Kedves Laci!

Thank you for your recent letter. You seem to have everything planned almost to the last detail. My own plans are still a bit uncertain. I will complete 35 years a service in 2<sup>1/2</sup> years and I might retire then or soon afterwards. We have no formal "extended teaching service" but I could sign on to teach the odd course after my retirement, if I want to ease myself out of teaching. A condo in Sarasota is probably not in the cards for us, no matter how much I like that part of the continent, partly because of the low Canadian dollar and partly because our health coverage covers only a fragment of US health costs and the extra private insurance is very expensive. Increasingly Canadians go to Vancouver island if they want to enjoy an early spring (March, instead of our usual late April). Perhaps there will be short trips for us to Sarasota too.


What you write about you mom's deterioration is very familiar to us. First it was my mom, starting 7-8 years ago (she passed away in '98). Then it was my mother-in-law, starting ca. 5 years ago. She lived with us (in our 2 bedroom apartment) for 3 years, but after her hip fracture, we had to put her into a nursing home here in Kingston. We both visit her daily, and my wife often spends hours there. This year it was the turn of my dad to go downhill. In May he still shopped for groceries, but in November we had to hire someone to live with him as he no longer remembered how to heat a meal for himself (he would put plastic containers on the stove, etc.). He refuses to go into a home.

Only one, somewhat slim (ca. 150 page) volume will come from the proceedings of the Toronto conference -- the 2001 vol. of the journal. I outlined this to you. Any further papers, including yours when the notes will be ready, I plan to put into regular issues for the years 2002 and 2003. Bisztray had hoped for a big volume, but that is unlikely to materialize now.

Good luck with your mom and try not to get depressed about her condition -- this is what I keep telling my wife too. And, good luck in your long-term plans. See you in Sarasota in a few years!

Thank you for your kind letter. Happy to report that I am well and counting the days to my retirement on May 17, 2002. My plans are to travel, write and enjoy life until September 1, 2003. Then, I will begin what we call "Extended Teaching Service" which means that I can teach one semester for the next four years. It is a "civilized" way to phase out of the profession. God willing, we hope to buy a condo in the Sarasota area of Florida and divide our time between here and there. All we need is good health!

One major problem in our lives has been my Mother's catastrophic decline of physical and mental powers. The downward spiral began about a year ago and has been continuing ever since. Fortunately I have a brother living near here so that we have been able to share the burden. In early September Anyahad an operation following which we had to place her into a facility with 24 hrs of nursing care. Then came the difficult task of closing down her apartment, divide her valuables between grandchildren and children. She had a serious surgery in mid-October and we did not expect her to survive. George Beelen's life represents the type of success story which would be hard to imagine anywhere in the world, except in the United States of America. Born to working class parents in Campbell, Ohio, he grew up in a modest but warm and supportive home and attended local schools. Upon graduation from high school, he entered Youngstown University to pursue his studies and become the first member of his family to receive a college degree. He was hired to teach English and Social Studies at Poland High School and soon gained a reputation as an innovative and exciting instructor. Married to his high school sweetheart and the father of an expanding family, he was never the less driven by a desire to grow intellectually and enrolled in the graduate program at Western Reserve University in Cleveland to pursue an MA degree in History, which he received in 1962. Two years later he was selected as a John Hay Fellow in the Humanities, the most prestigious award open to high school teachers, based on nation-wide competition. George and Betty Beelen picked up their small children and moved to Northwestern University in Illinois to spend an exciting and mind opening academic year. His former professors at Youngstown University followed his career with interest and he started teaching part-time in 1962 and joined the full-service History faculty in 1966. Driven by the desire to excel as a teacher-scholar, Beelen entered the graduate program at Kent State University and received his PhD in 1971. With remarkable skill he was able to juggle his responsibilities at YSU, at Kent and at the same time was a devoted husband and caring father to his three children. His dissertation on "Harding and Mexico" was a fine piece of scholarly research and was subsequently published by Garland Press in 1987.

Dr. Beelen's career at YSU was an unqualified success. He advanced rapidly in rank from Instructor to Full Professor and excelled in teaching, scholarship and University service. He was named Distinguished Professor three times, once for excellence in scholarship, once for outstanding administrative abilities, and once for public service. He has taught a variety of undergraduate and graduate courses in U.S. and Latin American History and has an excellent reputation as an exciting and inspiring lecturer. His enthusiasm for his subject matters has led him to organize study trips to Latin America in order to share the culture and history of the region with his students.

Professor Beelen is one of those rare academics who is able to share his scholarship with a wide audience. He lectured not only to fellow professionals but has been able to popularize relevant issues and render them understandable to a wide variety of audiences. His ability to "connect" with the community is exemplary. He has spoken to civic and school groups, to elders and to children, has been on radio and TV. Always well prepared, his comments are thoughtful and based on sound scholarship, delivered with grace.

Nothing illustrates better the high regard in which Professor Beelen was held at YSU than the fact that his colleagues elected him as Chairman of the History Department for an unprecedented three five-year terms. He was respected both by the faculty as well as by members of the Administration for his fairness and absolute integrity. He served many years on the university Senate, was YSU's representative to the Ohio Board of Regents and was a member of the Administrative Negotiation Team. Following his retirement from the faculty he was appointed by President Cochran to serve as Government Relations Liaison in Columbus. In every elected or appointed position, he served with distinction.

Never forgetting his roots in this community, Dr. Beelen has been deeply committed to building bridges between "town and gown." He serves on various boards and committees which are dedicated to the revitalization of the Mahoning Valley. A man of action, Beelen ran for Austintown Trustee and was elected to three four-year terms, serving as Chairman on four occasions. In an effort to bring honesty and integrity to local government, he was a candidate for the U.S. House of Representatives in 1976. It is interesting to contemplate how the Valley would have fared with an intelligent and honest person representing our interests in Washington.

Years before it became fashionable to "reach out" into the community, Dr. Beelen was involved in this process on a number of levels, seeking to enhance the presence of the University in the local schools as well as cultural organizations. His most successful endeavor has been the Ohio Cultural Alliance, which he initiated several years ago and which has developed into a major force in the community under his able leadership. Using the wide range of expertise of the YSU faculty and staff, the OCA has reached out into the region celebrating the ethnic, racial and religious diversity of our valley. The monthly meetings of the Ohio Cultural Alliance bring together hundreds of people, who gather to be educated, amused and entertained.

The attached Curriculum Vitae gives ample evidence to the varied activities of Professor George D. Beelen. What I have tried to emphasize is the quality of his character. Born and raised in this community, he has never forgotten his roots. He has used his inborn intelligence to advance his career, but has always shared his multitude of talents with others. Not only was he an excellent teacher, scholar and administrator, more importantly George Beelen is a superb human being. He has brought honor and prestige to the University and to this Valley and is a most deserving candidate for a Heritage Award.





In accordance with the provisions of the 1999-2002 contract, I am informing you of my decision to retire from full service teaching at the end of Spring Semester 2002. You already approved my request for Extended Teaching last fall.

Reflecting upon my long association with the University, I have many pleasant and positive feelings. In the fall of 1956 I entered Youngstown University as a freshman and graduated (cum laude) three years later with majors in History and French. After graduate work at Notre Dame, I taught some history courses here in the summer of 1963 before going on a Fulbright Fellowship to the University of Vienna, Austria, for the 63-64 academic year. In the fall of 1964, I started teaching full time at Youngstown University with the intent of staying one or two years maximum. Well, thirty-eight years later I am getting ready to retire. 





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## 2002 Distinguished Member Leslie Domonkos

The national by-laws of Phi Kappa Phi permit each chapter to recognize one outstanding member per year. The nomination is then approved by the National Board of Directors and conferred at a local ceremony. The Chapter Executive Committee voted to give this honor to Dr. Leslie Domonkos.

Dr. Domonkos was born in Hungary and still remembers fleeing along with the rest of his family across the fields from the advancing Russian troops at the end of



World War II. After living for several years in refugee camps in Europe, he made his way to the United States where the family settled in Farrell, PA. Les graduated cum laude from Youngstown University in 1959 and received his PhD in Medieval Studies from the University of Notre Dame in 1966. Throughout the years he has received several research grants, including two Fulbright Scholarships, which have enabled him to study overseas. Dr. Domonkos is a specialist in medieval and early modern European history, with an emphasis on education, the development of laws, and the Hungarian Renaissance. Among his long list of publications are a multivolume "The Laws of the Medieval Kingdom of Hungary," which is an ongoing project, and several articles on universities of medieval and early modern Europe.

Les began teaching at YSU in 1964 and has often been recognized for his outstanding service to the institution and particularly to the students. He has received six Distinguished Professor Awards for excellence in teaching and research. He has also served as History Department Acting Chair and as Director of Graduate Studies. Dr. Domonkos has served on numerous committees of this University as well as learned institutions in the United States and Europe. In 1990-91, Dr. Domonkos served as President of YSU's Chapter 143 of Phi Kappa Phi.
