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

You are the symbol and mascot of Youngstown College, an emblem of friendship and loyalty, the spirit of our athletes, and the vitality of our students.


Because we look upon you as symbolic of the progress and achievement of Youngstown College, to you this edition of the NEON is fittingly dedicated.

Carmen Julius, honorary captain of Youngstown College's first football squad, has won state-wide recognition through his aggressive guard play.




Youngstown 20 Geneva 7




Youngstown 6 Morris-Harvey 7


Youngstown 12 Dayton 13




Coupling a deadly passing attack with a tricky ground game, the Youngstown gridders swapped a hapless band of Titans from Westmister in the annual home-coming day battle.


Opening their campaign with a 5-4 win over the Westminster Titans, a large but inexperienced squad of Penguin netters looked forward to a successful season.
