He was a featured soloist with the Dana Symphonic Wind Ensemble in 2011. In 2014, Sean was accepted to participate in the Zodiac Music Academy and Festival, which took place in southern France. Passionate about piano pedagogy, Sean maintains a private piano studio in the Youngstown area. His students frequently receive the highest ratings at local adjudicated events and can be heard throughout the area in recitals and in master classes. Most recently, his students have been heard in events sponsored by the American Guild of Organists and the Cleveland International Piano Competition.

Both a pianist and an organist, **Dr. Zahari Metchkov** has performed at such venues as New York's Avery Fisher Hall and Washington's Kennedy Center. Dr. Metchkov released his first CD in 2008 -- a recording of works for piano and orchestra by Liszt and Franck and a second recording project featuring solo works for piano and organ completed in 2014.

Native of Sofia, Bulgaria, Dr. Metchkov holds BM, MM, and DMA from the Cleveland Institute of Music, Cleveland, Ohio. In 2010 he joined Colorado State University-Pueblo's department of music and is currently an Associate Professor of Music. He was the 2013 recipient of the CSU-Pueblo's Outstanding Service and Transformative Leadership Award and the 2014 recipient of CHASS Outstanding Faculty of the Year. Dr. Metchkov has also taught at the Cleveland Institute of Music as well as Youngstown State University.

Currently Dr. Metchkov is the Artistic Director of the Pueblo Keyboard Arts Festival and Piano Conversations Concert Series, Pueblo, as well as Rocky Mountain Music Alliance Concert Series, Colorado Springs. He also serves as Vice President for Conferences for the Colorado State Music Teachers Association. As a performer he has appeared in the Mostly Mozart Music Festival, Pianofest in the Hamptons, Bridgehampton Music Festival, Geneva Chamber Music Festival, New Year's Music Days Festival, and San Angelo Piano Festival.

'Flawless, eloquent, and always enlightened by clarity' (Daniel Hathaway, www.clevelandclassical.com) pianist Caroline Oltmanns delivers impeccable musical phrasing and engaging stage presence, attracting audiences both in the US and abroad. This season, Ms. Oltmanns offers an array of solo recitals and concert tours along with new creative paths in the co-production and performance of the concept show 'Crumb's Kaleidoscope'. Past seasons have included concerto appearances with Youngstown Symphony, Johnson City Symphony Orchestra, Harburger Orchester Akademie, and Cleveland Philharmonic Orchestra in addition to the commission, premiere and recording of several new concerti. Caroline Oltmanns has produced and recorded five solo CDs on the Filia Mundi label; her playing has been broadcast globally on radio and TV stations. As an International Steinway Artist, Fulbright Scholar, and recipient of the Stipendium der deutschen Wirtschaft, she is Professor of Piano at Youngstown State University and holds degrees from the Staatliche Musikhochschule Freiburg and the University of Southern California in Los Angeles. Her musical mentors were Robert Levin, John Perry, Vitaly Margulis, and Malcolm Frager.

Dr. Joachim Reinhuber serves as Associate Professor of Piano at Texas A&M University, Kingsville, and is in high demand as solo and collaborative performer, clinician, and adjudicator in the US and his native Germany. He studied with Gisela Sott (Frankfurt), Robert Levin (University of Music, Freiburg), John Perry (Rice University, Houston TX), and Nancy Garrett (University of Texas at Austin). As a faculty member of the City of Aschaffenburg Music School he taught piano, chamber music, and music theory. In August 2006 he and his family moved to Texas, where he completed a Doctor of Musical Arts degree in piano performance at the University of Texas at Austin.

Recent performances include Brahms' and Beethoven's first piano concertos, the Schumann concerto, Bach's concerto in D minor and the Stravinsky concerto for piano and winds. In 2012 and 2014 he was the pianist for the Texas Music Educators Association's All-State Men's Choir, in 2013 for the Texas Two Year College All-State Choir. In 2013 and 2014 he toured extensively throughout Texas and the United States, with a residency at the Keyboard Arts Festival in Pueblo, CO, and over 30 solo piano recitals at, among others, the University of Texas at Austin, Texas A&M International University, Bowling Green State University, Youngstown State University, Baylor University, and the University of Arkansas in Fayetteville. As a collaborator, he has worked with Marianne Gedigian, former principal flutist of the Boston Symphony Orchestra, the baritones Ronald Ulen and David Small, and the pianists Zahari Metchkov and Johan Botes. He has served as an adjudicator at the Sorentin International Competition in San Angelo. TX, the Laredo International Piano Competition, and the State Concerto Competition of the Texas Music Teachers' Association in Huntsville, TX.

South African composer-pianist James Wilding earned a Bachelor of Music and Master of Music from the University of Cape Town, a Master of Music from Youngstown State University, and a Ph.D. from Kent State University. Wilding's work has been performed in South Africa, Zimbabwe, Lesotho, Senegal, Germany, Holland, France, Switzerland, Britain, Canada, and the USA, and published by The American Composer's Alliance, Clear Note Publications, the Foundation for the Creative Arts and the University of South Africa. Wilding is an active pianist, performing regularly as a soloist and chamber musician. He lectures in composition and theory at the University of Akron.

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

PROGRAM NOTES AND TEXT TRANSLATIONS

Te Deum

Te Deum No. 2 in C was composed by Franz Joseph Haydn around 1799 as commissioned by Empress Marie Theres, the wife of Franz I of Austria. It is a choral and orchestral work of three separate sections, Allegro, Adagio, and Allegro Moderato, effectively making it a concerto for chorus and orchestra. It is an exuberant expression of praise that ends with a glorious overlapping of rhythmic and sycopated vocal entrances. Enjoy this vocal and orchestral masterpiece!

CHAMBER WINDS PROGRAM NOTES

Stravinsky: "The Octet began with a dream, in which I saw myself in a small room surrounded by a small group of instrumentalists playing some attractive music . . . I awoke from this little concert in a state of great delight and anticipation and the next morning began to compose." The result was a woodwind divertissement that equally exercises the listener's mind and the eight virtuoso performers. The first movement marks Stravinsky's rediscovery of sonata form. The second is the first of many Stravinsky variation sets to come. The quick finale yields a stately coda: cool, jazzy, syncopated. Aaron Copland attended the premiere in Paris and later wrote: "I can attest to the general feeling of mystification that followed the initial hearing. Here was Stravinsky . . . now suddenly, without any seeming explanation, making an about-face and presenting a piece to the public that bore no conceivable resemblance to the individual style with which he had hitherto been identified. . . . No one could possibly have foreseen . . . that the Octet was destined to influence composers all over the world."

CONCERT BAND PROGRAM NOTES

"Because this piece was commissioned by an ensemble in Colorado, I wanted the piece to make some reference to the awe-inspiring Colorado Rockies. **Colorado Peaks** is not, however, a depiction of their majesty. Instead it suggests a person's relation to them via a rugged and persistent climb." (Dana Wilson)

Dana Wilson holds a doctorate from the Eastman School of Music, and is currently Charles A. Dana Professor of Music in the School of Music at Ithaca College. The works of Dana Wilson have been commissioned and performed by a wide range of ensembles such as Detroit Chamber Winds and Strings, Memphis Symphony, Dallas Wind Symphony, Netherlands Wind Ensemble and Tokyo Kosei Wind Orchestra.

Rain is a gentle work with a great deal of expressiveness. It paints a picture of a quiet rainfall with distant rolling thunder. The sound of droplets hitting the ground often puts me at ease for a reason I cannot adequately describe. For this reason, I chose to explain my thoughts through music, which has always been a more powerful means of expression for me than words. The melodic and harmonic lines convey the complexity of rain—the sadness it brings to some, the calmness it brings to others, and its ability to rejuvenate; the soft droplets outside our window that can be so relaxing, yet can also be the cause of a raging river. It is my hope that groups will experience a wide range of emotions as they rehearse and perform this work. (Brian Balmages)

Gordon Jacob was born in London on July 5, 1895 and died in Saffron Walden, England, on June 8, 1984. He received his education from both Dulwich College and the Royal College of Music, earning a Doctor of Music degree in 1935. From 1926, he was a member of the faculty at the latter institution and taught counterpoint, orchestration, and composition. A long line of his composition students, including Malcolm Arnold, Antony Hopkins, and Bernard Stevens, went on to successful careers. His orchestral and choral works include a ballet, concert overture, two symphonies, numerous concertos for wind and string instruments, many pedagogic works for piano and for chorus and a variety of chamber works, songs, and film music.

An Original Suite was Jacob's first work for the band medium and was completed in 1928. It is assumed that the word "original" in the title was to distinguish it from transcriptions that made up the bulk of the band repertoire at the time or to alert listeners that the "folk song" themes were original. The suite begins with a March and includes four themes introduced by a snare drum solo. There is a recapitulation of the opening theme played over a distinctively British dotted eighth-sixteenth accompaniment, and the movement ends as it began with an unaccompanied snare drum. The *Intermezzo* opens with a seventeen bar solo for alto saxophone and ends with a somber A -minor triad. A rubato tempo is prevalent and subtle shading of tone pervades the movement. The Finale is reminiscent of the first movement. It begins with a polymeter - the clarinets and saxophones play scale passages in 6/8 while the rest of the band is in 2/4. The finale Coda repeats the second theme of the movement and finishes with a flourish of woodwind arpeggios to the final accented chords.

Arthur Willard Pryor was born into a family of musicians on the second floor of the Lyceum Theatre in St. Joseph, Missouri. His father was the bandmaster of the town, and Pryor's family lived at the theatre. Arthur was the second son born to Samuel D. and Mary (Coker) Pryor. The oldest son, Walter D. Pryor, became a famous cornetist who later was featured on recordings with the great Herbert L. Clarke. The youngest son. Samuel O. Pryor, became known for his skill on the drums. playing in many Kansas City theatre orchestras. Both Walter and Sam Jr. later played in the famous Pryor Band their brother Arthur directed.

Pryor was only 22 when he played his first solo with the Sousa Band during the World Columbian Exposition in Chicago in 1893. According to accounts of the day, he played his own *Thoughts of Love* to a crowd who just stood in awe, then cheered and threw their hats in the air. That was the first of some 10,000 solos that Pryor estimated he played during the 12 years he was with the Sousa Band.

WIND ENSEMBLE PROGRAM NOTES

Star Spangled Banner (A Love Song to Our Country) by Jack Stamp – This is a hymn-like treatment of the Star Spangled Banner. Jack Stamp actually wrote this piece in grad school, and some 13 years later it was brought back to the band world after 9-11-2001. There are different harmonies present at times, and it captures an entirely different emotion than the version we are all used to hearing, but it is entirely still appropriate.

The most famous American fanfare is *Hail to the Chief*. Next comes Aaron Copland's thumping huff and puff to honor *The Common Man*. Most fanfares are brilliant, some even aggressive (etymologists disagree whether the word "fanfare" is onomatopoetic or actually connected with the verbal family that gives us "fanfaronade," meaning blustering and bragging behavior), though John Adams has also explored the possibilities of the restrained and pianissimo fanfare (in his Tromba lontana).

Short Ride in a Fast Machine is a joyfully exuberant piece, brilliantly scored for a large orchestra. The steady marking of a beat is typical of Adams' music. Short Ride in a Fast Machine begins with a marking of quarter-notes (woodblock, soon joined by the four trumpets) and eighths (clarinets and synthesizers); the woodblock is fortissimo and the other instruments play forte. Adams sees the rest of the orchestra as running the gauntlet through that rhythmic tunnel. About the title: "You know how it is when someone asks you to ride in a terrific sports car and then you wish you hadn't?"

Short Ride in a Fast Machine features the usual minimalist earmarks: repetition, steady beat and, perhaps most crucially, a harmonic language with an emphasis on consonance unlike anything in Western art music in the last five hundred years. Adams is not a simple—or simple-minded—artist. His concern has been to invent music at once familiar and subtle. For all of their minimalist features, works such as Harmonium, Harmonielhere and El Dorado are full of surprises, always enchanting in the glow and gleam of their sonority, and bursting with the energy generated by their harmonic movement.

Program Note by Michael Steinberg

Radiant Joy was my first new work after a compositional hiatus, and one that I hope is equal to its title in character and purity of intent. It comes after a difficult period in my personal life, and thus its character was something of a surprise to me. This work began life as a strict, 12-tone, serialized creature modeled on Webern - I wanted something sparse and tightly constructed (in harmonic and intervallic terms), while still retaining a vital rhythmic pulse. After several sketches that ended in anger and frustration, I realized I was metaphorically banging my head against the creative wall, and perhaps I should stop forcing this music into existence with a prescriptive process, and simply listen inwardly to what I actually wanted to hear. The result is simultaneously the opposite of what I was originally trying to create, and also its direct realization - the vital rhythmic pulse is still prominent, but the harmonic materials veered toward the language of 70s/80s funk/jazz/fusion (take your pick). Regardless, the piece is intended to emanate joy and 'good vibes' (literally – the vibraphone is critical to the piece!), for the performers, the audience, and the composer!

World premiere on March 22, 2013 with the University of North Carolina Greensboro Wind Ensemble, conducted by John Locke.

The Koyukon call it "Denali," meaning "the great one," and it is great. It stands at more than twenty thousand feet above sea level, a towering mass over the Alaskan wilderness. Measured from its base to its peak, it is the tallest mountain on land in the world—a full two thousand feet taller than Mount Everest. It is Mount McKinley, and it is an awesome spectacle. And it is the inspiration behind John Mackey's *The Frozen Cathedral*.

The piece was born of the collaboration between Mackey and John Locke, Director of Bands at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro. Locke asked Mackey if he would dedicate the piece to the memory of his late son, J.P., who had a particular fascination with Alaska and the scenery of Denali National Park. Mackey agreed—and immediately found himself grappling with two problems.

How does one write a concert closer, making it joyous and exciting and celebratory, while also acknowledging, at least to myself, that this piece is rooted in unimaginable loss: The death of a child?

The other challenge was connecting the piece to Alaska - a place I'd never seen in person. I kept thinking about all of this in literal terms, and I just wasn't getting anywhere. My wife, who titles all of my pieces, said I should focus on what it is that draws people to these places. People go to the mountains—these monumental, remote, ethereal and awesome parts of the world—as a kind of pilgrimage. It's a search for the sublime, for transcendence. A great mountain is like a church. "Call it The Frozen Cathedral," she said.

I clearly married up.

The most immediately distinct aural feature of the work is the quality (and geographic location) of intriguing instrumental colors. The stark, glacial opening is colored almost exclusively by a crystalline twinkling of metallic percussion that surrounds the audience. Although the percussion orchestration carries a number of traditional sounds, there are a host of unconventional timbres as well, such as crystal glasses, crotales on timpani, tam-tam resonated with superball mallets, and the waterphone, an instrument used by Mackey to great effect on his earlier work Turning. The initial sonic environment is an icy and alien one, a cold and distant landscape whose mystery is only heightened by a longing, modal solo for bass flute-made dissonant by a contrasting key, and more insistent by the eventual addition of alto flute, English horn, and bassoon. This collection expands to encompass more of the winds, slowly and surely, with their chorale building in intensity and rage. Just as it seems their wailing despair can drive no further, however, it shatters like glass, dissipating once again into the timbres of the introductory percussion.

The second half of the piece begins in a manner that sounds remarkably similar to the first. In reality, it has been transposed into a new key and this time, when the bass flute takes up the long solo again, it resonates with far more compatible consonance. The only momentary clash is a Lydian influence in the melody, which brings a brightness to the tune that will remain until the end. Now, instead of anger and bitter conflict, the melody projects an aura of warmth, nostalgia, and even joy. This bright spirit pervades the ensemble, and the twinkling colors of the metallic percussion inspire a similar percolation through the upper woodwinds as the remaining winds and brass present various fragmented motives based on the bass flute's melody. This new chorale, led in particular by the trombones, is a statement of catharsis, at once banishing the earlier darkness in a moment of spiritual transcendence and celebrating the grandeur of the surroundings. A triumphant conclusion in E-flat major is made all the more jubilant by the ecstatic clattering of the antiphonal percussion, which ring into the silence like voices across the ice.

The concert begins at 8:00 PM and we are all thrilled and honored to make a repeat appearance in this historic venue!

ABOUT THE TROMBONE SOLOIST:

JOHN SEBASTIAN VERA, a native of Texas, became the Principal trombonist of the Pittsburgh Opera in 2010 and will also be joining the River City Brass as Principal Trombone beginning in 2015. A dedicated chamber musician, he also was a founding member of the critically acclaimed Guidonian Hand Trombone Quartet in which he played from 2008-2014.

He began his studies with Jon Bohls in Texas and continued his education at Southern Methodist University where he studied with John Kitzman of the Dallas Symphony. He then spent a year studying with Ed Zadrozny as a graduate assistant at the University of Akron, and finished his graduate work in New York City at the Mannes College of Music studying with David Finlayson and James Markey of the New York Philharmonic.

In addition to the Pittsburgh Opera, Mr. Vera has played with the symphonies of Dallas, Pittsburgh, the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra, New York City Opera, Vermont, Charleston, Albany, Akron, Huntsville, Canton and Orquesta Sinaloa de las Artes in Mexico amongst others.

In 2009, John was honored to be asked to play alongside the New York Philharmonic trombone section as well as members of the Metropolitan Opera to record two pieces for James Markey's solo release, "On Base".

In 2011, he spent the summer in Haiti volunteer teaching and performing in the Orchestre Philharmonique Sainte Trinite as well as the Ecole de Musique Dessaix Baptiste, which became one of the more profound experiences of his life.

With the quartet, John performed over 100 concerts and gave master classes all over the country. Heralded by the New York Times for their "expertly played performances" they have been recipients of numerous national grants, which have enabled them to commission countless composers to create new and innovative works for four trombones. In 2014 was the premiere of River of Fundament, a movie by film artist Matthew Barney, in which John recorded for and acted in along with the quartet.

Mr. Vera can also be heard on euphonium on the PBS documentary Abraham and Mary Lincoln, A House Divided.

John is an Artist for Edwards Instruments and resides in New York City and Pittsburgh. He is on the faculty at Youngstown State University and the Usdan Center for the Creative and Performing Arts, and also is Co-Founder of the Third Coast Trombone Retreat. ABOUT THE GRADUATE CONDUCTOR:

NICHOLAS MARZUOLA is a Graduate Assistant in the Bands department at Youngstown State University studying instrumental conducting with Brandt Payne and Stephen Gage. He is a graduate of The University of Akron and holds degrees in both music education and trumpet performance. His previous teachers include Scott Johnston, Robert Jorgenson and Galen Karriker.

Marzuola most recently was employed as a band director in the Youngstown City Schools from 2012-14. In the 2011-12 school year, Marzuola taught at Millennium Community School in Columbus, OH. He also was a music educator in Marietta, OH from 2009-11 where he taught 6-12 band and high school music courses.

In addition to teaching, Marzuola also has world-music experience, previously serving as a contrabassist and currently as a frequent guest conductor of the St. Nicholas Balalaika Orchestra.

ABOUT THE CONDUCTORS:

BRANDT PAYNE is the Director of Athletic Bands and Assistant Professor of Music for the Dana School of Music at Youngstown State University. At YSU he conducts the marching band, pep band, and concert band. He teaches courses in conducting, instrumental music education, marching band drill design, and graduate wind literature. Dr. Payne has held similar academic appointments at the University of Hawai'i and University of Wyoming. Dr. Payne began his teaching career as a high school band director in the Red Oak Public Schools in Red Oak, Iowa.

Dr. Payne is active as an author, guest conductor, and clinician throughout the United States.

Brandt co-authored the new editions of two textbooks, including the Complete Marching Band Resource Manual, with University of Pennsylvania Press and Conducting; the Art of Communication with Oxford University Press. He has published articles with the Instrumentalist, and written literature and recording reviews for the International Trombone Association Journal. Brandt has given presentations at the national conferences of the College Band Directors National Association and the CBDNA National Athletic Band Symposium. Dr. Payne conducts the Stambaugh Youth Concert Band in Youngstown, Ohio, a group comprised of over eighty young musicians from Ohio and Pennsylvania.

A native of Iowa, Dr. Payne holds a Bachelor of Music degree in trombone performance and teacher certification from the University of Iowa, a Master of Music degree in trombone performance and, Doctor of Musical Arts degree in conducting, both from Arizona State University, in Tempe.

ABOUT THE CONDUCTORS:

STEPHEN L. GAGE has served as Professor of Music and Director of Bands & Orchestra at Youngstown State University's Dana School of Music since 1993. In fall 2014, Dr. Gage was appointed as the conductor of the YSU Dana Symphony Orchestra in addition to his work with the YSU Wind Ensemble and Dana Chamber Winds & Strings. Stephen holds degrees from the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign, the Eastman School of Music, and the State University of New York at Fredonia where he also earned the Performers Certificate and was a concerto winner. Stephen studied conducting with Harry John Brown, Donald Hunsberger, David Effron, Roy Ernst, James Keene, H. Robert Reynolds, and Paul Vermel. In September 2012, Dr. Gage was appointed as the Conductor of the W. D. Packard Concert Band in Warren. Stephen begins his 23rd season as the Edward Zacharias Memorial Chair/Conductor of the Youngstown Symphony Youth Orchestra. Previous teaching positions include serving as Director of Bands & Orchestra at Emporia State University (KS) and as Director of Bands at Auburn High School (NY).

Professor Gage has written numerous published articles on conducting, rehearsal techniques, and wind band literature, and he is an active wind band and orchestral guest conductor, clinician, and adjudicator of international repute. Stephen has guest conducted and cliniced high school honor bands and orchestras as well as a number of university wind bands throughout the United States. His list of guest conducting appearances includes the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra, the U.S. Army Band: "Pershing's Own", and the U.S. Army Field Band & Chorus among others. The list also includes experiences in Canada, Ireland, and in 34 states. Dr. Gage has received critical acclaim from a number of distinguished composers, including a number of Pulitzer prize winners: Joseph Schwanter, Carter Pann, John Mackey, Samuel Adler, Karel Husa, Frank Ticheli, John Mackey, Michael Colgrass, Donald Grantham, D.J. Sparr, Jerry Ascione, and David Gillingham for his interpretation and recordings of their music. Stephen's professional affiliations include memberships in the CBDNA, NBA, OMEA/MENC, Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia, Kappa Delta Pi, Phi Beta Mu, Sigma Alpha Iota, and Phi Kappa Phi. Dr. Gage has been inducted into the prestigious American Bandmasters and was named as both Distinguished Professor and Faculty Mentor of the Year at YSU; he is currently on the NBA Foundation Board of Directors. In 2012, Gage was awarded the Marty Manning Faculty Mentor Award at the University. Stephen and the YSU Wind Ensemble made their Carnegie Hall debut in 2005 and the group has produced seven CD recordings. The sixth CD in this series, Urban Requiem, was released on the NAXOS International Recording Label in June 2008 and the seventh: Old Wine In New Bottles was released by NAXOS in August 2012. Both of these NAXOS recordings have earned critical praise from numerous critical reviewers and represented composers for their artistically convincing performances and musical and technical quality.

Stephen lives in Poland, Oh with his wife, Stephanie, and two of his three children, Claudia and Brendan; Gage's son, Matthew, and granddaughter, Zoey, live in Austin, TX.





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






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
