



Dear and Distinguished Colleague and Cher Ami:

The photo of Pierre Verger is duly posted into your book on the medieval university; my secretary, who is typing this letter, will bear witness to that fact. Pierre looks lovely, strong, and already with a Normalien look. Congratulations to both of you, and how is "Alice in Wonderland," the famous little girl Alice in the Plaza Hotel, New York City? When do I get a photo from Alice de Paree?

Now about Commission business:

- 1. Due to the fact that our colleague, Hammerstein, will be present at our meeting in Tubingen as interim representative of Germany, it would be very delicate to bring up the countercandidacy of Professor Bohan. Now what do you think about suggesting as second representative from Germany, one from Nord, this would be Professor Hammerstein and the other for Sud-Deutschland, Bavaria, who would be Professor Letitia Boehm.
- 2. I think we have to propose Mori, who was recommended by the Chairman of the Association of Japanese Historians. Naturally, if there is any other proposal, we can vote upon them. The vote is secret.
- 3. For Austria, we have Uiblein and a candidate of de Ridder-Symoens from Belgium, I think he is a professor at Graz. Due to the fact that none of them will be present at our meeting, both can be proposed and then a vote taken.
- 4. I would love to discuss with you the presidency, hopefully I will be able to confer with Professor Aleksander Gieysztor who is now in Dumbarton Oaks, Washington, If I can I will fly to Paris just to see you and discuss the Agenda of the Commission. The fact that the University of Paris never elected me Honorary Doctor makes it

difficult for me to get travel grants for Paris. I was twice in Germany, in Munich, where without any difficulty I could acquire funds.

Have you heard anything about the efforts of our dear friend, Professor Goff? I hear that one of my former students, who is editing the Government of Rulers of Vincent of Beauvais, paid a visit to him.

- 5. Hope everybody is satisfied with the Program. I saw the proofs of the Program in Stuttgart on October 1, 1984, in the headquarters of the Preparatory Committee. I put your name and de Ridder-Symoens and Feenstra and, naturally, Professor Gieysztor as president, so we are the only ones with four presidents. We look like a Politbureau, but this was the only way to assure that the noted members of our Commission should be in the General Program which is sent all over the world. I am enclosing a photocopy of that page.
- 6. Please make a note that I would like to propose Professor Dr. Leslie Domonkos, (Youngstown State University, 59 Camelot Court, Canfield, Ohio 44406, (216) 533-2771 (private) and (216) 742-3459 (Office), for Treasurer of the Commission for collecting the dues and any finances of the Commission. By the way, did I pay for 1985 as yet?
- 7. Would you have any idea of the number of copies I should print of our Program? The local organizing committee suggested charging DM 2, but I might say DM 1.50.

At the same time I was dictating this letter I received your excellent reprint, The Bible and the Middle Ages, "L'exegese de l'Universite," an excellent outline of the history of the teaching of the Bible in the medieval universities. In 1983, the University commissioned the firm of Richard Fleischman Architects, Inc. for a planning study that would reevaluate the University's existing Long Range Facilities Development Plan.

In February, 1984, the Fleischman report was submitted to the Youngstown State University Board of Trustees. They accepted the report for study and instructed the administration to develop recommendations, hold hearings, and return to the Board for further action.

The University administration developed their recommendations and held several hearings that were publicly advertised, inviting and involving the citizens of the Mahoning-Trumbull Counties area, faculty, staff, students, individuals and institutions near the campus and the President's Advisory Committee on Facility Planning (an off-campus, public group). After the hearings, certain modifications were made in the administration recommendations.

The Youngstown State University Board of Trustees at their meeting of June 7, 1985, approved and adopted the administration recommendations contained in the document The Youngstown State University Long Range Facilities Development Plan to be used to guide future capital improvements and directs that the balance of the Fleischman report be consulted whenever consideration is given to substantial changes of space utilization within buildings, but that the recommendations for such use or change in use not be considered binding.

The enclosed administration recommendations are to be used in conjunction with the Fleischman Report sent to you in previous correspondence.

### Memoirs of Fellows and Corresponding Fellows

### Charles Maxime Donatien Samaran

Charles Maxime Donatien Samaran, "Doyen d'âge" of the Institut de France, President of the International Committee of Paleography, Honorary Director of the Archives de France, Grand Officier of the Légion d'Honneur, died October 15, 1982, 13 days before his 103rd birthday, in the heart of Gascony in Nogaro, Departement of Gers, a few miles from his native village. He was buried in the cemetery of the Chapel of Hôpital-Sainte-Christie, a commandery of the Knights Hospitalers of Saint John of Jerusalem, of which he wrote its history in his 94th year: La Commanderie de l'Hôpital Sainte-Christie en Armagnac (1973). Born on October 28, 1879 in Cravencères in "Armagnac noir," after his studies in Lycée d'Auch (1890–1897), he entered the École Nationale des Chartes (1897).

This century was only a year old when Samaran, at 21, was already a member of the École Française de Rome. One of his early publications was on the papal finances in France during the period of Avignon and the Great Schism: La fiscalité Pontificale en France au XIVe siècle (1905), in collaboration with Guillaume Mollat. In 1904 he entered into the Archives Nationales in Paris. In 1927 he was appointed Director of the School of Latin and French Paleography at the École Pratique des Hautes Etudes. In 1933 a chair of Paleography and Archives for History of France was re-instated for him in the École Nationale des Chartes. In 1941 he was elected into the Académie des Inscriptions et Belles Lettres, giving him encouragement to survive the difficult war years of 1941–1948 as Director of the Archives de France.

Since 1952 he was editor of the <u>Histoire Littéraire de la France</u> and prepared Volumes 39, 40 and 41. In 1956 he was honored by the French Historical Society with his bibliography: <u>Hommage à M. Charles Samaran</u>, which at that time amounted to 539 publications, reaching 674 on his 100th birthday. In 1956 he assumed the responsibility of directing the <u>Journal des</u> Savants, a 300-year-old publication (founded 1665) of the Académie des Inscriptions et Belles

Lettres. In 1978 he was presented with two volumes of 904 pages of his collected shorter studies under the title: Une longue vie d'Érudit.

His numerous publications were characterized with elegant clarity, vigorous sobriety and solid documentation. His sources of inspiration were his love for the history of his native Armagnac, his passion for paleography to decipher difficult handwritings and editing the Records of the University of Paris, his predilection for historiography, and, desire for "distraction" led him to amuse himself with problems of literary history.

Half of his publications were dedicated to the history of Gascony and Gascons. In 1907 he published La Maison d'Armagnac au XVe siècle et les dernières luttes de la féodalité dans le midi de la France (1907). In 1912 he disserted on D'Artagnan, captain of the musketeers of the King: D'Artagnan, capitaine des mousquetaires du Roy. Histoire véridique d'un héros de roman (1912). In 1921 he published the life of Jean de Bilhères-Langraulas, a Gascon cardinal, diplomat of Louis XI and Charles VIII, who commissioned the Pietà of Michelangelo for Saint Peter's Basilica in Rome.

Samaran's long and arduous 37 years of work in the Archives Nationales made him one of the leading paleographers of our century. In 1908 he edited 48 plates of the original diplomes of the Merovingian kings in facsimile: Les Diplômes originaux des Mérovingiens. Fac-similés phototypiques (1908), in collaboration with Ph. Lauer. He also reproduced the Oxford manuscript of the Chanson de Roland in facsimile: La Chanson de Roland. Reproduction phototypique du Manuscrit Digby 23 de la Bodleian Library d'Oxford (1932). In 1931 he conceived the idea of writing a Catalogue of dated manuscripts. In collaboration with R. Marichal he published 12 volumes (6 volumes of text; 6 of plates) between 1959 and 1981: Catalogue des manuscrits en écriture latine portant des indications de date, de lieu ou de copiste.

Intrigued by the autographe handwritings of the Proctors of the Nations at the Faculty of Arts at the University of Paris, Samaran edited the minutes of the Proctors of the English-German

Nation from 1466–1492, those of the Picard from 1476–1484, and those of the French from 1443–1456 in the series of the <u>Auctarium Chartularii Universitatis Parisiensis</u> as Volume III (1935), with the aid of Suzanne Vitte, Volume IV (1938) and Volume V (1942), in collaboration with Émile Van Moé.

The historiographer in Samaran turned toward such chroniclers as Jean Castel (1927),
Guillaume Danicot, historian of Louis XI (1928), and Mathieu Levrien, chronicler of Saint—
Denis at the end of the reign of Louis XI (1938). Samaran discovered and edited the Latin
chronicle of Jean Chartier: La Chronique latine inédite de Jean Chartier (1422–1450), (1928).

During the span of 40 years he edited and translated in five volumes the works of Thomas Basin,
bishop of Lisieux: "History of Charles VII," (I., 1933; II., 1944), in collaboration with H. de

Surirey de Saint-Remy, as well as Basin's "History of Louis XI," (I., 1963; II., 1966), with the
collaboration of M. C. Garand. The Apologia of Basin (1974) was published in collaboration with
Georgette de Groër.

Samaran's venture into the history of the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries was qualified by him as "distraction." He wrote the life of the Venetian adventurer Casanova:

Jacques Casanova, vénétien. Une vie d'avanturier au XVIIIe siècle (1914) and Casanova.

Histoire de ma fuite des prisons de la République de Venise qu'on appelle les Plombs (1922).

Samaran's intellectual curiosity had no limits. While young, he translated the poems of Gabriel D'Annunzio into French; later he disserted on Rabelais, wrote on the marriage of Beaumarchais; contributed to the literary profiles of Cyrano de Bergerac, Ducange, Madame de Sévigné, Talleyrand and Georges Sand.

He had great admiration for the founding fathers of our Medieval Academy of America. In his memoirs: Enfance et Jeunesse d'un Centenaire (1979), he complimented Charles Homer Haskins. He reviewed E. K. Rand's book on the script of Tours and commented with interest on other publications of the Medieval Academy of America.

In our time of longevity it is not a novelty to reach 100 years of age, but to celebrate it with such brilliance of mind and alertness, physical fitness, vivacity and vigor as Charles Samaran did was unique in itself. He was like his favored subject, the Gascon captain D'Artagnan, always loyal and brave. When during a tiresome reception for his 100th birthday he was offered a chair, chivalrous and always polite, he looked around and said, "No, no, not for me, there are ladies around here standing."

During his visit to the United States in 1964, after being shown around in the libraries and museums of New York City, the 85-year-old Samaran insisted on seeing Times Square and on crossing the Brooklyn Bridge. The story of what happened at Brooklyn is still going around with Rabelaisian laughter in French academic circles. At the reception, Samaran was offered a gigantic cake of one yard in diameter with the inscription in chocolate frosting, "Hello Charlie."

Lucidity and sharp judgment accompanied him until the threshold of his 103rd year.

When a stroke hindered his writing, then as a true descendant of medieval masters, he dictated his letters. With his 103rd year almost completed, he earned the title of Magister Longaevissimus. His last warning to historians was: "Tu ne sauras jamais où tu vas si tu oublies d'où tu viens."

You will never know where you go if you forget from where you came.

he stained glass library window at Vassar College depicts the thesis defense of Elena Lucrezia Cornaro Piscopia who, on June 25, 1678, became the first woman to receive a doctoral degree.

The colorful scene shows her University of Padua sponsors standing in Padua Cathedral ready to present the ermine *mozetta* or teacher's cape, the doctor's heavy gold ring, and the poet's laurel wreath and to declare the Venetian scholar *Magistra et Doctrix Philosophiae*.

Born to an influential family, the Cornaro, as she is called, became a Benedictine oblate at an early age. She wore her religious robes under her gowns as a concession to her mother who disapproved of her daughter's dedication to religion and scholarship.

She had applied to take her degree in theology, but the Bishop of Padua refused. "Woman is made for motherhood, not learning," he reportedly said. He later yielded and allowed her to take the examination in philosophy.

The Cornaro Window was installed in 1906 in the Thompson Memorial Library at Vassar College.
