Student Council Sets Budget For Semester

A suggestion for school functions: The faculty or administration has no desire to put down set rules and regulations for the student body to obey, but for the students own good it is suggested that, if any school functions are held during the week the students are urged to leave before midnight.

Mr. John Raupple has been appointed as chairman of the Thanksgiving Dance. He has selected Miss Evelyn Riddle as co-chairman. The Freshman members of the Student Council is Mr. Dan Pettie. It will be his duty to represent the Freshman class.

The Student Council voted that the Mid-year Freshman Reception be abolished.

At a meeting of Student Council representatives and administration representatives the following budget for the year was adopted:

The Joint Committee apportioned the activities funds according to the following percentages:

24%—Basketball.
 20%—Social.
 8%—Intramural.
 15%—Jambar.
 1%—Boys' Glee Club.
 1%—Girls' Glee Club.
 1/2%—Key Fund.
 1%—Orchestra.
 3%—Dramatics.
 12%—Annual.
 14 1/2%—Wick Hall.

This allocation was made on the basis of \$2,700 fees for the year. These percentages shall govern only the first semester, with the prospect of re-allocation at the beginning of the second semester.

It was decided that \$200 be expended immediately for Wick Hall furniture, \$100 of this to be taken from the reserve fund.

Rules and Regulations Of Student Council

The Student Council of Youngstown College, desiring that its duties, privileges, and responsibilities be clearly defined and understood, presents herewith this memorandum for the consideration of the Administration and the Student Body.

The Council recognizes that the objectives of the Administration and the Council are identical and that the methods of achieving those objectives are complementary and not antagonistic; that the Administration is the responsible spokesman and representative of the Board and Faculty, and the Council is the representative of and spokesman for the Student Body.

The Council conceives its principal functions to include the following:

1. Social

All social functions of a strictly student nature shall clear through the Council for final determination. The Social Secretary of the Council shall keep a calendar of events for each collegiate year and adjust all claims for time and place, chaperones, etc.

The Council understands it to be part of its duties to discourage the holding of any social function on any evenings other than Friday or Saturday evenings, and that unless otherwise provided in advance midnight shall be closing time.

2. Student Activities

The Council shall have power to appoint the Editorial Staff of the Jambar and the Athletic Board Chairman, the Intramural Boards and Directors coming under the jurisdiction of the Athletic Board; and shall have power, whenever the interest of the student body requires it, to remove such appointees.

It shall be the duties of the Council to supervise the election of its members and determine their qualification, the election of May Queen, and supervision of May Day Activities.

The Council in conjunction with an Administration appointee, shall conduct Freshman Week and prescribe bounds of propriety of such activities as flag rushes, etc.

3. Finance

The Council recognizes the responsibility of the Administration in collecting student fees and its corresponding privilege of their supervision of their allocation. In order to meet this joint responsibility the following methods shall be followed in the administration of all matters pertaining to said fees:

1. A Joint Committee composed of (a) the President and one member of the Council and, (b) two members of the faculty, (c) the President of the College acting as ex-officio member of the Committee.

2. This Joint Committee shall have full and final authority in allocating the budgetary allotments by percentages of the fund created by the student activity fees of each collegiate year.

(a) Such budgetary allotments shall be determined only after each individual group or activity unit desiring a share in the activity fee has been given an opportunity by presentation through a qualified spokesman for such group of an itemized estimate of their needs for the year. Once this budget has

been approved by the group in question, then by the Joint Committee, it becomes a part of the group budget for the year.

(b) Exception to this general rule shall be allowed in athletic requirements. The Joint Committee, upon determination of the amount required and allotted for the year, shall pass the duty of detailed allocation to the Administration working in conjunction with the Athletic Board.

(c) All expenditures of student fees shall be made in this manner: The Secretary of each said group shall estimate in advance of any proposed obligations the amount by items required, present such individual proposed expenditures to the faculty advisor, working in conjunction with the Business Manager of the College, for approval. Only after such approval has been given in writing may any proposed amount be contracted for. Payment for all such approved expenditures shall then be made by the business manager for the college. Petty cash requirements may be estimated in total and amount advanced in one sum prior to expenditures, accounting to be made after each function is completed.

3. In the course of the college year if it becomes necessary to re-allocate funds for certain groups or items, such re-allocation may be effected, first by a written request to the Joint Committee. Said Committee considers such request by referring the request to the Council as a whole, then to the Faculty for like consideration.

4. Discipline

All matters of discipline belong to the Administration.

5. Promotional

It is one of the important functions of the Council to promote in various ways good fellowship as a prominent characteristic throughout the student body. It shall keep alive a greater college spirit for athletic and literary events, call pep assemblies, elect or cause to be elected, cheer leaders, etc.

6. Miscellaneous

The Council shall have a voice in arranging chapel programs. Have power to arrange special pep assemblies.

Have the right to remove the officers of any class or organization when petition by two-thirds of the membership of any such group.

Have the right to petition the Administration for changes when in their opinion such changes are for the best interest of and will meet with the approval of the Student Body.

Class elections shall come under the jurisdiction of the Student Council.

7. Source of Authority

It is understood that the Administration is the final source of authority and has the power of veto or alteration of any policy proposed or adopted by the Study Body or Council.

8. Amendments

The Student Council reserves the right to change, modify, or amend any or all clauses contained herein with the approval of the Administration, at any time, if the majority opinion of the Student Council so desires.

CO-CHAMPS**

Frosh Tie Seniors For Touch Football Championship.

In one of the last two games the Seniors met the Juniors and had an easy time in beating them 20-0, with Del Bene scoring the first touchdown, receiving a pass from Rich over the goal line. Rich added the extra point on a line play. In the second quarter Codrea picked up a punt and behind perfect interference tallied the second. Rich passed to Humphry for the extra point. Score at half Seniors 14, Juniors 0.

In the third quarter Codrea again behind good interference by Rich and Raupple, scored another touchdown. A pass for the extra point failed.

In the second game of the afternoon the Seniors met the Frosh for the championship. On the first play Centrello of the Frosh tossed a long pass to John Logan who was a "sleeper" in Codrea's territory. Logan scored outstepping Raupple. Centrello passed to Robinson for extra point. Score: Frosh 7, Seniors 0.

From then on the game was played on even terms with both teams missing good chances to score.

With three minutes to go and the ball on the Frosh twenty yard line Raupple stepped back and heaved a goal line pass to Rich. Seniors took time out. When play resumed Rich passed to D. Elser for the extra point tying the game at 7-7. The teams will receive their awards in the near future.

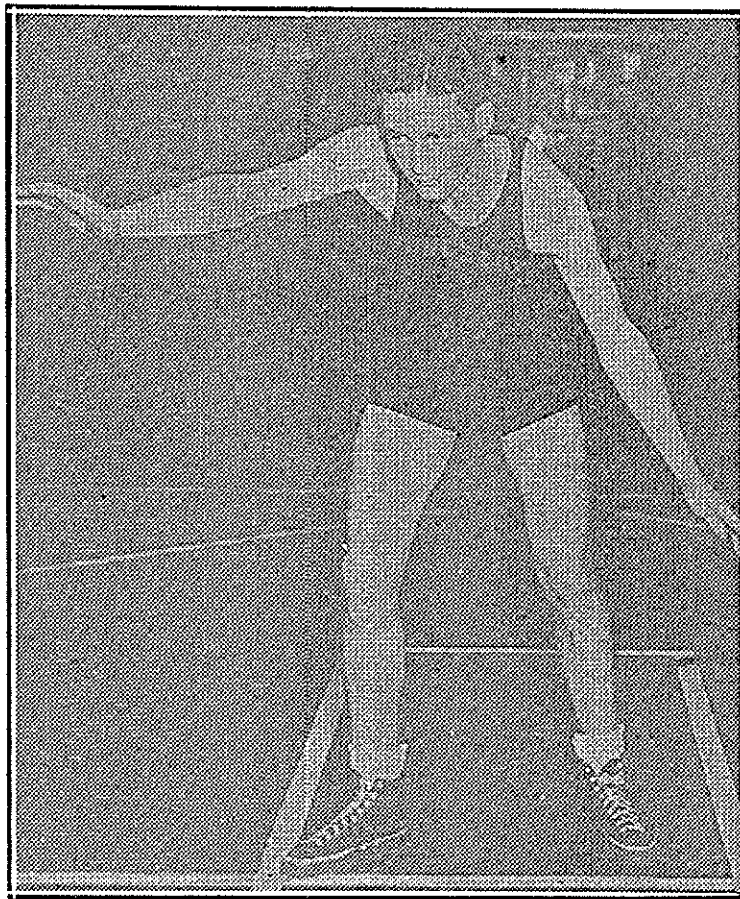

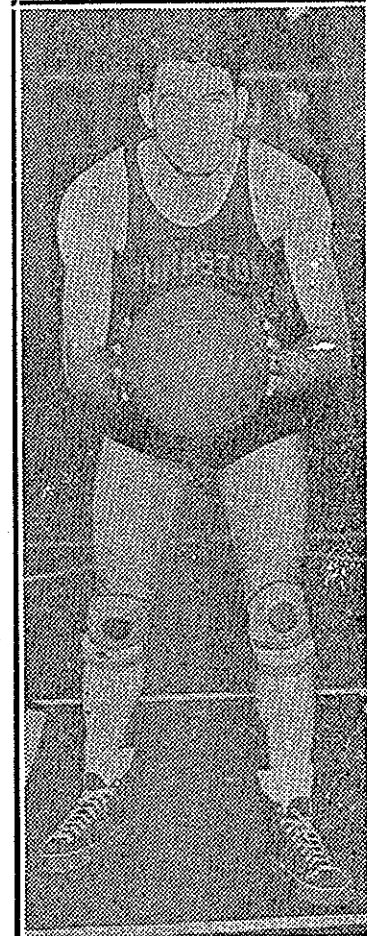

**Impression Of
Old Turkey**

Not the festive Thanksgiving bird, but one of the most interesting countries in the world is my subject. Old Turkey refers to that country before the Turkish Nationalist Movement under the leadership of Ghazi Mustafa Kemal Pasha transformed it in the brief span of years since 1922 from a medieval land into a modern nation. These "Impressions" are drawn from letters written in 1914 and 1915 while the writer was living in Central Turkey.

The first impression was exciting and rather disturbing. I had just arrived at Beirut and, together with all other Americans, had been invited to the reception given by the new Ambassador to Turkey, Henry Morgenthau, on board the U. S. S. Scorpion. At the reception we heard additional details about an incident that had been mentioned on ship board. During the holidays a month earlier, seven of the American tutors at the Syrian Protestant College (now the American University of Beirut) started out to walk to Jerusalem. Before they reached Nazareth, when it was growing dusk, a band of Arabs rode up and demanded baksheesh. They gave them a little money and walked on. Then two of the Americans went ahead to make arrangements at Nazareth. A little later the Arabs returned and opened fire on the teachers, wounded one, beat all of them, and robbed them. The tutors were unarmed; the two who had gone ahead had guns. The wounded man was taken to Nazareth and was improving

slowly. Two of the Arabs were caught and almost all of the booty was returned to the tutors.

A month later I was well settled in Aintab where Central Turkey College was located. I had the opportunity to make an interesting horseback trip when I was asked to escort a missionary lady back to her station at Marash, sixty miles north. We traveled slowly on account of Miss C. making the trip in two easy days. We stayed the first night at the khan at Karabukli, sleeping on the flat roof to avoid the fleas that infest the stuffy, unventilated rooms. While we were there about one hundred men from Albistan were marched into the khan and locked in one room—recruits for the Turkish army. The people are complaining because all of the young men are being taken into the army, leaving only old men, children, and women to till the fields and watch the flocks.

Marash is a beautiful city built on the southern slope of the Taurus Mountains, with many trees, mostly mulberry, and running water. There are plenty of good springs in the mountains and the slope on which the city is built makes a water system a simple matter. It is a very old city; there has been a city on this site as long as 4000 years—back in the Hittite days. This is the region in which the Hittites developed their civilization and much is being learned about them by means of excava-

tions that are being made all about here. In this region was found the famous old "Marash lion", a stone sculpture supposed to be of Hittite origin. I have collected a fine lot of antiques showing Roman, Greek, and even earlier influence.
