Dr. Fred Blue, History, will speak on the Northwest Ordinance; Political Science and Social Science Professor Larry Esterly will speak on how the court has interpreted the Constitution in the 20th century; and Dr. Anthony Stocks, chairman of economics, will discuss the Constitution and the American economy.

A tree planting ceremony will take place on campus Nov. 13. The state trees representing each state in the northwest Territory will be planted beginning with the buckeye tree at 11 a.m.

A Northwest Ordinance Observation Nov. 16 will feature Dr. Phillip Shriver, chairman of the Ohio Bicentennial Commission for the Northwest Ordinance and the U.S. Constitution. He will speak at 2 p.m. in the University's Kilcawley Center Ohio Room.

The final event in the celebration, Reflections on the Constitution, will take place at 8 p.m. Nov. 18 in the Chestnut Room of Kilcawley Center. The Hon. Nathaniel R. Jones, Judge of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Sixth Circuit, will be the main speaker.

Other related activities to the Bicentennial Celebration include a pre-game Bicentennial theme for YSU's football game on Nov. 14; a Bicentennial display in YSU's Maag Library during October and November featuring a replica of a United States flag from that period, books, and photos of signers of the Constitution.
