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YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - Dr. Sherry Turkle, author of <u>The Second Self: Computers</u>
and <u>The Human Spirit</u>, will present a lecture for Youngstown State University's
Special Lecture Series on April 6.

Dr. Turkle will discuss her book during the program at 8 p.m. in the Chestnut Room of Kilcawley Center, Spring Street.

YSU's Special Lecture Series is free and open to the public. Seating is on a first-come, first-served basis.

These programs are designed to enhance and enrich community and University life by bringing to campus prominent social, political, and intellectual leaders.

Dr. Turkle's book, <u>The Second Self</u>, explores the vast social and psychological implications of the emerging computer culture—an age in which, she argues, we are developing a new and unprecedented intimacy with machines.

After six years of research, she has developed some complex theories about the relationship between user and computer.

"The question is not what will the computer be like in the future, but what well we be like? What kind of people are we becoming?" These are some of the questions the author asks.

Dr. Turkle holds a joint doctorate in Sociology and Psychology from Harvard University and is an associate professor at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology's Program on Science, Technology and Society.
