

how often do we, as students, ask ourselves what actually goes into the making of a college or a university? what are the foundations of its success, its moderate achievement or its occasional failure? an answer to the question should be sought and sought again, disregarding the mere opinions. such an answer is only to be had by thorough study of the institutions themselves, of their trials and errors, of their triumphs, and their vicissitudes.

the immense complexity of the present time has made this question a vital one. youngstown university is rapidly coming face to face with some of its most puzzling and herculean tasks, but will face them with preparedness and knowledge. educators realize that, with the great increase in birth rate since the war, the picture of adequate education is changing. the younger children are already converging upon the primary schools, flooding the present facilities; in a comparatively short time they will be at the doors of the colleges and universities. youngstown university, while crowded at the moment, is still in a fairly good state of equilibrium. her number of students, nine times that of the college with its first three classes complete, is still not beyond the limit of what the space will hold, what the faculty can conveniently teach.

a small university has its distinctive and needful place in the educational scheme, just as has the large university; the small one has its own teaching mission and in this individualistic mission, youngstown university has long since been recognized. her size is always relative, however, and the question is, how can she as she grows—and grow she must—perpetuate the established spirit of friendliness among the students, of generous individual interest from the faculty and administration? how is she to accommodate herself practically and materially to a new order?

in a sequel such as this a disputed stopping place could be at the end of an era, but eras do not perceptibly end; they fuse into something else, and no one knows, upon glancing back, that something fresh began in a certain place and that which was past lost itself in that which was to come. but after the thoughtful examination of a sufficient number of years, of new things tried and proved, of wrongs made and redressed, after seeing barriers broken and horizons opened, there comes a time for summary. there comes a time for assembling thoughts, for asking again the question with which this study came into being, 'what actually goes into the making of a college or university?' the answer is pertinent, for upon the understanding of it hangs the possible key to much of the future of education.

accreditation

youngstown university is accredited by the north central association of colleges and secondary schools. women holding undergraduate degrees from it are eligible for membership in the american association of university women. it is accredited by the department of education of the state of ohio as a teacher training institution, and is on the approved list of the american medical association. william rayen school of engineering has the approval of the engineers' council for professional development for its day curriculums in electrical and mechanical engineering; dana school of music of youngstown university is a member of the national association of schools of music; and the school of law is accredited by the league of ohio law schools.

the youngstown university is a member of the american council on education, the association of american colleges, and the association of urban universities.

youngstown university grants the degrees of bachelor of arts, bachelor of engineering, bachelor of laws, bachelor of music, bachelor of science, bachelor of science in business administration, and bachelor of science in education.

the change in name from the youngstown college to the youngstown university became effective september 1, 1955.

historical sketch

youngstown university had its origin in a night school founded by the young men's christian association in 1888. work of a higher academic level was first offered in 1908, when the school of law was organized, and by 1920 the school was empowered to grant the degree of bachelor of laws. with the addition of other departments and courses, the college of arts and sciences was established in 1927, and in the following year the institution became youngstown college. in 1930 the degree of bachelor of arts was conferred for the first time.

in 1941 dana's musical institute, founded in 1869 in nearby warren, was moved to youngstown and became dana school of music of youngstown college. the engineering department became william rayen school of engineering in 1946, and in 1948 the business administration department became the school of business administration.

the entire control of and responsibility for the institution were transferred in 1944 from the trustees of young men's christian association to the members of the corporation of the youngstown college. in 1955 the name was changed, by action of the corporation members and the corporation was re-chartered as the youngstown university.

during its earlier years the school had a number of homes. starting in the old central y.m.c.a. building, it occupied various sites on wick avenue until in 1931 the present main building was completed and became the school's permanent headquarters. as the institution has grown, not only has new construction been necessary, but nearby properties have been acquired and their buildings converted to university use, so that today the campus extends through much of an area about three blocks wide, in the old residential section that has become a cultural center of the city. in 1952 and 1953, john tod hall and the adjoining library were completed and added to the permanent facilities of the university.



probably no one has watched the university's progress with greater pride and interest than the board of trustees of youngstown university.

under the able guidance of chairman of the board, wm. haig ramage, the standards of the university have been steadily raised. he and the other community leaders who comprise our board of trustees has worked energetically and enthusiastically to further the aims of the university in providing a broad, liberal, and cultural education.

we owe mr. ramage and his fellow associates our sincere appreciation.



in memoriam



raymond l. falls

we pause in solemn tribute, and in memoriam sing his praise. here be an honored dead, in an earth warmed by a kindred spirit which flamed in a heart too young to die. this spirit glowed brilliantly, and the warmth blossomed out of a credo which denied hate and prejudice. to us, the living, this credo lights the path of hope—a hope that hates and prejudices will some day vanish from the hearts of all men . . . everywhere.

we pay solemn tribute to the memory of the late raymond l. falls. we believe that he possessed the essence of life—life that may be recaptured and remembered by all, and made more meaningful to all those associated with the institution.

up to the time of his death dean falls served as dean of the school of law of youngstown university. he was appointed to that position in june 1942. he received his b.a. degree from thiel college and ll.b. from western reserve university. in 1939 dean falls was appointed to the publications committee of the ohio state bar association and was made a trustee of the mahoning county bar association.

we have lost a great leader of education and a true friend.

dedication

this yearbook is dedicated to dr. howard jones, who for twenty-five years has directed the destiny of what is now youngstown university. When he first came to the institution, in july of 1931, it was housed in what is now the secretarial school, though it soon moved into the present main building. during his presidency the academic program has been expanded from that of a college

granting b.a. and ll.b. degrees to a c.s., b.s. in ed., b.e. and b.s. in b.a. degrees, while the enrollment increased from 500 to over 5000. though president jones is the first to insist on how many others have played a part in the development of the institution, it is evident that his has been the guiding hand in the history of youngstown university for the past twenty-five years.

president



dr. howard w. jones

dr. howard w. jones is observing his twenty-fith year as president of youngstown university. through the years, he has shown firm, positive leadership with a decisive influence on the growth of the university. the school's expansion and its extensive programs are significant developments of the long and distinguished career of president jones.

as a man with varied interests, whose time and life, without thought of self, has been dedicated to his family, his profession, dr. jones is the epitome of the many abstract and elusive qualities that characterize youngstown university and makes her sons and daughters unique.

dr. jones was born in palmyra, ohio on september 27, 1895. he attended alliance high school and was graduated in 1914. he then entered hiram college and at the time of his graduation was presented the albert teachout prize for being the best all-round student in his class.

in 1917 dr. jones enlisted in the united states navy, the same year that the united states declared war on germany and her allies. he served overseas on a submarine chaser based in the english channel.

prior to the signing of the armistice in nov., 1918, he was appointed naval inspector at plymouth, england.

returns to hiram

returning to hiram, he was granted the bachelor of arts degree from the college in 1920.

dr. jones became connected with ymca work in cleveland 'y' preparatory school, where he was athletic coach and teacher from 1920-22.

on june 23, 1921 he married mabel lucile hurd, of southington, ohio, and they have two children, blanche carrol and marilyn lucile.

was principal

he was appointed principal of the cleveland school in 1922, and after eight years, went back to hiram college as assistant to the president, a position he held for three years.

president jones received his master of arts degree from

western reserve university in 1930.

when dr. jones came to youngstown college in july, 1931 it was to assume the title of director, a position comparable to that of president today, when that title was changed, dr. jones was officially named president on march 1, 1935, by the board of governors, as the board of trustees was then known.

brought football here

president jones was one of those instrumental in bringing football to youngstown college in 1938 and has regularly attended the athletic activities of the university since he first came to office.

award recipient

dı. jones has often been given awards for both his university activities and his civic work in the youngstown area.

he was named president of the ohio college association and allied societies at the 81st meeting of the organization. the year before that he had served as vice-president of the group.

in the summer of 1952 the president left for london to join the sherwood eddy seminar group for α six-week tour of Europe.

aided unit

some years ago, when the question of whether youngstown college would desire an rote unit was first discussed, dr. jones was one of the first

to work to bring government appointment of α unit here.

he speaks each semester to the new rote cadets, and has visited fort bliss, texas, each summer, while the corps was under the anti-aircraft artillery branch of the army. last summer, he went to fort bragg to see university cadets.

'who's who'

in addition to being listed in "who's who in america" and "who's who in education," dr. jones is a member of the youngstown club, the exchange club, the chamber of commerce, the american association of school's administrators.


he is also a member of the ohio college president's association.



in his capacity as first vice president, he serves with the medical service foundation of mahoning county and is a member of the board of the young men's christian association.









may, 1953, marked the dedication of youngstown university's million-dollar library. dr. jones was personally responsible for raising much of the amount needed before construction of the building could begin.

included in some of dr. jones' many activities are meetings with the president's student committee and a tour of various education departments.



the growth of youngstown university is due to the "coordinated effort of a lot of persons who have had a vision of progress, and that vision is now being brought to fruition."


dr. jones and the administration, faced with many urgent and pressing problems, get together at a meeting.

president jones has remarked that there are too many students enrolled now and he expresses regret that he cannot meet and know them all as he once could.




president jones takes time out for a little relaxation with faculty members, dr. reid and professor bunn.



dr. joseph e. smith


dean joseph e. smith

the dean of our university is an amiable and personable man with a position that greatly stresses the need for these characteristics. the job of dean is difficult and time consuming, and the friendly smile and sincere interest that our dean possesses at the end of a tedious day is a constant reminder of the quality of men that have cultivated our university.

dr. smith came to youngstown university in 1921. although teaching full-time at hiram college during the day, he served as part-time professor here in the evenings. in 1937 he became head of the social science department. he was appointed dean of men in 1939, and in 1949 became dean of the college of arts and sciences.

while α student at the university of nebraska, dean smith won α rhodes scholarship to oxford university in england. he received his b.a. degree from oxford, his a.m. from the university of nebraska, and his ph.d. from wallas college, london, england.

in 1940 dr. smith did extensive research in the field of labor for transcontinental research, inc., in new york city. during the war he was director of the war manpower commission in the youngstown area.

registrar

registration at youngstown university is indebted to the able direction of philip p. buchanan, registrar. mr. buchanan was called to assume the duties of registrar of youngstown college in 1928, following his resignation as principal of struthers schools.

he has exercised a decisive influence on youngstown university during a time when wide demand for business skills has increased significantly the role of this phase of the university's administration. His work with the ohio state collegiate registrars association and the american association of collegiate registrars has kept him in constant contact with the numerous and extensive problems of registration.

although she is not an official advisor to the student council, dean mc carty has given part of her office for their use and much of her time listening to their problems.


dean mc carty's efficient handling of her many duties is awakening the student body to the important position youngstown university is assuming in their lives and in the life of the community.

miss flint's efforts have brought forth the many accomplishments of the university and the students in the eye of the people of our community and surrounding area.




freshmen days



you may ask what student council has done to benefit the student body. one of their most important tasks was the revising of the constitution and bylaws, which affect every student and student organization on campus.



in june 1950 the department of the army selected the youngstown university, (then youngstown college), for the establishment of α senior division unit of the rotc. an artillery branch unit was instituted and for many years, a major portion of the commissioned graduates became artillerymen. in september 1956 the university changed from α branch (artillery) curriculum to α general military science program. this is due in part to the action taken by the army to revitalize the rota and increase its effectiveness as a primary source of officers for both the regular and army reserve.



the youngstown university rote graduates have served their country in most areas that the united states maintains military forces. in england, france, germany, in the far east including japan and korea, alaska and iceland and of course in various parts of the united states. this service has been honorable and with distinction and reflects great credit on themselves individually, and towards the university. a number of these men have found the army to be a rewarding and compensatory occupation and are still in the service, some as regular army officers and others as reserve officers on active duty.

thursday of each week of the school term is designated corps day, the purpose of corps day is to give each cadet practical experience in the precepts of leadership, drill and exercise of command. admittedly the scope of these subjects are so broad as to preclude ultimate excellence, it does present the best means available for cadet officers and non-commissioned officers to learn the principles by the applicatory method, it provides an opportunity for the initial development of leadership potentialities, in addition the proficiency of a unit in close order drill is an indication to the leader's ability to obtain results.

the youngstown rote is organized into a department of military science and tactics, very similar to other departments in the university. the pms and t, lt. col. o. r. hummel, is the head of this department. he is responsible to both the president of the university and the department of the army for the military program.

the instruction is of university level work and credit is allowed for the successful completion of all courses. the instructors are military personnel, who have been carefully selected by the army, and are experienced and well-qualified. many are veterans of world war 2 and/or the korean conflict. in each course of instruction emphasis is placed on the practical application of the subject matter being presented. it might be well to add here, that the military classes are no different than other classes in the university. if you do not understand some particular point or topic or the instructor is not making himself clear on the subject, you owe it to yourself and your classmates to raise questions that will clear it up, or insist that the instructor goes back over the problem until it is understood.


the magazine is almost entirely subsidized by student council, whole-heartedly supported by the faculty and administration and published solely for the student body.


phi lambda delta




under the leadership of president ray baker we concluded 1955 and began 1956 with continuing success athletically and socially.

this year's sadie hawkins day dance was a smash hit on campus. this was due primarily to the efforts of chairman ed tragesser and brothers pavlov and valantasis.


the first annual thanksgiving party was held under the expert planning of brother mccullough and volunteered cooperation of brother bond. this was the party to be remembered.








kappa alpha psi

the meaning of athletics. the striking interest of ancient athletics to us lies unconsciously in the multitudinous parallels that we find in them to the athletics of our day. we can still perchance learn something from the greek ideal; we can undoubtedly learn much from the history of greek athletics.

the story of ancient athletics is no more than the tale of greek athletics. the greeks, as historians tell us, were the only truly athletic nation of antiquity. we owe the word 'athlete' and the ideal that it expresses to them, although this does not mean that the greeks were the creators of the teeming sports and games that are descriptive of the athlete. the love of play is universal in all young things. children of all races and of all times were running, jumping, fighting . . . but play is not athletics, though the instinct to play is undoubtedly one of the motives, and recreation a basic element therein. children play till they are tired and go off. athletes go on after they are tired, go on to the point of exhaustion. they even discipline themselves painfully, essential to greater and more prolonged effort, exhausting themselves more completely. What interpretation is there for this driving force? what bodily enjoyment is there in something naturally painful?

the thought of effort is the very essence of athletics as we understand it; it is indeed inherent in the word itself. pindar describes the athlete as one 'who delights in the toil and cost'. the word is used by homer to describe boxing and wrestling as 'grievous', an epithet which he also applied to his description of the ten years' struggle of the trojan war. we too experience the same prevading response. the game that beseeches every true athlete, the game that he delights in, one that he looks back upon when his playing days are over, is 'the hard game', the game that amasses and puts to the maximum test all his animal gratification and all his bodily skill.

but why does the true athlete delight in the grievous contest? why do we enjoy a hard game? the athlete is one who contests for something, but it is to be sure not the material consideration of the prize that lures him. the prize may be tangible — a trophy a cup, a medal, a blue ribbon — but the most coveted prize in the greek world was the wreath of

wild olive. the real prize prize is the honor of victory. the motive that turns his effort into physical enchantment is the bewitching desire to put to test his physical powers, the desire to excel. it is not every people any more than every individual that feels this joy in the game, in the effort.

the athletic games are a play for which the acts can be written in advance. each inevitably brings a drama which no author can destroy, a drama created of the tension generated as each athlete waits like a lighted fuse for the moment of his explosive activity. many people have made predictions, but few have picked no heroes; only the games themselves can reveal his genius.

hope looms that there will remain time for us to acknowledge and respect the hero of modern athletic games, whoever he may be. this modern hero not altogether shorn of magic, will emerge a symbol of the athletic games. we need him as a reminder that the body of a man has a glory as well as his intellect and spirit. 'the main issue in life is not the victory but the fight, the essential thing is not to have won, but to have fought well.'



on the gridiron, "dike" beede's boys came out of a transcontinental schedule shooting .500, copping four games while loosing a like number. the team dropped all three games played away, with four of the five games played at home ending in victory.

youngstown traveled to colorado, west virginia and kentucky for road contests, and faced teams from texas, west virginia, minnesota and ohio at home. the team played some of the most formidable small colleges in the country and looked impressive against this high caliber opposition.


line play once again turned out to be a feature of the penguin play. the rugged forward wall had jim vechiarella, tony cougras, tony deascentis, john armeni, jake ewashko, john krafcik, ron stoops and dom delsignore as the leading bone-crushers.

in the backfield, a red-headed speedster with a nifty wiggle in his hips kept the opposing defense on edge with his spectacular running performances. davey kimmel, the exursuline star, collected 940 net yards rushing to top penguin ball-carriers and also notch the fifth ranking spot nationally. this was a new school record and barring injury, kimmel could grab off many more laurels before his time at penguintown is up.

several news services selected davey to little all-american teams. linemen tony cougras and jim vechiarella were also showered with praise by these organizations for their performances during the season.

giving kimmel a hand in the speedy backfield were john rouse, ray carter, herm yassall, cliff davis and jerry cox. all but rouse being underclassmen and back for another year of combat.

five seniors played their final college games in a penguin uniform. a fond farewell to ends, tony cougras, tony deascentis, and dom delsignore; halfback john rouse and tackle len batcha.



colorado defeats penguins 21-7 in opening contest

coach "dike" beede's 1956 edition of the penguins received its baptism on sept. 22, as western state, of gunnison, colorado capitalized on a stray aerial which went for a touchdown to whip youngstown u. 21-7. youngstown's racehorse backfield was working to perfection, especially dom delsignore and jerry cox who alternated at the quarterbacking chores. dave kimmel did a yeoman's duty for youngstown gaining 117 yards in 27 carries and scoring the only youngstown tally from the 2 yard line, statistic-wise the penguins edged state in first downs and yards gained, jim vechiarella turned in a sterling performance on defense, breaking up several state offensive tries.

penguins stomp midwestern before 7,000 fans

youngstown playing their first home game of 1956, stomped mid-western university of texas 20-6, before a crowd of 7,000 at rayen stadium. the first half of the contest was a very tight game, each team being able to collect one touchdown for a 6 6 tie. in the third quarter the penguins started a drive with kimmel and carter chalking up yardage, assisted by the pinpoint passing of jerry cox, freshman sensation from east. rouse hit paydirt on a reverse from 23 yards out. in the fourth quarter freshman joe booth slashed over from yards out to insure the penguins of their victory. the most exciting play of the game occurred when ray carter, in the opening moments of the contest, grabbed the ball on his own 16 yard line and ran 84 yards for the score.

the 1956 football season marked the 24th year of collegiate football coaching for "dike" beede, who has been at the helm of youngstown university teams since the gridiron sport was inaugurated here in 1938.

before coming to youngstown university, coach beede spent five years at westminster college, new wilmington, pa., and three years at geneva college, beaver falls, pa.

he is a graduate of carnegie tech, "1926", where he was a fullback and captain of his team playing under the famous judge walter p. steffan.

coach beede has also proven himself to be a successful rule modifier, his suggestion of dropping a flag after a foul infraction having been adopted by football officials.

youngstown traveled to bowling green, kentucky, going down to defeat before a highly touted and much heavier western kentucky state college 29-9. the penguins scored first on a 65 yd. drive, climaxed by a pass from kimmel to cougras. rouse's conversion was good making the score 7-0. kentucky then scored their first, followed by another in the second quarter. tony cougras turned in the last points for youngstown as he spilled a kentucky man in his own end zone for two points. the game was played on an even basis except for a couple of miscues that set up two more kentucky touchdowns.

morris harvey defeats penguins in final road tilt

traveling to charleston, west virginia for their final road game of the season the penguins dropped a close contest to morris harvey college, 6-0. the teams battled to a scoreless first half with neither side being able to muster up enough drive to score. in the second half of play the golden eagles pushed across the only tally of the game on a pass play. youngstown had several scoring opportunities deep in enemy territory but bad breaks stymied the threats. rugged line play by the penguin forward wall was led by jim vechia-rella while dave kimmel, despite a case of fumbilitis, paced the backfield.




penguins overwhelm baldwin-wallace

playing a highly touted team, youngstown overwhelmed the baldwin-wallace aggregation 31-7. the first period of play yielded nothing exceptional in the way of excitement. in the second quarter baldwin-wallace was able to get a tally. behind 7-0 at half-time, the penguins came back in the second half to swamp the yellow jackets with five touchdowns, all of them in 18 minutes. dave kimmel accounted for the first tally with a 52 yd. sprint. failing to gain after the kickoff, the yellow jackets punted to the youngstown 30 yd. line. johnny rouse rambled off right tackle and scampered 70 yds. for another score, an intercepted pass by jim vechiarella and a carry by rouse produced another touchdown, jerry cox, with a fine interception of a b-w pass, then tossed a 41 yd. pass to tony cougras for a score, the final touchdown came when davis broke loose to the four yd. line, where joe booth barreled his way into pay dirt.

penguins defeated in homecoming game

youngstown, playing a well balanced team, went down to defeat at the hands of the north texas state eagles, 19-12, before a rain soaked homecoming crowd of 7,500. a miscue early in the game set up the eagles first touchdown. the first penguin tally came when dave kimmel cut through tackle from the 38 yd. line, and with a beautiful block by jake ewash-ko, scampered for the score. cliff davis intercepted a pass for the penguins final score of the night. the eagles scored on an 80 yd. march and led at the intermission 13-12. the third quarter saw both teams threaten, but fumbles, interceptions, and airtight defenses caused the score to remain unchanged. the final tally of the game came on an intercepted pass going for 37 yds.




penguins rout marshall college

in their next game of the season the locals routed marshall college by a score of 33-13. it was a very impressive victory for the beede eleven. the first score of the contest came early as john rouse hit pay dirt from the 4 yd. line. a blocked punt by dom delsignore was recovered by jim vechiarella in the end zone for the second touchdown. marshall scored just before the half to make the score 13-7. as the second half began marshall knotted the count on a pass by former youngstown east star billy zban. following the kickoff davey kimmel broke loose from midfield and raced 50 yds. for a tally. a short time later youngstown recovered a fumble and jerry cox hit delsignore for six points. the alert defense of the penguins once more took command as johnny rouse intercepted a pass and sped 85 yds. for the final score.


penguins defeat gusties in finale




coach rosselli has been around youngstown university basketball for some 311 games and the diminutive mentor is known as one of the most colorful and interesting sports personalities in the youngstown district.





the penquins success in achieving such a fine record was undoubtedly due to a great display of smooth, coordinated teamwork and high team spirit. their ability to move the ball with certainty and their expert ball handling was proof of this co-operative spirit.

this year's team also possessed an exceptional wealth of high-caliber players. capable replacements were steve hawthorne, frank guarnati, charley bushman, ralph melfi, tom steele, john georges, and herb bartelmay.


