Sehr geehrter Professor Seibt,

It was with great pleasure and excitement that I read your kind letter of invitation to participate in the Symposium you are in the process of organizing for July 17-19, 1989 at Bad Homburg. I feel deeply honored and accept with enthusiasm.

The theme of the conference, "Mitteleuropa an der Schwelle der Neuzeit" is most appropriate and the participants well known in their respective specialties. The Symposium has the potential to be an excellent gathering, and I am eagerly looking forward to be there in July.

There are a few areas in which I need some clarification from you, dear Professor Seibt.

1. Please inform me concerning the preferred language or languages of the conference. Although my spoken German is a little rusty, I could certainly give my 20 minute "Referat" in whatever language you choose, i.e. German, English, French (or even Hungarian). As a child I spent six years in Germany (1945-1951) as a refugee or Displaced Person, before my family emigrated to the United States. At that time I spoke German fluently, but many years have passed since then and the only occasion I had to use German for a more extended period was in 1963-1964 when I studied at the Universität Wien (Heinrich Fichtenau) as a Fulbright Scholar.

2. You must forgive me, but I am not familiar with the system of "Thesenblatt", although I think that I know what you are asking: a brief synopsis of the main thesis of the presentation (Referat), not to exceed 30 lines. Would you want this to be in a specific format? In what language?

3. The news that the Werner Reimers - Stiftung would cover the expenses of the round trip flight to Frankfort as well as my stay in Bad Homburg, is most welcome. As you probably know, the economic situation of American Universities is increasingly more difficult, and thus it would be impossible for me to find funds to undertake this journey to Germany. As the father of four children, (three of them at the University) it would create a major hardship if I had to ^{depend} on my own resources to in order to be able to accept your kind invitation. Only with the generosity of the Reimers - Stiftung can I hope to participate in the Symposium at Bad Homburg.

In your letter of reply, you or your colleague Dr. Winfried Eberhart can naturally write to me in German. I hope that it causes you no problem if I respond in English. It is with anticipation that I anticipate the receipt of general information on the conference as well as a reply to my specific questions raised above.

I am looking forward to meeting you and your colleagues this summer.
