Dear Les,

Please excuse the long delay in answering your letter. I've tried to locate suitable photographs to include in the mélange article, but all I have from the dissertation are xerox or photo-static copies, ~~and~~ ^{but} not glossy photos, of ~~my~~ maps etc. of the College of Burgundy et environs. In order to get photos, I would have to get the microfilm back from Notre Dame and have photographs taken from the film -- and, since some of the films I used are a little scratched, they ~~may~~ may not come out well. *I may, however, come up with something.*

When I received your letter, I pulled my copy of the article out of my file and was horrified to find several infelicitous renderings as well as outright mistakes. Is ~~it~~ it still possible to make several minor changes -- it would not involve anything more than a different choice of words in two or three places and a rewriting of a sentence in four or five other places. I am particularly unhappy with the second paragraph, which ~~going~~ goes into a long background of the College of Burgundy without giving a very smooth transition from paragraph I, which introduced the main subject, John de Martigny. Neither do I like two references to the fact that the college's income ~~in~~ rents was diminished by 'rising prices', for I now realize that, although prices did rise at the time of plagues and famines and during monetary debasements, the general price trend during this period, particularly in regard to agricultural prices, was downward.

If it is still not too late to make these minor changes, there's no need to send back my article -- I can make the changes on my copy here and send them to you.

I'm right in the middle -- up to my neck, in fact, ^(of) ~~with~~ that D. C. Heath Problem in European Civilization I'm doing on the Renaissance ~~XX~~ economy, or more precisely, the economy of the 14th and 15th centuries. The deadline for submitting the ms. is November 1, and I'm still bogged down trying to ~~try~~ translate an article by Perroy on the 'Crises du xive siècle'.

How are you doing at Youngstown? It seems like decades ago that 'feted' we sat in the bar at the A.H.A. convention hotel in Philly and were ~~regaled~~ by 'le grand maître lui-même'. If you're going to the AHA this year, I'll probably see you there.



Dear Les,

Thank you for your letter of March 27. The publication of a Melange sounds like a great idea. I'd be very happy to submit part of my dissertation - I presume that the main theme of the seven contributions will be mediaeval education.

I've spent the last couple of days thinking of what chapter or section of the dissertation could best be extracted from the main body of the work and be presented alone. Since I have come across several good documents on the principalship of John de Martigny and since the period during which he was principal is quite important (ca. 1461- ca. 1490) because of the re-establishment of order and of financial stability in the college, I thought that chapter 8 of the dissertation might lend itself best to this type of project.

Very tentative outline:

- about two pages of background:
 - foundation of the College
 - brief mention of the major events in the 14-15 th.
 - about two pages on John de Martigny
 - about 17-18 pages on his principalship
 - harassment and imprisonment of de Martigny and other Burgundians by Louis XI
 - de Martigny's trouble with the martinets
 - His negotiations with the Sorbonne over a rent
 - Regents at the college under de Martigny: John Heynlin (de Lapide), Gilbert d'Auvergnat, John Monet, John Bernard, John Lantman, etc.
 - The writing of (Dec. 24, 1487) and probation (July 27, 1491) of de Martigny's will, in which he founds an anniversary mass for the benefit of his soul and bequeaths to the college 2000 pounds and five of his houses.
 - about a page of conclusion
 - importance of de Martigny's regime, etc.
- (Also, there could be included reproductions of a 16 th c. map of the college and of de Martigny's will).

Questions: What do you think of the topic?
How much time do we have?
Do you think that perhaps I'm being presumptuous in offering a ~~chapter~~ chapter which has not been approved//(? I have not yet seen the corrections and suggestions of the readers.

Dear Mr. Domonkos:

I was most pleased to receive your letter about a *Mélange* in honor of our beloved master on the occasion of the rare honor recently bestowed upon him in recognition of his scholarly activities. The notice of the nomination in *Speculum* brought home the uniqueness of the appointment, since only one other scholar, and of the greatest, participates in this honor. I think the idea of a *Mélange* Gabriel is the ideal way of celebrating this official recognition of the personal achievements in the academic world of the Reverend Gabriel in the United States and in Europe.

I would be most pleased to participate in the proposed *Mélange*. I have a text which is immediately available for publication and which I intended to send during the Easter Holidays to *Mediaeval Studies* for publication. I am interested in the fact that you are intending to complete the project within a reasonable limited time. The second chapter of my *Quest for Certainty in the Middle Ages* offers the basic thesis which is developed in the book. The title of the article would be "The Unity of the Mediaeval Intellectual Attitude". I feel it would have general interest and would be representative of an aspect of the work promoted by the Mediaeval Institute. Since this was written while I was at the Institute, it would be a work which would bring out the excellent academic research training the Reverend Gabriel is famous for instilling in his students. I believe the topic and the content of the article would make the *Mélange* well known through the cross-reference which this type of article would suggest to many writers of articles on the intellectual life in the Middle Ages.

I could send you the text, ready for publication, by return mail, whenever you advise me of the need of the text. The problem might be that the chapter as it stands in typewritten form is somewhat longer than the thirty page limit suggested. This difficulty could be worked out. A longer article might not be out of place in such a *Mélange*, anyway. One application of the theme has been published in *Franciscan Studies*: "The Quest for Certainty in Bonaventure" 21(1961) 104-227.

I hope the project will go through in a short space of time in order that this honor be properly celebrated before another honor call for another celebration. I am looking forward to hearing from you. Should an alternative project be needed, I would in not too much time satisfy you with something worth publishing.

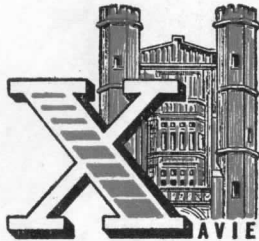


Dear Mr. Schneider:

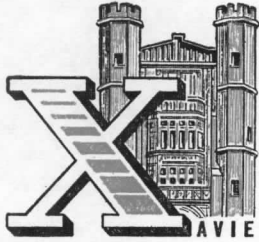


Another point which I would appreciate your checking for me concerns a reference in note 2 on p. 43 to my study of the Paris College of Prémontré in Texts and Studies in the History of Mediaeval Education. I suspect it should be p. 24, though I now have 22 in the note.

If the article is too long (I don't know what size your pages will be), I would suggest first of all putting the entire List of Students in smaller type, the same as that used for the notes. The abbreviated titles on pp. 1-3 could also be in smaller type. It seems to me that these sections, namely the abbreviated titles and the List, would look better if they were in a different type from that of the Introduction proper even if this is not required by space limitations.



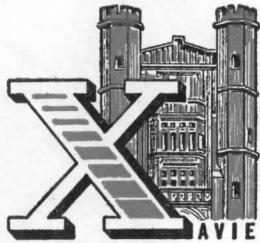

Thank you for your letter of May 17th. I stopped briefly at Notre Dame on June 1st in the hope, among other things, of seeing you and talking over the matter of the Festschrift. My disappointment in missing you was somewhat compensated for by my pleasure in seeing the Institute's sumptuous new quarters.

As for the Festschrift, I'm wondering, in view of the delay, whether it wouldn't be better to plan it as a 60th-birthday offering. I've always felt that it would be better for us to pay homage to the master on the occasion of one of his own achievements, such as a birthday or a publication, rather than simply to applaud someone else's homage, from however august a quarter it comes. But apart from this preference in principle, which I submit only as a mild suggestion, it seems from what you write that the Festschrift as now planned can't appear before 1966. Hence the additional delay till December of 1967 would only be a year and a half at most. Since the election to the Institut des Inscriptions et Belles Lettres took place in December of 1962, if my memory is correct, the present plan, inasmuch as the homage would follow the event by three or more years, would seem to have lost much of its topicality.

If my suggestion were adopted, it might be possible to consider enlarging the scope of the undertaking to include contributions by colleagues at Notre Dame and possibly from elsewhere as well (e.g. Pearl Kibre, Gray Boyce, et alii). This too I offer only as a timid suggestion, since it's on you and Mr. Domonkos that the extra work would devolve.

I ought to add that if my suggestion for postponing the Festschrift to December of 1967 should happen to be accepted, I would like to have my present article returned so I can submit it for publication elsewhere this year. I would provide a new one in the summer of 1966. This would have the incidental advantage of solving the map problem. I'll send you the sketch of my academic career as soon as I hear from you again.

If you think a satisfactory plate can be made from a micro-film of good quality there shouldn't be any difficulty in giving a facsimile of one of the three pages containing the repetition. I think I would have to get permission from Berlin, but I wouldn't anticipate any trouble there. The enlargement could of course be made right here. Just let me know what you'd like in the way of negative or positive and the size.

I feel it's useless for me to apologize any further for all my delays, but I'm sure you've gathered one moral from them: never edit another Festschrift.

I got a copy of it, but G.'s references were so inaccurate that I gave up trying to locate them; I'll be damned if I'm going to read through all that Latin for 3 crummy references; G. can find them himself.

I think it would be good if you wrote up a preface on the Gabe also; we could put the two together then and come up with something better.
