The Corvinian Library History and Stock By Csaba Csapedi. Transl. by Inve Gombos. Studia Humanitatis, I. Budapest : Akademiai Kiado, 1973. pp. 516

This volume is truely a labor of love. Dr. Csaba Csapodi has devoted almost a lifetime to the history of the Bibliotheca Corviniana, the Jamous library of the Renaissance king of Hungary, Matthias Corvinus (1452-1490) this patient and exchaustive research, assisted by his scholarly wife Mmeklara Gardonyi Csapodi, have ouricked thungarion Medicual of Renaissance studies for decades. The large number of articles describing their thousangly search for lost volumes of the Corvinian Library attest to their success. A few years ago they also published, with the assistance of UNESCO, a superbly illustrated volume (Bibliotheca Corviniana. The Library of King Matthias Corvinus of thungary, Budapert, Corvina Press, 1969), which summarized the state of their research at that time.

Dr. Csapodi's latest work is a definitive study on this subject and will be, in all probability, the last word on the library of king Matthias for several generations. It is a reference book of inestimable value. The work is divided into two parts. In the first section the author discusses the history of the library, its size, was development and destruction, as well as the previous estimates of its stock. The second part consists of the reconstructed Repertorium of the volumes, which, according to the author, were part of this Jamous collection.

In the discussion of the growth and decline of the Corvinian Library, Esapedi sees four distinct periods. The first stage of development extends from the election of Matthias in 1458 to 1472. The king probably had a few books of his own at the beginning of this period and might have inherited volumes from his father, I and from the collections of previous thungarian kings. Yet, the number of books Matthias had in 1458 could not have exceeded 100 volumes.

Thus this collection, which eventually surpassed almost all libraries of its time, with the exception of the Vatican, had a most modest begining. Under the influence of Archbishop Vitez Janos ihis nephew the poet Janus Pannonius and the Italian humanist Galeotto Marzio, King Matthias began earnestly to collect a library. This first period in the history of the Bibliotheca Corviniana ended with the disgrace and tragic death of both Vitez and Janus Pannonius and the acquisition of almost all of their books by the king through confiscation. This is how, for example, many of the Greek volumes of Janus became part of the royal collection. Coopedi estimates the number of volumes to be beforeen 500 and 600 by the end of this phase. The second period covers the years 1473 to 1484. After a slow start the number of volumes increased, especially after the sorival of Queen Bestix of Aragon, and reached about 1000 books. The third stage, 1485 - 1490, witnessed the peak of development in the history of the collection. After the capture of Vienna in 1485, Mathies Corvinus was at the hight of his power, spent lavishly on books abroad and employed scribes manuscripts is placed at about 150. Thus the total number of manuscripts in the royal library proper is estimated at about 1,500 to 1,600. To this number the author edds 300-400 incumabula and calculates that about 150 volumes were ordered but never delivered to Buda due to the sudden death of the king. Esapodi concludes that the total stock of the Bibliothera Corviniana ranged between 2000 and 2500 volumes. These numbers seem a little inflated and a more conservative estimate would be more realistic. The fourth and final stage extends from the death of Mathies in 1490 to the Battle of Mohacs (1526). This period can be characterized as one of lingering decay. Not only did the sweetsors of Corvinus neglect the continued growth of the collection, but some volumes were squandered, previous orders remained undelivered and the scriptorium of Buda Jell into

FROM OTHER SHORES: MALLE AND THE REGROUPING OF THE HUNGARTAN LEFT, 1919-39 LEE CONGDON

I am applying for a fellowship from the International Research and Exchanges Board for the period 1 September 1977 to 1 June 1978 in order to complete the research for a book entitled From Other Shores: Exile and the Regrouping of the Hungarian Left, 1919-39. This study in intellectual history will constitute a sequel to the series of ten articles I have published on radical Hungarian intellectuals, 1900-19, the research for which was completed in Budapest under a 1970-71 IREX fellowship.

This proposed investigation began as a study of Lajos Kassak and the circle of writers around the journal Ma ("Today"). Such a study seemed to be a logical extension of my earlier research, because as leader of the avant-garde left during the First Gorld ar, Kassak led a Young Turk revolt within the radical camp; he and his followers censured the pre-war left for its purported lack of authentic revolutionary zeal. Supported by a grant from the American Council of Learned Societies, I began my research on Kassak at the Hoover Institution on Mar, Revolution and Peace during the summer of 1973. In the initial stages of my work, I was most intrigued by the rebel artist-writer's life in Vienna. Having fled the white Terror that followed in the wake of Admiral Horthy's accession to power in 1919, he published Ma in the old Kaiserstadt from 1920 to 1925. As I became convinced that exile had added a new dimension to Kassak's radicalism, I began to think in terms of a broader study of the Hungarian intellectual enteration.

During the summer of 1975, I pursued my research in London, supported by a grant from Madison College. As a result of my work there, From Other

bhores took definite shape. Ly resolve to consider the impact of exile on the regrouping of the Hungarian left was strengthened by a long interview with Paul Ignotus (hinself an exile and a leading member of the inter-war left), whose essays constitute the indispensable starting point for my efforts.

I shall begin my book with a chapter on those intellectuals in exile who did not return to Hungary, at least until after orld far II. Among these men, most of whom were closely associated with either the Karolyi or the Kun government, were Oszkar Jaszi, Pal Szende, György Lukacs, Bela Balazs, andor Cabor, and Jenó Varga. From Vienna, Berlin, and Moscow, in emigre publications (e.g., Becsi Magyar Ujsag, Vilagossag, Diogenes, Uj Mang) or in "tolerated" Budapest forums (e.g., Szazadunk, Tarsadalmi Szemle, Condolat, 100%), they fired verbal salvoes at the Horthy government. Yet, for all their fervor and intelligence, their "letters from afar" (the title of Balazs's column in Uj Hang) seemed increasingly remote from Hungarian reality.

The major part of my book, therefore, will be devoted to those intellectuals (mostly younger men) who were repatriated in the mid-1920s; after a government amnesty. Hore specifically, I shall focus on massak, Gyula Illyes, and attila Jozsef. Lassak was the pivotal figure, "the doyen of hungarian revolutionary writers," as noestler once observed. Arrogant, but talented, his influence was pervasive. Hated by some, admired by others, this remarkable man could not be ignored. Indeed, "Lassak als braiener" might well serve as a title for my work. Both Illyes and Jozsef began as his proteges.

Gyula Illyes's populism was a product of his early life on a Trans-

danubian <u>puszta</u> and his experiences in Parisian exile (1921-26). Having begun his literary career as a contributor to Massak's <u>Ma</u>, he associated himself with the surrealists during his stay in the French capital. Yet, Illyes never became a cosmopolitan or a "French" writer; as he himself has observed many times, the view from Paris afforded new perspectives on his homeland. Paradoxically, his physical distance intensified his spiritual proximity. In 1926, he returned home to be a hungarian writer, rooting his opposition to the political-social order in the soil tilled by the dispossessed peasant masses of Hungary. Ever since, his social criticism has represented a unique synthesis of Luropean sophistication and peasant understanding.

to 1927 he did live and study in Vienna and Paris, a sojourn that was to prove decisive for his future thought. Born in Budapest and raised anidst urban poverty, attila was instinctively rebellious, but it was not until he came into contact with Viennese radicals and Hungarian emigres such as hassak, Lukacs, balazs, and Anna Lesznai, that he began to transcend his youthful mihilism and to turn to political commitment. After returning home, he edited (with Paul Ignotus) Szép Szó, the organ of Hungarian urbanism - the principal radical alternative to populism. Like some members of the Frankfurt School in Germany, he regarded it as his special task to bring together Larxism and Freudian psychology (he had heard Freud lecture in Vienna) in a combined assault on the citadels of power. It is, then, with populist and urbanist radicalism and their symbiotic relationship to stile that I will be principally concerned.

Having lived and worked in Budapest for one year, I am well acquainted with that great city's libraries and institutes. Ly research would be carried on at the Országos Szechenyi Könyvtár, the Fövárosi Szabó Ervin Lönyvtar, the Magyar Tudomanyos Akademia, and the Academy's Institutes of mistorical and Literary Science. It would be particularly helpful for my purposes to be attached to the Institute of Literary Science. I should like to be able to confer on a regular basis with scholars such as György Bodnar, who helped me very much five years ago; Farkas Jozsef, the Kassak scholar; hiklos Beladi, the Illyes scholar; and several others. Having corresponded in recent years with Erzsebet Vezer at the Petofi Museum of Literary History, I would make every effort to take advantage of her considerable knowledge of twentieth-century Hungarian intellectual history. at the Institute of Historical Science, I would benefit from discussions with Liklos Lacko, who has done some excellent work on the populists and Peter Hanak, who possesses a wide knowledge of modern Hungarian history. I am also well acquainted with the necessary sources. Although Hungarian collections outside of Hungary are very fragmented, I have exploited them fully. In order to complete my research, I must have the access to sources that working in Budapest alone would afford.

The study I am proposing would provide lestern readers with the necessary background for a fuller understanding of a number of creative writers and social thinkers of European stature. Horeover, since no full-scale study of the inter-war intelligentsia presently exists, it would supplement the work done by me and others on the "second reform generation" and thus provide a more complete account of the development of

twentieth-century Hungarian thought. And perhaps something more. If, as I believe, the political exile has become the symbol of our troubled century, a critical analysis of intellectuals in exile could shed light on what is arguably the master key to the complex intellectual history of our time.

He returned recently to personally brief me on developments and to let me know what he needs (background information) in order to help expedite his part of the work in the project.

It is a pleasure to report that preparation of the Encyclopedia is nearly complete, with ninety-eight percent of materials in the hands of the publisher. It now appears that there will be eight to ten volumes, depending upon space required for the glossary of terminology and index. The estimated wordage is approximately 3,000,000. Barring unforeseen events, the publisher expects to have the Encyclopedia ready for distribution in May, 1977.

At this time, I want to express my gratitude to the 2,000 or more scholars, members of the editorial advisory board, consultants, higher education administrators, government officials, and international educators in nations throughout the world who have assisted in the collection and compilation of information for the Encyclopedia. It is my hope that the Encyclopedia will become a major international reference work used in all nations of the world.

Those persons who have specific contracts with me as contributing authors, reviewers, advisors and consultants will receive their compensation, as agreed upon, directly from the publisher (Jossey-Bass Inc., Publishers) when the Encyclopedia is published.

In the course of preparing the Encyclopedia, a unique collection of information, basic documents, books, and other types of printed literature have been collected from nations throughout the world; and, of course, a great deal of information has been compiled through research. Recognizing the value of this collection and the importance of maintaining these resources, as well as the expertise which has been developed, Northeastern University has established the Center for International Higher Education Documentation as a division of the University Library. All Encyclopedia materials are now deposited in the Center and are being cross cataloged, with a sizeable collection owned by the University.

The new Center is under the direction of Mrs. Joy W. Viola, Senior Editor of the Encyclopedia. She is assisted by three members of the present Encyclopedia staff: Mrs. Solveig Turner, National Systems Editor; Mrs. Hazel Williamson, Educational Associations Editor; and Mrs. Kathryn McIntyre, Project Secretary. The Encyclopedia will actually carry the imprint of the Center and will be its first publication.

Whereas there are many documentation centers on higher education and numerous area studies centers on other college campuses, there are very few centers of international higher education documentation in existence anywhere which offer a global perspective on academic fields of study, major educational associations, research centers, institutes and documentation centers, national systems of higher education the world over, and international academic and administrative policies and procedures. The Northeastern Center will have, therefore, a unique opportunity to serve the international community in the realm of comparative higher education.

In the months ahead, you will be receiving further information about the publication of the Encyclopedia and the development of the Center. At this time, however, may I again thank everyone who has been involved in this project for your splendid cooperation these past four years. Without your assistance, this project could never have been completed.

JOHNS HOPKINS. Born 1795 in Anne Arundel County, Maryland of Quaker parents. Having accumulated some capital working for his uncle in a whole-sale grocery store, he (with two brothers) established a grocery business, Mopkins and Brothers, in 1822. After retiring from the grocery firm in 1847, he became a magnate in banking and railroading. When he died, 1873, he left a fortune of \$10,000,000, of which four and one-half millions were devised to The Johns Hopkins Hospital, and three and one-half million to found The Johns Hopkins University. The University opened in 1876.

MARK HOPKINS [the man on one end of the Log]. Born in Stockbridge, Mass., 4 February 1802. he was the grandson of another Mark Hopkins, an officer in the American Revolutionary War. Mark, the educator, graduated from Williams College, and from the Berkshire Medical School. After a very brief period of practice in New York City, he left New York City to return to Williams where he accepted a chair in moral philosophy (1830). In 1832 he was licensed to preach, and in 1836 became President of Williams. His tenure in the college presidency lasted until 1872, when he resigned; but on leaving the presidency he retained his professorship until his death in 1887. and his pastorate of the College church (appointed 1836) until 1883.

Of more than 1,760 Williams alumni living at his death, Hopkins had taught all but thirty.



Dr. Teller Says Soviets Had One First— Father of H-Bomb Miffed

"ENERGY AND CONFLICT: The Life and Times of Edward Teller," by Stanley A. Blumberg and Gwinn Owners. (Putnam. 492 pp. \$12.95.)

Whether he likes it or not (and he doesn't), Edward Teller is known as "the father of the H-bomb," which goes far to explain why, though one of the world's foremost theoretical physicists, he has been ignored by biographers till now. In the Fifties and Sixties, when public opinion was mostly left-leaning, Teller was regarded as the begetter of an ultimate weapon which threatened the destruction of life on this planet. His much publicized controversy with the late Dr. Robert Oppenheimer, developer of the A-bomb who resisted work on the H-bomb, earned Teller a great deal of public opprobrium, a residue of which still lingers.

This even-handed biography, written by two self-styled liberals who disagree with Teller on some points, offers the reader a number of surprises which help to clear the air. Teller cooperated with them by granting interviews and offering access to his papers, insisting throughout that he wanted no secrecy and was perfectly willing to take their criticism. Official secrecy, he still maintains, harms the U.S. more than it does the Soviet Union.

Soviets Exploded Theirs First

For the general reader the major shock delivered in this book is the news that the Russians exploded an H-bomb before the United States did. Quoting from what appear to be unexceptionable sources, the authors give the date of the first successful Soviet test as 1951 and ours as the following year. The first Soviet deliverable hydrogen bomb was detonated on Aug. 12, 1953, and ours on Feb. 2, 1954.

So much for Teller being "the father of the H-bomb." Soviet scientists, including present dissident Andrei Sakharov, have a prior claim to that dubious honor. This being the case, the reader should ask himself: what would be the position of the U.S. in the world today had Edward Teller not devised a similar weapon for

this country?

Teller was one of a group of brilliant Hungarian-born scientists who came to the U.S. because of the rise of Nazism in Europe. So numerous were they and so remarkable in the field of theoretical physics that Teller, Szilard, Bethe, von Neumann et al were collectively known as "the Martians." What historians may find paradoxical is that, while the development of the atomic bomb in World War II was hailed as a patriotic triumph for Oppenheimer and his colleagues, Teller's development of a hydrogen bomb was excoriated by many Americans a decade later. In 1970 students at Berkeley actually branded him a "war criminal" and had to be stopped by the police from burning his house down.

Deserves Praise, Not Blame

Though Berkeley has returned to normality, such public obloquoy has left a deep scar on Teller and his family. Even his public reconciliation with Oppenheimer in 1963 seems to have left some of his bitter-end opponents unmoved, though among his professional colleagues he has won international recognition. The authors quote extensively from interviews with Teller's colleagues, some of whom disapproved of his work on thermonuclear fusion yet concede his brilliance. A few believe he is "paranoid about the Russians."

In recent years Teller has urged the use of atomic explosions to produce oil from shale and has advanced other ideas for the domestic production of energy. Meantime he worries about Soviet superiority in thermonuclear weaponry. "The Russians are ahead of us and they are going to be ahead of us for years to come," he asserts.

The likelihood is that he is not exaggerating. If he takes the Russians more seriously than most of his colleagues, it should be remembered that he arrived in this country as a refugee with first-hand experience of totalitarianism. His biographers, to their credit, appear to have realized that Teller deserves more praise than blame, a verdict posterity may well confirm.


