


IOHN NABEREZNY



A superbly conditioned Youngstown College eleven inaugurated the 1954 season on the bright side, whipping a favored Gustavus Adolphus crew, 13-0 before a capacity crowd of 5,000 fans at Myrum Stadium.

The first score came by way of a 33-yard aerial from Frank Beck to Tom Mosure, in the opening period. Joe Guido, the Leetonia "flash," travelled 20 yards in the third quarter for the Penguins final tally. But it was the hard-charging Yoco line which captured the fancy of the partisan G. A. crowd. No one man can be cited as the entire team was at its best.

#### Youngstown 34 Great Lakes 32

It was Beck all the way in this game, as "Fireball" Frankie scored three touchdowns, passed nine yards to Mosure in the last quarter for the clincher, and kicked three of the all important extra points before 10,500 amazed fans at Rayen Stadium. "Scatback" John Rouse added the other tally. Trailing 26-14 at half-time, the Beedemen uncorked a 20-point second half splurge to beat the pass-happy Bluejackets, a three TD favorite, and staged one of the most spectacular games ever seen here. The home fans were astounded by the superb pass-catching of Great Lakes' stellar ends, Schroeder and Flowers. Also starring for the locals were Delsignore, Vechiarella, Cougras, Garcar and Pagano.

The Youngstown College gridders had quite a successful season in 1954. After returning from three rugged weeks of training at Camp Fitch on Lake Erie, they journeyed to St. Peter, Minn., and defeated the giant-sized Gusties of Gustavus Adolphus by a 13-0 score. This was just the beginning of many impressive victories to be notched by the powerful Penguins.

The Beedemen continued to play one of the toughset schedules in the college's history, meeting some of the top small colleges in the country. The result was a very formidable 7-2 record. Probably the most spectacular and impressive win was the upset of the star-studded Great Lakes eleven. G.L. came to Youngstown following a 42-6 victory over Fort Wood, and boasting such performers as Gene Schroeder, presently with the Chicago Bears, Bernie Flowers, Curt Jones, and Bob Burson all former greats from Big 10 Youngstown, trailing by two touchdowns at three different times during the contest, staged a terrific uphill battle to come out on the long end of a 34-32 score.

Aside from those already named, the victims of the Yoco squad included West Chester State Teachers, Lacrosse State Teachers, John Carroll, Mt. Union and Baldwin Wallace.


The two Youngstown defeats were administered by Eastern Kentucky, who this year gained the honor of participating in the Cigar Bowl, and Abilene Christian, of Texas, a perennial powerhouse in the smaller college circles.

No one player could be singled out as having contributed the most to the Penguins success this year, but rather it was the good fortune of Coach Dike Beede to have a "rock-ribbed" front wall to block for his fine array of fleet backs. Along with this went a wealth of bench strength which makes for a winning combination.






Going around right end against Creat Lakes is Frank Beck 33 who is ready to lateral off to Joe Guido 27.

Before coming to Youngstown College, Coach Beede spent five years at Westminster College, New Wilmington, Pa., and three years at Geneva College,


Beaver Falls, Pa.

SLOKO GILL Line Coach





#### Youngstown 21 West Chester 6

Beck had a hand in all of Youngstown's touchdowns. He passed for two, and plunged the final yard for the third. In the first period, Beck tossed 15 yards to Delsignore in the end zone for the initial tally. Midway in the second canto, Beck fired 32-yards to end Tony Cougras. The Campbell athlete gathered in the pigskin on the 10, and raced untouched into the end zone. Beck knifed one yard over guard for the final score in the fourth period. John McAneny tallied the opposition's lone touchdown. Outstanding for Yoco were linemen, Pagano, Garcar, Starinchak, Delsignore, Cougras and linebackers, Vechiarella and Rose.

#### Youngstown 7 Eastern Kentucky 25


Youngstown College's 14-year undefeated Homecoming slate was wrecked as Eastern Kentucky avenged last year's setback, scoring a 25-7 win before 11,500 fans. The loss was the first of the year following three victories.

The Penguin attack was marred by the many injuries, fumbles and pass interceptions incurred. Brightest spot in the Yoco operation was the scatback running of John Rouse, who brought the crowd to their feet with several healthy runs.

Youngstown's single tally came in the first period. Beck passed in the flat to Joe Guido on the locals 34, and Guido, after receiving a beautiful block from Tony Cougras, went all the way. For the Maroons, who gained a bid to the Cigar Bowl, it was their fifth consecutive victory without setback.

#### Youngstown 20 Abilene Christian 26

A fourth down gamble deep in its own territory with less than four minutes in the game paid off for Abilene Christian as Paul Goad rambled 66-yards to give the Texans a 26-20 margin over Youngstown College. Frank Beck continued to play tremendous ball, scoring two touchdowns and making good on two conversions. Davey Kimmel, former Ursuline sensation and City Series All-Star of last year, broke into his first game after transferring from the University of Iowa. In the second quarter Kimmel zigged and zagged 84-yards in a sensational run. The flame-haired speedster gained 152 yards in 10 carries. Freshman center Jim Vechiarella, intercepted a Wildcat pass on the Yoco 21 and raced 79-yards to paydirt only to have the run called back.

Under ordinary conditions Cougras would have been off to the races and another score, but he couldn't get started on the snow-covered gridiron and was pulled down from behind.


Joe Smaltz, running-mate of Dave Kimmel at Ursuline last year, gained a total of 44 yards in seven carries for the best average on either side.

Husky guard Andy Starinchak came through fast to grab the bouncing pigskin and from the 19-yard line headed for the goal line, stumbling over for the six points. The other tallies were made by Guido, Rouse, Delsignore, Beck and Dick Franko.

#### A Host of Penguins Converge on LaCrosse Back




#### Youngstown 33 Baldwin Wallace 7


Outstanding freshman center, Jim Vechiarella, intercepted a Mount Union pass and rambled 50-yards unmolested for his first score of the season.






#### Ticket Sales Manager of the Penguins


In his high school days, Tony Vivo captained both the East High gridiron squad and basketball team for two years, 1934 and 1935, and was selected as All-City end.


#### FOOTBALL MANAGERS

Other boys who were instrumental in the season's play were Bob Cercone, Bill Swift, Dick Nuskievicz, and Bill Yarb.


Youngstown College may not have had a winning team this past season, but surely it had a team to be proud of. The squad played under continual pressure and its schedule was certainly no pansy.


Tony Knott

Tony has another year of competition and should join the select circle of "2000 points in a career" cagers. Congratulations to Mr. Basketball.




Bob Atterholt

Youngstown will miss Bob Atterholt, but fond memories of his great ball playing and sportsmanship will forever linger in the hearts of those who saw him play.




#### ED POPLAVA




#### CHARLEY MOORE


#### FRED CLEARY

The junior from Niles began the season as starting forward but due to difficulties had to drop out of school and go to work. At that time he was the third highest scorer on the team and one of the top rebound men.



LT. MISHIA FREDERICK

The Military Science and Tactics unit at Youngstown College was begun in 1950. A student enrolled in the ROTC is not a member of the Army. He is instructed, however, from the latest Army textbooks by Army officers. Instruction is based on the latest methods and theories evolved during and after World War II, and includes practical exercises in many fields, utilizing the most modern army equipment as well as facilities of the college.

A cadet who distinguishes himself in academic and military subjects, and who demonstrates outstanding qualities of character and leadership, may, at the end of his junior year, be designated a distinguished military student and may then apply for a Regular Army commission. This opportunity is open to any qualified individual.

The military science program consists of two courses: the basic course, comprising the first two years; and the advanced course, comprising the last two years. Military science students are organized into a Corps of Cadets, commanded and administered by students designated cadet officers and cadet non-commissioned officers.


Sigma Delta Beta, founded in 1927 as a medical fraternity, is one of the oldest social fraternities on campus.
