About the Artist

Robert Elliott Hopkins is in his sixth year as chairman of the piano faculty of the Dana School of Music of Youngstown State University. A native of North Carolina, he received Bachelor's, Master's, and Doctor of Musical Arts degrees from the Eastman School of Music, Rochester, New York, where he was a piano pupil of Cecile Staub Genhart. He was awarded a Fulbright scholarship for post-doctoral study at the Akademie fuer Musik und darstellende Kunst in Vienna, where he was a pupil of Wladyslaw Kedra. He has appeared throughout the East as recitalist and soloist with orchestra, and was presented last season with the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra under the baton of Franz Bibo.

An active organist and harpsichordist as well as pianist, Dr. Hopkins is Organist-Director of Music of the First Presbyterian Church of Youngstown. He is a Fellow of the American Guild of Organists, having received national first prize in both the Associateship and Fellowship examinations. He is currently Dean of the Youngstown Chapter of the American Guild of Organists. He will appear again this season in the Dana Artists' Series on January 27, as organist in a program with the Dana Faculty Brass Ensemble at First Presbyterian Church.

About the Artist

Rosemarie Anne Kascher

Miss Kascher, an honors graduate from the University of Miami, Florida and Columbia University BM, MA, has credits from five other schools, among them Oxford University, England; is a member of Who's Who and Mortarboard and has given lieder recitals in Japan and Florida.

She was a Miami Opera Guild Scholarship holder and is currently a pupil of Margaret Kalil of the Metropolitan Opera and Madame Maria Guidi, formerly of the Rome Opera Company.

For three and a half years, she was on the faculty of Kwassui College, Nagasaki, Japan. Miss Kascher is a music coordinator for the Austintown Schools and a part time faculty member of the Dana School of Music. She has just returned from study in Europe and prepared this recital in Vienna.

Genevieve M. Bauman

Mrs. Bauman attended Western Reserve University and The Cleveland Institute of Music; she is a former pupil of Beryl Rubenstein, W. Frederic Miller and Marshall Bidwell of Pittsburgh. She is accompanist for The Saxon Club and Mannerchor German choruses and organist for Rodef Sholom Temple, Shriver-Allison and The Indianola Methodist Church.

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About the Artist

Dr. Vogel is beginning his first year of teaching at the Dana School of Music as a member of the voice department and as director of opera. He holds degrees from Indiana University and Columbia University, and has taught in the university systems of Kansas and Wisconsin prior to coming to Ohio. He has approximately 15 years of professional performing experience in opera, musical stock, concert, television, and the recording industry. His vocal and dramatic coaching have been with Martial Singher, Frank St. Leger, Carl Van Buskirk, Edgar Schofield, Hanz Busch, and M. Julia Drobner. Dr. Vogel was the recipient of a Danforth Summer Grant for study in the Humanities.

Mr. Kagarice joined the Dana School of Music faculty in 1967 as Assistant Professor of Low Brass Instruments. He received a Bachelor of Music Degree from Bethany College in 1964 and a Master of Music Degree from Indiana University in 1966. He is currently working toward a Doctor of Music in Brass Literature and Pedagogy at Indiana University. He is a trombone student of Dr. Thomas Beversdorf and a tuba student of Mr. William Bell. Prior to coming to Youngstown State University, he was a member of the music faculty at Wisconsin State University, Stevens Point. He is presently a member of the Dana Faculty Brass Ensemble and Principal Trombonist with the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra.

Dolores Fitzer is a member of the Dana piano faculty. She was a pupil of the late Hermann Gruss, and has appeared frequently on the Dana Artists' Series and in the Youngstown area as an accompanist and soloist.

About the Artist

Ronald L. Gould has been a member of the faculty of the Dana School of Music, Youngstown State University since 1960, and serves as organist-choirmaster of St. John's Episcopal Church. A native of Chicago, Illinois he received the Bachelor of Music degree from North Central College, Naperville, Illinois and the Master of Sacred Music degree from the School of Sacred Music, Union Theological Seminary, New York, N.Y. Mr. Gould is a candidate for the degree Doctor of Sacred Music at Union Seminary, having been awarded a Danforth Foundation Teacher's Grant for full time doctoral study during the academic year 1966-1967 with reappointment for 1967-1968. His teachers have included Hugh Porter, Alec Wyton and Vernon DeTar. He is an Associate of the American Guild of Organists.

As conductor of the Dana Concert Choir Mr. Gould will direct the two choral-orchestral concerts in this season's Dana Artists' Series on December 8 and March 9.

About the Artists . . .

The Dana Faculty Woodwind Quintet is now in its eighth year. Its members are instructors in their respective instruments at the Dana School of Music at Youngstown State University. Mr. Mayhall is first flutist in the Youngstown Philharmonic and former member of the Cleveland Orchestra. Mr. Byo is acting Dean of the Dana School of Music and principle bassoonist with the Youngstown Philharmonic. Mrs. Hopkins is first horn with the Youngstown Philharmonic and also performs with the Dana Faculty Brass Quintet. Mr. Rullman teaches oboe and theory at the Dana School. Mr. Alleman teaches clarinet at the Dana School of Music and has been principle clarinetist in a number of mid-western symphonies.

About the "Music for Five" . . .

The Dana Faculty Woodwind Quintet is pleased to present a new concept in chamber music to its Youngstown audience this evening. This composition, written in 1962, incorporates unusual, yet creative, musical idioms. Each performer in the ensemble is free to express his own musical ideas as he feels they fit into the over-all ensemble. This is not real "chance" music, as the composer has presented definite guidelines for each performer to follow. No two performances would be the same, however, as each musician follows what the preceding artist has created.

Patricia Connor received the Bachelor of Music Education degree from Oklahoma University, the Master of Music degree from North Texas State University, the Doctor of Musical Arts from Boston University, with advance studies at Columbia University, Juilliard, Salzburg Mozarteum, Milan and Vienna Conservatories. She held a Fulbright scholarship for operatic studies in Milan, where she studied with Carmen Melis, the teacher of Tebaldi. For five years she toured Europe in concert and opera performances, and under State Department sponsorship directed her own opera group performing in most of the NATO countries, accompanied by the Seventh Army Symphony. She has sung in most of the United States, performed with the Little Orchestra Society, the Knickerbocker Chamber players in New York, sung two Carnegie Recital Hall concerts, and on N.B.C. and C.B.S. as well as Broadway. She taught for five years at Eastern Nazarene College in Boston, was director of opera workshop and associate professor of voice for two years at the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater; director of opera workshop and associate professor of voice for two years at the Troy State University in Alabama. At present she is associate professor of voice and director of the University Chorus at Youngstown State University.

He is first cellist of the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra. He came here from Boston where he worked on his doctorate as a Danforth Fellow at Boston University and studied with Leslie Parnas. Mr. Conable did his undergraduate work at the University of Illinois, where he received an A.B. degree in 1964. He has been a member of the Aikido Quartet, the Jefferson Quartet, and the University of Illinois Contemporary Players. He was the conductor of the WBUR Chamber Orchestra in Boston. This is the first modern performance of the Cervetto Sonata in an edition by Mr. Conable.

Dolores Fitzer, a member of the piano faculty of the Dana School of Music, has performed in many cities of Ohio and other states as soloist, accompanist, in ensemble and as duo-recitalist with her husband, Robert Fitzer, who is an instructor of clarinet at Dana. For two years Mrs. Fitzer performed in chamber recitals throughout Georgia with violinist Sidney Weiss, now concertmaster of the Chicago Symphony.

Jane Brainard, a 1968 graduate of the Dana School of Music, is a member of both the Youngstown and Warren Symphony Orchestras.

THE STORY AND SYNOPSIS OF SCENES

TIME: 1875

PLACE: Near Vienna

ACT I

The scene opens in a room of Eisenstein's summer villa. Gabriel von Eisenstein has been sentenced to eight days in jail for a minor offense. His friend, Falke, persuades him to postpone surrendering and go instead to Prince Orlofsky's ball. Falke has a little scheme for revenge for a practical joke Eisenstein once played upon him. Elaborating his plan, Falke also invites Rosalinda, Eisenstein's wife, Adele, her maid, and Frank, the prison warden, to the ball, where all are to appear under assumed identities.

INTERMISSION

ACT II

The party at Orlofsky's is in progress. The prince, very rich and bored, is the host. Adele appears, wearing one of her mistress's ball-gowns. Eisenstein, posing as Marquis Renard, recognizes her, but Adele brazens out the situation to the bitter end, insisting that she is a successful actress. Rosalinda arrives, masked, and is introduced as a Hungarian countess who will remain masked because she has a very jealous husband. Eisenstein makes love to his own wife, and she succeeds in taking his repeater-watch away from him — a souvenir to be used as evidence of his misbehavior. The party breaks up at dawn.

FIVE MINUTE INTERMISSION. PLEASE REMAIN SEATED.

ACT III

Alfred has spent the night in a cell, supervised by Frosch, the merry drunken jailer. Frank, still tipsy, arrives to take over. Adele, who wants to be a real actress, comes to beg Frank, or the Chevalier Chagrin as she knows him to further her career. Eisenstein finally reports for jail. Rosalinda arrives, and eventually every one's true identity is revealed. Falke confesses that the evening was all his plotting and a good joke on everyone, aided by the culprit, Champagne.

Kenneth J. Alford was the pen name for Major Fred J. Ricketts, Bandmaster of Argyle and Sutherland Highlanders, and the Royal Marines, Plymouth. He composed many fine marches in a style which has been identified as "British". Other popular marches are "Colonel Bogey" and "On the Quarterdeck".

Celebration Overture Paul Creston

Celebration Overture. Paul Creston's third original work for band, was commissioned by Edwin Franko Goldman for the American Bandmasters Association. It is in three sections. The first section (Con spirito) is somewhat of a march in 3/4; the second (Andante) is quiet and pastoral in quality; the third section (Allegro giusto) is rhythmically crisp, building to a triumphant conclusion.

Symphony for Band (West Point) Morton Gould

1. Epitaphs

The Symphony for Band was written for the West Point Sesquicentennial celebration upon the invitation of Colonel Francis E. Resta and the West Point Academy. It was first performed on April 13, 1952, with the composer conducting. The first movement is both lyrical and dramatic. Its quiet and melodic opening statement of the main theme leads directly into a broad and noble exposition of one of the motifs, becoming a passacaglia based on a martial theme, first stated in the tuba. After a series of variations which grow in intensity, the opening lyricism, combined with the passacaglia motif, makes a quiet closing to the movement. The second movement is lusty and gay, in which marching tunes parade in an array of embellishments and rhythmic variants. After a brief transformed statement of the themes of the first movement, the work finishes in a virtuoso coda of martial fanfares and flourishes.

(Music furnished by Oxford University Press)

"Paganini of the tuba" and "Mr. Tuba" are but two of the appellations given by the press to describe the artistry of Harvey Phillips. Either term only begins to indicate what he has done for this often under-rated instrument.

He reveals the tuba to be capable of great technical agility and tonal beauty. In his hands, the tuba is demonstrated as one of the most beautiful brasswind solo voices in addition to its traditional role as the brass foundation of the band.

Mr. Phillips began his career at the age of 15 with the King Brothers Circus Band and toured three years with the famous Ringling Brothers and Barnum & Bailey Circus Band under the direction of Merle Evans.

His advanced musical training was received at the Juilliard School of Music and the Manhattan School of Music. He was the recipient of scholarships at both schools and received private tutoring on the tuba from Mr. William Bell.

Many new additions to the tuba repertoire have resulted from the achievements of this artist. Some of the composers who have been inspired to write for and dedicate new works to Mr. Phillips are: Gunther Schuller, Eugene Bozza, George Williams, Alec Wilder, Lucien Cailliet, Manny Albam, Vincent Persichetti, George Kleinsinger, and Lon Norman.

Mr. Phillips is presently Assistant to the President of the N. E. Conservatory of Music in Boston.

The Crosley March Henry Fillmore

Mr. Fillmore wrote many marches for the band medium. Other favorites by the march master are "Americans We", "The Klaxon", "His Honor" and "The Footfitter".

Mannin Veen Haydn Wood

Haydn Wood spent much of his early childhood on the Isle of Man, situated in the Irish Sea between England and Ireland. Steeped in the tradition of the Island, with its abundant folklore and wealth of native music, the composer turned his knowledge to good musical account in many of his works. His tone-poem, "Mannin Veen", is based on four Manx tunes: "The Good Old Way", "The Manx Fiddler", "Sweet Water in the Common", and a hymn, "The Harvest of the Sea". The simple beauty and expressiveness of these modal tunes are admirably brought out in this work. The title "Mannin Veen" means "Dear Isle of Man".

Robert Fleming graduated from Marshall University, Huntington, W. Va. with the Bachelor of Arts Degree in 1953. He was awarded the Master of Arts Degree in 1956, from the same university. Mr. Fleming, a student of Dr. Wilbur Pursley at Marshall, also studied with Roger Voisin of the Boston Symphony, during the summer of 1952, at the Berkshire Music Center, Lenox, Massachusetts.

From 1953 to 1958, Mr. Fleming was director of bands at Ironton High School, Ironton, Ohio. From 1951 to 1958, he was Commanding Officer of the 202nd Army Band of the Kentucky National Guard. In 1958, Mr. Fleming became band director at Warren G. Harding High School, Warren, Ohio. During his ten years at Warren, his band was awarded eight consecutive "Superior" ratings at contests of the OMEA, and was named "Ohio Band of the Year" in 1964. His band also received national acclaim during the marching season. Highpoints in nationwide TV appearances have been those in 1964 and 1967 at the College All-Star games in Chicago. The Warren Band has performed eight times at Cleveland Browns' games, twice at Buffalo Bills' games, and once at a Pittsburgh Steelers game.

In his present position as assistant professor of music, Mr. Fleming is in charge of the total band program at Youngstown State University. Professionally, Mr. Fleming is a member of the Youngstown Symphony, Warren Symphony, W. D. Packard Band, Kenley Players Summer Theater Orchestra, and the Top Notes Dance Orchestra of Warren, Ohio.

ABOUT THE MUSIC . . .

Debussy wrote **Petite Piece** for clarinet and piano in 1910, the same year he composed his famous **Premier Rhapsody** for clarinet and orchestra. A short, simple composition, it reflects the vivid imagination of the famous French impressionist.

The **Three Pieces** for Clarinet Alone by Stravinsky were composed in 1919 and show the wild rhythms Stravinsky shocked the world with in his **Rite of Spring** ballet only two years earlier. The final section of this unusual composition is based on interchanging rhythmic sections of 2/4, 5/16, 3/16, 3/8, etc. Von Weber based his **Variations** for clarinet and piano on a theme from his opera "Silvana", written in 1810. This composition was first performed on December 12, 1811, by the famous German clarinetist, Baermann. His **Andante and Rondo Ongarese** was conceived for viola and orchestra in 1809 and re-written by the composer for bassoon and orchestra in 1813. The melodic **andante**, so definitive of the bassoon's expressive ability, is contrasted by the almost comic Hungarian dance.

The G Major Trio was composed in Beethoven's 17th year and is indicative of the style that preceded his first experiences in Vienna. The problems in style and form are not evident in the more mature Beethoven.

Villa-Lobos, Brazil's leading composer, wrote the Bachianas Brasileiras for nine combinations of different instruments. No. 6 is certainly a contrast to other works of this composer several of which employ in excess of 1,000 performers.

About the Composers . . .

Beethoven, Op. 1, No. 1 in E flat — Composed 1793-95

In 1795 with three trios for violin, violincello and piano (Op. 1) Beethoven made his bow as a regular composer. These compositions instantly overshadowed all that Haydn and Mozart had ever composed in that form. The older trios were written with one eye upon the fashionable taste of the Austrian aristocracy. Op. 1, on the other hand, while keeping many a roccoco characteristic, was written with a style singular to the expression of personal feeling.

Walter Piston

Walter Piston was born in Rockland, Maine in 1894. Both as a composer and teacher, Piston occupies a high position in American music. In general he follows a cosmopolitan course in his style, adhering to classical forms, while extending his harmonic structures toward a maximum within a firmly tonal framework; his counterpoint is masterly; although he never professes the tenets of American Nationalism, he employs upon occasion syncopated rhythms of a jazz type.

Antonin Dvorak, 1841-1904

A composer of singular versatility and fecundity, the most prominent characteristics of his music are an inexhaustible, spontaneous melodic invention, rhythmic variety, free employment of national folk tunes, and an intensity of harmony, which, in his finest works, has an electrifying effect, though sometimes bordering on the crude. His musical style was eclectic; the conflicting influences of Brahms and Wagner occasionally affected an inner incompatibility; however, his very lack of startling originality, combined with an uninhibited emotionalism contributed to the lasting success of his music.

About the opera: **Sister Angelica** (*Suor Angelica*) is the second in a trittico of one-act operas written by G. Puccini which were first performed by the Metropolitan Opera Company in December of 1918: **The Cloak** (*Il Tabarro*), a veristic melodrama; **Sister Angelica** (*Suor Angelica*), a miracle play; and **Gianni Schicchi**, a delightful opera buffa. It is very seldom that the three operas are performed together in a single evening of operatic theatre; however, quite often are they performed singly as we are doing tonight.

The miracle qualities of the opera stem from the fact that on three separate occasions each year the setting sun strikes the water fountain in the courtyard and appears to turn the flowing water to the color of gold. The happening of this phenomenon is a forecast that some event, either joyous or foreboding, is about to happen. The event may manifest itself in the nature of a family visit, the granting of a wishful desire, the death of a Sister, or in some other form of revelation, either physical or spiritual. Near the end of the opera we see the phenomenon manifesting itself in the form of a spiritual hallucination occurring immediately prior to the suicidal death of Sister Angelica.
