DECONTAMINATION

Decontamination is performed only when the persistent gases, mustard and lewisite, have been disseminated. Other gases are soon dispersed by the wind. Only in important areas, buildings, etc., that cannot be evacuated for a sufficient length of time are active neutralizing procedures used. Otherwise the sun, wind, and rain will be allowed to destroy the noxious agents, although their action is slow.

Bleaching powder or chloride of lime is the most effective chemical agent used to counteract both mustard and lewisite. It is used either mixed with water as a thin slurry or mixed with dry earth, sand, ashes, or sawdust. Other substances are also useful, such as a 1 to 3 per cent solution of sodium sulfide, green solution which is 1 lb. sodium bicarbonate dissolved in sodium hypochlorite solution, kerosene or gasoline, chloramine T and hydrogen peroxide.

Mustard and lewisite readily soak into all porous substances such as earth, concrete, wood (even though painted), and plaster. Eradication by means of a mixture of earth and bleaching powder or slurry is indicated. Interior surfaces may then be treated with sodium silicate to seal in any remaining noxious agent. Non-porous objects may be treated similarly except where the corrosiveness of bleaching powder is detrimental as in the case of machinery. Solvents, such as kerosene and gasoline, followed by soap and water, wiping dry and oiling or greasing is the alternative procedure.

Clothing, linens, etc., require either destruction by burning, burying or treatment by steam or by hot

(180°) solution of sodium carbonate (1/4 lb. per gallon). Shoes and upholstery (including that of vehicles) are almost impossible to decontaminate and must therefore be destroyed.

New gases are an ever present threat. Their composition and methods are, of course, a military secret. In all probability civilians will not be given information of this sort until after their use has been established.

A-3 Naval Training Station
Newport, R. I.
Dec. 18, 1942

Dear Claude:

I have been waiting to write to you to let you know when I got the Bulletin but it seems like I'll never get them so I won't wait any longer.

I have charge of the skin clinic at the Training Station. There are thousands of potential patients and no competition. The fees from the acne cases alone in private practice would cause me many sleepless nights because of the \$25,000 ceiling on income. Most of the cases I see are those common to young people, such as warts, tinea, impetigo, urticaria and plenty of measles. I am working on one case, however, which I believe may be Leishmaniasis.

The skin clinic is open from 8 to 4. I have three corpsmen (Male nurses) to assist me. The amount of medical knowledge these young men acquire is really surprising.

Every third day I am on 24 hour watch duty. Every sixth day after the skin clinic closes at 4 P. M. I serve as officer of the day until 8:00 the next morning. Then I have complete charge of all the sick boys. This comprises eight wards which normally hold fifty patients each but at present are over crowded. Then I also take care of all emergencies that may arise.

There are a number of very fine physicians attached to this station. Various men give lectures on their special work. Recently I heard a lecture on a new method of reducing a dislocated shoulder and two days later my new knowledge came to practical use at 2:00 A. M.

This is getting too long for a letter but I did want to give you a general idea of Navy life.
