"He spoke freely amongst his intimate friends," said the Chevalier de Seyfried, "on political affairs, which he estimated with unusual intelligence with a clear and well balanced outlook. All his sympathies leaned towards revolutionary ideas," and "blow by blow," says Romain Rolland, "he forged the Eroica Symphony * * the Illiad of Empire and the Finale of the Symphony in C minor (the fifth from 1805 to 1808, the grand epic of glory."

"Finlandia," Symphonic Poem, Op. 26, No. 7 _____ Jean Sibelius

"Finlandia, though without explanatory sub-title, seems to set forth an impression of the national spirit and life. * * * * The work records the impressions of an exile's return home after a long absence. An agitated, almost angry theme for the after a long absence. An agitated, almost angry theme for the brass choir, short and trenchant, begins the introduction, Andante sostenuto (alla breve). This theme is answered by an organ-like response in the wood-wind, and then a prayerful passage for strings, as though to reveal the essential earnestness and reasonableness of the Finnish people, even under the stress of national sorrow. This leads to an allegro moderato episode, in which the restless opening theme is proclaimed by the strings against a very characteristic rhythmic figure, a succession of eight beats, the first strongly accented. * * With a change to Allegro, the movement looked at as an example of sonata form, may be said to begin. looked at as an example of sonata form, may be said to begin. A broad, cheerful theme by the strings, in A-flat, against the persistent rhythm in the brass, is followed by a second subject, introduced by the wood-wind and taken up by the strings, then by the 'cello and first violin. This is peaceful and elevated in character, and might be looked upon as prophetic of rest and happiness. The development of these musical ideas carries the tone-poem to an eloquent conclusion. Francesco B. DeLeone, probably the most favorably mentioned young American composer of opera of today, is a native of Ravenna, Ohio, attended the Ravenna public schools. He later took up the study of music at Dana's Musical Institute, a pupil in theory of W. H. Dana and in piano of Lynn B. Dana. After leaving D. M. I. he went to Italy where he studied several years. On his return to America he settled in Akron, where he opened a private music school which still flourishes. As head of the Music Department of Akron University he has won distinction.

His Opera "Alglala" is the first to be written by an American librettist, an American composer, produced in an American city, with an all American cast, chorus and orchestra and backed by every real American musician and music lover.

Mr. DeLeone was given the degree of Fellow in the Art of Music by D. M. I. in 1923 and a bronze medal from the same source the night his opera was presented in Akron. Since that time he has been honored with the title of "Chevalier" by the Italian Government and a commemorative bronze



CHRONOLOGICAL HISTORY OF WAR WITH SPAIN

- 1898-February 15.-Battleship "Maine" blown up in Havana harbor; 264 men and two officers killed. Spanish Misister de Lome sailed for Spain.
- 1898- April 16.-United States Army began moving to the coast.
- 1898—April 22.—The President issued his proclamation to the neutral powers, announcing that Spain and the United States were at war. Commodore Sampson's fleet sailed from Key West to begin a blockade of Havana. Gunboat "Nashville" captured the Spanish ship "Buena Ventura."
- 1898—April 23.—President issued a call for 125,000 volunteers.
- 1898-May 25.-The President issued his second call for volunteers, 75,000 men. First Manila expedition left San Francisco.
- 1898—July 1-2.—Terrific fighting in front of Santiago, and El Caney San Juan were carried by assaults in which the American loss was great.
