



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#### The Roots 1868-1908





Youngstown State University, which in 1982-83 is celebrating its Diamond Jubilee, views its beginning as the introduction of a law class in the YMCA Night School in 1908. The roots of the University, however, go back some forty years before, to the founding of the Youngstown YMCA itself. The first attempt to organize a YMCA in Youngstown was in 1868 when the organization opened free reading rooms on the second floor of "Packard's Tall Brick Building" on Federal Street. This first attempt failed and the organization became dormant. It was revived by prominent citizens in 1883, however, so that the present Youngstown YMCA dates back to that year. The new group included many wellknown Youngstown families dotted with such names as Wick, Richard Brown, McKelvey, Gerwig, Dennison, Ford, Bonnel, Stambaugh, and Fording. They incorporated the members of the earlier organization into their group.

The rooms of the revived YMCA were on the third floor of a building at 127 West Federal Street known as the "Bushnell Block." This building is still standing and is now a part of Lustig's Shoe Store. The main objective of the YMCA was to assist the large number of young men who were leaving the rural area to seek employment in the expanding cities. To accomplish this purpose the YMCA offered the use of cheerful and well ventilated reading rooms; writing materials; a directory of good boarding houses; an employment register; visitation in time of sickness; and social and religious

meetings.

Of particular interest to the history of Youngstown State was the establishment of the reading room proved to the YMCA that this part of its funds was well invested. At almost any hour of the day, the secretary reported, young men could be seen using the room. There were 65 different periodicals in the reading room and the list of titles was impressive, for it contained





Eugene Magee in Law Library of John Wick Building




most of the outstanding periodicals of the 1880's. The choice of these reflected a certain degree of sophistication on the part of the YMCA leadership.

It was in this environment and against this background that the seeds of Youngstown State University were sown. These seeds were the YMCA's Educational Program which began in the 1880's and 1890's. It is not known when the first class was held but the earliest of which there is any record was a class in mechanical drawing in 1888. At this time, the activities of the YMCA were still in the rented rooms at 127 W. Federal Street. The two Youngstown newspapers, The Vindicator and The Telegram described those classes in 1890 and implied that they had been in existence for several years. Whatever the date of the first class, it is evident that by that year there was a well developed educational program.

The activities of the YMCA had so expanded by 1890 that the rented rooms were no longer adequate. A large building was therefore constructed at the corner of Champion and Federal Streets lan office building, City Center One, now occupies this site) which was dedicated by Governor William McKinley in 1892. The opening of this building gave the night classes a boost, for it contained rooms specifically designed for them.

The Vindicator stated that the classes for fall and winter of 1890 were in arithmetic, algebra, bookkeeping, civil government, English, electricity, freehand drawing, orchestral music, and political economy. Professor C.F. Jewett, principal of Rayen School, gave a series of twelve lectures on chemistry which, the announcement stated, "would look into the study of iron and steel." The Vindicator also announced that if a sufficient number of people were interested, instructors would be secured to give classes in vocal music and bookkeeping. Day classes were first begun in 1905 during the summer.






First campus structure — 191

The program grew so rapidly that, in 1898, Prof. George H. Lamb, principal of the Wood Street School would be the head of a great university. The Telegram headlined his talk with the words A GREAT ASSOCIATION UNIVERSITY IN SIGHT. Another important move was the appointment of M. C. Gibson as the first full-time educational secretary in 1906. Prior to this appointment the classes had been under the supervision of the general secretary and the chairman of the committee. This committee was of particular importance because it later developed into the Board of Trustees of Youngstown University. The committee continued to play an important role even after the first full-time educational director was appointed.

Thus by the time that the law class was introduced in 1908, the YMCA night classes were firmly established. Several aspects of these classes foreshadowed the character of Youngstown State University. Like these classes, the University would be geared to the industrial and business life of the community. Its students would be those who needed additional education or who had to earn their living and could go to school only part-time. It also catered to those who did not have the academic background to enter a conventional college. It utilized the professional and business men of the community as sources for its faculty —a practice that it continues on a lesser scale today. The members of the YMCA Board of Trustees and its educational committee were drawn from the prominent people of the community, as are the University trustees today. The YMCA building, which housed the classes, was located near the center of the business district, as is the present University. Each class that was added to the school was designed to meet some need in the community. Thus the tradition of community service was already well established when the law class opened in 1908.

The introduction of a law class in the YMCA School in 1908 is regarded as the beginning of Youngstown State University. In the ensuing year, college-level classes were added and those at the secondary, elementary, and vocational level were dropped. As a result, the school eventually became entirely a college level institution. Like other part-time law schools, a low-cost legal education was the Law School's main attraction. As one prominent alumnus pointed out, the reason the students became lawyers was that it was the only place in Youngstown where they could get a lowcost professional education; if the school had been a medical school they would all have become physicians.


The rapid expansion of the School taxed the capacity of the first YMCA building and was one of the reasons for constructing a new one. It was dedicated in 1916 with a speech by William Howard Taft, ex-president of the United States. The new structure was carefully designed to include an adequate number of classrooms. Only a year after the opening of the new building, however, a controversy started because the School wanted to use two social rooms as temporary class rooms. Other departments feared that the education department's temporary use might turn into a permanent one.

The overcrowding became so critical by 1920 that the Trustees decided to erect a new building for the automobile school in a lot behind the Public Library on Rayen Avenue, just off Wick. This new building failed to solve the space problem and in September, the Board gave the School 27 dormitory rooms, thereby allowing the School a 30 percent increase in space. Another step dictated by the large enrollment was the incorporation of the School in 1916 under the Ohio law for the incorporation of not-for-profit organizations. An interesting problem arose in regard to the name of the School because it had been known by a

variety of names: The YMCA School, the Technical Institute, the Night School, and the Association School. The name finally agreed upon was the Youngstown Association School. The school claimed an enrollment of two thousands students in 1920, but it should be remembered that all of these were part-time, usually enrolled for one class each. This was, nonetheless, a large operation in terms of the 1920's, and not a small one by present day standards.

The Law School was authorized by the State Department of Education to confer the Bachelor of Science in Law degree in 1920; the School of Commerce and Finance was authorized to confer the Bachelors Degree in Commercial Science in 1924; and the School of Liberal Arts was authorized to grant the Bachelor of Arts degree in 1930. The School of Engineering gave advanced courses although it did not grant degrees. In line with these developments, the Trustees again changed the name of the School to the Youngstown Institute of Technology. In 1921, the Institute continued to draw most of its faculty from the business and professional people of the city but drew its Liberal Arts faculty from small colleges in the area. Youngstown being a railroad center, it was possible for professors at these colleges to teach their classes at their home college in the morning, take an afternoon train into Youngstown, teach their classes in Youngstown in the evening, and return home on a late evening train. Colleges from which the School drew its liberal arts faculty were Hiram, Theil, Slippery Rock, Westminster, and the University of Pittsburgh. A special relationship developed with Hiram because that college contributed most of the faculty. As the institute evolved into a college, several of the men who began as part-time night instructors became full-time professors. It was said that the one qualification that ranked higher at the Institute than a doctorate was some connection with Hiram.





1931 Day Law Academy Gradua




Further expansion began in 1922 when the Grustees leased the Bonnell Mansion just north of the Public Library on Wick Avenue. Its site is now occupied by the firm of Steego Auto Parts. A year later the Grustees announced the purchase of the John C. Wick Mansion, at the corner of Wick and Lincoln avenues, now the site of Youngstown State University's Jones Hall. Ghis was the beginning of the present University campus. The Institute expanded again in 1928 with the leasing of the Henry C. Wick mansion. This gave the Institute a five-acre campus with three buildings.

The most notable event in the early years came in 1929. The YMCA launched a campaign to raise a million dollars to purchase equipment, retire indebtedness, and build new buildings. One of the new buildings was for the Institute to be erected at the corner of Lincoln and Wick, and was to accomodate all the Institute activities. At the "kick off" banquet, however, the chairman announced that the money had already been raised and the occasion became a victory banquet. Despite the stockmarket collapse in October, and the subsequent depression, most of the pledges were paid in full, many in advance. The School thus began the era of the 1930's and 1940's with a large building deemed adequate for all of its needs in the foreseeable future.






# Part III Youngstown College in Depression and World War 1931-1945



The era from 1931 to 1945 were years of economic depression and world war, both of which had a major impact on the emerging college. The most immediate impact of the Great Depression was that it caused an increase in the number of college students. Middle income parents who normally sent their children to out of town universities were unable to do so, and therefore sent them to the local institution. This led to a steady increase in college courses and to a decline in elementary, secondary, and vocational courses. The trade school enrollment declined due to the inability of its graduates to find jobs, and the high school and elementary schools were closed in 1934. By the end of this era, the only non-collegiate school left was the secretarial school. In line with this development the name of the school was again changed in 1931 from the Youngstown Institute of Technology to Youngstown College. The expanding student body also meant an expanding campus. When the "new" building — now Jones Hall — was opened in 1931, many Youngstowners believed that it would be adequate to meet the needs of the College for years to come. The trustees and administrators, however, were under no such illusion. The Henry C. Wick mansion next door was purchased in 1938 and was used to house the secretarial school. The next building to be acquired was the Charles S. Thomas home, just one block north on Wick Avenue, which was used to house the Dana School of Music when that school merged with the College in 1941. Then followed another acquisition to the south — the Rayen School. This building was leased to the College in 1944 and became the William Rayen School of Engineering.

The Law School was still regarded as the top school of the College. A student writer in the yearbook said, somewhat facetiously, that the law students were a breed apart and were supposed to be the intellectual elite of the valley. He went on to say,










however, that this was not very obvious to the impartial observer. The Liberal Arts School, which was next in prestige to the Law School, offered courses that were typical of liberal arts colleges in the 1930's. The School of Business Administration had courses in accounting, bookkeeping, commercial law, and advertising. The state granted it the authority to confer the Bachelor of Commercial Science degree in 1924.

Gwo new departments, Education and Engineering, emerged in this period. The Education Department had its roots in a teacher training program begun in 1912 at the suggestion of the Youngstown Superintendant of Education. Authorization to grant the Bachelor of Science Degree in Education was given in 1937. Engineering courses had been offered in previous years but the first distinctive engineering program appeared in 1932-33. These, however, were offered under the department of chemistry, mathematics, and physics. The College did not grant an engineering degree until the early 1940's but by 1944 was granting three engineering degrees.

The most notable addition to the curriculum was the merger of the College's Department of Music with the Dana School of Music. The College's Department of Music was comparatively new but it had already built a fine reputation under the leadership of Dr. Henry V. Stearns, minister of music at First Presbyterian Church. The Dana Musical Institute in Warren, Ohio, was an old school having been founded in 1868. It was, therefore, older than the College itself. Thus, as a result of this merger, the College's Dana School of Music had the most distinctive background of any of its schools.

The leading event in this era, however, was the separation of the College from the YMCA. Several issues led to this move but the primary one was the refusal of the Morth Central Association to accredit the College as long as the YMCA owned its







buildings, kept its books, and controlled its funds. The College was concerned that students might spend time and money attending Youngstown College and then find their credits were not accepted elsewhere. The YMCA, therefore, set up a seperate Board of Grustees for the College in 1937 and in 1944, gave it complete control of the College's buildings, books, and funds. Not all ties to the YMCA were broken, however. A majority of the College Trustees had to be members of the YMCA's Board of Trustees; the College still used the facilities of the YMCA for its physical education activities, and faculty members still enrolled in the YMCA pension fund. This action, nevertheless, satisfied the North Central Association and the College was accredited in 1945.


World War II affected the College in a number of ways. Football was dropped for the duration. Enrollment declined, but this was partially offset by several armed forces training programs held in College buildings. The Engineering School expanded enormously, particularly in those courses that were related to the war effort. While these programs ended when the war was over, the Engineering School remained one of the College's leading schools.

The College had made many advances during these years. It had almost completly dropped its character as an elementary, secondary, and vocational school and by 1944 its courses were nearly all of college grade. It had a large building which would be the center of its expanding campus and which housed most of its current activities. Dr. Howard Jones, its president, was an able administrator and fund raiser and would guide its expansion for another twenty years. It had started to build a faculty of full-time professional scholars; it had expanded its curriculum to cope with the expanding needs of the Mahoning-Shenango Valley; and it had started a college library. The foundations were well laid to cope with the problems that the coming years would bring.






## Part IV The Private University 1945-1967



The end of World War II inaguarated a period of growth in American higher education unparalleled in it's history. This was sparked by the passage in 1944 of the Servicemen's Readjustment Act, popularly known as the "G.I. Bill of Rights." Mindful of the fact that at the end of World War I there had been widespread unemployment, Congress passed this bill which most notably extended to veterans government support at accredited educational institutions for periods based on the length of their military service. It gave the opportunity for a college education to many veterans who were the first in their families to attend college. Enlisted men had also observed that most men with a college degree were able to get commissions, while those with a high school education or less usually got no higher than a noncommissioned officer; they therefore advised younger members of their family to get a college education. President Jones noticed that many students were not veterans themselves, but were brothers and sisters of veterans. This increase was reflected at Youngstown College. The enrollment in the last year of the war was 1,093 and by 1966-67 it was 12,033.

This phenomenal increase inevitably led to the expansion of the physical plant of the university. The first new buildings were a set of five barracks, obtained from Camp Perry, Ohio, under a program for the disposal of surplus army equipment. The most pressing need, however, was for a new library. A report in 1949 referred to the meager College library located in a small room at the west end of the Main Building's first floor. The campaign for the new building was led by President Jones and most of the money was contributed by businesses in the Valley. When the building was complete, however, space was provided in it not only for the library, but also for faculty offices, meeting rooms, registration of students, and other activities. Instead, therefore, of being devoted exclusively to library functions, it also served as a general pur-

pose building.

Building construction as well as acquisition, continued throughout the 1950's. The Pollock and Ford mansions on Wick Avenue were donated by the families that owned them. The YMCA Youth Center on Rayen Street was acquired and renamed Clingan-Waddell Hall in honor of the families who made its purchase possible. The former Newsboy's Club on Lincoln Avenue was remodeled for use in training physical education teachers. Classes were also held in St. John's Episcopal Church, Pilgrim Collegiate Church, First Christian Church, and the Butler Institute of American Art. Next was the Kilcawley Student Center named in honor of Mr. and Mrs. William Kilcawley whose contributions made its construction possible. An additional science building was named the Ward Beecher Hall in honor of the Youngstown industrialist who donated part of the money for its construction. Under a grant from the Housing and Home Finance Agency, the College also acquired a Christian Science Church which became a recital hall for the School of Music. It purchased the Elm Street School through contributions from W.E. Bliss, L.A. Beeghly, and C.G. Watson. Plans were also made to obtain funds to finance a Health and Physical Education Building, a Music and Fine Arts Building, and an Engineering Building.


The University continued to change to meet the changing needs of the Youngstown community. The closing of the Law School was a major shift, one forced on the College by the increased accrediting requirements which it could not finance. Another was the change in the name of the school from Youngstown College to Youngstown University in 1955. This was done at the suggestion of North Central Association which pointed out that the school was, in fact, already a university since it was composed of four schools of

college grade.

The rapid growth of the student body after World War II and the increased de-

mand for more advanced courses and new programs were two factors that led the University to "go state" in 1967. From its beginning, the school had been supported soley by fees and private contributions. President Jones once boasted that "Youngstown University never cost the taxpayers of Youngstown a dime." This position began to change during the expansion of the 1950's when application for funding was made to state and federal agencies. The matter was brought to a crisis in 1965 with the impending retirement of President Jones. Several well-qualified men applied for the position but lost interest when they found that their principal duty would be to raise a million dollars a year just to meet operating expenses. The Grustees, therefore, decided in 1966 to accept the invitation of Ohio Governor James A. Rhodes and become part of the state university system. Dr. Albert Pugsly, vicepresident of Kansas State University, was named president and guided the transition from private university to state university in 1966-1967.

In a thoughtful editorial, The Vindicator, which had previously upheld the concept of a university financed by private contributions, summarized the factors that led to the changeover to state support. Youngstown University, it said, once a college and at its beginning a YMCA night school, had successfully met the growing educational demands of a healthy, bustling steel center. A change in the official status of the University that would enable it to take advantage of public funds was inevitable. The University's enrollment had been increasing year by year. New technologies in many varied fields had added financial pressures to the University, while state funds for higher education were going to other areas. Admitting frankly that private contributions were inadequate, the paper said, "The university — any university operating as Youngstown has been — can ask only so much from loyal individuals and organizations."


Construction eof the Engineering Science Building,  $196^{\circ}$ 




After sixty years as a private school, Youngstown University became a state university in 1967. The most noteworthy difference between the university as a private institution and a state institution was that it now had adequate financing. It was thus able to accelerate its physical expansion and introduce new programs. The traditional schools continued to expand and the Dana School of Music was absorbed into the College of Fine and Performing Arts. New Schools were established: the Graduate School and the College of Applied Science and Technology were founded in 1968 and the Northeastern Ohio Universities College of Medicine was formed in 1972 with Akron and Kent Universities. Black Studies began in 1970 and a complete program was in operation by 1972. An Office of Continuing Education presented courses outside the traditional degree program. The University became a member of the Northeastern Educational Teletium, with Akron and Kent State Universities. The Center for Urban Studies was founded in 1969 to relate the resources of the University to the problems of urbanization in the Valley. The Charles B. Cushwa, Jr. Center for Industrial Development was established in 1978 to assist local industry in broadening its productive capacity and to encourage new enterprises.

With state financing, the University was able to continue, on a large scale, the construction program that had begun in the 1950's. At one time, so many buildings were being constructed or expanded that the campus had much the appearance of a bombed-out city in World War II. Of these new structures, the largest are the two which represent two different aspects of university life: The Maag Library and the Arnold D. Stambaugh Football Stadium. The former, opened in 1976, dominated the campus physically until the completion of the football stadium in 1982. Both buildings had long histories. The library




emerged as an issue early in the history of the school. Since the YMCA was always located in the vicinity of the public library, some people believed that a separate college library was unnecessary. A number of prominent citizens realized that this was not true, however, and formed an organization known as The Friends of the Youngstown College Library. Its purpose was to raise money to buy books, but following World War II it decided that the College needed a separate library building. It therefore began a campaign which culminated in the construction of a building in 1953. This building, as noted in Part IV, was a general purpose building which housed the library, among other functions. A leader in this campaign was Mr. William Maag, editor of The Vindicator. It was therefore appropriate that when the University finally obtained a building devoted soley to library purposes, that it should be named for him. When the University joined the state system in 1967, obtaining such a building became a major objective. This was achieved with the construction of the Maag Library Building in 1976.


The football stadium also had an interesting history. Since people who have no interest in higher education itself read the sports pages of the newspaper, college athletics are designed not only for the benefit of the students, but also to keep the University before the general public. The establishment of a football team at Youngstown College in 1937, therefore, generated a considerable amount of public interest. By 1940, sports columnists were commenting on the need for a football stadium to acco-


modate the crowds.

The possibility of building a stadium was discussed by Frank Ward, Vindicator sports columnist, in November, 1941 lless than a month before Pearl Harbor). He pointed out that a defense program was underway and that steel needed for the stadium could not be obtained. It was an-










nounced in 1943 that Youngstown College was dropping football for the duration of the war and Dwight Beede, the legendary coach, was going into the insurance business. Football was resumed at the close of the war and Dwight Beede came back to coach. The need for a football stadium had to be kept in the background, however, because the construction of buildings for classrooms, laboratories, and offices had priority. With state support, it was possible to revive the stadium project. The funds for its construction were raised by popular subscription and state subsidy. It was dedicated on September 4, 1982.

Other events in the 1970's affected the University. The wave of student unrest that swept the nation in the late 1960's and early 1970's was reflected at Youngstown State. Although there was some excitement on campus, there was little disorder or violence. Unlike many residential schools, Youngstown State did not close, nor were classes ever suspended. Another event of considerable importance was the unionization of the faculty in 1973 - a first in the state of Ohio. Dr. Albert Pugsly resigned as president in 1973 and was succeeded by Dr. John Coffelt, executive vice-president of the University. Before coming to Youngstown in 1968, Dr. Coffelt was vicechancellor for research and planning of the Oklahoma Regents for Higher Education. He presides over the continuing development of the University in the 1980's.

As this history is concluded, the question naturally arises: What is the significance of Youngstown State University? It was only after World War II that the need for tax-supported universities in the center of our cities was clearly recognized and that state and federal funds were made available to establish the modern urban university. By the 1950's, over half the students in degree-granting institutions were enrolled in urban universities. With the soaring cost of higher education, even more people will







be turning in the future to the urban universities for their education. Thus, Youngstown State University is not only a representative of the predominant type of higher education in the present, but of the type which will be even more important in the future. As it celebrates its Diamond Jubilee, its foundations are well laid to serve the Youngstown community.



September 4, 1982 will be remembered in Youngstown as "Super Sports Saturday" and the opening of the new Arnold D. Stambaugh Stadium. The stadium, which seats 16,000, has many features. It includes a sports medicine center, a gymnasium, handball courts, concession stands, locker rooms for home and visiting teams as well as officials. It also contains a doctor's office, coaching and administrative offices, lecture rooms, classrooms, and security offices.

The top level of the stadium is a pressbox with accomodations for television, radio, and the working press. In January 1983, a segment of the "Today" show was taped there with hostess Jane Pauley featuring the unemployment rate of Youngstown and the "Steel Valley".

The dedication of the Arnold D. Stambaugh Stadium officially marked the begining of YSU's 75th Diamond Jubilee and a year long program of events to commemorate the college's anniversary.

The morning schedule on "Super Sports Saturday" started with public tours of the stadium, with an Alumni Brunch following. Later a dedication ceremony was held, with special guest Ohio Governor James A. Rhodes.

The pre-game ceremony included a dedication of the Beede All-Sports Athletic Field, honoring Dwight "Dike" Beede for the 31 years he coached the Penguin gridders.















#### **Talent Show**

No other day has been spent quite like "Today" at YSU.

NBC's popular morning television program sent co-host Jane Pauley and its production crew to Youngstown for the purpose of recording film segments, as well as telecasting live segments for the January 26 presentation of the "Today" show. Pauley talked with public officials and out-of-work steelworkers in the community to help illustrate the effects of unemployment in this country relative to President Reagan's State of the Union Address. Additional camera footage from outside the Arnold D. Stambaugh Stadium, from where the show was being telecast, gave YSU's students and campus national exposure.





#### Governor Celeste





Ohio's Governor Richard Celeste spoke before approximately 300 people on February 11, in the Arts and Science Auditorium. Governor Celeste focused his talk on the unemployment crisis in Ohio and the growing budget deficit. But Celeste's main reason to appear in Youngstown was to gain support on his proposed income tax surcharge.

Celeste proposed a 90% income tax surcharge and he also proposed a 15% cut in funding for higher education. YSU stands to lose \$3.9 million compared to last year's funding. He defended his proposed income tax surcharge as the only honest and equitable way to head off Ohio's budget deficits. Celeste claimed that the unemployed and Senior Citizens would not be affected by the surcharge. Celeste did win support from the crowd when he said he "planned to put Ohioans back to work," as they reacted in cheers and applause.


#### Of Mice And Men










#### THE KNACK



#### Kurt Vonnegut



Kurt Vonnegut Jr. discussed his inventions of Kilgore Trout, man/woman hours, analytic geometry and the extended faimly April 11 to a capacity crowd in the Chestnut Room, Kilcawley.

When he goes to that "great book club in the sky," he said, he wants to be remembered as an inventor rather than as a writer.

Vonnegut, author of Cat's Cradle, Slaughterhouse-Five and Breakfast of Champions, spoke on "How to get a Job Like Mine." He contended that, despite European opinion, writing can be taught.

"You start with capable people and tell them bone-headed mistakes they're making," he said.

Among his tips:

"Throw away the first six pages" rather than using them to show off writing talents, and "marry money" to provide the financial security necessary for working on a novel.

Vonnegut said he was encouraged by the number of young people writing and trying to get published. "But to think you can make a living out of it," he warned, "is unrealistic."



#### Casino Night





After the gambling is all over there is a dance for everyone. All those who participated in Casino Night are then eligible for the drawings of prizes at the dance.






#### Mash 4077














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
# Young


Dr. Warren Young is a professor of Physics and Astronomy and is the chairman of this department. A talented scientist, Young received the Distinguished Professor Award in 1978, was instrumental in the purchase of the planetarium, and has been its Director since its opening in 1967. He also invented the Planetarium Radio Sky Projector. In addition, Young was one of the key individuals in securing the 118-acre arboretum for the university.

Dr. Young is president of Sigma Xi, a member of the Scientific Research Society, and Special Lecturers Committee. The courses under his direction include Descriptive Astronomy, Moon and Planets, Astrophysics, and Observation Astronomy. Dr. Young received his B.S. from Case Institute of Technology and his M.S. and Ph.D. from Ohio State University.



Dr. Young enjoys teaching because of "... the contact with the students and it gives him the opportunity to keep up to date in all aspects of astronomy.








Through her experiences, Boyd hopes to offer her students "... specific, structured guidelines for competencies in lab work," in addition to her expertise in the field of Medical Technology.






Dr. Dodge received his B.S. in Industrial Management, and his M.B.A. and Ph.D. in Marketing, all at Ohio State University.


ty of West Virginia in Morgantown.

Enjoying the freedom and independence which teaching allows, Dr. Moroose also feels, "... dedicated to education and new technology."





### **Haims**



Dr. Dorothy Scott feels she has to offer students "scholarship, knowledge, and wide experience in my field of expertise as well as those in foreign countries."





Mr. Joseph Long teaches "... for the happy interaction of working with students, colleagues, and staff at the University." He hopes to "... give the students a holistic view of business and life."








Dr. Martin Greenman has been instructing at Youngstown State University for 15 years, during which he has received the award for Distinguished Professorship.


Prior to teaching here, Dr. Greenman attended the University of Chicago, where he earned both his B.A. and Ph.D. He teaches Esthetics,


Away from YSU, Dr. Mavrigian has been an industrial mathematician and consultant, in addition to serving as a professional engineer in the state of Ohio.

He and his wife Yolanda have three children; Michael, Cynthia, and Mark.




working with the newly formed Jump Rope Presentation Team.


Dean Sutton believes in active participation in a great number of academic and professional organizations. The American Association for

Dean Sutton, his wife, Marilyn and children, Dana and Jeremy, reside in Poland, Ohio.





Residing in Youngstown, he enjoys sailing, watercoloring, music, amateur radio, photography, and reading (especially science fiction and fantasy).



Having served on nearly all of the University committees, Yozwiak is currently involved with several NEOCOM committees, the Academic Senate, and Academic Planning Committee.



Residing in Canfield, Dean Richley and his wife Mary, have two children, Marilyn and James.





He has taught at Christopher Newport College of the College of William and Mary, for two years served as faculty advisor to *The Jambar*, and was chairman of the English department at YSU.





Salata and his wife Clara reside in Youngstown and have six dren.






Mears






### Gillis


Mr. Frost received his B.S. degree from Bluffton College and later his M.A. from Westminister College.

In spite of its 3-11 record, the 1982 tennis team was one that never gave up and "performed 100% every match." Led by MVP David Thompson, the team gained valuable experience from participating in the tough OVC and, according to head coach Rob Adsit, this will only help to make things easier in 1983.

"Taking into consideration the particular playing techniques of the athletes in the OVC, our players finished an incredibly competitive season," stated Adsit. "The team always benefited more from tough competition because their highest potentials were shown."

The Penguin netters captured two of their first five matches in 1982, but suffered through an eight game losing streak before winning the final game of the campaign against the College of Wooster 7-2, ending the season at 3-11.

Jeff Sinclair, playing the #5 singles positions, posted a 6-8 ledger and the #2 doubles team of Pierre Tanguay and Mike Fraley earned a 5-8 mark. Tanguay, who also competed with Sinclair in the #2 doubles slot, finished with a 2-2 record.

The Penguin netters were hampered last spring by injuries as well as tougher competition. "We never really got on track that season," commented Adsit. "Several injuries forced us to play key players out of position but if anything, it allowed us to gain valuable experience by playing a tough schedule."

Three lettermen return to aid in the expected turn-around in 1983, along with new recruits who are now playing an accelerated powerhouse type of game, similar to that used in the OVC. In preparing for the 1983 season, the team will be using a new technique of play along with daily workouts.

eading the Penguins' bat attack in 1982. Barb Nick who posted a .403 batting rage and a slugging percentage of .613. k also led the categories of runs (9), hits , stolen bases (9 of 11), homeruns (2) and 's (13). The overall batting average for J was .217.

The number one pitcher for YSU was Melissa Kerner with an ERA of 2.26 followed by Donna Tinkey who posted a 3.08 ERA. "Our pitching really wasn't that bad," commented Bevly. "We went against some teams that really could hit the ball and there were errors made in the infield that made it hard on our pitchers." Expected to be called to the mound more often this year, Kerner should become Bevly's number one pitcher in 1983.

Other standouts for YSU noted by Bevly were Tinkey, the feature pitcher and outfielder for the Penguins, and Meg Diebel at the catcher's spot. "Donna really converted from being an outfielder to becoming a pitcher and I thought she just did a super job when called upon," said Bevly. "And Meg is just an outstanding athlete, a real standout."

The Penguins faced some tough opponents in 1982, notably Akron and Ohio State University whom they lost to in a 15-inning state tournament game with a 3-1 score.

They also went to bat against West Virginia University, Ohio University, Edinboro State, Kent State and Slippery Rock State College.

The bulk of the 1982 team were members of the previous state champion team who still had not made a complete adjustment to fastpitch, but 1983 finds Bevly with a group who has been playing fast-pitch for awhile.


















# Slidin' In The Wins

n more than one respect, the 1982 Penbaseball season could be summed up as meback of many sorts. For YSU's legendcoach Dom Rosselli, it was the end of one and the beginning of another chapter. losselli has been head mentor since the eption of baseball as a varsity program in 8 and served as YSU's long successful ketball coach for 38 seasons, but had not erienced much success in recent years ause his 1981-82 basketball unit comd only an 8-18 record, and his last two eball teams had posted losing seasons (13in 1980 and 11-18 in 1981). Including se two squads, there had been only three ng campaigns in 27 seasons. Rosselli was eed hoping for a change for the better. hat hope materialized into an exciting 23season, breaking a two-year slump. It was estimony of the seniors who had played

the previous three years, but on teams

that were talented and injury-riddled that just couldn't quite mount an effective charge.

The 1982 season was synonymous with record-breaking achievements. It was the 11th 20-win season in the last 14 years and the 23 victories were the most by a Penguin squad since the 1977 team established a school mark of 26 wins in a single season.


Rosselli decided to relinquish his basket-ball coaching reins at the end of spring '82 and devote his time to coaching baseball exclusively. He has compiled a combined coaching record of 1030-627, including a 441-228 ledger in his 28 baseball seasons. Rosselli had reached the 1000-win coaching milestone during the 191-82 cage campaign.


The '82 Penguins struggled at times on the mound and in the field defensively, but the team's offensive strength carried them for much of the season. Two senior co-captains contributed most to the rewriting the YSU

record book.

Catcher Mike Nittoli erupted after a dreadful 5-for-27 (.185) start at the plate, to post a .346 batting average. Most noteworthy, however, were his power figures. Nittoli's 44 base hits were the second most in one season, and his seven homeruns and seven doubles were team highs. The Penguins receiver culminated his career by breaking YSU school standards for most career homeruns (12), runs-batted-in for single season (41), and most career runs-batted-in (80). His eight game-winning RBI's paced the team as he became one of the clutch performers all year long. Nittoli had consecutive game hitting streaks of 13 and 12 games respectively.

Third baseman John McAbier became solidly entrenched as the glue of the '82 infield at the "hot corner" despite a painful hand injury. McAbier made several key defensive plays to bail out the team and became one of


the club's most productive hitters. After hitting just .227 in 1981, "Mac" responded by setting a YSU record for most base hits in one season (45), batting a .352 while scoring 29 runs and driving in 22 more. He had a phenomenal 20-game hitting streak, which is thought to be a school record. In that span between April 20 and May 8, McAbier had 28 hits in 71 at-bats (a .394 clip) with one homer and 14 RBI's, punctuating a great comeback-player-of-the year story.


Junior Bob Gardner continued to emerge as one of the top Penguin players ever, based on his '82 season. Despite playing three different positions during the season, Gardner managed a .341 batting mark, the second straight year the infielder-outfielder had eclipsed the .340 clip. Gardner had 42 hits, driving in 31 runs, while tallying 31 more

himself. His four homers were second on the team, with his two in a single game vs. Cleveland State tying a school standard. Gardner also had five game-winning RBI's and stole ten bases.

Sophomore centerfielder Mark Snoddy set a YSU record for runs scored in a season (35) and batted a solid .346 with 44 base knocks, predominately out of the leadoff position in the Penguin batting order. On two occasions, Snoddy managed six consecutive base hit streaks (in a period of three games vs. Akron, Cleveland State and Ashland, and a doubleheader with Thiel College). Snoddy is on a pace whereby he could become YSU's career leader in base hits in two more years.

While the pitching staff had its highs and lows, some of the hurlers turned in fine performances. Senior Mark Schlarb and freshman newcomer, Mike Anderson, tied for club honors, each winning five decisions. Schlarb was the ironman of the staff, appearing in




The club caught fire, winning 10 of its next 12 games. The Penguins took the second-place runner-up trophy in the annual University of Akron Baseball Classic, and won six of seven games in the week following the tournament. YSU ended its season with a double-header conquest over Baldwin-Wallace, gaining a measure of revenge against the Yellow Jackets who beat them twice earlier.

All in all, it proved to be an eventful season, one that will be remembered for quite a while.



### Coach . . .

Since coming to YSU in 1975, head football coach Bill Narduzzi has compiled a 52-34-1 record and has led the Penguins to two Mid-Continent Conference championships (1978, 1979) and two straight national playoff appearances in Division II (1978, 1979). In 1981, he coached a team that was predicted to finish in eighth place in the OVC to a second place berth, and his 1982 team fought to earn a tie for third place in the OVC.

A graduate of Miami (Ohio) University, Duzzer's collegiate coaching career has taken him to the University of Pittsburgh, Brown, Yale, Miami (Fla.) and Kentucky. He was picked as the Ohio "Coach of the Year" in 1978 and as national Division II "Coach of the Year" in 1979.

In 1980, Narduzzi became the first ever at YSU to take the dual role as Athletic Director/Head Coach. But at a January 7, 1983 press conference, Duzzer announced that he was stepping down from the Athletic Director position to devote his attention solely to football. "While trying to reach a decision, I had only one basic thought: 'Where would I be happiest?'. I think I'd be happier as head football coach," explained Duzzer. "I feel YSU is approaching a more exciting era and its one I'm looking forward to."


# Never ...

September 4, 1982 — It was a beautifully sunny day as nearly 16,000 fans filled the seats of the brand new Arnold D. Stambaugh Stadium to witness the Penguins host arch-rival University of Akron in the first dual of 1982. The emotion and enthusiam was unmeasurable; it was a perfect day — if only . . .


"I wish I had a nickle for everytime I heard: 'It was a perfect day, except for . . . ' " reflected head coach Bill Narduzzi. "The effect that game had on our team was shown in our record. It lingered with us through the whole season and it was devastating to our team morale as well as to the fans' faith in us."

The 1982 battle between the Penguins and the Zips was a game that will be talked about and remembered for years. It was a game that found YSU losing to Akron, 20-19, in the last second of the game which set the tempo for the beginning of the season. The Penguins held a 13-0 lead up to the end of the second quarter when Akron's Ron Brandt raced to paydirt on a 102-yard kick-off return and, with only seconds before halftime, Akron again scored to hold a 14-13 advantage at the half. The second half was a dual between the place kickers. Paul McFadden added six points to YSU's side of the scoreboard with boots of 28 and 42 yards.

At the 7:03 mark, Akron kicker Dennis Heckman added a 31-yard field goal to Akron's score and it seemed as if that would be "all she wrote." Wrong! Fans were cheering, and some were even leaving, happy to know that the Penguins had opened the new stadium with a victory when, BOOM! With only:01 on the clock, Heckman kicked a 48-yard field goal to assure the Zips the 20-19 win and spoil YSU's day.








# Never ...

The Penguins finished the 1982 grid campaign with a 6-5 record and a tie for third place in the OVC, but the memories of the opening game haunted the Penguins' play in the early part of the season.

Throughout the first six weeks of competition, YSU lost five of its first six games and to many, it seemed as if there was no hope. But the Penguins shook loose and went on to win the last five games of the season.

"Losing the first game really took the air out of our kids," stated Duzzer. "That loss destroyed our concentration and it took weeks to get it back. But we knew that we were better than our record showed and we salvaged a lot of pride. A 6-5 record can mean a lot of pride."

YSU lost its second game to Eastern Kentucky, 31-17 who eventually became the Division I-A National Champions. The following week, Tennessee Tech became the Penguins' first victim as they lost on a 37-14 note. YSU then lost games to Cincinnati (57-3), Eastern Illinois (27-23) and Western Kentucky (28-14). But for the rest of the season, it was win, win, win! YSU riddled off victories against Austin Peay (31-9), Middle Tennessee (11-10), Western Illinois (28-20), Morehead State (38-19) and Northern Iowa (25-13), ending the season with a 6-5 mark.

"There were some close games and we made a lot of mistakes, but after the start we had, a 6-5 record is a goal in itself," said Narduzzi. "Our winning finish left some confidence for next year's players and it just goes to show that Youngstown State never quits."


For the second year in a row, All-American tailback Paris Wicks literally stole the show. All he did was gain 1,392 yards this year (his second straight 1,000 yard season), score 10 touchdowns including one from 65 yards out, catch 24 passes for 222 yards and led YSU in all-purpose yardage, averaging 155.7 yards per game. His 1,392 yards rushing was good enough for second in the conference and fourth in the nation in Division I-AA. He also finished fourth this year in the conference in scoring. All this helped him earn his second straight berth on the OVC First Team as well as being named to the Associated Press First Team, the OVC Media Association Player of the Year and the Penguins' Most Valuable Player.


1982 allowed YSU's #24 to statistically rank fourth in career points (182), tie for third with most touchdowns in a career (30), and push to second place in the career rushing attempts category with 595 tries.


While Wicks may be considered as the one who makes the Penguins go, the YSU cocaptain is the first to bring praise to his offensive line. "They are a great bunch of guys," said Wicks. "They do all the dirty work and I get the glory. They are the main reason why I got where I am today."












Injuries required the Penguins to utilize three different quarterbacks in 1982. Jamie DeVore was the starting ring-leader at the opening of the season, but was sidelined for the rest of the year with a serious leg injury suffered in the first game with Akron. Filling in for DeVore, Griffen Keys came in and ended up being the Penguin passing leader with a 53.8 completion average and 84.2 yards per outing, finishing as the third leading passer in the OVC. Keys was eventually hit by the injury bug and Mike Sloe was called upon to finish the season, turning out to be the catalyst in the team's last five wins.

Place kicker Paul McFadden also inked a few new marks into the record books, booting 17 field goals and 21 PAT's for a total of 72 points, good enough to lead both the Penguins and the OVC in those categories. His 17 field goals gives him the record for most field goals in a season, his 39 strikes are a career standard, and on two seperate occasions he hit the uprights four times in a single game. He was also on the All-OVC Second Team and the OVC Media Association Team.


Other statistical leaders for the Penguins were: Jeff Patterson in receiving (28 catches for 611 yards, eighth in the OVC); Robert Thompson in kick-off returns (20 for 374 yards, an 18.7 yard average per kick-off); Thompson in punt returns (20 for 181 yards; one an 81-yard touchdown); Nick Xides in punting (second in the OVC with a 40.9 yard per punt average); Mark Derthick in defense (104 total tackles, including 51 solos and 53 assists); co-captain Tom Cullen in defense (10 quarterback sacks for 86 lost yards; led the OVC in total tackles for loss with 19 for a loss of 113 yards; named as YSU's Defensive Lineman of the Year and also a member of the OVC Media Association Team); and Dave Peters (first in the OVC and second in the nation with eight pass interceptions; named as the Defensive Back of the Year and to the All-OVC First Team as well as the OVC Media Association Second Team).

"Our seniors really set a great example and we're going to miss them," said Duzzer. "But the winning finish we had proved that we have a good, solid program with lots of good character. Hopefully, our winning streak will continue in September of 1983."


















In his fifth year at the helm of the women's volleyball team, Coach Tokash has led his team through its first tough season in OVC competition, chalking up a 17-17-1 record.



"Volleyball is a hobby," Tokash said with a smile. "I really don't think I'd be happy if I weren't involved with it in some way."



"But I can honestly say that we never got 'blown away' by any team. We gave everybody a battle — regardless of what the score was."

Standouts for YSU were Meg Deibel, Denise Dietz and Sandy Treece. Deibel was chosen to receive the 1982 MVP award as well as being chosen for the OVC All-Tournament Team, the Allegheny Tournament All-Star Team and the YSU Tournament Dream Team. Senior captain Dietz was also named to the YSU Dream Team and Treece was picked as an Allegheny All-Star.

"Meg could play anywhere in this country if she were bigger," boasted Tokash. "She's

only 5'4", but she plays like she's 5'8" or taller. And Sandy can hit harder than anyone around. These two will be the king-pins next year."

Only three veterans will be lost — Kathy McConnell, Andrea Igel and Dietz — so next year looks promising. "1983 should be a better year because we got our first taste of OVC and big-school play in 1982," said Tokash.

Although there were stand-outs on the squad, Tokash is proud to say that on his team, "everybody gets to play."

"We play as a team," stated Tokash. "There are no Reggie Jacksons. We try to win, and we want to win, but we concentrate on playing a happy game. If we lose that's it. We walk away with school pride and our heads held high. We place representing the school first, winning second."



### Coach

He has some big shoes to fill, but Mike Rice has become only the seventh head basketball coach in YSU's 52-year basketball history and is part of what has been termed "a New Era."

In his fifth season as a collegiate head coach, Rice previously spent four years at Dusquesne University where he compiled a 62-49 career record. During those same years he also earned Eastern Eight "Coach of the Year" honors in 1979-80 and 1980-81 while leading the Dukes to the National Invitational Tournament during those same campaigns.

Rice started playing college ball at Cass Tech in Detroit before going to Dusquesne where he was captain of the team his senior year. He averaged 14.3 points and 8.5 rebounds a game despite his size of 6'2" and 170 pounds. Remembered for his intense and competitive style of play, Rice played on


teams that totaled a 37-14 record.

In fourteen years of coaching high school basketball, his greatest achievement was at Valley High School in Kensington, PA, where his teams compiled a 171-39 mark over nine years, including five WPIAL Championships. Overall, his high school teams tallied a 245-71 record.


Rice said that YSU's move into Division I status and the OVC was an influential factor in his coming to YSU. "The conference that we're now in is much more difficult than 90 per cent of the people in the United States realize," stated Rice. "Division I basketball is much like a business and we want to suceed in it."


Known for his top recruiting techniques, Rice feels the keys to the Penguins' hopes of becoming a power are recruiting and scheduling. "If we can get (local athletes) to stay in Youngstown, we have an excellent opportunity of winning."








### Era . . .

The 1982-83 basketball season was hailed as a "New Era" for Penguin basketball with changes abounding, including new rules, a new head coach and the school's first seven footer. From the halls of Duquesne University came a new head mentor in Mike Rice. The Ohio Valley Conference decided to install a 30-second clock and a three point goal to speed up play. The Youngstown courts were also graced with Ricky Tunstill the schools first true bigman. But maybe the biggest change was a winning record of 15-12 something not seen since the 79-80 season.


"The biggest disappointment was not making the OVC tournament, because it gives the players a taste of college basketball and what the season's all about," stated Rice. "Our biggest surprise was the fact that we won eight games on the road, something most NCAA teams don't do."

The cagers started the season on a winning note with an exhibition game held at Beeghly Center. A visiting British team from Doncaster England was mauled by the Penguins 102-72. The Penguins again ended up on top—this time at the Utica cage tournament in Utica, New York. The Penguins captured the first place trophy by dumping both Columbia University and North Carolina Wilmington. The season soon turned sour as the Penguins were dumped by Division I powers Ohio State and West Virginia. The rest of the season found the YSU roundballers losing several close games including two of four in overtime


The season did end on a high note as Youngstown ruined final game ceremonies in Akron's Memorial Hall. Next season Akron is to move to a new 7,000 seat arena. The Zips are the same school that ruined Stambaugh Stadium's home opener. Youngstown also held the number two scorer in the nation Joe Jakubick in hand as he scored only ten points.

Troy Williams had another outstanding season for YSU. Williams led the team in scoring at a little over 12 points a game, and was the second leading rebounder. Defensively, Ricky Tunstill was second in the nation in blocked shots with 138, an average of almost five blocks per game. Tunstill also led the team in rebounds as he averaged about seven a game. Freshman Bruce Timko was the leading assist-man while Sophomore Kevin Cherry was tops in steals.


A class player, Bruce Alexander finished his career at Youngstown State as the all-time number four scorer. "I had a real good four years at Youngstown," Alexander not-ed. "I accomplished a lot of goals at Youngstown." Among those goals are a career foul shooting percentage of 86.3 percent and a season high 91.1 percent. Alexander was twice second team all MCC as well as second team all District four selection in 1981.












# Struggling For The Rebound

### Coach . . .

He's big and he's boss — boss of the women's basketball team that is. Jeff Cohen is only the second person to be named to the position of head coach for the YSU's women's basketball team, but has some pretty fine credentials backing him up.

Cohen is a graduate of Dickinson College in Carlisle, PA and he most recently was an assistant at Auburn University of Arkansas and was instrumental in turning an 11-18 program into a 26-10 women's program that competed in the AIAW playoffs. A native of Philadelphia, Cohen also served as head coach at Gloucester Catholic High School in Gloucester, PA, where his teams posted an overall record of 54-3 and earned numerous post-season awards.

Bold and outspoken, Cohen generates spirit and enthusiasm among the team members and remains optimistic that 1983-84 will produce more wins and fewer losses than the 1982-83 season did.

### Rebound ...

Right from the beginning of the 1982-83 women's basketball season it seemed as if the cards were stacked against the Penguins, and no one knew how to play the cards that were dealt them. With less than a month's worth of preseason workouts, head coach Jeff Cohen took a team that had just finished with the worst record in the history of the sport at YSU, and was about to face the toughest schedule in the history of women's basketball. As a result, YSU struggled and fought, but could only finish the 1982-83 season with an 11-16 record — now the worst in the history of YSU's women's basketball.

The Penguins started their season by losing eight of their first nine games, and there wasn't much optimism being shown. But then there came a three-week lapse in the season, and YSU came back to post a 10-8 record after Christmas break. Now sparks of optimism flickered in the hearts of Penguin fans in hopes that the Penguins could finish the year with a .500 mark — but they couldn't.

"We were a lot smaller than many of our opponents and many times our opponents were faster," Cohen commented. "We were, however, able to keep ourselves in most every game through our hustle and desire. I can honestly say that no one out-hustled us this season."

While this season ended with the team's worst record in it's eight-year history, Cohen is the first to point out that a transition from one coach to another, or one style of play to another, is not the easiest thing in the world to do. "You might say that this was 'getting to know each other' year," Cohen said. "It took awhile for the players to get adjusted to my style of coaching and I had adjustments to make as I tried to get to know my players. I feel that we've laid a solid base for next year and smoother sailing through the OVC next year."


YSU has a young and talented team returning next year, but loses center Evelyn Rohland to graduation who pulled down 148 rebounds this year and added 177 points. The Penguins also lose seniors Barb Nick and Cindy DiDomenico.


Freshman guard Danielle Carson led the Penguins in the scoring column, averaging 12.8 points per outing with 345 total marks. She poured in a season and career high 25 points in the final game of the season with Tennessee Tech, which YSU lost 103-78. Carson also emerged as the squad's top rebounder by averaging 6.5 caroms per game. She hit an individual high of 151 field goals, and finished second in assists (90), steals (68), and minutes played (870.5).

Margaret Peters, YSU's sophomore guard, finished second in scoring (12.1 ppg. avg.) and led in assists (140), steals (85), and free throw efficiency (68 of 103 for a 66.0 percent).















### Coach ...




"I guess you might say I am a little sad that we didn't have a qualifier for nationals," Hinkle added, "but our all-out performance was second to none."

The Penguins as a team finished fifth at the 16-team Ohio Collegiate Wrestling Championship at OSU. Frank Mancini was the top grappler for Youngstown as he took second place in the 126-pound weight class. He finished the season with a 20-9-1 record. Rick Brunot at heavyweight, and Hyun Chul Kim at 134 each took third, while Aquilino Morales at 167 took fourth.

Brunot had an outstanding season for the Penguin matmen, finishing the season with a team high 27-2 personal record.


One sour note for Hinkle's team was an injury to 158-pounder Bob Donaldson. He was a top returnee this year and was sporting a 7-1 record into the middle of the season when a rib injury sidelined him for the rest of the season.



### Coach ...

Being coach of one team is hard enough, but coaching two teams requires a lot of patience and dedication. This is especially true of head swim coach Joe Kemper who coached a women's team to a 5-3 record with six swimmers qualifying for nationals, and a men's team that struggled for a 1-10 finish.

"The men's record is no indication of the talent or potential they had. We just lacked depth," commented Kemper.

"The women, however, swam with a lot of confidence," Kemper continued. "This was a top-notch women's team which, aside from being young, is a very talented group of individuals. Their enthusiasm was infectious for everyone on the squad this year."

And Kemper knows what it's like to go against stiff competition. A graduate of YSU, he was an NCAA qualifier for four years and was named an All-American three times. He still holds a YSU record for the three-meter diving.

Besides finishing his second year as YSU swim coach this year, Kemper has also served in the role of Director of Intramurals.

### Waves ...

Although the 1982-83 men's swimming team played havoc with coach Joe Kemper's emotions, he couldn't have been more pleased with the women's results for the season.

"Our women had a record-breaking year and we accomplished almost every goal we set in the beginning," commented Kemper.

The 5-3 mark was the first winning record posted by a women's swim team and en route to reaching that point, they broke every record in the YSU books. To add further sparkle to the season, six swimmers qualified for the NCAA's Division II Swimming and Diving Championship in Long Beach, California.

Freshman Janet Kemper earned All-American status in five events, setting school records in all five and a new national record in one. She won the 50-yard butterfly in national record time (26.23), while setting school records in the 100-yard freestyle (third with a time of 58.18), 50-yard freestyle (third with a time of 24.14), 100-yard freestyle (third with a time of 53.07), and was part of the 200-yard IM relay team that placed tenth with a time of 1:40.58. Also earning All-American status were Cathy Sipka, Peggy DeVall, and Becky MacFadyen who were part of the relay team. Lori Greenlee and Karen Williams also qualified for the national competition.

"This was an exceptional team, but next year we should be even better because every point we scored at nationals is returning," stated Kemper. The Penguins lose the two senior co-captains next year who were Sabra Reagle and Williams. "These girls added great leadership all year long," said Kemper.


But on the other side of the coin, it was a frustrating year for Kemper as the men's team could muster only one win, and that was by forfeit. "It may look like it, but this team was not as bad as their record indicated," Kemper noted. "Our people worked extremely hard and many had lifetime-best performances. But a lack of depth hurt us in both our dual meets and the Penn-Ohio Conference championships."


Swimming in his last collegiate race, Tim Hilk was the only Penguin swimmer to finish with a first place in the Penn-Ohio meet. He took the title in the 1,650-yard freestyle event, as the Penguins finished in seventh place. He also placed fourth in the 400-yard individual medley swim.


"Ever since he's been here, Tim has been the backbone of this team," said Kemper. "It was so appropriate for him to have capped his career with a championship win."

### Coach ...

When he took the position as tennis coach at YSU, Rob Adsit was referred to as "the new kid on the block" because he was only 24 years old and barely out of college. Well, he's not much older now, but age doesn't seem to be a factor with his coaching skills.





But with a year's experience under their belts and fresh recruits, Adsit is very optimistic about both teams next year.















### Coach ...


1983 was not one of Head Coach Dom Rossellis better seasons. Still the Dean of Y.S.U. coaches passed a major landmark in his career as he registered his 1,000 combined baseball basketball sports victory.

Rosselli has been the major force behind Penguin baseball since its inception in 1948. Though the team finished with only a 17-20 record Coach Rosselli still retains a sterling 435-239 lifetime record.









### Hit . . .

Baseball is a game of paradoxes, inches and feet, home runs and singles. It's a game where a man tries to hit a ball traveling at speeds up to 90 miles or more. Still baseball is mostly a game of statistics and numbers, although the stats and numbers have usually smiled upon the Youngstown program in the past, the 1983 season was plagued by them.

"We never really got on track this season" said the teams skipper Dom Rosselli, "When we got good pitching our hitters and defense fell off or vice versa."

"It was a season when none of our major components never really worked together for an extended period of time". The result of not being able to combine both a strong defensive as well as offensive showing led to the first 20 loss season in Y.S.U. history. "We could easily have been 20-17 if we could have won those last three games" Rosselli stated. The 17-20 record still stands out as third time in the last four years that the Pens have finished below 500%.

The Penguins were able to nudge out arch rival Akron for third place in the O.V.C. Northern Division. On the year Y.S.U. could manage only one three game win streak while having one-four and two-three game losing streaks.


The Penguins weren't without their bright spots as Denny Krancevich, Bob Gardner, and Jim Tinkey led the Pens in most of the offensive and defensive categories.


Recent transfer Denny Krancevich was the teams top hitter sporting a .381 batting average. Besides hitting for average Denny also showed some slugging ability as he carried a 581% slugging percentage while knocking in 61 runs.

Team Co-Captain Bob Gardener again had an outstanding season as he hit for a 328% and led the team with 41 base hits. The standout on the hot corner also moved closer to putting his name on the top of Y.S.U. hit list as he finished the season only one off the record held by Mark Zaluski.

Jim Tinkey was the teams stopper with a 5-2 record and a nifty 3.29 E.R.A. Tinkey also led the team in strikeouts as he fanned 51 on the year while only walking 32 in 52 innings pitched. Rich Jovanovich was the only Y.S.U. hurler to also have an above 500 record with a mark of 4-2.







As far as statistics went the Penguins were an awesome hitting team. As a team the Penguins hit a combined .267 average and had a





### 'Tee'


The 1983 golf season ended with the team falling just below the .500 mark, which was really disappointing to head coach Helen Mines.




### Trainer ...







### Care ...

A very important part of any athletic program is the training staff, and at YSU students have an excellent opportunity to be student trainers. Head Athletic Trainer Dan Wathen and his assistant Laura Rubesich, supervise the student training program with 13 students currently involved.

Student trainers are assigned to particular sports and each is required to be at all practices and travel with the team. They must learn and practice the training skills which doesn't leave much free time for the students. "A lot of the kids find out how much time is involved and won't dedicate the time," Rubesich pointed out. "But if the interest is there and they are hardworking students, we'll put them to work."

A student need not be a physical education or pre-med major to be allowed to do this; all it

takes is interest, time, and dedication. Wathen is a prime example of someone possessing all these qualifications.

YSU's modern new Sports Medicine Center, housed in the Stambaugh Stadium, not only provides high-quality sports medical care for both the campus community and the surrounding area, but it sponsors research and preventive conditioning programs. Since it started in July 1981, the facility has successfully treated athletes and sports enthusiasts at an average of 50 to 55 per month.

Clients are accepted from YSU, other colleges, area high schools, elementary schools, athletic clubs, as well as the "casual athlete: such as the jogger, tennis player, golfer, or swimmer." Some of the services provided include physicals, conditioning, nutrition counseling, exercise prescription, injury diagnosis, traction, ultrasound treatment and specialist consultation, among others.

In 1930, Ita Sigma Theta was incorporated as a nanal organization.

Being a public service organization, Delta ma Theta seeks to project this image oughout its Five-Point Program. Through sprogram the sorority works to assist in


eradicating educational, social and economic inequities. The five areas — Educational Development, Community and International Involvement, Housing and Urban Development and Mental Health — are served through national pilor projects and through the local chapters' programs.

There are over 100,000 members in 669 chapters grouped into seven regions according to geographic area. The chapters are located in 42 of the 50 states including Alaska the District of Columbia, Nassau, Bahamas, the Virgin Islands and Haiti in the Caribbean, the Republic of Liberia in West Africa, and in Frankfurt, West Germany, and Europe.

On a national level the sorority provides undergraduate financial assistance through scholarships and awards, seed grants, individual scholarships and grants and the Minerva Award for Academic Excellence. The sorority also has the distinction of having as President Emeritus Mrs. Sadie T.M. Alexander, Attorney, first Black woman to receive the Ph.D. degree in the United States.

Inter-Varsity is open to all faculty, staff, and students of the University.









Sigma Alpha Iota was founded June 12, 1903, at the University School of Music, in Ann Arbor Michigan.


Youngstown English Society was founded 1977 by a small group of English majors nd faculty members who sought to promote e study and appreciation of the language nd it's literature.

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

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
