He undertook these projects during his YSU faculty improvement leave for 1986-87.

Dr. Ahmed was awarded the Fulbright professorship for the Bengal Engineering College of the University of Calcutta, India. There he taught graduate and undergraduate courses and also acted as an advisor for curriculum development and several research projects, including one with the Indian Space Research Organization.

While in India he met some of the engineers who were trained at YSU under Ford Foundation grants during the 1960's. He said they now hold positions in government and industry and were quite eloquent about their pleasant memories of the U.S. and its people, particularly Youngstown.

The U.S. Educational Foundation in India also organized a series of lectures for Dr. Ahmed at different research organizations and universities in India.

Next, Dr. Ahmed participated in NASA research on the next space shuttle's main engine. His work centered around special alloys for the engine, which will operate at very high temperatures and under extremely high pressure.

Dr. Ahmed's NASA research resulted in several NASA publications and patents.
