László Domonkos was born in Budapest and received his early education in Hungarian, German and French schools before coming to the United States in 1951. He took his undergraduate degree in History and French from Youngstown University and continued his graduate education at the University of Notre Dame, where he was awarded an MA degree in Early Modern European History. He became a fellow of the Mediaeval Institute of Notre Dame and earned the degrees of Master of Medieval Studies and Doctor of Medieval Studies in 1963 and 1966 respectively. During the 1963-1964 academic year, he studied at the University of Vienna, Austria as a Fulbright Scholar.

Since 1964 he has been on the faculty of Youngstown State University. He has lectured at a number of institutions of higher education, among them the universities of British Columbia, Notre Dame, Indiana, Duquesne, Cincinnati, the Universities of Warsaw and Stuttgart in Europe. He has been a participant in several regional, national and international scholarly conferences. With grants from the International Research and Exchange Board and the American Council of Learned Societies, he has done extensive research in European archives and libraries.

Professor Domonkos is a specialist in Late Medieval and Renaissance Hungarian cultural history. He has contributed a number of articles to journals, encyclopedias and Festschriften and is currently preparing a major monograph on the reign of the great Renaissance ruler of Hungary, Matthias Corvinus.

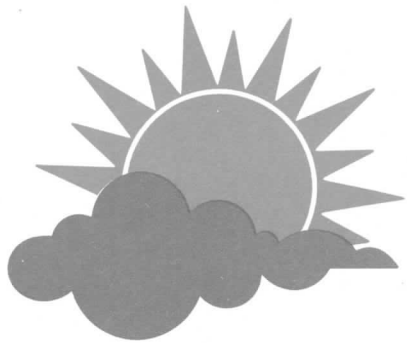

Dear Professor Domonkos:

Just a few days more than a year ago we were in Oberlin exchanging insights and research about Oszkar Jaszi and the fate of minorities/nationalities in Eastern Europe. It was an exciting conference, and for me personally it was a rewarding opportunity for making new friends and acquaintances.

At this time, my main objective, however, is not to reminisce, but to provide you with a brief report on the status of the publication process of the papers presented at Oberlin. At the same time, I would like to apologize for not writing until now, but the unsettled status of the publishing process, plus my own other commitments, conspired against the writing of interim reports.

Finally, we have arrived at the stage where I can say some concrete things about what is likely to transpire. After discussing the content of the proposed volume with the publisher (Atlantic Research), we came to the conclusion that collecting all the studies presented at Oberlin into one volume would produce an expensive book and one that would be hard to market. Consequently we have decided to divide the papers into two groups, one dealing just with Jaszi, the other focusing on the "nationality question" in Eastern Europe. In this way both will be more coherent and at the same time less bulky, less expensive to produce, and easier to market. Since the project is now divided into these two parts, the editing work will also require two separate teams. Harlan Wilson and William Batkay will be the co-editors of the Jaszi volume while Nandor Dreisziger and myself will be co-editors of the Nationalities in Eastern Europe volume. The probable publisher for both volumes remains Atlantic Research and Publications, with the Jaszi volume scheduled to appear first (since the studies collected already compose a complete and coherent whole) while the volume on Nationalities in Eastern Europe needs to be supplemented by some additional contributions to make it publishable. This means it will appear somewhat later. You will receive an update on the publication schedule from the editors responsible for each of the above volumes.

Dear Colleague:

Please forgive my being out of touch so long; let me now try to explain why.

Our conference on the Renaissance, as originally formulated, was approved by the Joint Committee on Eastern Europe of the American Council of Learned Societies of which I was then a member. As you know, the date for the Conference was shifted to June 1987 in order to allow more time for the preparation of papers and to secure the participation of a few scholars in East Europe with whom contacts were slow in developing.

When plans were nearly complete -- that is, the speakers and their topics as well as a site (Dubrovnik) had been agreed upon -- I submitted the program to the ACLS with a request for the release of at least some of the \$15,000 (tentative) budget allocated for the Conference so that some preliminary expenses could be met. In the meantime, the terms of a few members of the Joint Committee -- myself among them -- expired, and a new Committee was formed. Speaking for the new Committee Dr. Jason Parker of the ACLS informed me that it had now instituted an outside review policy for conferences and that no funding for the Renaissance Conference could be approved pending the results of an outside review of the program that I had submitted. I objected to this on the grounds that my understanding was that the Conference had already been approved and that a new policy was being applied retroactively. My objection was overruled and the Renaissance Conference program was sent out for review.

Dr. Parker eventually got back to me with the report that the outside reviewers were on the whole quite favorably disposed to the project, but had suggestions for changes which the Committee then expected me to make. The suggestions included broadening the scope of the Conference by inviting participants in music and the fine arts and disinviting certain participants on the grounds that there were more prestigious scholars in the same field who should be invited instead. I agreed in principle to the former suggestion and disputed the latter. One of the scholars to be "replaced," for example, was Prof. Pelc of Warsaw whom I had invited to speak on Kochanowski on the basis of a major study by him on the poet. I had originally decided not to invite Prof. Ulewicz of Krakow since he had already given a lecture on Kochanowski at a conference at Indiana. Prof. Weintraub of Harvard, my first choice, was not in the best of health at the time and so I decided against asking him to participate thinking that a long trip to a conference would probably be out of the question. My efforts to enlist the participation of specialists on East European music, painting and architecture during the Renaissance proved only partly successful and in any case sufficiently time consuming so as to throw the conference target date of June 1987 into jeopardy. I also encountered considerable difficulty in bringing a Polish Renaissance historian into the Conference after never receiving a reply from Prof. Janusz Tazbir of Warsaw whom I had originally invited.

To compound the problems I was then experiencing, I was also informed by Dr. Parker that the new Committee at the ACLS also wanted the

Conference revised in such a way as to make it more "issue oriented." I found that rather difficult to understand in view of what I assumed to be prior Committee approval of the nature and scope of the Conference. Dr. Parker advised me additionally that no funds for the Conference would be approved until the revisions proposed by the Joint Committee were effected. This meant, in effect, that the Conference had to be reformulated along the following lines: a) it had to become "issue oriented," which would, in my opinion, then change its character; b) it had to have the added participation of music and fine arts specialists whom I had difficulty in identifying and whose inclusion in the Conference threatened to broaden it still further at a time when the Committee was insisting that it become more "issue oriented"; and c) that a few participants already invited be dropped in favor of others which I refused to do both for reasons of courtesy and because I simply could not see a solid objective basis for a preference for one scholar as opposed to another. I also strongly objected to the fact that we were now being required by the new Committee at the ACLS to revise a conference already previously approved and that until the Committee was satisfied with the redesign of the Conference it could not be approved for funding. I was also asked to have participants submit summaries of their papers for review by the Committee. I felt that I could not ask participants to undertake this work at a time when there was no guarantee that the Committee would approve even a revised Conference. I asked Dr. Parker for a commitment on behalf of the Committee for the funding of the Conference for the date already agreed on and assured him that an effort would be made to include some representation of music and the visual arts and that a certain refocusing of the Conference would be undertaken in order to bring certain "issues" more to the fore (mostly along the lines of significant divergences in the development of the Renaissance in East Europe from West European patterns). I declined, however, to disinvite anyone already on the program. Dr. Parker told me that no commitment would be possible until, in effect, a new conference proposal was submitted. This meant, of course, that there could be no guarantee that the Committee would approve even a revised proposal.

With considerable regret I have to inform you now that because of present circumstances, which I have tried to describe as best as possible in this letter, I am giving up any further work on the Conference. This means then that the Conference is being cancelled and I am so advising the Joint Committee at the ACLS.


While we indeed have the goodwill of the Committee and have had quite favorable response to and review of the original Conference proposal, my sense is that the Joint Committee has developed a different, more critical attitude toward conferences than what existed when I was a member of it. Scholarly conferences are still looked upon with favor by the ACLS and are still supported, but at least with respect to the Joint Committee on Eastern Europe the view now seems to be that the Committee has funded too many conferences in the past and that not all of them worked out well (meaning primarily, that a number of them did not result in publications); therefore a more rigorous screening of conference proposals should be instituted. I certainly have no quarrel to find with the objectives of such a policy, but I very much take issue with the retroactive application of it to a conference, such as the one on the

Renaissance, which had already been approved and for which a program, conference site, and date had already been submitted and announced. I honestly do not think it fair for a new Committee at the ACLS to ask for revisions at such a late date and for revisions which by their nature point to a serious alteration of the original Conference. I also find it contradictory that we are being asked to broaden the Conference to include music and the visual arts at the same time as we are being urged to narrow its scope by making it more "issue oriented."

In its original formulation, the Conference may not have been perfect, but it did represent a respectable attempt to provide a good overview of major aspects of the development of the Renaissance in East Europe. A few specialists on the Renaissance in the West had agreed to participate as commentators and the prospects for a fruitful conference seemed good. From the very beginning, I saw our Conference as a way of producing a badly needed English-language text of a general nature on the Renaissance in East Europe as a whole, one that might broaden the scope of Renaissance studies at least in this country and at the same time make a valuable contribution to East European studies. The project may have been overly ambitious from the start, but I do think that it was worth undertaking. I am very sorry that it will not take place and I am most grateful for your interest and support all along. But in the present situation with respect to the ACLS, I strongly doubt that the Conference can be revised to the satisfaction of the Joint Committee on Eastern Europe. Any further attempts at revision would only result in additional postponements with no guarantee still of eventual approval and funding.

I deeply regret the way that this has all turned out and I apologize for any inconvenience the change of plans may have caused you. With all best wishes for the New Year, I am,

IREX needs your help!

1) We are applying for a renewal of our major, multi-year grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities. The Endowment is most interested in knowing how the IREX exchanges have contributed to the growth of scholarship, as reflected in the publications of IREX participants. May we ask you to send us in the nearest future your latest curriculum vitae with a list of publications? Please place a bold check mark next to those that are related in whole or in part to your IREX exchange sojourn(s). We will collate the results here at IREX for presentation to the NEH. Please include the full range of your IREX-related publications, from the earliest to the most recent.

2) As you know, the largest single funding source for the IREX exchanges is the United States Information Agency, specifically, the USIA's account for educational and cultural exchanges. This source is now threatened by a sharp reduction as approved by the the Senate Appropriations Committee. There will be two opportunities during September to reverse this outcome: in the full Senate appropriations debate, and/or during the House-Senate conference committee proceedings. If you are willing, please write as soon as possible to both of your Senators asking that, when the matter comes before the full Senate, they support the more favorable level (\$144 million) approved by the House of Representatives. In addition, if your Representative's name appears on the enclosed list of members of the House Appropriations Committee, will you please write to her or him asking support for the House figure when the matter comes to the attention of the House-Senate conference committee. While the appropriation is most closely identified with the Fulbright exchanges, IREX draws its funds from the same line, and could be seriously affected by a reduction.

We thank you for taking the time to address these critical matters. Both are extremely important to the future of the exchanges.

Cher(e) et éminent(e) Collègue,

L'année 1986 approchant de sa fin, permettez-moi de vous présenter, tout comme dans ces dernières années, un bref aperçu de l'activité de notre Centre.

Malheureusement je ne peux pas rendre compte, cette fois-ci de la parution de nouvelles publications, étant donné qu'en conséquence de la crise régnante dans le domaine de l'édition en Hongrie depuis plusieurs années retarde la parution de bon nombre de nos livres remis à l'imprimerie. Ce qui me désole le plus c'est que je ne peux toujours pas annoncer la parution du I^{er} volume de l'histoire de la littérature de la Renaissance en quatre volumes mis au point sous l'égide de l'Association Internationale de Littérature Comparée. Toutefois, et cela nous console quelque peu, nous sommes en train de corriger la mise en page et à mettre au point l'Index, autrement dit, si l'on ne peut pas encore annoncer la parution, on ne peut pas moins enregistrer un progrès sensible des travaux. Il y a également progrès en ce qui concerne les préparatifs du volume IV de ce manuel dont la responsabilité incombe également à notre Centre. De nombreux collaborateurs de ce volume nous ont déjà fait parvenir le chapitre dont ils avaient la charge, et nous espérons recevoir dans les mois qui suivent les chapitres encore en chantier.


Pour ce qui est des autres travaux en cours, j'aimerais en particulier signaler l'édition de la correspondance d'Andreas Dudith, dont le premier volume est achevé, en premier lieu grâce au bon travail de nos collègues M. Tibor Szepessy et Mme Klára Pajorin. Nous avons commencé et fait avancer les préparatifs de l'édition critique des oeuvres de Janus Pannonius, et espérons pouvoir faire disparaître cette regrettable lacune des recherches portant sur l'humanisme hongrois. Nous pouvons enregistrer quelques résultats aussi en ce qui concerne notre participation à la Bibliotheca Dissidentium dirigée par le professeur André Séguenny. Pour la série contenant les bio-bibliographies des penseurs religieux non-conformistes du XVI^e siècle le premier volume consacré aux hérétiques et hétérodoxes hongrois dirigé par M. Mihály Balázs est mis au point et remis au directeur.

Une perte douloureuse a été pour nous tous la mort subite et inattendue du professeur Robert Dán, éminent chercheur de la Réforme, savant hébraïsant et directeur de la série Bibliotheca Unitariorum contenant les fac-similé des écrits antitrinitaires de l'époque. Il nous sera extrêmement difficile de le remplacer et de poursuivre le travail sans sa compétence. Voilà ce qui explique que les travaux du deuxième volume de la série ont subi un sensible retard et le volume ne pourra sortir que l'année prochaine.

Le Centre a continué à organiser ses réunions mensuelles. En dehors des conférenciers hongrois nous avons eu la joie de pouvoir saluer parmi nous Ms. Kathryn Milun (Minneapolis) et les professeurs Piña Martins (Lisbonne) et Kim Veltman (Toronto). Le colloque annuel du Centre s'est tenu entre le 21 et le 24 mai dans la ville de Szigetvár, sous le titre "L'époque des Turcs en Hongrie". Les discussions du colloque portaient sur les problèmes de la culture hongroise (et turque, sud-slave et juive) survivante sur les territoires de la Hongrie occupée par les Turcs. Parmi les conférenciers hongrois il y avait entre autres nos éminents turcologues et comme hôte étranger nous avons le plaisir de pouvoir écouter l'exposé de M. Markus Köhbach, professeur de turcologie à l'Université de Vienne.

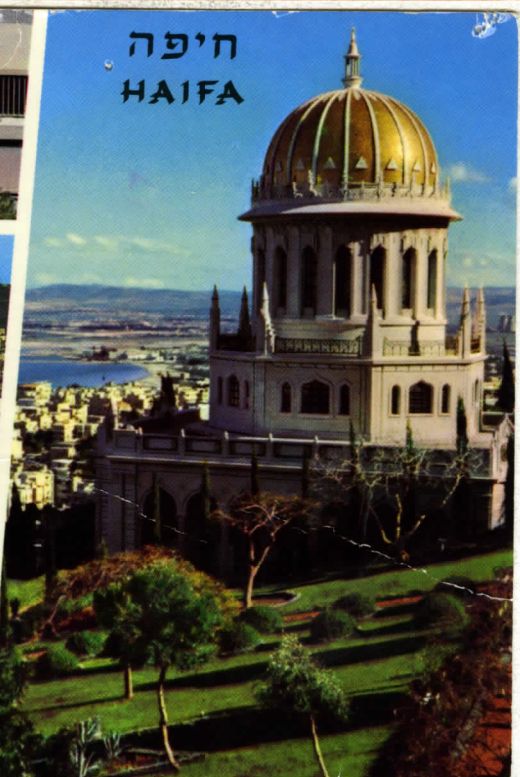

Oh edle Nacht

Weihnachtsimpressionen aus Bayern

Ganz Bayern riecht in diesen Tagen nach Lebkuchen und Punsch. Überall florieren die Christkindl-Märkte. Weihnachtsschmuck aus Stroh und Bienewachs gibt es zu kaufen, Gewürzsträuße, bemalte Spanschachteln, „Berchtesgadener War“. Die Kirchen stellen ihre Krippen auf, mancherorts, in Andechs, in Miesbach, sind „lebende Krippen“ zu sehen, mit echten Menschen und Stalltieren zum Streicheln.

Den Kunstfreund lockt das Diözesan-Museum in Freising, wo eine neu erworbene neapolitanische Krippe – die größte soll es sein und eine der schönsten, mehr als eine Million Mark wert – zu bewundern ist. Das vorzüglich erhaltene Prachtobjekt, das sich der König beider Sizilien in der zweiten Hälfte des achtzehnten Jahrhunderts von Künstlern anfertigen ließ, ist mit Fürsten und Bettlern, Hofleuten und Fischweibern, Komödianten und Bauern ein wahres Panoptikum seiner Zeit.

Die bayerischen Weihnachtsbräuche, deren Ursprung im Barock, im Mittelalter, oder gar in ferner vorchristlicher Zeit zu suchen ist, haben nicht unangefochten unsere Tage erreicht. Ob Weihnachtsschießen in Berchtesgaden, wo in der Woche vor dem Christfest jeden Tag zehn Minuten lang gegen die bösen Geister losgeballert wird, ob Fackellauf in Kempten oder Floßfahrt der mit Kerzen erleuchteten Luzienhäuser auf der Amper, die meisten Bräuche sind Wiederbelebungen aus allerneuester Zeit.

In ihnen meldet sich das bayerische Selbstbewußtsein kräftig zu Wort. Auch das „Alpenländische Adventssingen“, wo in Dirndl und Kniebundhosen gewandete Musikanten Harfe, Hackbrett, Zither spielen, Wiegenlieder und Andachtsjodler singen und meistens noch Texte besinnlichen Inhalts rezitieren, ist eine Erfindung der Nachkriegszeit.

In der Landeshauptstadt erreicht das vorweihnachtliche Treiben – „Weihnachtstod“ hin oder her – um den vierten Advent herum seinen Höhepunkt. Am Gärtnerplatz-Theater, so steht es in der Zeitung, wird am Samstag Punkt zehn der Vorverkauf für die Vorstellung am Weihnachtsabend „Eine Nacht in Venedig“ eröffnet. Da sich die Interessenten bereits Freitag nacht anstellen, schenkt die Theaterleitung um halb acht Gratiskaffee aus. In der Akademie der Schönen Künste liest die allererste Theatergarnitur die Weihnachtsgeschichte der Bibel: Dieter Dorm, Marianne Hoppe, Peter Lühr, Maria Wimmer.

Die halbe Stadt verfällt dem Musikausgang. Das Konzert in der Musikhochschule, dreimal gegeben: ausverkauft. Das „Weihnachtsoratorium“ in der Philharmonie (2400 Plätze): voll. Adventssingen, Barockmusik in der Residenz: Stunden zuvor keine Parkplätze mehr. Die Woge der Musikfreunde schwappt in

den Gebrüdern Asam allerfeinst dekorierten Raum geht es heimelig familiär zu.

Diverse Geschwistergruppen – „de Grabenstätter“, „de Lechler“ – singen und musizieren, daß die im Kerzenlicht schimmernden eleganten Tabernakelengel des Johann Baptist Straub noch fröhlicher ihre silbernen Weihrauchfässer schwingen: „Oh edle, liebeiche, herzugeldene Nacht!“

Einen handfesten Weihnachtsskandal gibt es auch. Per Fernsehen frei Haus geliefert von Udo Lindenbergh. In einer Talk- und Musikshow des dritten Programms, die live gesendet wurde, verstieg sich der mancherorts als „Medienbubi“ etikettierte Rocksänger zu dem, was der „Münchner Merkur“ eine „unglaubliche Gotteslästerung“ nennt. Daß er die Heiligen Drei Könige als „Schleicher in der Wüste“ bezeichnete, hätte man ihm vielleicht noch durchgehen lassen. Aber Jesus als „Rumpelstilzchen“, das Christkind als „Sensationsfratz“, das schlug dem Faß den Boden aus.

Im Bayrischen Rundfunk flogen die Fetzen, der Fernsehdirektor entschuldigte sich persönlich beim Publikum, während der Übeltäter treuherzig von sich bekannte, ein Jesus-Fan zu sein und an Weihnachten einen aufs Christkind zu trinken. Selber schuld, Bayerischer Rundfunk, wer liefert schon solchen Schnodderschnauzen die Weihnachtsgeschichte zum „Versketchen“ aus!

Flucht aus dem Geschwätze und Gesein und Getriebe. Zuerst ins Museum. Ein Spielchen spielen: Welches ist das schönste Weihnachtsbild? In der Alten Pinakothek ein hoffnungsloses Unterfangen.

Nehmen wir in diesem Jahr die Gemälde der großen Flamen, die gemalt sind auf der Kippe des Mittelalters zur Neuzeit. In der Wachheit und individuellen Ausdruckskraft der Gesichter, die Rogier van der Weyden, Dirk Bouts den Betern an der Krippe gegeben haben, findet sich schon der moderne Mensch, doch ist ihnen noch die ganze Frömmigkeit der alten Zeit eingeschrieben.

In der Katholischen Akademie trägt der neue Weihbischof von München, Engelbert Siebler, ein kantiger Mann aus dem Niederbayerischen, dem quirligen Journalistenvolk, ehe es ans Buffet geht, eine Weihnachtsmeditation vor. Der himmlische Gesang, die Engel der Weihnachtsgeschichte, sagt er, erleichtern den Menschen den Zugang zu dem Ungeheuren, das geschieht: dem Einbruch des Göttlichen in die Welt.

Gold und Silber, mit dem seit dem dritten Jahrhundert die Krippe verkleidet wird, jubelnde Musik, fröhliches Brauchtum, ja selbst die geschlottenen, den Kommerz ankurbelnden Geschenke wären demnach notwendige Krücken für das menschliche Fassungsvermögen. Die angemessenste Reaktion auf das
