THE COMMENCEMENT SPEAKER and CANDIDATE FOR THE DEGREE HONORARY DOCTOR OF LAWS

On December 31 of this year, **Dr. Michael Schwartz** will leave the presidency of Kent State University to return to the classroom as a professor of sociology.

During his nine years at the helm of Kent State, Schwartz led the university to a point in its history noted for record enrollment, expanded research in the sciences, and rising academic standards.

Under Schwartz's presidency, selected programs and projects have been strengthened and have attained national prominence, including the Glenn H. Brown Liquid Crystal Institute, the Kent State University Museum, and the May 4 Memorial. Enrollment totals have increased steadily in the past 11 years, as have the academic credentials of incoming students. Research at Kent State has drawn more than \$10 million in grants and contracts for the second year in a row.

Schwartz came to Kent State in 1976 as vice president for Graduate Studies and Research. He was subsequently appointed vice president for Academic and Student Affairs in 1978 and provost in 1980. He assumed the presidency in 1982. A native

of Chicago, he received his bachelor's, master's and doctoral degrees from the University of Illinois and began his teaching career at Wayne State University and Indiana University. From there, Schwartz moved to Florida Atlantic University, where he served as chair of the sociology department and dean of the College of Social Science.

Dr. Schwartz serves on the boards of various community organizations, including the Akron Symphony Orchestra, Northeastern Educational Television of Ohio, Inc., Northeastern Ohio Universities College of Medicine, and the Akron Regional Development Board. He has chaired the Inter-University Council of Ohio and the President's Council of the Mid-American Conference of the NCAA.

Widely published in his field, Schwartz has focused his research on the problems of poverty and urban life in modern society.

Michael and Ettabelle Schwartz have three grown children, all graduates of Kent State University.

ACADEMIC REGALIA AND CEREMONY

The gowns, hoods, and caps worn in academic ceremonies today are relics of clothing worn in medieval times by students and professors. In the early universities — Bologna, Paris, Oxford — the undergraduate students had no prescribed academic dress but wore their usual clerical or ecclesiastical habits. The professors wore more colorful academic regalia than their modern-day descendants. Probably the gowns and hoods were worn for warmth in the unheated halls where the lectures were delivered. From the sixteenth century on, there is a change to somber black and it is only in the hoods worn in academic processions today that the warmth and color of medieval academic pageantry is retained.

The hoods representing degrees granted by various colleges and universities have linings (turned to exhibit their hues to the fullest advantage) in the colors of the granting institutions. In addition, the facing of the hood represents by its color the discipline in which the degree has been granted: white for arts, letters, or humanities; golden yellow for science; purple for law; green for medicine; lemon yellow for library science; orange for engineering; drab for commerce or business; light blue for education; pink for music; brown for fine arts; apricot for nursing; dark blue for philosophy; scarlet for theology; citron for social work; sage green for physical education.

Since 1895, in the United States, the colors and types of caps and gowns have been largely standardized; in 1932 the code was revised to some extent, and in 1960 it was revised once more. A few American universities have adopted gowns other than black in color, and in European universities there is more diversity in cut and in the cap than prevails in the United States. Trustees and administrators of American colleges and Universities, too, may wear regalia which is different from that commonly worn. The trustees of Youngstown State

University wear a specially designed cardinal gown.

The bachelor's gown is worn closed; the master's gown is worn open or closed, depending partly on its tailoring; and the wearer of the doctor's gown has the privilege of wearing it open or closed. The sleeves of the three types of gowns are of different lengths and cuts, and in addition the sleeves of the doctor's gown have three horizontal velvet stripes. The doctor's gown also has vertical facing of velvet in front. The stripes and facing may be either black or in the color representing the field in which the wearer has received the doctorate.

There are different opinions about the origin of the caps worn in academic ceremonies. One view is that the "mortar board" is in actuality adapted from the wooden square used by masons. Another is that it stems from the ecclesiastical or clerical head covering of the medieval period. The tassels worn on the caps may or may not be of the same types. In some institutions all masters' and bachelors' tassels are black; in others the tassels, which are the same as the colors of the facings of the hoods, reflect the degree received. The tassels worn by doctors may be black or gold thread.

There is something of the same adherence to tradition in commencement processions that exists in academic garb, although each institution has the right to adapt the ceremony to its own requirements. The chief marshals lead the line of march, followed by the president, the speaker, trustees, and other members of the party to be seated on the platform. Then follow the faculty and the candidates for degrees. The procession at the end of the ceremony follows the same order.

Recipients of University Honors will receive special insignia, consisting of golden honor cords placed around the shoulders.

PROCESSION: As soon as the platform party and marshals have reached their places, DR. HUMPHREY REMOVES HIS CAP AND THE OTHER MEN REMOVE THEIRS. (Caps will be replaced just before granting of degrees)

INVOCATION: While all are standing, Rev. Simon steps to the podium and gives the invocation. When the invocation has been completed, Rev. Simon returns to his place. When he has reached it, Dr. Humphrey goes to the podium. ALL OTHERS BE SEATED.

INTRODUCTION OF TRUSTEES: Dr. Humphrey introduces the Trustees and they rise individually at their seats. Dr. Humphrey then returns to his seat.

GREETINGS AND INTRODUCTION OF THE SPEAKER; PRESENTATION OF HONORARY DOCTOR OF LAWS: Mrs. Mackall goes to the podium and extends greetings to the graduates. She introduces Dr. Schwartz and presents him for conferral of the degree.

Dr. Humphrey will pick up the diploma from the table and move to the podium. Dr. Gillis will move to the table and pick up the hood. Dr. Gillis and Mrs. Mackall will stand at the left and right of Dr. Schwartz as shown on Page 2.

Dr. Gillis will step forward, assisted by Mrs. Mackall, invest Dr. Schwartz with the hood, and step back. Dr. Humphrey will say, "President Schwartz, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the state of Ohio and by the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University, I confer upon you the honorary degree Doctor of Laws with all the rights and privileges pertaining thereto. The evidence for your degree is contained in the diploma." Dr. Humphrey will then step forward and present the diploma to Dr. Schwartz.

ADDRESS: Dr. Schwartz takes his place before the podium as all parties take their seats.

MUSIC: Musical selection performed by the YSU Symphonic Wind Ensemble.

RECOGNITION OF GRADUATES ATTAINING UNIVERSITY HONORS:
Provost Gillis goes to the podium and acknowledges the group of students receiving honors. After each group is finished, he signals the honorees to be seated.

PRESENTATION OF CANDIDATES FOR DEGREES: (Men replace caps) Provost Gillis requests the entire graduating class to stand. Dr. Humphrey rises, makes his charge to the graduating class and then says, "By virtue of the authority vested in me by the State of Ohio and by the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University, I shall presently confer upon you the respective degrees as read by the Deans, with all the rights, privileges, and obligations pertaining thereto. evidence for your degree is contained vour diploma."

Provost Gillis then has the class sit and Dr. Humphrey also takes his seat.

N.B.: Individual names are not read for those receiving associate and bachelor's degrees.

Dean Richley rises, goes to the ASSOCIATE IN ARTS: microphone on the right and says, "Candidates for the degree Associate in Arts please rise." ASSOCIATE IN APPLIED BUSINESS: Dean Richley says,

"Candidates for the degree Associate in Applied Business please rise."

ASSOCIATE IN APPLIED SCIENCE: Dean Richley says, "Candidates for the degree Associate in Applied

Science please rise."

ASSOCIATE IN LABOR STUDIES: Dean Richley says, "Candidates for the degree Associate in Labor Studies please rise." When all candidates are standing, he turns to Dr. Humphrey who rises and goes to the Dean Richley salutes him and says, "Mr. podium. President, these candidates for the Associate degrees having completed the requirements for the degrees are now presented to you for the conferring of the Associate degrees.

Dr. Humphrey turns to the candidates and says, "I now confer upon you the Associate degrees."

Dean Richley says, "Please be seated," but will remain standing as does Dr. Humphrey.

- B.S. in A.S., B.S. in N: Dean Richley follows the above procedure substituting "degree Bachelor of Science in Applied Science and Bachelor of Science in Nursing." He takes his seat after asking the graduates to be seated. (Throughout the awarding of the Bachelor's degrees, Dr. Humphrey remains at the podium.)
- **B.S. in B.A.:** Dean Cicarelli follows the above procedure and sits down after he asks the graduates to be seated.
- ${f B.S.}$ in ${f Ed:}$ Dean Ruggles follows the above procedure and sits down after he asks the graduates to be seated.
- B.F.A., Mus. B and A.B.: Dean Sweetkind follows the above procedure and substitutes "degrees Bachelor of Fine Arts, Bachelor of Music and Bachelor of Arts," and sits down after he asks the graduates to be seated.
- **A.B.** (all others): Dean Yozwiak follows the above procedure and remains standing after he asks the graduates to be seated.
- **B.S.**: Dean Yozwiak again but he sits down after he asks the graduates to be seated.
- **B. Engr**: Dean Sutton follows the above procedure and sits down after he asks the graduates to be seated.

GRADUATE DEGREES:

MASTER OF ARTS: Dean Hotchkiss will rise and say, "Candidates for the degree Master of Arts please rise as your names are read."

MASTER OF BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION: Dean Hotchkiss again.

MASTER OF MUSIC: Dean Hotchkiss again.
MASTER OF SCIENCE: Dean Hotchkiss again.

MASTER OF SCIENCE in EDUCATION: Dean Hotchkiss again.

MASTER OF SCIENCE in ENGINEERING: Dean Hotchkiss again.

When all candidates are standing, she turns to Dr. Humphrey and says, "Mr. President, these candidates for the Master's having completed the requirements for the degrees are now presented to you for the conferring of the Master's degrees."

Dr. Humphrey turns to the candidates and says, "I now confer upon you the Master's degrees," Dean Hotchkiss says, "Please be seated," and then takes her seat. Dr. Humphrey remains at the podium for announcements and then takes his seat.

BENEDICTION: Rev. Simon rises and goes to the podium. Dr. Humphrey removes his cap as do the other men; everyone else rises as Rev. Simon takes his place. He then delivers the benediction.

ALMA MATER: Mr. Spondike goes to the podium and asks all to join him in singing the Alma Mater. At the conclusion of the Alma Mater, DR. HUMPHREY AND ALL OTHER MEN REPLACE THEIR CAPS.

RECESSION: Those on stage start the recession leaving in the same order they used for the procession: Dr. Humphrey leads the line on his right; Dr. Schwartz leads the line on his left. Marshals take the lead at the foot of the stairs.
