CANDIDATE FOR THE HONORARY DEGREE DOCTOR OF LAWS

DR. JOHN J. COFFELT is president emeritus of Youngstown State University.

Dr. Coffelt joined YSU in 1968 as vice president for administrative affairs after serving as vice chancellor for research and planning for the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education. On August 31, 1973, he succeeded the late Dr. Albert L. Pugsley as the third president to serve this institution since its founding in 1908. Dr. Coffelt retired June 1, 1984.

A native of Missouri, Dr. Coffelt received a bachelor of science degree in business administration from the University of Denver, a master's degree in public school administration from Colorado State College, and a doctoral degree in education from the University of Colorado.

A veteran in the field of higher education, he served as a faculty member and director of accounts, records and registrar at the State Teachers College in Dickinson, N.D., 1948-52; director of research, Colorado State Department of Education, 1952-56; executive director, Colorado School Board Association, 1956-58; director, Colorado Legislative Commission on Education Beyond High School, 1958-61; coordinator of research, Oklahoma State Regents for Higher

Education, 1961-65; and vice chancellor of the Oklahoma Regents, 1965-68.

While president of YSU, Dr. Coffelt served as president of the Ohio Inter-University Council, the Ohio Valley Conference of the National Collegiate Athletic Association, the Association for Higher Education, and the Committee on Studies of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities. He was also a director of the Northeastern Medical Education Development Center of Ohio, the Northeastern Ohio Universities College of Medicine, and Northeastern Educational Television of Ohio, among others.

Active in many community organizations, Dr. Coffelt served on the board of directors of the Butler Institute of American Art, Youngstown Hospital Association, Downtown Lions Club, Youngstown Area Chamber of Commerce, and Mahoning Valley Council, Boy Scouts of America.

He is a member of Phi Kappa Phi, national scholastic honor society; Alpha Kappa Psi, commerce and business fraternity; and Phi Delta Kappa, education society.

ACADEMIC REGALIA AND CEREMONY

The gowns, hoods, and caps worn in academic ceremonies today are relics of clothing worn in medieval times by students and professors. In the early universities—Bologna, Paris, Oxford—the undergraduate students had no prescribed academic dress but wore their usual clerical or ecclesiastical habits. The professors wore more colorful academic regalia than their modern day descendants. Probably the gowns and hoods were worn for warmth in the unheated halls where the lectures were delivered. From the sixteenth century on, there is a change to somber black and it is only in the hoods worn in academic processions today that the warmth and color of medieval academic pageantry is retained.

The hoods representing degrees granted by various colleges and universities have linings (turned to exhibit their hues to the fullest advantage) in the colors of the granting institutions. In addition, the facing of the hood represents by its color the discipline in which the degree has been granted: white for arts, letters, or humanities; golden yellow for science; purple for law; green for medicine; lemon yellow for library science; orange for engineering; drab for commerce or business; light blue for education; pink for music; brown for fine arts; apricot for nursing; dark blue for philosophy; scarlet for theology; citron for social work; sage green for physical education. It is possible, also, to determine from the length of the hoods the type of degree held by the wearer—quite long for the doctor's degree, medium for the master's, short for the bachelor's.

Since 1895, in the United States, the colors and types of caps and gowns have been largely standardized; in 1932 the code was revised to some extent, and in 1960 it was revised once more. A few American universities have adopted gowns other than black in color, and in European universities there is more diversity in cut and in the cap than prevails in the United States. Trustees and administrators of American colleges and universities, too, may wear regalia

which is different from that commonly worn. The trustees of Youngstown State University wear a specially designed cardinal gown.

The bachelor's gown is worn closed; the master's gown is worn open or closed, depending partly on its tailoring; and the wearer of the doctor's gown has the privilege of wearing it open or closed. The sleeves of the three types of gowns are of different lengths and cuts, and in addition the sleeves of the doctor's gown have three horizontal velvet stripes. The doctor's gown also has vertical facing of velvet in front. The stripes and facing may be either black or in the color representing the field in which the wearer has received the doctorate.

There are different opinions about the origin of the caps worn in academic ceremonies. One view is that the "mortar board" is in actuality adapted from the wooden square used by masons. Another is that it stems from the ecclesiastical or clerical head covering of the medieval period. The tassels worn on the caps may or may not be of the same types. In some institutions all masters' and bachelors' tassels are black; in others the tassels, which are the same as the colors of the facings of the hoods, reflect the degree received. The tassels worn by doctors may be black or gold thread.

There is something of the same adherence to tradition in commencement processions that exists in academic garb, although each institution has the right to adapt the ceremony to its own requirements. The chief marshals lead the line of march, followed by the president, the speaker, trustees, and other members of the party to be seated on the platform. Then follow the faculty and the candidates for degrees. The procession at the end of the ceremony follows the same order.

Recipients of **University Honors** will receive special insignia, consisting of golden honor cords placed around the shoulders.
