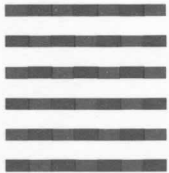

Dear Dr. Domonkos:

I am pleased to inform you that your application to participate in the exchange program with Hungary during the 1987-88 academic year has been approved by our Selection Committee for Eastern Europe. Your fellowship has been designated as one lasting 4 months beginning 15/03/88 (day/month/year).

A memorandum regarding financial provisions is enclosed. Final disposition of your IREX fellowship is contingent upon ratification of your nomination by the Board of the American Council of Learned Societies and, of course, upon your official acceptance by the authorities of the host country. It is also contingent upon your being in good health and upon what other fellowships and awards you may receive.

All participants who have been selected for the 1987-1988 IREX exchange programs are advised that applications by IREX for funds to support these programs are still pending with the organizations that have given grants to IREX. Since these granting organizations have not officially informed IREX that the grants will be forthcoming, IREX is not legally permitted to make financial commitments to its own grantees until it receives formal notification that its applications for support have been approved, nor can IREX disburse funds to its grantees until the essential monies have actually been given to IREX for this purpose. Consequently, the announcement of your selection at this time is for information purposes only and does not constitute a binding financial commitment by IREX.

In order for us to nominate you to our exchange partner we shall need to receive from you the data sheet called for by the exchange agreement. Enclosed are four data sheets, which you should complete in accordance with the enclosed instructions. It is essential that we receive your data sheets no later than February 5, 1987 (please use special delivery, Express Mail, or Federal Express).

January 15, 1987

In preparing your data sheet, please remember that it will provide the basis for both the host country's decision on your acceptance and the details of your placement in that country. Accordingly, please be as specific as possible in naming the institution(s) with which you wish to be affiliated and in naming all archives and research locations you wish to visit. In describing your proposed theme, exercise restraint and common sense to avoid any wording or reference which might be construed by the authorities as sensitive or inappropriate without, of course, misrepresenting your project in any way. The proposed theme must not exceed one and a half pages.


IREX participants who have requested a starting date of September 1, 1987 may be admitted to a one-month summer language program at the Summer Language Institute in Debrecen. Time spent at the seminar will not count against a participant's total number of months. This program usually begins in late July and ends in late August. At the end of the language program participants may immediately begin their grant period. As soon as the exact dates of the program are known you will be informed. If you wish to attend, please include this fact on your data sheet.

According to the exchange agreement, a reply to our nominations from our exchange partner in Hungary is due on April 15. However, we sometimes do not receive notification before June 1. We will, contact you immediately upon receiving a reply to your nomination and will be in touch with you before then regarding the details of your award.

Any questions regarding any of the information in this letter should be addressed to Marian Zelazny, Program Officer.

We look forward to receiving your data sheets in the immediate future. In the meantime, please accept my congratulations on your selection by the Committee.

STUDENT ORGANIZATION ADVISOR'S RESPONSIBILITIES

- A. As one means of promoting positive student-faculty extra class interaction, all registered organizations are now required to have a full-time faculty or staff member as an advisor.*
- B. Appointed annually by the President of the University, the advisor agrees to maintain contact with the organization and to be familiar with its programs and personnel.
- C. The University expects an advisor to:
 1. act in an advisory as opposed to a directive relationship in their organization. The following educational functions are cited as examples:
 - a. providing the officers with the elements of good organizational and administrative practice,
 - b. teaching the techniques and responsibilities of leadership and following,
 - c. teaching the principles of effective group operations,
 - d. developing procedures and plans for action,
 - e. keeping the group focused on its goals,
 - f. developing self-discipline and responsibility in the group, and
 - g. stimulating and initiating activity;
 2. be available to the officers and members in order to share ideas about organization affairs;
 3. meet with the officers as a group at least quarterly to discuss the progress and direction of the group;
 4. attend as many meetings and functions as possible;
 5. advise and consult with the organization and its officers in its financial affairs to see the proper budgets are formulated as well as proper distribution of, and accounting for funds of the organization are maintained;
 6. accept responsibility for transmitting communication between any University office and the organization's officers;
 7. grant approval for any off-campus activities in which students represent the organization such as meetings, convention, etc.;
 8. sign or cosign appropriate University forms such as those for the organization's request for use of campus facilities, purchase orders, travel requests, or the registration of visiting speakers or lectures; and
 9. monitor the organizations' activities closely enough to ensure that the organizations comply with University and state hazing regulations.
 10. serve until a successor is appointed, if for any reason it is impossible to continue as advisor to the organization.

* Limited service faculty or staff may serve as advisor upon approval of the Coordinator of Student Activities.

Medievalist spotlights

Paris students

Early Hungarian ties to the West are revealed in a new book by a University of Notre Dame medievalist who explores the life of Hungarian students and masters at the University of Paris in late 15th and early 16th Centuries.

The book, "The University of Paris and its Hungarian Students and Masters During the Reign of Louis X and Francis I," is by Prof. Astrik L. Gabriel, director emeritus of the Medieval Institute at the University.

Hungarian subjects studying at the University of Paris were part of the English-German nation, the term "nation" signifying the tribe or clan to which an individual belonged. The foreign students in this nation came from northern and central Europe, as well as from England, Scotland and Ireland. Relying on unpublished material on the English-German nation, Gabriel reconstructs the intellectual contacts of Hungarians with outstanding German, English, Dutch, Scotch, and Irish scholars of the time. Some Hungarians were elected to high offices in the nation, and they even inscribed their native saints into the official calendar used by the nation, originally written in the 14th Century.

Using casual information written by officials of the nation between the lines of financial accounts, Gabriel outlines the

political and historical events of the time, including the plagues of 1501-1502 and 1522 to which Hungarian students were exposed during their studies in Paris. Gabriel also shows that Hungarian students went on to enroll at other famous European universities, such as Cracow, Padua and Vienna, after leaving Paris.

The flourishing contact of Hungarians with the West came to a tragic close in 1526, the author notes, when the Turks successfully invaded Hungary and the

flow of students to Paris was cut off.

Gabriel, an expert in the history of medieval education, has been at Notre Dame since 1948. A native of Hungary and a former professor at the University of Budapest, he is a corresponding member of the French and Bavarian Academies of Sciences and fellow of the Medieval Academy of America. His book is the 17th in a series of Texts and Studies in the History of Medieval Education originated at Notre Dame.

This memorandum has several subjects, the foremost being an expression of our appreciation and thanks for taking part in the Annual Meeting of the Medieval Academy next month in Toronto. We are grateful to you for taking a part in the program and look forward eagerly to the event. Thank you for agreeing to participate.

The concurrent sessions are a design familiar from many conferences, but uncommon at meetings of the Medieval Academy on the scale of next month's meeting. The Officers and Council of the Academy view the concurrent sessions as having several advantages: One is the opportunity for colleagues widely dispersed by field and location to help organize the program; another is an enriched program offering sessions which will appeal to a wide variety of professional interests; and a third is the opening of the program more widely than in the past so that more members of the Academy will be able to participate in meetings than have in recent years.

The plan for concurrent sessions is a pilot project, which may be retained as a standard design, or not, depending on the way this meeting and the two to follow it in 1988 and 1989 are perceived by those attending. There is, in sum a larger issue at stake than this one meeting, although that is our immediate concern.

Beyond some words of welcome, then, this memorandum is to invite your attention to the pilot nature of the concurrent sessions and to request your observance of the time limits for papers and for sessions. As you can see from a glance at the entire program, the schedule is very tight; there is no time to accommodate run-overs in the sessions. No one wants to be left

with inadequate time for his or her presentation or with a dwindling audience vanishing toward the next event. To keep everything on time is important to the whole design and a courtesy both to other participants and to the audience. To the point, then. May I remind everyone that the upper time limit for papers in concurrent sessions is 25 minutes. Where there are four speakers in a session, the limit should probably be 20 minutes, if there is to be time for discussion. In making final adjustments to your papers, please ensure that not more than 25 minutes will be taken to read them at a normal rate of delivery; a length of 10 to 12 typed pages in double spacing with normal margins is about the maximum length to meet this constraint. I hope this request is seen as it is intended, an effort to ensure that everyone has his or her fair share of scheduled time.

Our records as of March 25th indicate that you have not yet registered. Could you please send your registration form by return mail; we need to know your intentions about attending the banquet, lunches, reception and play at once. A telephone call will ensure that space is held: (416) 978-4884. The date for release of the block reservation at the Park Plaza Hotel is already past. If you telephone the hotel, you may still be able to reserve a room, but the space is going quickly. There are many other hotels in the approximate area; if you need assistance, please call, but as soon as possible.

We look forward to seeing you in Toronto in a month's time.

László Domonkos was born in Budapest and received his early education in Hungarian, German and French schools before coming to the United States in 1951. He took his undergraduate degree in History and French from Youngstown University and continued his graduate education at the University of Notre Dame, where he was awarded an MA degree in Early Modern European History. He became a Fellow of the Mediaeval Institute of Notre Dame and earned the degrees of master of Medieval Studies and Doctor of Medieval Studies in 1963 and 1966 respectively. During the 1963-1964 academic year, he studied at the University of Vienna, Austria, as a Fulbright Scholar.

Since 1964, he has been on the faculty of Youngstown State University. He has lectured at a number of institutions of higher education, among them the universities of British Columbia, Notre Dame, Indiana, Duquesne, Cincinnati, the Universities of Warsaw and Stuttgart in Europe. He has been a participant in several regional, national and international scholarly conferences. With grants from the International Research and Exchange Board and the American Council of Learned Societies, he has done extensive research in European archives and libraries.

Professor Domonkos is a specialist in late Medieval and Renaissance Hungarian cultural history. He has contributed a number of articles to journals, encyclopedias and Festschriften and is currently finishing a major monograph on the reign of the great Renaissance ruler of Hungary, Matthias Corvinus.

ADMISSION AND PARKING FREE

Professor co-edits book

Dr. Leslie S. Domonkos of Canfield, professor of history at Youngstown State University, has co-edited a book just published and distributed by Columbia University Press, New York.

"Louis the Great: King of Hungary and Poland" commemorates the 600th anniversary of the death of the monarch who ruled over Central Europe in the 14th century. His reign was significant because of the flowering of late medieval culture in both countries, and the major role Hungary and Poland played in European affairs during his lifetime.

The book contains 22 studies written by an international team of specialists from the United States, Canada and Europe. The various articles examine the political, as well as artistic, literary and cultural history of Hungary and Poland.

In addition to serving as an editor, Dr. Domonkos wrote one of the articles, "The Campaign of Louis the Great in Italy."

Co-editors with Dr. Domonkos were Dr. S.B. Vardy, professor of East European History and chairman of the Department of History, and Dr. Geza Grosschild, professor of Economics, both from Duquesne University, Pittsburgh.

Born in Budapest, Hungary, Dr. Domonkos graduated from Farrell, Pa., High School, and received a bachelor's degree from Youngstown University and master's and doctor's degrees from the University of Notre Dame's Medieval Insti-

tute.

He has served as senior scholar in the International Research and Exchanges Board in Budapest, as well as a visiting senior scholar in the Hungarian Academy of Sciences. He also was a Fulbright Scholar at

the University of Vienna.

Dr. Domonkos has twice received the Distinguished Professor Award for excellence in teaching and scholarship at YSU, where he is a specialist in Medieval and Renaissance cultural history.



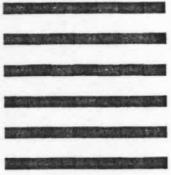

Dear Ms. Kolesar:

During the late 1950's, I had completed a four year tour in the Air Force during the Korean conflict, had been working at Copperweld Steel Company and was also working an extra job, an apprentice dry-wall finisher in construction.

In the mid 1960's, I still was uncertain as to what I really wanted in life and in which direction I should proceed. I did, however, become active in the labor movement and attended one of the Labor Education Studies provided by Ohio State University. This was a four year program, which greatly excited me. I vividly remember an outstanding instructor, Professor Morris Slavin.

It was during Professor Slavin's teachings I discovered what I wanted in life. Dr. Slavin was an unselfish, dedicated individual. He would take extra patience and give unlimited time to be sure his charges fully understood his teachings. He motivated me, as well as many other local Labor leaders during this Labor Studies course.

At one point in time, when the sessions were being held during the evenings at the Warren G. Harding High School, a directive was issued which notified our group that classes could no longer be conducted at that facility. The Director of the Ohio State University Labor Studies was desperately seeking another favorable location.

In the meantime, to prevent the Labor Studies students from missing any Labor Studies classes, Professor Slavin unselfishly scheduled the students to meet at his home. This did place an undue burden on Mr. and Mrs. Slavin, but together they congenially accepted our traipsing through their home, into their living room, week after week; even during the inclement winter months. Needless to say, we did track in salt, snow and other debris which became embedded into their carpeting and floors.

From the inspirational teachings which Dr. Slavin conveyed to me, I became a different person. Thanks to him, I enrolled in Kent State University, became more deeply involved with the labor movement and went to work with the U.S. Department of Labor as a liaison representative from the AFL-CIO in Washington, D.C.

Presently I am working for the United Steelworkers of America as a representative at our International Headquarters in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

Many things could have happened in my life, and many avenues could have been chosen for me to travel; but I attribute my labor field success to people who cared and were concerned. Certainly, Professor Slavin was one of the "concerned and caring" individuals who gave me the opportunity to think positive of myself. I am, and will always be, most grateful to Dr. Slavin and I will always appreciatively remember Mr. and Mrs. Slavin.

I truly consider Dr. Slavin a fine human being and a man devoted to social justice; therefore, I enthusiastically recommend the University bestow the "Heritage Award" upon him.



Dear Professor Gabriel,

Prof. Domonkos was so kind to write me that he will send You a copy of my letter to him. So I hope You wont mind me writing You.

After having passed the degré of maître-ès-lettres at Aix-en-Provence in 1985, I am now preparing a thesis under the direction of Prof. Laetitia Boehm at the University of Munich, Institute for History of Universities and Education. My dissertation shall deal with the life and works of the Parisian magister regens theologiae Jean d'Anneux (Johannes de Annosis). His teaching at the University of Paris is proofed for the years 1316 - 1328/29. In 1329, he died at the papal court of Avignon; in december 1329 his parish and his post as chaplain of Cardinal Annibal Gaetani de Ceccano was given to another priest (CUP II, 858; A. Fyen, Lettres de Jean XXII, vol. II, 1860, 2595).

Jean d'Anneux wrote an interesting French Miroir de Prince accusating Guillaume I de Hainaut of being the example of a bad prince (ca. 1325; MS Bibl. de l'Arsenal) and a tract against the Mendicants, aiming especially at the Franciscans, in december 1328 (MS Bodleian Library). He himself quotes his own Questiones de Quodlibet, which are lost or have not yet been found. His Sermones had been conserved up to XVIIth century in the library of the Augustinian Regulars in St. Martin de Louvain (Sanderus, Bibl. Belg. Manuscripta, 1643, p. 218) but have been lost probably when the priory was dissolved in 1784. Jean d'Anneux also was the author of a treatise on confession (1327), which had been conserved in the Library of the Collège des Cholets as codex 2 (see Catalogue BN lat. 13068, fol. 224,; E. Chatelain, Notes sur les manuscrits du Collège des Cholets. 1889: Codex ppppp, with 180 (!) letters of Pierre de Blois and some

letters of Seneca). In Paris the treatise hasn't been conserved. But I happened to find a copy of the original manuscript in the catalogue of the ancient St. Veit Metropolitankapitel at Prague. I am still waiting for the microfilm or the permission to consult the manuscript for the library is today under the administration of the Chancellery of State at the Hradčín. But I have already received the film of the annotations which an anonymous made of this treatise, unfortunately only of the first two parts (State Library Prague).

In the title of this treatise on confession Jean d'Anneux is named a consocius of Jean de Pouilly (C. Oudin, *Commen-tarius*. 1722, vol. III, col. 802). Probably because of this connection and his relation to Annibal de Ceccano, Jean d'Anneux is often placed among the members of the Collège de Sorbonne, but no evidence is given (P. Féret, *La faculté théologique de Paris*. 1896, vol III, p. 231-32; P. Glorieux, *Aux Origines de la Sorbonne*. 1966. vol. I, p. 317. Monsignore Glorieux even writes that Jean d'Anneux had been teaching at Paris since 1323, but without any proof).

For that reason, I would like to ask You, if You happened to have found some trace of this Jean d'Anneux (Anneux is a village near Cambrai; as parochial priest of St. Amand in Belgium, P. Glorieux puts him in his register under Jean de St. Amand) as a member of the Sorbonne or elsewhere in the course of Your studies.

I would be very grateful for a response to my question and I hope my demand won't molest You too much.

The President of the United States Subcommittee for the History of Universities, Professor A. L. Gabriel (University of Notre Dame), Honorary President of the International Commission for the History of Universities, in cooperation with the Medieval Academy of America organized a session at the Sixty-Second Annual Meeting which this year was held at the University of Toronto on April 26, 1987.

The topic discussed was "Unpublished Records of French Universities in Medieval and Renaissance Period." The meeting was presided by the President of the Canadian Subcommittee, J. K. McConica, himself President and Vice-Chancellor of the University of Saint Michael's College in Toronto. As guest of the U. S. Subcommittee, Professor Jacques Verger, Vice President of the International Commission for the History of Universities, spoke on "The Unpublished Records of Southern French Universities.

Professor L. S. Domonkos (Youngstown State University, Ohio) discussed the "Unedited Texts of Paris Colleges." A. L. Gabriel spoke on the Liber receptorum (1494-1531) and on the Liber procuratorum (1421-1552) of the English-German Nation awaiting editing. J. K. Farge disserted on the material to be published on the "Faculty of Theology in Paris."

Professor William Courtenay (University of Wisconsin-Madison) arranged a session at the 128th meeting of the American Historical Association on December 30, 1986, in Chicago on "The Social History of Universities."



Nyugodtan hálátlan disznóknak nevezhetnétek, joggal, hiszen nem írtam Nektek karácsonsi üzeneteket, ám a méltóságom az, hogy immár harmadszor vagyok kórházban. Először Főleték visszatérve, november 24-én mentem be, megoperáltak és egy hét múlva eleventettek. Ezután három napra lenakadt a lencse a helyéről és befordult, igen nagy fájdalmat okozva. Egy héttig is tépelődtek, hogy mit csináljanak, míg artán visszaverték. 





SUBJECT: ERIP Up-Date

I was informed by V.P. Alderman last week that the report of the ERIP Task Force is under review by several Administrative officials. It is his expectation that the Board of Trustees will be asked to consider a recommendation at a special meeting to be called within the next month.

IF an ERI program is implemented, YSU is required by law to make it available to no less than 5% of the STRS members currently employed - in our case, no less than 37 individuals. Moreover, the law requires that, if YSU imposes a 5% limit on the number of ERI opportunities, then priority must be given to those with the greatest amount of service at this institution.

The ERIP Task Force identified the 116 individuals with the greatest amount of service at YSU or its predecessors. You are No. 54 on that list. Your position on this list, however, may change somewhat based on (1) the amount (if any) part-time service you performed prior to becoming a full-service employee and (2) the date you signed your first full-time contract with the university. Such "fine tuning" will be done when and if the decision to implement an ERI program is made. Should the Trustees adopt such a plan, it could go into effect as early as July 1, 1987!

The purpose of this note is to alert you to the possibility that you may be offered an opportunity to participate in such a plan and to advise you to prepare accordingly. You should, at the very least, make sure that all your qualifying service (military and other public service) is certified by STRS, PERS, or SERS.

Report on the
Sixtieth Annual Meeting of the Medieval Academy of America
at the University of Toronto (Canada)
April 21 to April 26, 1987
Astrik L. Gabriel, University of Notre Dame,
In Attendance

Professor A. L. Gabriel actively participated in the meetings of the Medieval Academy of America (MAA).

1. By organizing a session of the Academy listed on the Program for Thursday, April 23, 1987, 4:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. on the "Unpublished Sources of Medieval French Universities."
2. By addressing the Academy on "Unpublished Records of the English-German Nation at the University of Paris, 1495-1531."
3. Functioning as officer (Scribe) of the MAA, also substituting as Orator by reading the citations of the newly-elected Fellows.

I. Structure of the MAA

The Medieval Academy of America, founded at Harvard University in 1925, has two distinct units with two Presidents and elected Body of Officers.

A. The Medieval Academy of "Members" (circa 2,000) with officers elected annually: President, Vice President and Second Vice President. Upon the recommendation by two members of the Academy, with \$30 yearly dues, anyone can become a member.

B. The Fellows of the MAA are elected by secret ballot by the Fellows upon recommendation by five Fellows. A two-thirds majority of votes are necessary for election. There are now ninety elected Fellows; Officers are President, Orator and Scribe with elections being held every three years. A. L. Gabriel functioned as Scribe during the meeting, and also filled in for the Orator. The Fellows have "private meetings" attended only by the Fellows and an "open meeting" in conjunction with the MAA when the new members are admitted with the Orator reading the citations.

II. Sessions Organized by
A. L. Gabriel

In the recent programs of the MAA, "interpretatons" of literary phenomena seemed to squeeze out communications about new historical discoveries, calling attention to publications of unedited sources.

- A. Historical source material collection at the University of Notre Dame analyzed at the meeting of the MAA.

The session called attention to the impressive collection of Medieval and Renaissance material related to the History of Universities collected by A. L. Gabriel during his directorship of the Medieval Institute. Circa two thousand manuscripts on the history of the oldest universities--Paris, Bologna, Vienna, Cologne, Leipzig, Heidelberg, Louven, Ingolstadt, etc.--are on microfilms in the Medieval Institute, scattered in three rooms.

B. Participants in the session were presided by the President of the University of Saint Michael's College.

Besides A. L. Gabriel, Professor L. S. Domonkos, a former doctoral student of the Medieval Institute, was also invited to address the MAA. Domonkos, now Chairman of the Department of History at Youngstown State University, spoke on "Colleges in Medieval Paris." He referred to the existing unpublished, rich material on the History of Colleges at the University of Notre Dame. He also called attention to the series Texts and Studies where histories of various colleges have been published by A. L. Gabriel and his former students, such as the Colleges of Autun (Sanderlin); Bourgogne (Ford); Ave Maria, Skara House (Gabriel); Buda (Domonkos).

The session was presided by the Very Reverend James McConica, O.S.B., Representative of Canada in the International Commission for the History of Universities and President of the University of Saint Michael's College.

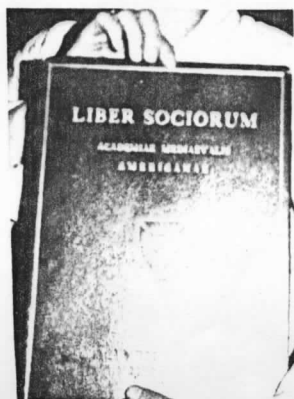

III. Induction of New Fellows

Citations were read for three newly elected Fellows: from Brooklyn College (Brown), Toronto (Hughes) and Williams College (Massachusetts), Dr. Francis Oakley, President of the college. Five corresponding fellows were admitted, one each from Israel, Great Britain, Spain, Federal Republic of Germany, and France in the person of Robert-Henri Bautier, President of the French Academy.

A. L. Gabriel read the citations in Latin and English. When President Bautier did not seem to heed the English and Latin invitations to ascend the presidential podium to sign the Liber sociorum, Professor Gabriel, functioning as Orator, addressed Bautier in the language of Richelieu, founder of the French Academy in 1623. Professor Gabriel, due to his early election to the French Academy in 1962, is now Dean of Age of the forty corresponding members of the Academe des Inscriptions et Belles Lettres.

Chase wanted so much to make a name for himself in American politics that early in his career he considered changing his "fishy" appellation to the more important sounding Spencer Payne Cheyce. That alteration never came about, but even without a fancy name, the New England-born, Ohio-bred attorney devoted his life to public service at many levels of government.

Chase served as Free-Soil Senator from Ohio, as Governor of that pivotal Midwestern state, as Secretary of the Treasury under Lincoln, and as Chief Justice of the United States, although he never realized his primary ambition—the presidency. Complex, overly ambitious, and deeply religious, Chase perhaps undermined his presidential hopes partly by his strong antislavery stance, but primarily by his failure to organize systematically his drive for national office.

Chase worked hard for the rights of fugitive slaves and became prominent in the

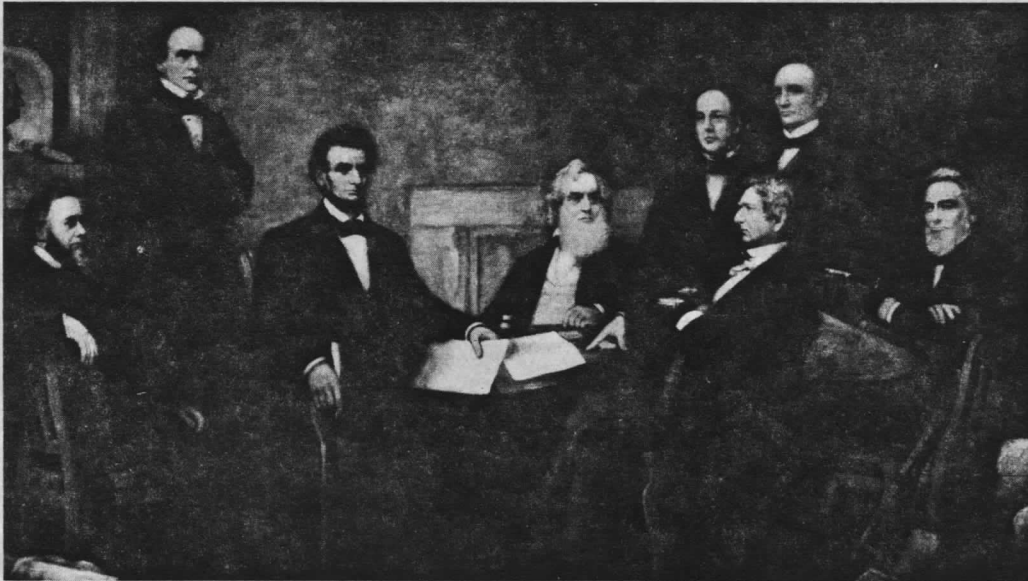
antislavery movement and in the establishment of the Liberty and Free-Soil parties, but he was often accused of being concerned only with his own personal advancement. Frederick Blue has done extensive research among Chase's voluminous and often hard-to-read correspondence, and has incorporated pertinent collateral primary and secondary sources as well, to produce the first modern biography of this key Civil War era personality.

Blue searches for the man behind the actions, and his conclusions are enlightening and fascinating. Chase comes alive as an individual who overcomes personal tragedy and finds happiness and fulfillment perhaps in no other place than in his work.

It is with great pleasure that I can inform you that I have received formal notification from Washington D. C. that I am the recipient of a Fulbright-Hays Research Abroad Award.



Many thanks for your very kind letter and forgive my tardy reply, but I had page proofs of a book to read through and to my horror found quite a few changes I still wanted to make!


I, too, am quite unhappy about the outcome of the Renaissance conference project and unhappier yet about the behavior of the Joint Committee. In their defense, however, I can only say that they have been disappointed in some of the conferences they funded and simply decided to retrench. Since they seem very committed now to interwar and post-World War II projects (I think this kind of emphasis helps their fundraising), the one on the Renaissance came to be regarded as expendable. Also, the Indiana conferences on the Renaissance in Poland and Hungary seemed to obviate the need for yet another conference on the Renaissance in East Europe. So be it.

Your own work is extremely interesting and I look forward to your book. I ordered Marianna Birnbaum's, but haven't received it yet. My own, on Poland, should be finished by early fall. I'm also well under way with a volume of translations (from Latin and Polish) of Polish Renaissance political writing. It's interesting material, but God knows what publisher will be willing to put it out.

I'm on sabbatical leave for 1987/88 and Professor Deborah Milenkovitch, an economist, will be Acting Director. We would very much like to have you here for a lecture, but I would like to be on hand for it. Perhaps I can try to find some money somewhere for a "mini-" conference on the Renaissance to be held at Columbia if not in 1987/88 then the following year. Hope springs eternal, and the idea of some kind of conference on the Renaissance in East Central Europe as a whole still appeals to me. Needless to say, if anything interesting develops I'll let you know.

Minutes of the Business Meeting

The annual business meeting of the AASHH was opened by Professor Thomas Sakmyster at 3:40 pm at the Longfellow room of the Park Plaza Hotel in Boston, on November 6, 1987. The meeting was held concurrently with the 19th annual AAASS meeting.

The agenda was:

1. The Treasurer's report (S. Glanz)
2. The Report of the Book Award Committee (P. Pastor)
3. The Nominating Committee Report (G. Vermes)
4. Report from the Hungarian Chair at the U. of Indiana (Gy. Ránki)
5. Panel suggestions for future conferences
6. New Business

1. The Secretary/Treasurer reported that 57 members have paid their 1987 dues and 12 have paid their dues for 1988. As a result the AASHH has \$578.04 in its checking account and has a three month renewable \$500 CD. The organization is in better financial shape than ever before. The Secretary/Treasurer reminded everyone that each Newsletter costs roughly \$100 to publish and mail. All those members who have not yet paid their dues for this calendar year should not look at our current financial standing as the only benchmark, and please mail in your dues as soon as possible. Members were also asked to continue to mail in their activities so that everyone can be kept informed. Also any suggestions for the Newsletter would be welcomed.

2. Prof. Peter Pastor reported on the work of the Book Award Committee. As none of the members (L. Congdon, Gy. Ránki) have received nominations for the award, the committee suggested that the award be given every second year as originally it was planned.

Prof. Ivan Völgyes offered Prof. Charles Gáti's book "Hungary and the Soviet Bloc" published by Duke University Press in 1986 for the 1988 award.

3. The Nominating Committee (Bárány, Várdy and Vermes) report was delivered by Prof. Sakmyster instead of Prof. Vermes who arrived late due to problems on Amtrak. The Committee nominated Prof. László Domonkos and Prof. Paul Bödy for the Vice President's position. The person elected for vice president will serve until December 31, 1989 and then automatically will assume the post of the President. In that capacity he/she will then serve until

December 31, 1991. For the two vacant positions in the Executive Committee Prof. Alfonz Lengyel and Prof. László Deme were nominated. They will serve for one year, until December 31, 1988. For the position of Secretary/Treasurer Prof. Susan Glanz was renominated. (The position is for two calendar years.)

There will be a ballot attached to the copies of the Minutes that will be mailed out. Members will be asked to return their ballot before the 10th of December. This way at the next business meeting to be held in Washington DC on December 29, 1987 (concurrently with the AHA meeting) the results can be announced. The term of the newly elected members will start January 1, 1988. The Acting President, Prof. Thomas Sakmyster will automatically become the President and will serve in this capacity until December 31, 1989.

4. Professor György Ránki from Indiana University reported on the work of the Hungarian Chair. The Chair sponsored two conferences in Bloomington this year, one on political thinkers and writers and one on economics. At this later conference over 50 American economists and 15-17 Hungarian economists participated.

The US Ambassador to Hungary, Mark Palmer has also visited the University, to help the Chair get more financial aid from the school.

The Chair is also putting together a Hungarian Studies Conference to be held in November 1988. Prof. Ránki took this opportunity to ask the members of the AASHH to nominate graduate students who would be interested in participating at this conference. The Chair has some funds available to help the students meet the cost of attending the panels.

Prof. Ránki, who is also the President of the Hungarian Institute of History of the HAS announced that his Institute together with the Soros Foundation has launched a new quarterly titled **The Danubian Historical Studies**. The aim of this new publication is to publish papers, documents and review articles on the history of the people in the Danube Basin. If interested in subscribing write to: MTA Történettudományi Intézete, POB 9, H-1250 Budapest, Hungary or to Kultura Foreign Trading Co. POB 149, H-1389 Budapest 62, Hungary. All members must have received previous announcements about this publication. The first two issues have been published already.

Prof. Ivan Völgyes (U. of Nebraska, Lincoln) at this point announced that he is organizing a conference titled "Judicial Murders" in October 1988 at the U. of Nebraska. The panels will focus on the murders of Imre Nagy, 1948, and the events of 1968. Anyone interested in participating either as a listener or presenting papers, proposing panels should contact Prof. Völgyes.

5. Prof. Peter Pastor has reported that the AASHH has been unsuccessful in working with other associations in order to suggest panels at different conferences. At the same time he requested that panel suggestions for the 1988 AAASS meeting, that will be held in Honolulu, should be sent to him directly (to Montclair State College) or to the Secretary/Treasurer. One panel titled "The Left In Hungarian History" has already been put together. The participants will be Profs. László Deme (The Left in 1848); Mary Glück (The Left in 1918-19); and Bennett Kovrig (the Left in 1848); and the discussants will be György Ránki and George Bárány.

Prof. Marianne Birnbaum suggested that a panel on the "fin-de-siecle Budapest" should be put together. She has suggested the subject to a number of people, who all seemed to be enthusiastic. But she has other commitments at the time of the conference therefore, would anyone be interested in following up on the idea?

6. Prof. I. Deák has brought up the subject of the Hungarian Studies Review, which is published by the Hungarian Chair at the University of Toronto and is edited by Prof. N. Dreisziger. At the last report to Prof. Deák by Prof. Dreisziger the Review was faltering. The motion was made and seconded to find out if the membership of the AASHH believes that the Review is worth saving or not. The decision was that it is worth saving. To help decide what the next step should be the suggestion was made and accepted that the President of the AASHH should contact Prof. Dreisziger and find out exactly what is the financial situation of the Review. To help save the publication senior scholars should contribute to the paper. The goal should be to broaden the scope of the magazine.

The three volume History of Transylvania which was published in Hungarian in Budapest has irked the Romanian Government. They have purchased advertising space in several world papers (e.g. the London Times). The AASHH membership has voted not to react to those ads. Prof. Schöpflin has reported that the Republican Romanians in London have already answered the ads.

Prof. Ránki informed us that the History of Transylvania will be debated by three Hungarian historians at roundtable conferences in several European cities.

Prof. Sugár reported that an English language history which is edited by him, on Hungary, will be out next Fall.

Prof. Deák reported that the Institute on East Central Europe jointly with the Soros Foundation will publish three essays by young Hungarian social historians. The goal of the series is to make the work of young Hungarian scholars available to American scholars. Both Profs. Ránki and Deák asked that if any of our members know

of good studies in any of the social science fields done by young Hungarian scholars to please inform them. They would be interested in helping the paper get translated and accessible to American scholars.

Prof. G. Vermes' book "István Tisza: The Liberal Vision and Conservative Statecraft of a Magyar Nationalist" will be published in Hungarian in Hungary.

Prof. Deák raised the point, that it is not enough that the American public gets to know the work of Hungarian scholars, an effort should be made to let Hungarian scholars find out what their American counterparts are doing. To achieve this the American scholars should make an effort to inform the Hungarian Publishing Houses and the Hungarian Academy of Sciences of their work.

The meeting was adjourned at 5 pm. Cookies and drinks were served.

Other news items!

1. We are proud to report that both panels sponsored by the AASHH at the Boston AAASS meeting, "Populism in Hungary and Poland After World War I" and "Federalist Ideas in East Central Europe During The Interwar Years" were very well attended.

2. We have received word, that the Business Meeting at the AHA meeting in Washington DC was changed to Thursday, Dec. 29, 1987 at 11:30 - 1:30 at the Kennedy room of the Sheraton Hotel. Please mark it in your calendar and hope to see you there!

3. Papers are sought for a new interdisciplinary annual series, Research on the Soviet Union and Eastern Europe, to be published by JAI Press. Any topic will be considered, including foreign relations, but preference will be given to papers dealing with current issues. Volume I will appear in December 1988, and contributors must deliver the final camera ready version of the paper to the editor by March 1, 1988 at the latest.
