



**RE: ETS Requests** 

On October 17, 2001, Professors Fred Blue and Les Domonkos formally petitioned the Department of History for permission to exercise the option for Extended Teaching Service after their retirements in May 2002. Those requests were approved unanimously by the faculty of the department. As chair, I concur with the department; their requests have my approval as well.

Present: Kulchytsky, Blue, Friedman, DiBlasio, Leary, Pallante, Satre, Berger.

Excused: Domonkos, Ayana.

1. Minutes of the 20 August and 12 September 2001 minutes were approved as distributed, except that Leary should be listed as present on 12 September.

- 2. Pallante stated that the department proposals to hire for positions in Latin American History/Spanish language and the Black History/Black Studies appear strong, and she expects approval shortly. When approved, the department will have to set up search committees for both positions.
- 3. Daniel Ayana is serving on a committee headed by Dean George McCloud to set up a Chinese Studies Program at YSU, with possibility of offering a minor. The committe will try to raise funding for the program from local business leaders. We will certainly need someone to teach an Asian Civilization survey course. Faculty discussed Dr. Domonkos's proposal that the department hire someone in Asian history as his replacement when he retires in May, 2002, and goes on Extended Teaching Service. A discussion on replacements for Blue and Domonkos will be continued at a future department meeting. According to Pallante, the department must first receive from STRS letters of irrevocable retirement from Blue and Domonkos before taking steps to replace them.
- 4. Friedman raised the question, what will the department do when there are six retirees asking for ETS classes? Doesn't that, he argued, restrict the offerings of the newer faculty? Pallante indicated that the University believes that the History Department graduate program is one that is capable of growing, and that we should be able to offer a substantial number of graduate courses from both the regular and the retired faculty. The American Studies program is also considering adding a graduate program, and about one-third of the courses required in that program would be in history. The Budget Office has stressed that for funding reasons, faculty on ETS should be teaching only upper-division and graduate courses and not survey courses.
- 5. Satre moved, DiBlasio seconded the motion, that Domonkos and Blue be approved for Extended Teaching Service. Motion carried unanimously.
- 6. Berger complained about the absence of maps, especially in 20th century Europe. Friedman humbly confessed that he had the map on Europe 1938. Department will send out a posse of graduate students to rooms to see if any stray maps can be rounded up.
- 7. DiBlasio announced that the Historic Preservation Program has received approval from the National Park Service on National Register nominations for the Wick Park Historic Area Boundary Extension and the Burlington 37 Cemetery?
- 8. Pallante stated that Jenkins is the Vice-President/President-Elect of the Ohio Academy of History. The department should send a good-sized delegation to the April OAH meeting.

This time, I should like to request some information from you about technical (logistical) details. As we have to confirm room and board within the next two weeks, it is essential that we receive **your reply by September 8, 2001** at the latest by e-mail (bakjan@ceu.hu) or fax (+36-1 327 3055) or air mail (CEU Med. Present plans are as follows: arrival in Budapest on December 1 (Saturday) at the latest. (Usually air tickets are much cheaper if travelers spend a Saturday night at the point of destination.) Rooms will be booked for all at the CEU Residence and Conference Centre (Budapest X., Kerepesi út 78). Any cab or airport-minibus driver knows the way there. On December 2, Sunday, we leave the Centre around 8 a.m., take a train at Budapest Déli pályaudvar (Southern Railway Station) at 9:05, arriving 3 hours later in Sárvár, where we are collected by the "Jagdgasthaus Vadkert". We are booked to stay there with full pension from noon (lunchtime) of 2 December to noon 6 December. Thus, we have four working days, allowing also for some little excursion into the region, if the weather is suitable. The thermal bath is a few minutes from the hotel, so bring swimming suit, if you care to explore that. Return to Budapest on Thursday afternoon. (If departure of participants demands, we can arrange return journeys earlier; those who have to leave next morning can spend the night again at the Centre.) Dear Members of the Consumer Relations Department;

For thirty-eight years I have been a Professor of Medieval and Renaissance History. As a Barnes and Noble customer I have enjoyed shopping at your stores both here at home (Boardman, OH) and also during vacations or other travel. In the mid 1960s I even visited your original store on Fifth Avenue in New York City.

On September 23<sup>rd</sup> I went to the local bookstore (2724), selected my purchases and presented my Educator's Discount Card at the check-out counter. To my dismay I was told that Barnes and Noble has changed its policy and that now only K-12 teachers are eligible for discounts, university faculty are not.

I am writing to you with two questions and one request.

- 1. Has there indeed been such a policy change, or is this a mistake on the part of the local store?
- 2. If in fact you have eliminated Educator's Discounts for university faculty, why would you institute such an illogical policy? It is my conviction that college faculty have a far greater influence on the book buying habits of their students than primary and secondary school teachers.
- 3. It is my sincere hope that you will reconsider your action. Let me explain why I believe that your policy is short sighted and economically unsound. In my lectures to undergraduates and especially to graduate students I make constant reference to books that are relevant to the subject under discussion. In many instances I have indicated that I have seen the particular volume at Barnes and Noble, and I encourage my students to look at the book and possibly purchase it. (Unfortunately many college bookstores carry only those books which are assigned in various courses and they are far more interested in selling sweatshirts and mugs than books!) Furthermore, I encourage my students to build up a library of their own and stress how important it is for an educated person to have a love of books. I am positive that most university faculty echo these sentiments. This is the kind of free publicity and advertisement that is invaluable and it has undoubtedly brought profits to Barnes and Noble which far exceed the few dollars that you "lose" as the result of extending discounts to university faculty.

If you have discontinued giving faculty discounts because some people have abused the privilege, then take steps to eliminate the problem but do not discontinue a policy that has been helpful to so many of us.

Your letter has brought me some most welcome cheer but has at the same time put me in a terrible quandary. Let me explain.

Since spring my dear Mother (who will be 88 on Oct. 1) has been precipitously declining in body and mental capacity. Last week she had an operation, returned to her apartment on the day your letter arrived. Until now my brother and his wife and Éva and I have been taking turns to take care of her. Her condition is such that we will have to hire some helpers to come in daily to assist her since her care is becoming overwhelming. In order to maintain some quality of life and preserve her human dignity we are doing the utmost to keep her in her home and prevent her from being put into a home for the aged, which, as you probably know are "hell holes" even in the best of circumstances. This is what has happened since our last exchange of correspondence.

If it is not inconvenient for you to include me at that point, please do it, otherwise I regret that I will not be able to attend.
