





While admitting that out style and content may not quite match that of the more famous financial gurus of the media (Sylvia Porter, Howard Ruff, etc.) we nevertheless feel confident that the financial services offered by the YSU-FCU are impressive and should be more widely advertised to our campus community. Thus, this reaches you as the first of a series of one page newsletters in which we intend to present detailed information about the Credit Union to our current members and, hopefully to attract the attention of potential members. Our objective is to emphasize the wide range of excellent financial services available, to invite your objective comparison of these services with those offered elsewhere and to keep you fully informed of the growth and financial condition of your Credit Union.

The YSU Federal Credit Union was established in November 1974 and, as it approaches its 1st decade anniversary, can proudly note a growth from a few tens of members to over 2,800 individuals and groups in total with the current membership at approximately 2000. Similarly, assets have grown from a miniscule beginning to the 1.75 million dollar mark of today. Membership is open to all YSU employees and students and members of their immediate families and to organizations which are affiliated in some way with YSU or are within the current YSU-FCU charter.

The financial services offered by the Credit Union include:

- 1. Savings accounts currently paying  $5\frac{1}{2}\%$  dividends on the low monthly balance, compounded quarterly. Deposits are guaranteed up to \$100,000 by an agency of the Federal Government.
- 2. Loans current interest rates are 12% annually (1% of the unpaid balance per month) on new cars and 15% annually (1.25% of the unpaid balance per month) on other loans.
- 3. Convenience of payroll deduction for savings and loan payments.
- 4. Direct deposit of payroll checks.
- 5. <u>Life Savings Insurance</u> (up to \$4,000) on share accounts and <u>Loan Protection insurance</u> (up to \$10,000) on loans at no extra charge.
- 6. Share Draft Accounts, comparable to checking accounts offered by banks, pay  $5\frac{1}{2}\%$  current dividends on the low monthly balance. There is no service charge (unless the account is overdrawn) and your first 40 share drafts are FREE.
- 7. A summer payment plan for faculty on nine-month contracts.
- 8. Christmas Club Accounts earning  $5\frac{1}{2}\%$  in dividends.
- American Express Travelers Cheques at a cost of only \$1.00 per \$100 in cheques.
- IRA Accounts and certificates of deposit paying competitive interest rates.

For more information and assistance with your financial questions, give us a call or stop in the Credit Union Office. Also, please share this information with a colleague or with someone who is not yet a Credit Union member.



Dear Editors;

I am extremely disturbed by the way my article, "The Horea-Closka Revolt of 1784-1785: Some Observations," was treated in your recent publication, Transylvania. The Roots of Ethnic Conflict, pp. 93-107.

I strongly believe that, when an article will be criticized in an edited volume (in this case by the graduate student Edsel W. Stroup), especially when the author is not notified of this eventuality, it is the moral obligation of the editors to provide the author so criticized an opportunity to reply. The lack of such courtesy is especially strange in light of the fact that the book was five years in preparation and, therefore, there was no lack of time. Furthermore, since only my article received a lengthy and substantial review, a reply of a couple of pages would not have raised the price of the volume.

What is especially disturbing is that the editors considered it appropriate to have a graduate student review my article one who has obviously scanty knowledge of European History. Two examples will illustrate this point:

Mr. Stroup writes; ... "If the rebellion's demands somehow reflected the rational athmosphere of the Enlightenment, its fanatical objectives of social, racial,(!) and religious exclusiveness did not." (p. 140) Obviously, our Edsel has not year reached the era of the French Revolution in his graduate studies with its fanatical objectives of social and religiou exclusiveness. He goes on in this manner and then quotes Gyula Szekfu to the effect that "...Genuine national aspirations, or an institutional state structure, or even of Horea's phantom 'Dacian Kingdom' far surpassed the intellectual abilities of these rebels..." (p.140) The dear Edsel is

naturally unaware of the nature of jacqueries whose intellectual orientation has never been on the level demanded by graduate students. What is even more surprising, however, is that he is also blisfully unaware that he is simply echoing the nationalistic attitudes of the Hungary of the 1930's when to which even such respectable historians as Gyula Szekfű had succumbed.

These two instances are but samples of the multitude of misleading statements and opinions, some of which Edsel W. Stroup attributes to me. Unfortunately, he has been even unable to read my article carefully enough to avoid such statements.

If the editors considered my contribution inadequate, they should have excluded it from the volume. But to use it as a butt of a graduate student's desperate need for a publication without notifying me of this fact, is morally and ethically wrong. Furthermore, this volume exudes some of that nationalistic flavor that the conference at Kent State in 1979 tried, in my opinion, to avoid. It is extremely unfortunate that it was permitted to creep back through the back door, and this is the responsibility of the editors.

Therefore, I have no other recourse than publicly dissociate myself from this volume which I will proceed to do promptly.

Thank you for your kind letter of August 21. Thank you for your kind note concerning inclusion of a portrait of Janus Pannonius in Volume II of the <u>Contemporaries</u> of Erasmus.

Unfortunately this will be quite problematic. I have researched the matter and have found the following information.

There are two possible portraits of Janus Pannonius but there is serious doubt in both cases about their authenticity.

- I. Padua, Church of the Eremitani, Capella Ovetari. There is a fresco painted by Mantegna depicting St. Christopher. According to Vasari one of the figures in the fresco depicts "a Hungarian bishop," and has been identified with Janus Pannonius. This attribution is, however, a matter of dispute.
- II. Wien, Osterreichiche National Bibliothek, Cod. lat. III fol. 1. This volume contains the works of Plautus and at one time belonged to the uncle of Janus, Archbishop Vitez of Esztergom. Folio 1 has several figures in miniature, among them the possessor Vitez and possibly a likeness of the young Janus. There is no concensus on this attribution either.

As you can see, this is a rather difficult problem. While it would be nice to include a portrait of Janus Pannonius in the volume mentioned above, you might be far safer if you did not use these disputed likenesses.

Dear Professor Adler:

In August of 1985 the International Congress for Historical Sciences will be held at Stuttgart, W. Germany. I have been invited to deliver a paper at this conference and will participate on a panel devoted to "Great Personalities in the History of Universities." I have chosen as my topic the career of Robert M. Hutchins, Chancellor of the University of Chicago.

Although I am a medievalist by training, I have been interested in the history of universities since my studentsdats at the Mediaeval Institute at the University of Notre Dame. As graduate assistant to Dr. A. L. Gabriel, internationally recognized authority on university history, I became involved in this fascinating subject. I have published a number of articles in the area of intellectual history and contributed a lengthy study to the International Encyclopedia of Higher Education on the "History of Higher Education." While doing research on that article I became interested by the career of Hutchins, although I was already familiar with his name since a number of my former professors as well as colleagues were graduates of the University of Chicago (David M. Behen, Alvin W. Skardon, Steven Fulkerson, Vern Bullough).

Naturally I am familiar with the major publications of Dr. Hutchins as well as with the reaction to his plans for a truly liberal education. In order to add something new and original to the discussion of this problem, I would like to have some more detailed and personal information about the reaction to Chancellor Hutchins' plans among the faculty of the University of Chicago. I know that Professor Harry Gideonse, for example, was vocal in his criticism of Hutchins. There were obviously others both in support as well as in opposition to the views of the Chancellor (then President).

I know what an immensely busy man you are and am reluctant to add to your burden. You, as the closest associate of Hutchins, are the person who knows more about these matters than anyone else in the world,

This summer I finished another chapter, and fortunately I receibed a research leave from the University during the Winter Quarter. This will enable me to complete the writing by late March.

As far as travel is concerned, the situation is as follows: If the Renaissance Conference at Indiana does materialize, I will be going to Bloomington next spring and hope to see you there. I also plan to be at the International Congress of Historical Sciences to be held at Stuttgart next August. I am giving a paper at the meeting in the area of University History. Following the conclusion of the Stuttgart meeting, I will probably go to Budapest for 10 days or 2 weeks. We shall see what will materialize from all of this.

My health, fortunately, has been fairly good. Except for blood pressure and some circulation problems, I am well. It has been 5 years now that I was hospitalized with heart problems and as long as I don't overdo, all seems to be OK. Thank you for your concern.

Lut me know what you have in mind for the Decreta III. How would I be of assistance to you in this great project? Also do let me know more about the Nationes volume. I I looked over my correspondence with you during the past two years, and find that I have no specific information about the project. I was under the impression that you had abandoned this matter some time ago.

Congratulations on the excellent work you and your colleagues have done in the Medieval primary sources. Excellent and useful! When it becomes commercially available, please let me know. I would like to use it for my seminars.

Well, this letter has certainly become much more extensive than I originally planned, but it has been a long time since we have communicated.


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


## ICONS AND IDEAS IN SPENSER'S FAERIE QUEENE

Dr. Szőnyi holds his degrees from the University of Szeged. He has taught at the University of Warsaw and lectured in England and Ireland as well as in Hungary. His special interests include East-West cultural contacts during the Renaissance, the sociology of reading and education, occult sciences in 16th- and 17th-century Europe, medieval and Renaissance music, and reconstruction of Renaissance libraries and book collections. In addition to his Renaissance scholarship, he has also published a novel.

Dr. Szőnyi represents the Renaissance Research Centre of Attila József University. On this first visit to the U.S., he is travelling for a month to confer with colleagues and to work in the Folger,



Newberry, and Huntington Libraries. He is visiting Cleveland State in connection with *The Spenser Encyclopedia*, to which he is contributing articles on hermeticism and on John Dee (astrologer to Queen Elizabeth I, acquitted of practicing sorcery against Queen Mary in 1555).

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
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
