WCBA's curriculum, enhance the international knowledge and competencies of students and faculty, and educate the Mahoning Valley business community about opportunities for international trade in emerging markets.

Eunni said the current focus of EMI is a group of fast-growing emerging economies called the BRICs – Brazil, Russia, India and China. The BRIC economies together are forecast to become larger than the G-6 economies in less than 40 years, he said.

"These trends are important for the United States, and especially so to Mahoning Valley," Eunni said.

While Ohio is the seventh largest exporting state in the United States, accounting for over \$45 billion in exports, the Mahoning Valley's share is less than 1 percent, Eunni said. Excluding Canada and Mexico, Brazil and China account for the largest share of exports from Ohio, and together with India and Russia represent 20 percent of Ohio's total exports.

"The message is thus clear – targeting the BRICs is the way to go for Mahoning Valley to partake in the benefits from international expansion," Eunni said.

Among the activities of the YSU EMI:

- Seminars for the local business community to learn about the importance of exploring opportunities in the BRIC economies.
- A new course on International Business Consulting.
- Educational tours for students to China and India in the next two years.
- Plans to introduce two foreign language courses Business Chinese and Business Hindi.

EMI's community partners include the Ohio State Governor's Regional Office, Ohio Department of Development's International Trade Division, Northeast Ohio Trade and Economic Consortium (NEOTEC), Mahoning County Commissioners Office, the Youngstown/Warren Regional Chamber, area high schools and women's professional organizations.









John Yemma, 77, former dean of the Bitonte College of Health and Human Services at YSU, died Monday, Jan. 24, in the Cleveland Clinic.


A native of Youngstown, Yemma earned a bachelor's degree in education from YSU in 1961, a master's degree in biology from Vanderbilt University and a doctorate in cytochemistry from Pennsylvania State University. He joined the YSU biology faculty in 1971, was the first chair of the Allied Health Department when it was formed in 1976 and served briefly as dean of the former College of Applied Science and Technology before it was restructured. He was dean of the Bitonte College from 1992, the year it was created, until he retired in July 2008. He had published 37 scholarly articles and was awarded 11 research grants.

Recognized repeatedly for his service to YSU and his discipline, Yemma was named a YSU Distinguished Professor three times, received the Watson Award for Outstanding Administrator, was named to Who's Who in Science and received a National Science Foundation Fellowship. He was also recognized as a distinguished graduate faculty member.

Funeral services were Saturday, Jan. 29, at the Fabrizio Funeral Home in Youngstown. The family requests donations to the American Diabetes Association.




In memoriam...Jackie Griffith


Students launch Rookery Radio

Rookery Radio, YSU's first student-run Internet radio station, launched last week at www.rookeryradio.com.





Tony Award-winning Crucible set for YSU

University Theater will present the main stage performance of Arthur Miller's drama THE CRUCIBLE, opening Thursday, February 24. The performances are scheduled in Ford Theater February 24-27 and March 4-6. Thursday through Saturday performances begin at 7:30 p.m. while the Sunday matinee performance is at 3:00 p.m. All seats in Ford Theater are reserved. Winner of the 1953 Tony Award for Best Play, THE CRUCIBLE is an exciting drama about the Puritan purge of witchcraft in old Salem and is both a gripping historical play and a timely parable of our contemporary society. The story focuses upon a young farmer, his wife, and a young servant-girl who maliciously causes the wife's arrest for witchcraft. The farmer brings the girl to court to admit the lie—and it is here that the monstrous course of bigotry and deceit is terrifyingly depicted. The farmer, instead of saving his wife, finds himself also accused of witchcraft and ultimately condemned with a host of others.

The show's Artistic Director, W. Rick Schilling, noted that each performance will include a brief pre-show educational surround or dialogue a half-hour before the shows begin, coordinated by Dr. Dennis Henneman, the show's Assistant Director, Dramaturg and Stage Combat Consultant. The dialogues will be presented by community and University leaders who will assist the audience in understanding some of the play's important issues.

The discussions will take place in the Box Office Lobby in front of the collaborative floor-to-ceiling art piece constructed by Art faculty Dragana Crnjak and visual art students. The space was constructed using fragmentation, high contrasts and implied shadows to reflect the ideas of power, distortion, fear, and secrecy.



"Through philanthropy, JPMorgan Chase wants to ensure that Youngstown


children acquire the knowledge and skills needed to become productive, engaged citizens," said

The program, a partnership between the Youngstown City Schools and the YSU Center for Urban and Regional Studies, is an interdisciplinary approach to science instruction for fifth- and sixth-grade students. Students learn to understand science and its applications in real life by engaging in numerous interdisciplinary activities, including trips to Mill Creek Park for lessons in life science.

"In this type of dynamic learning, students remember more easily because they are challenged by a problem they have to figure out and they are typically also using their senses – hearing, touching, seeing and smelling," said Holly Burnett-Hanley, research associate with the Center for Urban and Regional Studies.

Under the program, 450 fifth-graders and 75 teachers from various disciplines engage in an interdisciplinary approach to Life Science, Physical Science and Earth & Space Science. The approach includes hands-on activities, field trips and 3-D models based on the Ohio Academic Content Standards. The program also includes 75 sixth-graders and 10 teachers in various disciplines who pioneer an interdisciplinary approach to the three sciences and create a model for the other sixth grade schools in the next coming school year based on the Ohio Academic Content Standards.



The free workshop, held in Kilcawley Center on the YSU campus, is designed to expose young women to career opportunities in science and technology and is open to all middle and high school






YSU basketball for \$1
