





Objectives for Sabbatical Leave 1997-1998

L. S. Domonkos

Objectives or goals to be achieved by September 15, 1998.

I. On volume IV of The Laws of Medieval Hungary, (1490-1526).

The following items should be in final form (preferably in "camera ready" format) by the end of the sabbatical period:

- a. Introductory essay on legislation issued by kings Wladislaus II (1490-1508) and Louis II (1508-1526).
- b. Establishment of correct Latin texts of the laws (decreta) issued during this period.
- c. Translation of 10 laws, some in complete form, others in shortened version, by elimination of duplications within the decrees. Explanatory notes for above.
- d. Chronological table of major events.
- e. Index of Names (Persons and Places)

II. On volume V of The Laws of Medieval Hungary, The Opus Tripartitum.

The following items should be at least in "rough draft" form or should have gone through the first editorial revision:

- a. Essay on political as well as socio-economic background of the "Opus Tripartitum."
- b. Translation of the Preface as well as Part I (134 articles); Part II (86 articles); Part III (36 articles)
- c. Explanatory notes for complete text.

Sabbatical Project: To prepare for the publication of the final two volumes (IV and V) of the bi-lingual (Latin-English) edition of The Laws of the Medieval Kingdom of Hungary, 1000-1526.

Volume I was published in 1989, volume II in 1992 and volume III, of which I was co-editor in 1996. (See appendix I).

As part of my sabbatical project I will help to prepare for publication volume IV, which will contain laws issued from 1490 to 1526. Work on this tome has begun and the book should be ready in 1998. Volume V is a compendium of customary law called the Tripartitum, first issued in 1516. Publication is expected in 1999 to be followed by an Index (Vol. VI) which will facilitate the use of the five volumes set.

I have been Series Editor of Volumes II and III (see appendix II), Project Director. I supervise the entire editorial operation, help to establish the most accurate Latin texts, the best English translations. Together with the other co-editor (J.M. Bak, Univ. of Brit. Columbia) I help to write the introductory essays to Vol. IV and V, assist in the preparation of annotations, critical apparatus and glossary.

Background of Project: About a decade ago a group of medieval legal scholars from the US, Canada and Europe undertook the task of editing and publishing the laws (dereta) of the kingdom of Hungary from 1000 to 1526. I was invited to join this international team of about a dozen scholars first as consultant and subsequently as Series editor, Co-editor and Project Director.

Impact of Project: The bi-lingual edition that we have prepared and are planning to complete makes available to a wide scholarly audience both an accurate Latin text as well as a readable English translation of the laws issued by the kings and diets (parliaments) of medieval Hungary. This is of interest not only to legal scholars in Central Europe but such a compendium of judicial precedent has great value to historians of comparative political structures, sheds light on socio-economic conditions, as they evolved for over five hundred years. Reaction to the already published volumes has been generally most positive.

Outside Funding: This undertaking has been subsidized by the National Endowment for the Humanities and the Hungarian Academy of Sciences with a grant totaling \$84,000 during the 1991-1995 period. In 1995 I submitted a request to the NEH for the continuation and completion of the project but received a letter in September of last year stating that the competition for Grants in the Translation Program has been canceled as a result of Congressional budget cuts. (Appendix III). Subsequently NEH has informed me that applications will once more be accepted with a Sept. 1, 1996 deadline. A month ago I mailed a grant proposal to NEH, asking for financial assistance for a two year period: 1997-1998 (See appendix IV). My sources in Washington inform me that the resources available to NEH are very limited and the chances of our project being funded are rather slim.

Request from YSU: A sabbatical leave for the academic year 1997-1998 would allow me to devote much more time to this project and assure its completion. I would serve as project coordinator, co-editor of volumes IV and V, keep the team focused on this last phase of our endeavor. With some financial assistance from the Central European University (Prague/Budapest) and the Hungarian Academy of Sciences as well as meager savings from our

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previous NEH grant, we should be able to complete at least Vol. IV and possibly Vol. V. If by some miracle NEH funds the project for 1997-1999, travel and clerical expenses would be covered and the series would be completed. I request no other assistance than the time needed for this undertaking. On a personal note I would like to add that time is slowly running out on the members of the team. The Chief editor has recently retired from the University of British Columbia, I probably will seek retirement by the year 2000. Two very valuable members of our team have died since the inception of the project. With good coordination and some luck we hope to complete the planned series of five volumes before our own end, and/or the end of the century.

As an indication of my scholarly productivity, I am enclosing my Curriculum Vitae (Appendix V).

Könyvedet köszönettel megkaptam. Már válaszoltam volna, de mindig közbejött valami. Most is csak röviden írok és inkább csak a szokásos évi beszámolómat küldöm el. Könyvedet különben majd igyekszem recenziózni, csak még egyelőre nem tudom, hogy melyik folyóiratban tudom lehozatni az ismertetést. A *Speculum* ugyanis eddig még nem kért meg rá, amit egy kissé furcsának is tartok.

Jelen levelemben mellékelem két újabb tanulmányunkat, valamint az egyik recenziómat. (Azt hiszem, hogy az egyiket már elküldtem, de nem vagyok benne biztos.) Az elsőből láthatod véleményünket a magyar-magyar viszony fejlődéséről, a második viszont az amerikai magyarságtudomány szomorú helyzetét mutatja be.

Mult évünk különben elég, sőt túl forgalmas volt. Túl sokat utazgattunk, s így bele is fáradtunk az egészbe. Áprilisban Aruba szigetén voltunk Ágival, ami igen jól sikerült. Juniusban két hetet töltöttünk Kaliforniában, ahol egy nagy összeruccanás is részt vettünk, méghozzá olyanok társaságában, akikkel valamikor együtt voltunk fiatalok Cleveland-ben. Június-július fordulóján közel két hetet töltöttünk Floridában, ahová Laura kislányunk egyik clevelandi barátnőjét is magunkkal vittük, hogy időnként szabadok is lehessünk. Július és augusztus folyamán öt hetet töltöttünk Magyarországon és Ausztriában. Zoltán fiunk megnősült, s az esküvője a Mátyás-templomban volt. Ugyanakkor előadtunk a budapesti történész-konferencián, az egrri Anyanyelvi Konferencián, és a Debreceni Egyetemen, nyaraltunk a Salzburg-melletti Sankt Johann-ban, s közben az új rokonokat is meglátogattuk Kisvárdán. Laura mintegy három hetet töltött náluk, ahol rendszeresen lovagolt. Ugyanakkor egypár régi kedves rokonnal, kollégával, és ismerőssel is találkoztunk, részben Zoltán esküvője alkalmával, s részben pedig a főt jelzett konferenciák alkalmával.

Augusztus végén-szeptember elején két hétre visszajöttünk Pittsburgh-be, s azt követően pedig mindjárt mentünk is vissza a római-nápolyi Hungarológiai Kongresszusra. Visszatértünk után szeptember 22-én agyvérzést kaptam (a magas vérnyomás volt az okozója), melynek következtében kórházba kerültem. Azóta pedig szedem a pirulákat és igyekszem rendbejönni.

Közben persze a 30-dik Duquesne History Forum-ot is meg kellett rendeznem. Az is lefutott, csak a szokásos fogadás maradt el a lakásunkban.

Jelenleg mindkét fiunk Londonban él. Attila egy nagy angol befektető társaságnál van alkalmazva, ahol egy 250 millió dolláros alapnak a "fund menedzsere," s ahol naponta sok millió dollárt mozgat jobbra-balra. Zoltán pedig a CNN-nek (amerikai TV vállalatnak) dolgozik, ahol a kelet-európai ügyek intézője. Mindkettő rengeteget utazgat Moszkvától, Budapesten és Prágán keresztül, egészen Athénig. Többször jönnek Amerikába is, de egyelőre még nem végérvényesen.

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

3. Page 13 of text has been eliminated. Text ends with last sentence on pg. 12.
4. Note 54 needs reference to Prof. Székely's study in this volume.

It is uncertain how the FAX transmission will look when you receive it. I certainly hope that it will be a clear copy from which your typesetter can work. If there are problems of legibility, especially of the footnotes, try to compare the text with the Studies on Hist. of Univ. of Óbuda, Eötvös Univ. Press, 1995, 3-29.

Considering the shortness of time, this is the best I could do in the few days available to me. Kedves Laci, if you feel that something must be added to the notes, please do so! I will be most appreciative.

MEMORANDUM

Professor Morris Slavin, a world renowned expert on the French Revolution, has donated a large number of microfilms to the W. F. Maag Library at Youngstown State University. This immensely valuable primary source collection has been acquired by Dr. Slavin in the course of his illustrious academic career. The original repositories of these documents are the French National Archives and the National Library of France in Paris. Prof. Slavin's generous and unique gift has not only enriched the YSU Library, but has made available to scholars in North America research tools which are otherwise difficult to examine or obtain.

1. Description of the materials:

- a. 25 unedited reels of 35mm microfilm
- b. 41 unedited strips of 35mm microfilm, each 10 inches long

2. Evaluation of quantity:

- a. Each reel holds 100 ft. of film, each frame is approximately 2 inches long, thus each reel contains 600 frames.
- b. The 41 strips, each 10 inches long, contain 410 frames.

3. Base price of items:

- a. The latest information concerning the cost of microfilm from the French National Archives is 1.50 Fr. per frame.
- b. Based upon the conversion rate of the French Fr. and the U. S. dollar, the cost of each frame can be set at \$0.30.

4. Cash value of gift items:

- a. 25 reels x 600 frames x \$0.30 = \$4,500.00
 - b. 41 strips containing 410 frames x \$0.30 = \$ 123.00
- TOTAL \$4,623.00

Summary: Based upon my own experience in dealing with European Archives and research libraries, I have determined the value of the microfilms Prof. Slavin has donated to the YSU Maag Library at \$4,623.00. Considering all the other expenses Dr. Slavin incurred in obtaining these valuable documents, I find the above mentioned amount to be extremely modest.

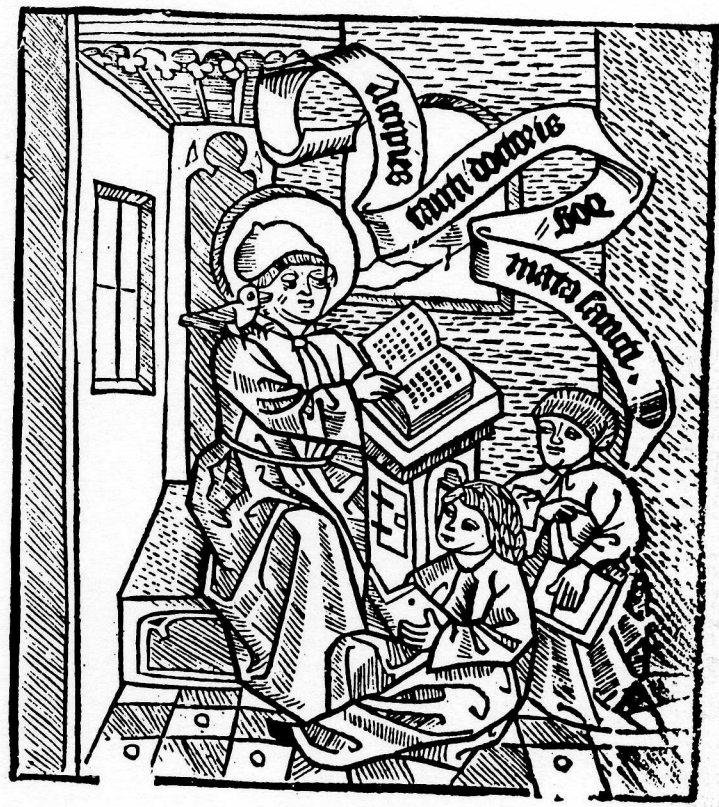
