YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - The sometimes topsy-turvy relationship between the United States and Mexico in the early 1920s is analyzed in a book written by Dr. George Beelen, chairman of Youngstown State University's History Department, and published by Garland Publishing, Inc., New York.

Dr. Beelen's study, "Harding and Mexico: Diplomacy by Economic Persuasion, 1920-1923," details the political relations between Mexico and the U.S. after a decade of turbulence.

He reviews the role business had in getting Harding to recognize the Mexican government because of the fear that the two countries' economic interdependence would be imperiled if diplomatic relations were not resumed.

Dr. Beelen's work is one of 24 such studies that make up Garland's series, Foreign Economic Policy of the United States.

Dr. Beelen joined the YSU faculty in 1962. Previously he was a teaching fellow at Kent State University and Northwestern University, and a teacher at Poland Seminary High School, where he became chairman of the Social Studies Department.

He graduated from YSU with a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Social Studies; from Western Reserve University in Cleveland with a Master of Arts Degree in History; and from Kent State University with a Doctorate in History.

Dr. Beelen does extensive lecturing and has been active in civic affairs. He was a three-term member of the Austintown Township Board of Trustees and served as chairman; chairman of the Board of Directors of the American Heart Association's Eastern Ohio Chapter; and president of the Mahoning County Trustees and Clerks Association, among others.

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
