In this 13 part series, airing in the same weekly time slot, Lawrence Dennis traces Mozart's career, illustrating it with his music.

Listeners will be taken through a musical journey of Mozart's short life, beginning when the already seasoned musician was about 12.

The musical biography sketched by Dennis will include some of Mozart's lesser known works as well as familiar compositions.

YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - The world-class St. Louis Symphony Orchestra will present 13 performances from its highly acclaimed 1985-86 concert season over Youngstown State University's WYSU-FM, Classical 88.5, beginning at noon April 5.

The series will feature the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra's conductor, Leonard Slatkin, as well as several guest conductors, including Raymond Leppard, James DePreist, Michael Tilson Thomas, Rafael Fruhbeck de Burgos and Erich Leinsdorf.

Guest artists will include: Phillipe Entrement performing Mozart's "Piano Concerto No. 20 in D minor, K 466"; Claudine Carlson and John Cheek performing Berlioz's "Romeo et Juliette"; flutist Jean-Pierre Rampal offering works by Bernstein and C.P.E. Bach; and Pinchas Zukerman performing Beethoven's "Violin Concerto in D Major, Op. 61."

The 13-part series will also feature the world premiere of American composer Steven Martland's "Babi Yar," Charles Ives' "Holidays Symphony," and the concert version of Puccini's opera, "Tosca."

YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio - The Art Gallery in Kilcawley Center at Youngstown State University has been transformed into a colorful scene from Japan.

The exhibit, "Japan: Off the Beaten Path," is the fruit of 15 years of living, study and collecting in Japan by Jennie Hutchings, a weaver and teacher from Akron.

The show opened today and continues through April 19, with a slide presentation by Ms. Hutchings and a reception from 6-9 p.m. Friday, April 4.

Free and open to the public, the Art Gallery is open from 10-4 Monday and Friday; 10-8 Tuesday and Thursday; and 11-3 on Saturday.

"Japan" features an array of textiles, folk art, weaving implements and antiques that Ms. Hutchings gathered while she lived in Japan. Included are kimonos, kites, weavings, prints, dolls, baskets and china.

The kimonos of silk, cotton, linen and wool illustrate the different types worn by adults and children for daily living plus richly colored and brocaded robes used for special occasions.
