YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - The first Gina Tenney Memorial Scholarship at Youngstown State University was presented recently to Wendy S. Weingartner of Shenango Township, Pennsylvania.

The one-year, \$400 scholarship comes from a fund which has reached about \$4000. It was established last January through the efforts of Student Council in memory of Gina Gay Tenney, 19, of Ashtabula.

Miss Tenney, a sophomore and student leader at YSU, was killed last Dec. 30. Her off-campus death was ruled a homicide and the police case remains open. She was vice chairwoman of Student Council, a student assistant in the Students Serving Students program, and active in other groups.

Mrs. Weingartner, 38, lives on Old Butler Road. She is a sophomore at YSU, majoring in studio art/graphic design and pursuing a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree. She and her husband have two daughters. She graduated from Kirtland High School, Geauga County, in 1967.

Criteria for the scholarship included a grade point average of 3.4 out of a possible 4.0, a major in fine arts or humanities, and involvement in extra-curricular activities.

Mrs. Weingartner is an elder of Northminster Presbyterian Church, New Castle, a board member of Contact EARS, a 24-hour crisis hotline, and an active member of the YSU Nontraditional Student Organization.
