OVERTURE to "Tannhauser" Romantic opera in three acts, first performed under the direction of the composer, October 19th, 1845. The overture is one of the most popular works of its kind. Its themes are drawn from the opera which it was written to introduce, but it is nevertheless, a complete symphonic poem. It depicts the struggle between good and evil, virtue and vice.

BEETHOVEN'S FIFTH SYMPHONY is one of the masterpieces of musical expression which appears to deal with the elements of emotion in true forceful manner. There seems to be little doubt that into this symphony Beethoven poured recollections of his love for the young Countess Theresa von Brunswick, his "Immortal Beloved" to whom he was engaged to be married, but from whom he was later separated. The Andante con moto is full of charming examples of the repetition that never tires. The beautiful theme which forms the basis of the movement consists of two contrasted strains, which are presented in a variety of treatment through the entire movement.

"THE LITTLE ONE" Beethoven affectionately called his EIGHT SYMPHONY. It is smaller in scale, and lighter in texture than the other symphonies.

The sprightly Allegretto, which we program tonight, takes the place of the usual slow movement.

"THE ANGLER," latest Military March of J. D. Cook, Professor of Clarinet, and Theory, of Dana's Musical Institute, is a typical modern military march, full of sprightly rhythm and brilliant melody—the kind that makes the "boys" want to "go." The trio is introduced as bell solo, with the usual transition, and repitition—Tutti, Fortissimo. The march compares favorably with any from our best American march writers.

THE SYMPHONIC POEM, "Les Preludes" was suggested to Liszt by the following passage from Lamartine's Meditations Postiques:

"What is life but a series of preludes to that un-

known song whose initial solemn note is tolled by Death? The enchanted dawn of every life is love; but where is the destiny on whose first delicious joys some storm does not break?—a storm whose deadly blast disperses youth's illusions, whose fatal bolt consumes its alter. And what soul thus cruelly bruised, when the tempest rolls away, seeks not to rest its memories in the pleasant calm of rural life? Yet the man allows himself not long to taste the kindly quiet which first attracted him to Nature's lap; but when the trumpet gives the signal he hastens to danger's post whatever be the fight which draws him to the lists, that in strife he may once more regain full knowledge of himself and all his strength."

RONDE D'AMOUR. The arrangement played by the band is the work of Mr. Raymond E. Williams, D. M. I. graduate of the class of 1916. Mr. Williams later taught theory at D. M. I., until called to the colors in 1917. While in service, he was selected for membership in the orchestra aboard "The George Washington" in her several trips with President Wilson, and his party. Last season Mr. Williams was first flutist with the "Russian" Symphony Orchestra en tour, and this year has been offered the first flue desk with the Minneapolis Symphony Orchestra.

THE ORIGIONAL FANTASIE for baritone solo by Picchi, Piano arrangement by Mantia, baritone soloist of Pryors Band, and the band arrangement is by the soloist of the evening, Mr. Weeks, class of 1921.

"MAZEPPA" takes for its theme the story of the hero of the steppes which has been made familiar by Byron's poem. The musical treatment is divided into three sections, of which this is the third. It begins with a mysterious tremelo in the lower instruments. Growing louder, and more animated, it appears hope is gradually being infused into Mazeppa until with one final burst all breaks into a great forceful theme indicative of Mazeppa's rescue and glorification.



Program Notes

Charles Francois Gounod is probably best known by his opera of "Faust," but the music student by careful study will find that the purely orchestral numbers from his pen are works of high value. He was a great musician and master of the orchestra. The Danse Espagnole (Spanish Dance) is one of four numbers which compose the ballet "Tribute to Zamora" and is one that fairly scintillates with the rhythm of the olive skinned people which it describes.

Orientale Cui

The "Orientale" of Caesar Cui is one of twenty-two numbers which form what the composer styles the "Kaleidoscope" Suite. The suite was originally written for violin, but has been adapted for orchestra as well as many different instruments. While the whole suite is good, there is a subtle charm about the "Orientale" that has made it most popular of all the numbers.

PraeludiumJarnefe't

The composer of the Praeludium (Prelude) is a noted Finnish composer and has done much to bring the little known music of this people to the attention of music lovers. The number is a delightful bit of orchestral composition.

TraumeriSchumann

Robert Schuman was born June 8, 1810 at Zwickau, in Saxony and died at Endenich near Bonn, July 29, 1856. He was a most prolific writer of music, songs, piano numbers, symphonies, in fact every branch of musical composition is found among his works. The familiar "Traumeri" (Dreaming) is from his album for the young and has been most effectually arranged for strings and French horn.

Overture "Festival"Lassen

Eduard Lassen, tho a native of Copenhagen, where he was born April 13, 1830, is virtually a Belgian musician since he was taken to Brussels when only two years old, entered the conservatory there at twelve, in 1844 took first prize as pianoforte player, in 1847 the same for harmony and soon after the second prize for composition.

The "Fest" or Festival Overture is one of his most popular orchestral numbers, having as it does for its two outstanding themes the well known songs, "How Can I Leave Thee" and "It was a Dream." The overture has a noble introduction for brasses leading up to a well written Allegro confuoco, which gives the composer ample play for his knowledge of theme development. The Maestoso or coda is simply a replaying of the principal theme of the introduction by the brasses and wood-wind with variations for the violins.

PROGRAM NOTES

Tschaikowsky's Symphony No. 4, ranks as one of the most inspired works of its kind. It is a splendid example of the great Russian's inventive powers, originality, and command of instrumental effects.

Of the Andantino, the composer says that it is intended to express "the melcancholy which steals over us at evening when we sit indoors alone, weary of work, whilst the book we have picked up for relaxation slips unheeded from our fingers. A procession of old memories goes by. How sad to think how much is already past and gone—and yet these recollections of youth are sweet."

The Scherzo is one of the brightest movements ever written by Tschaikowsky. For the orchestra this movement is pizzicato throughout, for the strings.

The Finale of this work is splendidly adapted for performance by a wind band. The movement may be described as a wild rondo. There are three chief themes, the second of which is the folk tune, "In the Fields there stood a Birchtree"

The Overture, "In the year 1812," is intended to be descriptive of the invasion of Russia, by the French under Napoleon. The leading ideas may thus be roughly summed up: Introduction (Greek Church Hymn); supplication for aid. Gathering of the Russian Army. French National Song and battle. Cossack song: renewal of the conflict; gradual gain over the French; and final victory for the Russians. Public thanksgiving, ending with the National Anthem. ional Anthem.
