Dana, Jr., to acquaint the general public with the work being done at Youngstown college in connection with national defense, will be presented each Sunday evening at 7 o'clock. The first 12 will be broadcsat from station WKBN, and the 12 immediately following will be heard from station WFMJ.

The sreies began Sunday evening, January 4, when Dr. George M. Wilcox spoke on "Youngstown College and National Defense."

Dr. Wilcox cited the types of training offered at Youngstown College which may be used either directly or idirectly, to aid in national defense.

Dr. C. W. Foard presented an address, entitled "Civilian Pilot Training", Sunday, January 11, in which he gave an account of the work being done by the CTP at YOCO and of the support which is given to the United States Government in training Civilian pilots for

Next Sunday at 7 o'clock, Dr. Eugene Scudder will speak on another phase of national defense.


