
Thank you very much for your letter of July 17th, and please forgive my long delay in responding to it. It came a week before I left on a month vacation, and since my return I have had to deal with more pressing matters and have only now gotten back to "things Hungarian".

I hope you will not be offended if I say that, of the mass of communication I have had from various sources on the continuation of the Hungarian program at CSU since last Spring, your letter is the most eminently sensible. The first and last paragraphs of your letter suggest to me that you are aware of the kind of problems that I have to deal with. What will happen with the Hungarian program I cannot at this point say with any certainty. We have a continuing tenured faculty member, Professor Theofil Lant, who was also born in Budapest and is interested in, and potentially at least, capable of continuing the Hungarian program. Given the department's precarious budgetary circumstances, it is very unlikely that we will be able to continue it out of our own resources on any other basis. There have been suggestions of grant support from outside the university, from the Cleveland Hungarian community, but this has problems tied up with it that are going to be difficult to deal with diplomatically. I have called a meeting for October 3rd of all the people who have communicated with me, but I have no idea whether that meeting will produce light, or only smoke.

Let me note as a purely personal reaction that, judging from your credentials, I would very much like to have you sometime teach the Hungarian culture courses at the university. I am not, of course, solely responsible for such decisions, and in any case I'm not at all sure that we could afford you. I would, however, like very much to meet you sometime. I note that you are a medievalist, and that too is my own area of interest. Do you ever get to meetings of the Cleveland Medieval Society? It would be a pleasure to meet you and talk shop.

I will certainly keep your letter confidential and not "communicate any of this to Professor Oszlanyi". Am I right in deducing from your vita that you are his son-in-law?

Résumé

Le coût des grades: droits et frais d'examen dans les universités du Midi de la France au Moyen Age.

Dans les Universités du Midi de la France (Avignon, Montpellier, Toulouse), droits et frais d'examen semblent être apparus seulement au XIV^e siècle. Ils se sont progressivement alourdis, puis fixés et précisés au XV^e siècle; ils furent alors parfois même quelque peu réduits. Ces droits et frais d'examen rendaient les grades universitaires fort coûteux, surtout la licence et le doctorat, encore qu'il put y avoir, entre facultés et entre universités, de fortes disparités. Il est certain que leur existence a beaucoup contribué à rendre difficile l'accès des étudiants pauvres aux grades. Peut-on cependant parler d'une "ségrégation par l'argent" consciente et organisée ? C'est plutôt l'âpreté au gain des docteurs, eux-mêmes souvent besogneux, qu'il faut sans doute mettre en cause. De nombreux indices attestent leur "cupidité", leur souci de tirer le profit maximum des grades qu'ils décernaient tout en essayant de ne pas faire fuir les candidats éventuels par des exigences abusives.

A la fin du Moyen Age, le principe même des droits et frais d'examen était cependant parfaitement admis dans nos universités. On n'y voyait plus une forme de simonie, mais simplement le prix à payer, de manière normale, pour entrer dans la caste des ~~docteurs~~ docteurs. De plus, les cérémonies somptueuses que ces dépenses permettaient d'organiser, étaient bien perçues comme le signe que les grades ouvraient l'accès à une sorte de nouvelle chevalerie, que leur collation était l'occasion pour les nouveaux promus de s'approprier les valeurs et les rites des groupes dirigeants de la société.

Il serait souhaitable que d'autres études vinssent confirmer l'existence, dans les autres universités médiévales, de ce lien entre la nature et l'évolution des droits et frais d'examen d'une part, le recrutement et le rôle social d'ensemble de l'université d'autre part.

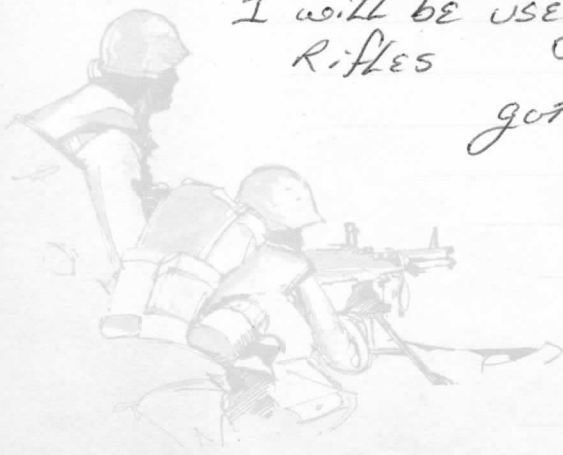


Dear Leslie,


We also pledge a report at the IREX meeting of participating representatives in Atlanta, October 7th and 8th, before the AAASS meeting.

Dear Colleague:

As you will learn from the enclosed letter and questionnaire, IREX has asked experts from the Bureau of Applied Social Research of Columbia University to undertake a major, independent evaluation of the impact of the IREX exchanges on American scholars and scholarship.

The evaluation will serve two purposes. We would like to document systematically the individual and collective accomplishments which the exchange programs have made possible and the problems which exchange participants have encountered. We would also like to identify the most important areas for improvement of IREX services. We need your help on both counts, and I hope you will take the time to respond thoughtfully to the questionnaire.


The results of the survey eventually will be published, and the preliminary findings will be the principal subject of the IREX meeting of participating representatives in Atlanta on October 7th and 8th, immediately preceding the AAASS meeting. We hope you can join us for that program, which will include panels of former participants.

To thank you for your cooperation and to encourage your attendance in Atlanta, all respondents will receive invitations to the IREX dinner there, and twenty respondents will be chosen at random for reimbursements of up to \$100 toward their hotel and incidental expenses at the IREX meeting.

We hope that this evaluation can encompass the European experience with these exchange programs, as well as the American. To this end, negotiations are currently underway to conduct parallel surveys among our former Eastern European and Soviet exchange participants. If these negotiations are successful, those surveys will begin in 1976.

We appreciate your cooperation and look forward to sharing the survey results with you.

Thank you for your letter of the 8th.

I have taken another look at your footnotes and have come to the conclusion that, in order to enable us to give a trouble-free manuscript to the printers, it should be retyped. The relocating of the English translations is a much too complicated matter to leave to printers, especially in a text which requires careful attention and at least two proofs. I always place the translation after the title and I think this is the procedure recommended by the Chicago Manual of Style.

I have also noticed that the capitalization in your translations is not consistent. Could you please decide whether to capitalize all words in the translations, or only proper names, etc. I do not recall what the Manual recommends on this question.

[In the retyped version could you also make sure that op. cit. is written as two words.]

In retyping the notes you will also have an opportunity to insert the footnote to the title of your article at the start of the notes.

I very much regret to have to make this imposition on your time. The fact that I have not asked you to do this before is entirely my fault. On first reading I had been so impressed with your study that I had come to the conclusion that at last I had a manuscript in my hands which could go to the printers without any adjustments.

I hope you understand that when dealing with a text containing passages in five or six languages, complicated punctuation and many numbers (both Roman and Arabic) it is of great importance that the printers receive a trouble-free manuscript.

I will be able to send your article to the printers immediately after the receipt of the revised version of the notes.

Dear Dr. Coffelt,

I was graduated from Y.S.U. in June, 1968, and went promptly thereafter to San Francisco where, despite having a good job, I decided to try to get into law school. I went through the formalities of applying but ultimately decided that I had already had too much of academe, for the moment.

In the course of the applications, Mrs. Mary Smith wrote a letter about me for one of my potential schools. I have enclosed a copy of the copy she sent to me.

When I visited my parents this past Christmas I realised that it is indeed time for me to complete plans about grad school and to this end, have so far taken the ATGSB, scoring in the 93rd percentile, and will repeat my law boards in two weeks despite having 1969 scores in the 97th and 98th percentiles. Because the ATGSB application form required a statement of my university accum., I rang the records office because I was unsure whether Mrs. Smith's letter said I had a 3.1 or 3.2 -- but the records office tells me I have a 2.74.

Despite my high test scores and the fact that I will have been out of university seven or eight years before entering, and therefore far more serious and wise, that great difference in my accum. must necessarily alter my choice of schools to which I will apply. On an English salary I cannot afford the application fees of, say, Harvard, if my grades are so low.

I write to you because my memories of records office efficiency are not happy, and because I think that if there is a flaw in the recording/reporting system you would be the first to want to correct it. As I cannot calculate my own accum. because I do not know the difference in weighting semester versus quarter grades, I would appreciate a clarification of my academic standing in my class and in general. As I have been trading on this 3.11 for almost six years I cannot but hope it is for real.

However! Now having taken the ATGSB & LSAT I'm looking for a job in a Warsaw-pact country (or thereabouts) to last me the next year or two. So far only W. Berlin & Yugoslavia have replied, to say that Americans outside the diplomatic corps are not welcomed. (I wrote our embassies/consulates there and in Budapest, Bucharest, Prague, Poznan, Warsaw) - if they don't pan out I may go to Dusseldorf or Munich and pound on doors until I get a job, doing anything legal or that mother would approve of.

- Incidentally, if my initial request is embarrassing or puts you in a tough spot professionally/diplomatically, don't follow it up - even the admin. of YSU must answer letters ultimately. And if you send me another postcard to reply the rate airmail is only 18¢ - you wasted a dime on the last one but thanks!

PROGRESS REPORT

Completion of the preparation of the International Encyclopedia of Higher Education is progressing most satisfactorily. This report will bring you up to date.

World-wide contacts and continuing research make it clear that this Encyclopedia will be the first among higher education publications to present administrative procedures, academic policies and organization, current issues and trends in higher education from a global perspective.

The following is a report on the various sections of the Encyclopedia.

Topics: Authors are reminded once again that outlines for articles are absolutely essential in advance of completed manuscripts, if we are to avoid considerable revamping and rewriting. Authors also are reminded that a global perspective is essential for articles which are to appear in this Encyclopedia. Authors from more than 75 nations are using illustrations based on experiences of higher education in North America, South America, the Caribbean, the Middle East, Far East, Russia, Eastern Europe, Western Europe, etc. This emphasis recognizes the growing trends toward the internationalization of higher education.

National Systems of Higher Education: Most of the 160 National Systems essays have been completed or are presently in the process of being completed by national authors or our own Encyclopedia staff writers. All such essays are being held, however, for the latest statistical information it is possible to obtain. Difficulties still remain with a few nations with internal political problems, but essays will be included on these countries with the latest information available as of press time.

Fields of Study: There will be approximately 160 fields of study included in the Encyclopedia. Each entry will describe the nature of the field, the levels and programs of study available around the world, the major national and international organizations in the field, and a bibliographic guide for information sources in the field. Three taxonomies have been reviewed and adapted to our purposes, including UNESCO's International Standard Classification of Education (Paris: UNESCO, 1974). Essays are being prepared wherever possible by national and international experts. Thus far, 120 essays have assigned authors. Bibliographies are being compiled by our staff and reviewed by library subject specialists. Completed entries will be reviewed by appropriate national and international professional organizations.

Educational Associations: We now expect that we will have some 400 associations individually presented. Experts on associations and regional areas of the world at the United States Library of Congress have assisted us in this work.


Centers and Institutes: The addition to our staff of a "quasi expert" on Centers and Institutes is enabling us now to move into this section of the work in much the same manner as we have followed in the identification of educational associations around the world.

Reports on Higher Education: Some difficulty has been encountered in obtaining copies of international reports on higher education. The unreliability of the international mails continues to plague us and we are now endeavoring to ferret out copies of these reports in major libraries in the United States.

Glossary: Our glossary is growing rapidly as manuscripts and national systems essays produce a lengthy list of terminology in need of definition to those outside the country of origin. We are beginning to conclude that this can be one of the most important sections of the Encyclopedia.

Additional Staff: During the past month we have hired three additional persons, all professional editors with publishing house experience, whose jobs will be to assist us in the processing of manuscripts in the months ahead. In addition, we have had a one-week on-site visit by the publisher's editor to establish procedures for the smooth transition of materials from Boston to San Francisco where the publisher is located.

Effective July 1, the Editor-in-Chief will assume the title of Chancellor of Northeastern University. Future correspondence should be addressed to Asa S. Knowles, Chancellor, Northeastern University, Boston, MA, 02115.

Nagyon köszönjük a szép karácsonyi üdvözléket és kedves soraitokat. Nekünk az idei különleges karácsonyi ajándékunk lett. Dec. 24-én déli 1/2 12-kor egészséges kisfiánknak született. Elhíhettek hogy jutunk neki a két klassz fiú után. Eva-Kristina lesz a neve. 3240 gram és 50 centi volt, de most hat hetes és közeledik a 4 kilóhoz, szóval népen fejlődik.

En most az iskoláig szabadsgon vagyok és valószínűleg kieszek egy év fizetés nélküli szabadsgot, mert nagyon jó itthon a gyerekekkel. Anders nagyon jó tanuló. Paul csak 1975-ben kezd az iskolát, de Anders megtanította olvasni, és írni is megtanult, így aztán nem tudom mit fog az iskolában. Most kezdett zongorázni tanulni, Anders pedig két éve. Agya óta hogy voltál Magyarországon és hogy sajnos Eva nem volt veled mert beteg volt. Mi nem voltunk 1971 óta. Majd volt itt a tavaszi félévben, június végén ment vissza. Agy három hédig volt a nyáron. Az nem vitás, hogy az árak itt Európában alaposan felmentek és a Ti eddigi igen előnyös átváltási lehetőségellek nincs más meg. Főleg az élelmiszer és a lakások, meg a szolgáltatások árai magasak. A ruhanemű még viszonylag olcsó. Most a benzín ára is felment 20%-al hála az araboknak. A magyar viszonyokhoz képest azért még mindig jól élünk. Bandi, Anders és Paul két hét múlva megy Norvégia'ba szelni az egy hétes sportszünelt idejére. Carissime !

Valóban elismerem vétkességemet, hogy a nem-írók bünös szektájába tartoztam, de fogadom erősen, stb. stb. Azt sem tudom, hol kezdjem. Mindenekelőtt megköszönöm hosszú beszámolódat, valamint a szivbőljövő karácsonyi üdvözlőt. A házépítést tárgyaló epistoládat Gábornak is megmutattam. Az Ikinék küldött csomagok felbontásánál sajnos nem voltam jelen, így a duplumokat tettem magamévá. Apropos: hogy áll Máttyás-könyved? Mikor fog realizálódni? Én most eladtam a lelkemet az ördögnek, s aláírtam egy szerződést egy tizives Zsigmond-életrajzra. Januárban le kéne adnom a próbaféjezetet, de nem tudom, hogyan fogom csinálni. Rengeteg az apró, tisztán pénzkereső feladat, s az ember könnyen szétforgácsolódik. December 1-től elkerültem a könyvtárból a dokumentációra/Tóth Pista helyére/, ez valamivel több rugalmasságot enged meg, bár így is van munka bőven. Elsősorban egy készülő történelmi atlasz szervezési és bibliográfiai munkálatai várnának rám. Ez az ügy persze érdekel is, de még nem indult meg teljes gőzzel. Makkai vezetné. Elhagyván a hivatali dolgokat áttérek a háziakra. Októberben végre átköltöztünk az új lakásba. Természetesen nem ment minden a legsimábban, mert mikor először kinyitottam, egy ácskapcsot találtam, amivel valamelyik munkás felfeszítette a már bezárt lakást és leszerelte a konyhai csap-csavarókat meg a zuhanytartót. Persze azóta sem pótolták. A kilátás nagyon gyönyörű, látjuk egész Kelenföldet, Sasadot és az erkélyről a Széchenyi-hegyet is. A lift is működik /kevés kivétellel/, a fűtés nagyon is jó, sőt egészen szárazzá teszi a levegőt, s így a régi butorok eresztékei erősen megmozdultak. Alig győzöm vizes törülközővel és edényekkel, amelyeket a fűtőtestre teszek. Mert fűtőtestre való párologtatót október óta nem kaptam... A lakásnak talán legnagyobb hibája az igen gyatra hangszigetelés, ami miatt az alsó lakók TV-jét nagyon hallani, s ha valakinek eszébe jut házibulit tartani, reng az egész ház. Ilyenkor gondolok fájó szívvvel azokra, akiknek saját home-juk a saját castle-juk... Látod, milyen elégedetlen az emberi fajzat! De azért ez eléggé zavaró, főleg, ha az ember este dolgozni akar. Ilyenkor muszáj nekem is zenét csinálnom. A nagy szobában van egy hosszú könyvespolc, ezen egyelőre dupla sorban vannak a könyvek, ami meg nem fért fel, az a sarkokban várja sorsa jobbra fordulását. Itt van még a szekréter, meg a sublót, a barokk asztalka s vettünk még négy széket is, eredetileg a konyhába, koloniál szalmafonatos kis ülőalkalmatosságokat, de oly jól néztek ki, hogy bevittük a szobába, ahová igen jól passzolnak. Ideiglenesen most itt van egy kis divány is, amelynek a másik része a harmadik szobában van /ez általában a vendégeké/, de még nem volt igazi nagy vendégjárás-, a kettőt egymásra lehet tenni, és akkor csak egy. A másik szobában a diványom van, meg több könyvkupac, a la Cheops, Chefren, Mykerinos. /Én vagyok a mumia.../ A falhoz támasztva egy nagy aranykeretes biedermeier tükör, ebben hosszasan elgyönyörködhetek bájjaim felett. /Majdnem h-val irtam, ami bizony nincs messze a valóságtól.../ Persze idővel itt is konszolidálódnak majd az állapotok. A fürdőszoba jól funkcionál. Hát ennyit egyelőre az egészről. Ami a Nachwuchsot illeti, talán most sikerül... Semmiképpen nem akarom elkiabálni. Egy finnországi utat tervezünk a nyárra, de emiatt talán el fog maradni. Hivatalos utnak ígérkezik egy rövidebb DDR-Ausflug és három lengyelországi konferencia. Most éppen egy intenzív német nyelvtanfolyamra járok, amely a nyelvvizsgára készít elő. Ezután jön az angol, bár most is szívesen gyakorolnám a kiejtést, de nincs kivel... A szakszöveget így is el kell olvassam. Még egy ujság: ismét lehetett Trabontra befizetni, s én sem voltam rest; így talán már jövő év végére /hivatalosan csak 1976-ra, de ez általában előre szokott tolni/ egy papír-Jaguar tulajdonosa leszek. Nem baj, csak guruljon. Sajnos, a kis Fiat 126 amelyet a jövőben Lengyelországból tömegesen szándékoznak importálni, igen rossz kritikát kapott, a Trabant állítólag még mindig sokkal jobb. Ezzel legalább kedvünk-re járhatjuk az országot, még maradt éppen elég műemlék, amit nem láttunk. Mikor csatlakozol hozzánk?

Könyvügyekben minden lehetőet megteszek - sajnos, valóban igazad van, a xeroxok, nem tudni miért, még itt maradtak, úgyhogy sürgősen elindítom őket. Egy Ofner Staatsrechtet csodával határos módon sikerült szereznem, ez már el is ment. A többiek bizony elég keserves dolgok, úgyhogy hosszú türelemmel vétezd fel magad.

Remélem, ez az esztendő ismét meghozza találkozásunkat. Nagyon várunk Benneteket. Hogy tőlöttétek a karácsonyt, szilvesztert?
