

A small medical museum lines the stairs from the street, and human services displays highlighting the evolution of welfare reside in glass cases in the basement. GUINATHON: for the Kids

Community service; what does it look like? Perhaps serving food at a soup kitchen, volunteering at the local animal shelter, and even dancing. The YSU Dance Marathon, also known as Guinathon, takes place in February, but the dedicated members of this group are working throughout the year. The funds acquired during this eight-hour dance marathon all go to patients at the Mahoning Valley Children's Hospital.

Executive Director of Guinathon Jaycie C. Watt believes in the impact her organization has in bettering the community. "We hope that one day we will dance in celebration but until then we will keep dancing for a cure!" she said "The impact each participant, volunteer, and donor have on families and children right here in our local community is tremendous. We are able to give back to a hospital who turns no child away due to an inability to pay, treats every child like their own, and treats others as they would want to be treated. This allows for more miracles, more tomorrows, more kids to grow up and be whatever they can dream up."

Although this is only Guinathon's third year in action, the number of participants and funds raised has increased greatly.

"YSU's first dance marathon was held in 2017, raising \$18,247.62 with 120 student participants. [This year] we were able to raise \$57,474.31 with 205 student participants. This wouldn't have been possible without all of the work and support of the YSU community. It has been wonderful to watch a college campus come together to support kids who are battling things some of us couldn't begin to imagine," Watt said.

Watt and the staff behind the scenes who make Guinathon a reality work closely with the Mahoning Valley Chidren's Hospital and the families who are hoping for a miracle. While Guinathon has seen such growing participation, they have plans to reach even more of the campus and community.

"In the future we hope that Guinathon can grow by getting more students involved, working with more student organizations, and really just being active on campus.," Watt said. "We hope to create more miracles and keep saving lives with a little bad dancing!" ◆

he floor of the Chestnut Room was bustling with energy as anticipation from attendees increased as each speaker took the stage to warm up the crowd.

The first of many speakers was Youngstown Mayor Jamael "Tito" Brown, who opened the rally by welcoming everyone to Youngstown.

"Youngstown has had our challenges. In the past, we've had the steel mills close. We've been known for some negative activity in this community. But today is a new start, a new opportunity to move forward," he said. "Youngstown's open for business, if you don't know it by now."

Multiple Democratic candidates on the ticket this midterm election season took the stage to support one another and emphasize the party's ideologies on health care, Wall Street, immigration and the current state of the real estate market....

Joe Biden started off by telling the crowd he was in Youngstown because "who ends up being the governor of Ohio is going to tell a lot about the country."

The former vice president also addressed the recent pipe bombs being sent to prominent democrats and the attack on The Tree of Life synagogue in Pittsburgh, Pa. He regarded the events as the work of "hate and terror," and it was time for politicians to unite for the welfare of Americans.

"This election is bigger than politics," he said. "When have we ever said there was something we couldn't do? So let's lift our heads up This is America, there's not a thing we can't do," Biden said as he closed out the rally and descended into the crowd to interact with attendees.
