Q&A with Interim President Dr. Helen K. Lafferty

In October 2022, the Youngstown State University Board of Trustees approved the appointment of Helen K. Lafferty as interim president of YSU upon the departure of President Jim Tressel. Lafferty, long-time professor and administrator at Villanova University in Pennsylvania, will assume the interim role on Feb. 1, 2023, and will serve in that role while the Board undertakes a national search for YSU's 10th president.



Lafferty, looking forward to her time on campus, took some time to share with YSU Magazine a little bit about her background, her goals as interim president and what YSU means to her.

"I am thrilled and excited to be serving Youngstown State University as the Interim President," says Lafferty. "I am coming home and it is simply a great place to be — I am back where it all started. The Ursuline Sisters and YSU set the stage for me. Hopefully, I have made them proud, using the gifts they gave me to make others' lives better."

Share with us a bit about your background, and specifically about your journey into higher education?

I was born and raised in Youngstown, Ohio, the oldest of three daughters. After graduating from Ursuline High School, I enrolled at YSU where I received my Bachelor of Science degree and then my Master of

After I married (my husband is also a graduate of YSU) we moved to Pittsburgh, where I was appointed principal of a high school and began working on my Ph.D. at the University of Pittsburgh. Shortly thereafter, we moved to Philadelphia, and I began working at Villanova University. I have held a number of positions there: associate dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, University Vice President for 16 years, graduate faculty member in the Department of Education and Counseling, teaching graduate students in the higher education track. Recently, I was appointed Global/National member of the YSU Board of Trustees, a position I held for two years until I was appointed interim president.

What is your leadership style?

My leadership style/s are determined by the issues/concerns needing decisions. Primarily, I follow a transformational style of leadership combining it with a social justice model of leadership. I believe that effective and inclusive leadership has the power to advance humanity in productive ways that make us all better. As Eleanor Roosevelt reminds us: "Good leaders inspire people to have confidence in their leaders. Great leaders inspire people to have confidence in themselves."

What does the role of interim president mean for you, and can you share your top priorities? What do you hope to accomplish as interim president? Being interim president at YSU means I have a limited time with the community. While my stay will not be a lengthy one, I am confident that our working together will be both productive and purposeful, centered on advancing the YSU mission and the Strategic Plan. As stated in the mission: "YSU is an institution of opportunity: YSU inspires individuals, enhances futures, and enriches lives." My interim presidency will focus on these objectives, especially for our students.

We are a student-centered University built on academic excellence, using the gifts we have been given to enrich our culture and region.

Spring semester is a really exciting time on campus, what are you looking forward to most in the coming months?

I am really looking forward to immersing myself in the various activities of campus during my time here. Universities are exciting places to work, since the future of our world is right here with us each day. They are in our classrooms, on our athletic fields, in our student life and service offices. They do extraordinary things, and I intend to enjoy and rejoice in all of it during my presidency.

YSU obviously means a lot to you. Thinking about the transition to a new president, what do you hope for the future of YSU?

My hope is that YSU continues to be that strong beacon of opportunity it has become. YSU is blessed with excellent faculty, dedicated staff and terrific students. Learning is our focal point and purpose. We can expect great things when we stay focused on learning and serving in meaningful ways.

What does this transition mean for the Plan for Strategic Actions to Take Charge of Our Future?

Our Strategic Plan is an organic and living document. Hopefully, it will change with the changing needs of students and faculty and be under constant growth and revision. I believe the best decisions are always the ones that can be reassessed. YSU is blessed with a Strategic Plan that is future-oriented, always reflecting the needs of the University community.

How long do you anticipate serving in the interim position? Are you interested in the permanent position, will you be a candidate as the university looks for a new president?

I will be the interim president until the search process

has concluded and the permanent president has been named. I will not be a candidate for the position.

If you had to describe YSU in three words, what would they be?

If asked to describe YSU in three words, I would say it is a place "transforming minds and hearts!"

Volunteers also helped write hundreds of personalized

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

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

The project, titled "Extracting COVID-19 Virus (SARS-CoV-2) from Excrement," placed second in the Environmental Sciences category at the National Collegiate Honors Council Conference in Dallas. Bowman's research was selected from among 178 academic posters presented at the

conference, which attracts students, faculty and administrators from around the world.

("Foxconn") (TWSE:2317) gathered on campus this Fall to announce intentions to establish a partnership to design and launch a national electric vehicle workforce training and innovation center. The center will focus on helping the emerging electric vehicle industry build and scale a sustainable workforce around advanced manufacturing, energy storage and other integrated technology solutions, such as artificial intelligence, 5G and cybersecurity. "Over the course of history, Ohio has shown that it knows how to build a workforce," YSU President Jim Tressel said. "YSU and our partners across the state and nation are committed to ensuring that we have the skilled, talented workers needed for the electric vehicle industry to succeed. This training and innovation center will be central to those efforts for our nation."



FACULTY/STAFF RECORD GRANT ACTIVITY "REMARKABLE"

YSU faculty and staff earned nearly \$16 million in research and service grants, the most ever in a single year. "This recordsetting level of grant activity across campus is remarkable," said Brien N. Smith, provost and vice president for Academic Affairs. "This means that over the last two fiscal years, our talented and hard-working faculty, staff and others throughout the university have garnered more than \$30 million in grants – a laudable achievement." Faculty and staff won 93 grants totaling \$15.8 million in fiscal year 2022. That's up from \$14.4 million last fiscal year, the previous high mark for YSU.

RECOGNIZES YSU FOR HELP IN CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS


The YSU Department of Physics, Astronomy, Geology and


burden is important." The textbook savings initiatives are among many listed in YSU's annual Affordability and Efficiency Report filed last week with the Ohio Department of Higher Education.

YSU LEADERSHIP IN WORKFORCE TRAINING EXPANDS TO 5G

The Appalachian Regional Commission awarded \$1.15 million to YSU to implement broadband and 5G readiness training across eastern Ohio. The award to YSU's Division of Workforce Education and Innovation will allow 165 people in Mahoning, Trumbull, Columbiana, Ashtabula, Jefferson and Belmont counties to earn 375 credentials for careers in broadband and 5G, said Jennifer Oddo, executive director of the division. "The deployment of 5G is expected to create approximately 32,000 jobs in network infrastructure over the next several years," Oddo said. "This funding allows YSU to continue its leadership in ensuring that we develop the trained workforce to respond to those demands."

Beecher Planetarium suffered a fire (https://www.wkbn.com /video/planetarium-at-ysu-out-of-service-after-fire-causesdamage/8291874/) that Youngstown Fire Department estimated caused about \$400,000 in damage. YFD said the fire began when a roofing company tried to fix a small leak on the flat portion of the building's roof. The building was evacuated. Two firefighters sustained minor injuries. The planetarium is closed pending repairs. The planetarium was in the midst of celebrating its 55th season, featuring more than a dozen new and tried-and-true shows for space enthusiasts of all ages. The planetarium in Ward Beecher Hall on campus opened in 1967 and serves as an astronomy and science education resource center for the Mahoning Valley and surrounding communities. The facility, operated by the YSU Department of Physics, Astronomy, Geology and Environmental Sciences, supports astronomy teaching on campus as well as public planetarium shows.
