BARN DANCES

Libby Larsen (b. 24 December 1950, Wilmington, Delaware) is one of America's most performed living composers. She has created a catalogue of over five hundred works spanning virtually every genre from intimate vocal and chamber music to massive orchestral works and over 15 operas. Grammy award-winning and widely recorded, including over fifty CDs of her work, she is constantly sought after for commissions and premieres by major artists, ensembles, and orchestras around the world, and has established a permanent place for her works in the concert repertory.

As a vigorous, articulate advocate for the music and musicians of our time, in 1973 Larsen co-founded the Minnesota Composers Forum, now the American Composer's Forum, which has become an invaluable aid for composers in a transitional time for American arts. A former holder of the Papamarkou Chair at John W. Kluge Center at the of the Library of Congress, Larsen has also held residencies with the Minnesota Orchestra, the Charlotte Symphony, and the Colorado Symphony.


According to the composer, "Barn Dances is a set of four abstract pieces for flute, clarinet and piano. Each piece draws its title from the name of a particular dance step used in cowboy dances. Taking the name of the step as the point of departure, my idea was to take a flight of fancy in each movement and to create the musical equivalent of a character drawing." Movement II is an homage to Gene Autry. For an example of "Cowboy Swing," listen to the music of Gene Autry, specifically "Don't Fence Me In."

LAUDATIO

Written in 1966 for German horn player Hermann Baumann, Laudatio opens with a motif which represents a spiritual question. What follows is a journey, a search for understanding. The question reappears many times, often following the nearly-schizophrenic emotional roller coaster of musical events. A section of Laudatio references the early Christian Hymn (plain chant) Te Deum Laudamus, the opening line of which is included within Krol's piece and is reminiscent of Gregorian chant. After this prayerful section, the question is asked again in fragmented form, and an authentic cadence brings the listener to the final answer.

Definitions of the Latin word laudatio include "praise, commendation; a testimonial, a funeral oration."

Bernhard Krol (1920-2013) was a horn player with leading orchestras between 1945 and 1967, including the Berlin Philharmonic and the Stuttgart Radio Symphony Orchestra. He studied with Schoenberg's disciple, Josef Rufer in Vienna. However, Krol uses the tonal system, looking back towards composers such as Reger or Hindemith.



TRIO, OP. 274

German-born Carl Reinecke (1824-1910) was a composer, teacher, administrator, pianist and conductor. His father was a music theoretician and author who gave his son Carl a strong musical education. Under his administrative guidance, Reinecke turned the Leipzig Conservatory into a musical bastion in Europe. He believed in a strong foundation in the Western musical tradition of Classical and pre-Classical music, and his discipline and attention to detail were exhibited in his conducting of the Gewandhaus Orchestra in Leipzig. As a gifted pianist with a refined style and clarity, Reinecke is best known for his piano compositions. A pupil of both Mendelssohn and Schumann, Reinecke was influenced by Mendelssohn's melodic style, while his piano writing is similar to Schumann's in nature with its strong rhythmic accompaniments and Romantic, melodic nature. Most important of Reinecke's 19th-century influences, though, was Johannes Brahms. As a composer, Reinecke identified strongly with the balance of formal classicism and lyrical passion in the music of Brahms.

Reinecke's Trio, Op. 274, is one of his last chamber works, completed when the composer was a venerable but still productive 81 years old. The Finale: Allegro displays the overt influence of Brahms, with an uplifting theme in B-flat major having a broad but steadily-moving feel. The keyboard navigates its way through a sea of constantly churning notes. The mood of this movement in sonata form alternates from exuberant and celebratory to moody and dark. As in the chamber music of Brahms, the clarinet and horn parts weave in and out of the swirling piano texture. Reinecke shows great craftsmanship in his skillful and effective transitions between strongly contrasting themes, moods and harmonically remote keys, before bringing the piece to a harmonically and cyclically satisfying conclusion.

Performer Bios

Stacie Mickens is Assistant Professor of Horn at the Dana School of Music, Youngstown State University. Mickens received her doctorate in horn performance from the University of Michigan; she also holds degrees from the University of Wisconsin-Madison and Luther College. Her teachers include Adam Unsworth, Bryan Kennedy, Douglas Hill, and Patricia Brown. An active orchestral musician, Mickens is a member of the Youngstown, Akron, and Wheeling symphonies. She was recently featured as a guest artist at the 2013 Southeast Horn Workshop in Richmond, VA. Previously, Mickens served on the music faculties at Luther College and Winona State University.

Kathryn Thomas Umble, Associate Professor of Flute at Youngstown State University, is principal flute with the Warren Philharmonic Orchestra, holds the piccolo position with the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra and has performed principal flute with the Toledo Symphony Orchestra and the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra. She has presented recitals in Europe and throughout the United States, including venues such as Alice Tully Hall and Symphony Space, New York, and the Milhaud Society at the Cleveland Institute of Music with members of the Cleveland Orchestra. Umble was featured as guest artist of the Pittsburgh Flute Club, concerto soloist with Warren Philharmonic Orchestra, guest artist in recital with the Aurista Ensemble in New York City, winner of the 2009 Pittsburgh Concert Society Major Auditions Competition, and she performed in recital at the 2011 National Flute Association Convention in Charlotte, NC. Umble is a founding member of Duo Allant, a flute and guitar ensemble - duoallant.com

Dr. Umble has served on the faculties of Bowling Green State University and Grove City College and holds degrees from the University of Michigan, Bowling Green State University, and Michigan State University and was awarded the Prix d'excellence for Outstanding Musicianship from the Fontainebleau School of Music, France, which she attended on full scholarship. Umble has also served as a National Flute Association competition judge and flute pedagogy panel member. She conducted the Dana Flute Ensemble in a full concert performance at the 2005 OMEA Conference and the 2006 and 2009 National Flute Association Conventions.

With a career including solo and chamber music collaborations in North America, Europe and Asia, Alice Wang's clarinet performances have been described as "lively, assuring" and "incredible [with] fast and intricate finger work." Since her appointment in 2007 at the Dana School of Music at Youngstown State University, Dr. Wang has presented many solo and chamber music recitals throughout the United States. She has been a featured soloist with the Ohio District V Honor Band. the W.D. Packard Concert Band, and recorded composer David Morgan's Reflections and Meditations with the Youngstown State University Wind Ensemble. Dr. Wang conducted the Dana Clarinet Ensemble in a full concert performance in the 2011 Ohio Music Education Association Conference and this February performed composer Frank Ticheli's Concerto for Clarinet with the YSU Symphonic Wind Ensemble in Columbus. In 2012, Ms. Wang together with soprano Misook Yun and pianist Sophié van der Westhuizen won the Pittsburgh Concert Society Major Competition and were featured in its recital series at Carnegie Mellon University. Alice is a member of the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra and frequently performs with the Warren Philharmonic Orchestra, the Opera Western Reserve and the Canton Symphony Orchestra.

Dr. Wang completed her Doctorate of Musical Arts in Clarinet at the University of Texas at Austin with Prof. Richard MacDowell. Her previous teachers include Yehuda Gilad and Mitchell Lurie at the University of Southern California, as well as Sir Walter Boeykens at the Royal Conservatory of Music in Antwerpe, Belgium and Hermann Stefansson of the Stockholm Royal Philharmonic Orchestra.

Indonesian pianist **Cicilia Yudha** made her debut with the Cleveland Orchestra at Severance Hall in 2003, and was also awarded the "Rosario Marciano Prize" with a solo recital in Vienna. As a versatile soloist and an avid chamber musician, she has given performances in the U.S.A., Cambodia, Canada, Austria, France, Germany, and Indonesia.

Passionate in music education and community service, Dr. Yudha taught at the Cleveland Institute of Music Piano Preparatory Department, New England Conservatory Secondary Piano Department, and New England Conservatory Preparatory School. She was staff collaborative pianist for the Eastern Music Festival and the Boston Children's Chorus. Since her appointment as an assistant professor at Youngstown State University, she established Class Piano Program at Chaney High School Visual and Performing Arts.

On full scholarship, Dr. Yudha earned a Doctorate in piano performance at University of North Carolina Greensboro, where she also coordinated the Class Piano and taught piano for non-keyboard majors. Upon graduation, she was inducted into the Pi Kappa Lambda honor society. She holds a Bachelor of Music Degree with honors and the Artist Diploma from the Cleveland Institute of Music, Master of Music degree in piano performance and Music-in-Education concentration with honors and Graduate Diploma from the New England Conservatory of Music. She joined the Dana School of Music Faculty at Youngstown State University in 2012 where she is the coordinator of the keyboard musicianship program and the pianist of the school's ensemble-in-residence, The New Amici Trio.

Program Notes:

Gustav Holst, St. Paul's Suite, Op. 29, No. 2 (1912-13)

Like many composers, Gustav Holst descended from a lengthy musical lineage, although none before him achieved the great success that Holst did. In what was a natural progression of events, Holst's father taught him to play piano and violin at an early age. Neither instrument was suitable to the young man, the difficulty owed to an unknown nerve problem in his right arm. Eventually Holst made some success with the trombone, an instrument he credited with strengthening his asthmatic lungs. From this point, Holst continued onward with what again should have been a seamless progression for a young musician. Yet he was not accepted when he applied in 1891 to the Trinity College of Music in London, and took on further studies in counterpoint to gain more skills. In 1893, Holst was admitted to the Royal College of Music and there studied his craft with Sir Charles Hubert H. Parry and Ralph Vaughan Williams. The latter proved to be a greater influence on Holst's personal style than the former, and Holst and Vaughan Williams remained lifelong friends.

Today Gustav Holst is primarily remembered for his Planets suite for orchestra, as well as his undeniable influence on modern composers, especially the work of John Williams. There are several smaller scale compositions, however, that are remembered with equal enthusiasm, and his St. Paul Suite is one of those pieces. The work is dedicated to the St. Paul Girls' School in London, where Holst was employed as music director from 1905 to 1934. The school is still active today and carries on the long tradition of excellence in music instruction. The suite is an enigmatic collection of moods and styles that clearly reflect Holst's own diverse musical and philosophical interests. The St. Paul Suite opens with a cheerful jig, then turns inward towards unique combinations of English folk song and more exotic, "Eastern-sounding" material, the latter being Holst's own musical expression of his study of Hinduism. The result of the two inner movements is a musical landscape belonging entirely to Holst, somewhat quirky but never lacking in thoughtfulness or taste. The suite concludes with a variation of the Dargason, a traditional English (or Irish, sources seem to overlap) folk or country dance. It is an eight-bar form that uses a circular melody, making it ripe for combination with other tunes. Holst uses this to advantage in the finale of the St. Paul Suite, weaving the famous *Greensleeves* tune into the primary melody.

Program Notes:

Richard Strauss, Metamorphosen, Study for 23 Strings, (1944-45)

Strauss' Metamorphosen was written during the last years of both the Second World War and Strauss' life. The composer subtitled the work "In Memoriam", setting off a debate about exactly who, what, and where the work was memorializing. Some believe that Strauss was mourning the terrible bombing of Munich and the Munich Opera House, still others claimed that the work memorialized Beethoven or even Hitler. The latter was nearly instantly refuted, however. It is most likely, given the quotation from Beethoven's 'Eroica' Symphony in the concluding moments of the work, that Strauss' addition of "In Memoriam" was a Beethovenian move. Just as Beethoven once supported and nearly idolized Napoleon, Strauss nurtured similar sentiments for Hitler, as did many of the time before he became a terrifying, bloodthirsty dictator. It is clear that the who and where are irrelevant here, and if we remain faithful to Strauss' own personal beliefs it is a simple conclusion that Metamorphosen is all about the what and the why. Today, it is commonly accepted that this work follows the Goethean path of discovering the root cause of atrocities such as war.

Ludwig Van Beethoven, *Piano Concerto No. 3 in C Minor, Op. 37*, (1800-1803)

Beethoven's Third Piano Concerto was written during what would be remembered as one of the first of several intense and prolific periods of writing in his career. And like many of Beethoven's master-piece works assigning a precise date to the work is not always possible, hence the handful of possible years of completion given above. Those listeners who are familiar with his famous Fifth Piano Concerto, known colloquially as the "Emperor," will detect many similar motives and themes throughout the earlier Third Concerto. And those who are not familiar will feel somehow connected to this work by many larger factors that would become the cornerstones of Beethoven's musical

signature. To begin, the Third concerto is in the key of C minor. Much ink has been poured over this key and Beethoven's preference for the "mood" it instills. Beethoven's Fifth Symphony and the famous "Pathetique" piano sonata were also written in C minor. The Third Concerto also shares common threads with Beethoven's Third Symphony, "Eroica." Both works were dedicated to "Great Men," or, at the very least the imagined ideal of such an individual. In both instances, the "Great Man" that Beethoven had in mind was Prince Louis Ferdinand of Prussia. Ferdinand, in addition to being an illustrious military figure, was also an accomplished pianist and composer in his own right, and someone Beethoven bestowed much affection for.

The Third Concerto is a standard Classic period piano concerto with regard to form and content. It is apparent from the introduction of the first movement that this concerto is still very much rooted within the earlier Classic traditions, however, and does not bear as many of the revolutionary changes that began to surface in Beethoven's large scale works, even those written in the same time frame. One small exception to this would be the extensive pedal instructions given by the composer in the second movement, something more associated with the "modern" nineteenth century composer who wished to exert more control over his own music. The primary theme of the first movement holds resemblance to Mozart's Piano Concerto No. 24, yet another link to the past. The overall mood of the concerto conjures the image of the heroic dreamer that we readily recognize in other works, and it could be said with good confidence that the Third Piano Concerto was a preview of many great things to come in Beethoven's career.

Conductor's Note

I read an interesting article in the September 2013 National Geographic titled "Failure Is an Option" by Hannah Bloch that was insightful. Failure and success is a driving force in our evolution if you think about it. Is the median level of musicians better now than they were fifty years ago, or a hundred and fifty years ago? I'd certainly say yes. And I can base that on the fact that 42 years ago when I auditioned for the National Symphony Orchestra even the rules were different. Then, you didn't need to submit a resume to audition for any orchestra. Orchestras and conductors were looking for good players. Now good players are looking for a job, most any kind that will pay the bills. I remember sitting Concertmaster of the Florida State University Orchestra my senior year in a performance of the Brahms Requiem with guest conductor Robert Shaw (the famous choral director and then conductor of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra). After the performance he pulled me aside and asked "why don't you get a car, drive up and audition for us in Atlanta?" How's that for encouragement? And I remember my ole teacher Mr. Burgin telling us of a conductor auditioning a violinist over the phone! Not to say it was so easy 42 years ago; there were some 70 plus violinists there and most were excellent. My success then was the fact I was well prepared and in my mind playing for experience.

There were a good number of quotes and thoughts I would like to reference. Bloch, "Failure-never sought, always dreaded, impossible to ignore-is the specter that hovers over every attempt at exploration. Without the sting of failure to spur us to reassess and rethink, progress would be impossible." Samuel Beckett, "Try again, Fail again, Fail better." The word success itself is derived from the Latin succedere, to come after, and what it comes after, is failure.

Conductor's Note

Luck plays a role in any failure or success of any endeavor. Robert Ballard, "We remember our failures because we're still analyzing them. Success is quickly passed, and too much success can lead to overconfidence-which in turn can lead to failure." During the 1996 Everest season, in which 12 climbers perished, mountaineering experts wrongly "felt they had the mountain wired and pretty well sorted out." In truth the formulas get you into trouble; failure keeps you on your toes. The Netherlands-based ABN:AMRO Bank started an Institute of Brilliant Failures. And the Eli Lilly and Company, began throwing R&D-focused outcome celebrations-failure parties-two decades ago to honor data gleaned from trials for drugs that didn't work; some 90% of all such trials fail. A Harvard Business School professor historian Nancy Koehn was so struck by Shackleton's doomed expedition to cross Antarctica when his ship "Endurance" became trapped in ice because Shackleton's goal quickly shifted from exploration to ensuring a safe return home for himself and his crew. It's a huge failure from the perspective of exploration but inspiring partly because of its failure. He was a great crisis manager; persistent and resilient, adaptable, a master of perspective. Wanting to go beyond your status quo is the nature of the human condition. There's no magic to getting where we already know we can. And lastly, Kipling's quote on the illusory nature of failure and success; "Treat those two impostors just the same."

Indonesian pianist **Dr. Cicilia Yudha** made her debut with the Cleveland Orchestra at Severance Hall in 2003. In recognition of her musicianship and artistic personality, she was awarded the "Rosario Marciano Prize", and presented a solo recital in Vienna sponsored by the Vienna International Piano Academy in Austria.

As soloist and avid chamber musician, she has performed in the U.S.A., Canada, Austria, Germany, France, Cambodia, and Indonesia. Dr. Yudha was a winner of the Cleveland Institute of Music Concerto Competition, Cleveland Orchestra Youth Orchestra Concerto Competition, New England Conservatory Commencement Concerto Competition, and UNC Greensboro Student Artist Concerto Competition resulting in performances with each orchestra. She has also appeared with the Lakeland Civic Orchestra, Converse Symphony Orchestra, UNCG Symphonic Band, and the Duke University Symphony Orchestra. Her live performances have been broadcast by Jakarta's Radio Klasik, Cleveland's WCLV FM, New York's WQXR, the Canadian Broadcasting Company, and on the national radio program, "From the Top."

Passionate in music education and community service, Dr. Yudha has served as a piano faculty at the New England Conservatory Secondary Piano Department, NEC Preparatory School, and the Cleveland Institute of Music Piano Preparatory Department, and she has served as a staff collaborative pianist of Boston Children's Chorus and Eastern Music Festival. Since her appointment as an assistant professor at Youngstown State University, she established Class Piano Program at Chaney High School Visual and Performing Arts in Youngstown, OH.

On full scholarship, Dr. Yudha earned a Doctorate in piano performance at University of North Carolina Greensboro, where she also coordinated the Class Piano and taught piano for non-keyboard majors. Upon graduation, she was inducted into the Pi Kappa Lambda honor society. She holds a Bachelor of Music Degree with honors and the Artist Diploma from the Cleveland Institute of Music, Master of Music degree in piano performance and Music-in-Education concentration with honors and Graduate Diploma from the New England Conservatory of Music. Former teachers include Lena Yudha, Iravati Sudiarso, Olga Radosavljevich, Wha-Kyung Byun, and John Salmon. Since 2012, she is an Assistant Professor at the Dana School of Music Faculty at Youngstown State University, where she is the coordinator of the keyboard musicianship program and pianist of the school's ensemble-in-residence, The New Amici Trio.

The Performers:

Kathryn Thomas Umble is Associate Professor of Flute at Youngstown State University and has served on the faculties of Bowling Green State University and Grove City College. Dr. Umble holds degrees from the University of Michigan, Bowling Green State University, and Michigan State University and was awarded the Prix d'excellence for Outstanding Musicianship from the Fontainebleau School of Music, France, which she attended on full scholarship. In addition to performing principal flute with the Warren Philharmonic Orchestra, Umble holds the piccolo position with the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra and has performed principal flute with the Toledo Symphony Orchestra and the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra. She has presented recitals in Europe and throughout the United States, including venues such as Alice Tully Hall and Symphony Space, New York, and the Milhaud Society at the Cleveland Institute of Music with members of the Cleveland Orchestra.

Pianist Caroline Oltmanns has performed extensively in Germany, France, Switzerland, South Africa and the United States. Reviews rave about her "focused and heartfelt emotion" (L'Alsace, France) and her "mature creativity" (Fürther Zeitung, Germany). Her playing has been broadcast on radio and television stations in the US, South Africa and Germany. In addition to a wide variety of piano solo and concerto repertoire, Caroline Oltmanns frequently performs and premieres works by contemporary composers. Caroline Oltmanns is a Fulbright Scholar and International Steinway Artist. A native of Germany, she earned her Diploma at the Staatliche Musikhochschule Freiburg and her Master's and Doctoral degrees at the University of Southern California in Los Angeles. Her musical mentors were John Perry, Robert Levin, Vitaly Margulis and Malcolm Frager. She is Professor of Piano at Youngstown State University.


South African composer-pianist **James Wilding** earned a Bachelor of Music and Master of Music from the University of Cape Town, a Master of Music from Youngstown State University, and a Ph.D. from Kent State University. Wilding's work has been performed in South Africa, Zimbabwe, Lesotho, Senegal, Germany, Holland, France, Switzerland, Britain, Canada, and the USA, and published by The American Composer's Alliance, Clear Note Publications, the Foundation for the Creative Arts and the University of South Africa. Wilding is an active pianist, performing regularly as a soloist and chamber musician. He lectures in composition and theory at the University of Akron.

Bryan P. Teeters is a graduate of Clarion University of Pennsylvania (2010), earning his bachelor's degree in music education with an emphasis in percussion. In addition to being the assistant marching band director at Struthers High School, Bryan is currently a candidate for the master's degree in percussion performance at the Dana School of Music at Youngstown State University of Ohio, where he teaches Percussion Methods class, and is the assistant director of the percussion ensemble.

Motive A:

Part 1:

The first piece of the evening, *The Timelessness of Time* for flute and percussion, introduces Motive A. The motive is transformed into the melody of the second piece, *As Time Goes By*, which is presented in a two-piano arrangement entitled "Play it Once, Sam, for Old Time's Sake" (Famously misquoted as "Play it again, Sam" this is Ingrid Berman's actual line in the film *Casablanca*). During the *Passage* of No. 3, this material is transformed into the Ritornello of *Jesu bleibet meine Freude* (No. 4). In the following *Passage* (No. 5) the material in Bach is transformed into the melody of the middle section of Chopin's *Fantaisie-Impromptu*, which ends the first part.

Program Notes:

Part 2:

A Call from Afar introduces Motive B, accompanied by a Peking Opera percussion group. The motive happens to contain the same material as the beginning of the Chinese Folk Song Sai na yaoyuan de difang (In That Remote Place). Ghost Nocturne, played inside the piano with glass tumblers, picks up on the percussive nature of the Chinese instruments and the repetitive character of Motive B. It leads to Bronze Dragons, in which two Chinese instruments form a continuation of this repetitive and percussive sound. Surprising in its peacefulness, the Berceuse for piano duet presents a variation on Motive B. The Berceuse melody and Motive B are playfully interchanged in the following Passage (No. 12), producing the link to Friedrich Gulda's Übungsstück Nummer 9.

Part 3:

The Space between Love and Death is a free fantasy on Motives A and B. Piano and percussion render Motive A energetically, until the introduction of Motive B brings about a calming down of the music. The flute enters with peaceful versions of first Motive B, then Motive A, and finally a brief memory of the melody from As Time Goes By. The pianos and percussionists then resume the high energy level of the beginning. Motive A becomes mixed with Motive B, and the flute joins in during this development. The music subsides once more, with short tranquil cadenzas, before building up again into a climactic statement of As Time Goes By.

Program Notes:

Part 4:

Rudi Vallee's 1931 recording of *As Time Goes By* is heard on the original 78 shellac record. The characteristic distortions are imitated by *Morning Music*, for solo piano with crackly paper on the strings. In the No. 17 *Passage*, the flute shows the connection between the theme of *Morning Music* and the following *Hungarian Dance*, which combines Brahms' two-piano arrangement with his percussion parts. The following *Passage* (No. 19) reveals how the preceding is connected to Motive A, which is presented in its original form for the first time in *Twin Suns*.

Part 5:

Motive C is the basis for the 5th part. It is the opening gesture of *Moon Setting*, an adaptation of Crumb's *Idyll for the* Misbegotten for flute and drums. It forms the beginning of the melody of *Je te veux*, which is Satie's own transcription of his original song. And, after the opening rumbles of *Beta Cygni*, it can be heard quietly in canon, which returns later, inverted.

Part 6:

Dream Images is Crumb's original source of Motive B, and quotes directly from Chopin's Fantaisie-Impromtu. The Advent is a three section work, beginning with a massive sound build-up stated twice, followed by a stark middle section, which leads to the final section Hymn for the Nativity of the Star Child, which is Crumb's own re-working of Motive B. The final number of tonight's concert, Play it Again, Sam, borrows from another Crumb work (Starry Night), which in turn borrows from Gustav Mahler's fourth symphony. Before a repetitive tonal harmonic background, Crumb's sound world and fragments of As Time Goes By are now heard for the final time.

Gustav Holst (1874-1934)

Program Notes:

Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, "Misero! O Sogno!," Recitative and Aria for Tenor and Orchestra, 1783

In addition to the numerous arias that belong to Mozart's operas, he also composed forty-two so-called "concert arias" for independent performance. Today's performance features one of the most celebrated of these concert arias, a work that is considered to be one of the composer's greatest accomplishments in vocal music. In a letter dated December 24th, 1783, Mozart wrote to his father to discuss a concert he had just given in Salzburg. The letter itself is not of great importance, but it gives a clue as to who performed the aria, or, as Mozart called it a "rondo." The performer mentioned was Valentin Adamberger, known today to be one of Mozart's best German tenors. The music itself is not in a rondo form, and scholars have done much speculating as to why he referred to it as such.

The librettist for the aria is unknown, although in the past was erroneously believed to be the work of Metastasio. A review of a large nine-volume set of Metastasio's works that Mozart was known to possess did not turn up the text of the aria, and thus the idea that it was his was abandoned. The theme surrounds a potentially imprisoned man and his final dying wishes. If he is to die alone and unnoticed, he pleads that "a gentle breeze may carry his final farewell to his now-distant lover as he awaits death without hope or consolation." The intensity and passion, and the deeply emotional involvement with the text was a "breathtaking revelation" to the audience of that late December night, and it is thought that Franz Joseph Haydn may have been in attendance and met Mozart for the first time. *Misero, O Sogno!* maintains its potency on concert programs today, and those not yet acquainted are in for a very special experience.



Wretched me! Am I dreaming or am I awake? The path leading out of here is blocked.
O stars! Must I thus end my life here, alone in this remote area, Inhabited by shadows, in this silent and sad place, where nothing can be heard in the horror of the night but the lamenting cries of the nocturnal birds?

Open, vile creatures, this door to the netherworld, open it, you pitiless one, open it. No one hears me, and hidden in the rocky cavern, only a compassionate echo answers my complaints. Must I die here? Oh my God, could I not at least bid one last farewell to my dearly beloved with these bitterest of sighs?

Gentle breeze which whispers about me, carry my sighs on your wings to her, whom I adore. Tell her that I am dying for her sake, that she will never see me again. I am surrounded by a thousand spirits and hear the sound of various voices. What a horrible place to be, what new torments, what a barbarous fate, what a sorry state! I lament, I sigh, but no one hears me. In the gravest of dangers, I see no one. There is no hope for comfort, I find no compassion.



Joaquin Rodrigo, Fantasia para un Gentilhombre, Villano y ricercar, 1954

Joaquin Rodrigo is revered as a composer that brought the guitar out of its humble past and onto the concert stage. Ironically, he was an accomplished pianist and not a guitarist. Rodrigo was legally blind from a very young age after suffering complications from illness, and all of his compositions were written in Braille and transcribed after, a fact that makes Rodrigo's significant accomplishments all the more fascinating. His compositions are numerous, and he continued to compose new music well into his eighties. Rodrigo passed away at the age of 97 in Madrid, Spain.

The Fantasia para un Gentilhombre is one of Rodrigo's most popular guitar works, second only to the even more famous Concierto de Aranjuez, written for, in Rodrigo's own words, the memory of a child his wife miscarried. Fantasia was based on dances from a collection by seventeenth century composer Gaspar Sanz, in which Rodrigo selects specific movements and motives from each to create a larger concert piece of his own. The first movement is broken into two sections, the tuneful Villano, which is exchanged by the guitar and orchestra. The second section hearkens back to the older forms, and is a ricercare, as the title indicates.

Lars-Erik Larsson, Concertino for Trombone and String Orchestra, 1955

Lars-Erik Larsson was born in Akarp, Sweden on May 15th, 1908. He is considered one of the most important and prolific modern Swedish composers and wrote for nearly every major genre, including symphonies and concertos. His early musical education began at the Stockholm Conservatory and later expanded southward to Vienna, where Larsson studied with twentieth-century master Alban Berg. Larsson incorporated an eclectic variety of influences into his own style, including the symphonies of Jean Sibelius and Arnold Schoenberg's twelve-tone system.

The Opus 45 Concertini were written out of Larsson's sympathy for young performers' lack of suitable solo material. Some sources accuse these works of suffering from simplicity, and, as a result, a lack of popularity outside of their homeland. The trombone concerto is not, however, a work considered the realm of the amateur performer and requires great technical skill and stamina. Consequently, the trombone concerto is the most popular and frequently performed work from the Opus 45 collection.

Gustav Holst, The Planets, 1913-1917

Gustav Holst was an English composer who worked throughout his career to separate himself from Western music traditions. His personal fascination with Eastern philosophy and various themes of antiquity, including but not limited to a study of Sanskrit, infused his compositions with a unique quality that is not easily imitated. Modern composers such as John Williams were heavily influenced by Holst, and, in the case of Williams in particular, that influence stemmed directly from Holst's grand orchestral work, *The Planets*. Oxford Music Online contextualizes the work with other large-scale compositions such as Modest Mussorgsky's *Pictures At An Exhibition*, Edward Elgar's *Enigma Variations* and Claude Debussy's *Nocturnes*, yet states that even these immense cornerstones of modern orchestral writing do not begin to approach the depth of inventiveness and mastery of large form that Holst achieves in *The Planets*.

Holst's grand masterpiece calls for an orchestra of immense, Berliozian proportions. It is not often that the audience is privy to the score, but an inclusion of the orchestra forces provided here perhaps will give an idea of how Holst works his musical magic:

Four flutes, additional 2 piccolo and 1 bass flute
Three oboes, 1 bass oboe
English Horn
Three clarinets in B flat and A
Three bassoons, Contrabassoon
Six horns in F
Four trumpets in C
Two tenor trombones

Program Notes:

In contrast to popular belief, the opening movement *Mars, Bringer of War* was actually composed before the outbreak of the First World War and was not inspired by those events, although given Holst's personal interest in astronomy and other varieties of mysticism the correlation remains a bit hair-raising! There are many tales that surround this work, but the truth of *The Planets* lies mostly with Holst's own unique and personal expression, and how he was finally able to achieve this expression through what became his defining composition. Colin Matthews writes in Oxford Music Online:

"A great deal of Holst's musical personality is encapsulated in *The Planets*: a rare glimpse of the extrovert in 'Jupiter', a more characteristic heavy-handed humour in 'Uranus', a sad processional in 'Saturn'. He is at his most relaxed and lyrical in 'Venus', a vein that he did not often recapture in later life. Though in mood the other three movements could not be more different one from another, they share a common harmonic background, with a particular emphasis on bitonality: in 'Mars' this serves to produce harsh dissonance, in 'Mercury' a quicksilver elusiveness, and in 'Neptune', remoteness and mystery. In this last movement Holst uses an offstage choir of women's voices, singing wordlessly to magical effect — something he had already employed in *Sāvitri* and may have borrowed from the third of Debussy's *Nocturnes*, which he almost certainly heard the composer conduct in London in 1909".

Holst's later works did not achieve the high level of praise or acclaim that the *Planets* did, yet it seems as though the work not only preserved a place within orchestral repertoire for itself but even for lesser-known or smaller works Holst wrote before and after. What remains clear is that the *Planets* has left a tremendous impression on the imaginations of modern composers and audiences alike, and we owe much to Holst for his inspiring contribution to the popular orchestral music we enjoy today.

Conductor's Note

Sensational?

While reading an article in Discover Magazine I was reminded of the sensationalism rampant in the media. The article was a list of 20 Things You Didn't Know About...Hunger. Some of the high points were: A 2004 brain-imaging study revealed that even thinking about a favorite food triggered a release of dopamine, a feel good hormone also produced during sex and drug use. Two billion people worldwide rely on bugs for protein, a serving of caterpillar has more protein than a serving of beef, our brain needs the daily equivalent of the sugar found in three cans of soda, and the early humans' ability to switch to other food sources like eating ourselves from the inside out essentially allowed us to outlast other primate species. Every year it seems the media makes the stories they peddle more sensationalized to the point of, well, sensationalism. And why hasn't the media joined the science in discussing and solving the global environmental problems we face? Are they afraid we can't handle the truth? Is our government and economic leaders betting they can keep us dumbed down long enough to keep the status quo for their own personal gain? Or is it just not a story that will sell; not sensational enough. The media would rather run with the story about the whacko that shoots up a school or movie theater for days on end.

Conductor's Note

Well, that's when it struck me this dopamine release figures into all the things we do to stimulate, satisfy, and fulfill our lives. We all have childhood memories that bring a rush of warmth. One I fondly remember as a very young child was the joy of discovery in the woods of a rotted pine log, the smell, the feel, what would become soil for new growth. I brought a bag of it home with a little seedling I dug up with a stick, planted it out in the back corner of our yard and remember the joy as the seedling grew into a stately wild bay magnolia that now towers in our old backyard for others to enjoy. As a teacher and parent I've learned over the years the real payday is sharing knowledge and experience with others; I've learned something new every day and that's what charges my dopamine. I am so grateful that I can offer what I know to the youth I work with, an approach, an idea about what might enrich their skills in music and life. We're all part of the process; we need to embrace the bigger picture of interconnection with all things living to seek balance and the ability to adapt to change. The artists lead the way by networking, challenging, finding success in a job market that changes exponentially, keeping eyes open and striking when the iron is hot. What is really sensational is how we interact with each other, how we create, share and grow each generation to leave a place better than was found.

Program Notes, Texts and Translations

Gottes Zeit ist die allerbeste Zeit also known as Actus Tragicus, is one of early sacred cantata not intended for Sunday Mass. Bach composed this in 1707, and he composed it for a funeral, possibly that of the Mayor of Mühlhausen or of Bach's uncle Tobias Lämmerhirt. The cantata is sometimes cheerful in musical terms, but the text is concerned with death throughout. Bach draws text from the Psalms, Isaiah, Luke and Revelation, in addition to the hymn texts of Martin Luther and Adam Reusner.

Cantata BWV 106 has four movements, two of which have multiple parts. The first half of the cantata presents the Old Testament view of death, and in the second half, this view is challenged by the New Testament, which promise redemption through Jesus Christ.

2a. Chorus

God's time is the best of all times.

In him we live, move and are, as long as he wills.

In him we die at the right time, when he wills.

2b. Arioso (Tenor)

Ah, Lord, teach us to consider that we must die, so that we might become wise.

Put your house in order; for you will die and not remain alive!

It is the ancient covenant: human, you must die! Yes, come, Lord Jesus!

3a. Aria (Alto)

Into Your hands I commit my spirit, You have redeemed me, Lord, faithful God.

3b. Arioso (Bass) and Chorale (Alto)
Today you will be with me in Paradise.
With peace and joy I depart in God's will,
My heart and mind are confident, peaceful and calm.
As God has promised me: death has become my sleep.

4. Chorus

Glory, praise, honor, and majesty be prepared for You, God the Father and the Son, to the Holy Spirit by name! The divine power makes us victorious through Jesus Christ, Amen.

Program Notes, Texts and Translations

Mendelssohn's *Hear My Prayer* was originally written in German in 1844 and dedicated to Wilhelm Taubert, one of Mendelssohn's friends. The work is based on Psalm 55. Mendelssohn sets the first three sections of this Psalm, creating a mini-drama. The narrator, King David, entreats God for protection against his enemies, expressing his fear and their anger. He worries, but trusts God to save him. Part 1 introduces us to the narrator, beseeching the Almighty to come and save him from his enemies, for he feels lonely. Mendelssohn programmatically sets Part 2 as King David describes dramatically the forces arrayed against him, and the chorus reiterates the dangers and the narrator's pleas. Part 3 returns to introspection and contemplation as the narrator comments that if he could fly away from the turmoil, he would seek a quiet, peaceful place in which to spend the rest of his days.

Hear my prayer, O God, incline Thine ear! Thyself from my petition do not hide. Take heed to me! Hear how in prayer I mourn to Thee, Without Thee all is dark, I have no guide. The enemy shouteth, The godless come fast! Iniquity, hatred, upon me they cast! The wicked oppress me, Ah where shall I fly? Perplexed and bewildered, O God, hear my cry! My heart is sorely pained, within my breast, my soul with deathly terror is oppressed, trembling and fearfulness upon me fall, with horror overwhelmed, Lord, hear me call, O for the wings, for the wings of a dove! Far away, far away would I rove! In the wilderness build me a nest, and remain there for ever at rest.

Program Notes, Texts and Translations

Robert Ray is a composer, conductor, and professor of music at the University of Missouri. He regularly travels the U.S. and abroad as a clinician of African American Spirituals and Gospel Music. With its driving beat and enormous appeal, this powerful gospel work, *He Never Failed Me Yet*, has become one of the definitive selections in this style. Robert Ray brings us dynamic gospel tunes that are a joy to sing along.

I will sing and give thanks to Thee for all the dangers, toils and snares that He has brought me out.

He is my God and I'll serve Him no mater what the test.

Trust and never doubt, Jesus will surely bring you out, He never failed me yet.

I know God is able to deliver in time of storm.
I know that he'll keep you safe from all earthly harm.
One day when my weary soul is at rest, I'm going home to be forever bless'd.

Didn't my God deliver Moses from King Pharaoh? And didn't He cool the fiery furnace for Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego? When I think of what my God can do, He deliver Daniel, I know He will deliver you.





Rain Dance (1988) Alice Gomez b.1960 and Marilyn Rife

Rain Dance is a four mallet marimba solo that gives the effect of falling rain, with a sound resembling Native American music.

#1 from Douze Etudes (1964) Jaques DeLécluse b.1933

DeLécluse was a percussionist, composer, and all around talented musician. He began writing his etudes in 1964, because at the time in France there was no repertoire for snare drum, primarily just orchestral excerpts. His etudes are closely related to that, as they are more musical in nature rather than technical patterns organized together.

Cold Pressed (1990) David Hollinden b. 1958

The term "cold pressed" refers to the method of extracting olive oil which results in the most robust and full-bodied flavor. Syncopation, contrasting timbres and rock-influenced style are blended together in music which is vivid, spicy and obsessively persistent.

Hellcat Halftime (1985) John S. Pratt b.1931

Off the Beaten Path (2014) Roger Lewis b.1985

For this drum set solo, I wanted to combine elements that were both very comfortable for me to play, and also other elements that I'm interested in playing but don't get to incorporate into my groove playing very often. The piece starts out in common time, representing my comfort zone as a rock drummer, but then touches on some different odd time sections before settling into a 7/8 groove with improvisation.

Straight, No Chaser (1951) Thelonius Monk (1917-82)

Straight, No Chaser, recorded July 23, 1951 (Blue Note 1589, 1511), it is only the second blues Monk recorded, *Misterioso* being the first. Like *Misterioso*, *Straight*, *No Chaser* is not like other blues in that the melody breaks with the typical four-bar phrasing and extends beyond the bar line. It is also the only blues he recorded in F (all others, including a few versions of "Straight No Chaser," are in Bb). It has become a true standard in jazz repertoire. *Notes by Robin D. G. Kelley*

Rosanna (1982) David Paich b. 1954

Rosanna is a song from the band Toto, a million selling certified gold hit single. It features a famous drum groove known as the Purdy Shuffle. For this arrangement, I have taken the chord changes and melody and orchestrated it for a jazz combo, using the vocal melody and then soloing over the form while keeping the same signature groove.

Roger Lewis is a 2004 graduate of South Range High School and a current Music Education Major at the Dana School of Music at Youngstown State University. Growing up in North Lima, OH, he began taking drum lessons from Jim Vivo at age 6. During his time at South Range High School, he was a member of the marching band, symphonic wind ensemble, jazz band and pep band. Outside of school, he played with various local rock bands and also played in the pit orchestra for musicals at South Range and the Youngstown Playhouse.

At Dana and YSU, he has studied under Dr. Glenn Schaft, Brian Sweigart, Nathan Douds, Rob Ferguson, Ron Coulter, and Dr. Elizabeth DeLamater. He has been a member of the YSU University Band, Concert band, Wind Ensemble, Dana Symphony Orchestra, Chamber Orchestra, and the Percussion Ensemble, and can be heard on the Youngstown Percussion Collective's recording Forms of Things Unknown. He has also performed with the Marching Pride, Jazz Combos and played drum set in the pit orchestra in 2006 for YSU's musical theater presentation of How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying.

Outside of YSU, Roger has performed and recorded with his original rock band Relic and original blues and soul group Hoss and the Juggernauts. He was able to perform at Rock on the Range, a large music festival in Columbus, Ohio among various other opening spots with National Recording artists as a member of Columbus based band Noise Auction. He can also be heard playing drums on Natalie Sprouse's jazz/blues album "Queen Bee." In the summer of 2013 he recorded drums for Christopher Lee Bayda's We Wish You A Merry Rockin' Christmas, heavy metal arrangements of traditional Christmas music.

He also plays various regional touring gigs with tribute bands Robbing Zombie (Tribute to Rob Zombie), Nightmare: The Alice Cooper show, Kid Rocked (Tribute to Kid Rock) and Speak of the Devil (Tribute to Ozzy Osbourne), and in 2013 served as drummer and music director for Main Street Theater's production of "The Wizard of Oz" as well as various church, pit orchestra, and various other gigs.

Roger spent four years as the percussion instructor/coordinator for the South Range Schools music department from 2008 until 2011 and currently maintains weekly private lessons in the Youngstown area as well as teaching marching drumlines for South Range, McDonald, and Geneva High Schools.





Festive Overture (1954)

The story behind the creation of the *Festive Overture* is one of those fantastic tales that reveals the true nature of a composer's genius, leaving all of the eyewitnesses shaking their heads in wonder. Shostakovich's friend Lev Lebedinsky related the story of how one time, when he was hanging out at the composer's apartment one day in the fall of 1954, a conductor visited them from the Bolshoi Theater Orchestra. Due to mysterious political maneuverings and bureaucratic snafus, the orchestra needed a new work to celebrate the October Revolution, and the concert was in three days.

Shostakovich had his friend Lebedinsky sit down next to him and began to compose. Lebedinsky relates:

"The speed with which he wrote was truly astounding. Moreover, when he wrote light music he was able to talk, make jokes and compose simultaneously, like the legendary Mozart. He laughed and chuckled, and in the meanwhile work was under way and the music was being written down."

There is not a trace of haste or carelessness in the vibrant Festive Overture. Shostakovich always composed at a fast pace, writing down the notes with superhuman facility. We will never know whether or not he employed musical ideas that were already lurking in his imagination, or whether the entire work was simply an instantaneous flash of inspiration. It is amusing however to think of Shostakovich "laughing and chuckling" as he composed, for it is easy to imagine the pervasiveness of the composer's good humor driving this energetic, truly festive work.

Incidentally, Shostakovich, who (as we have seen) had shaky nerves, conducted an orchestra professionally on only one occasion, at a concert organized by his friend Mstislav Rostropovich in 1962. Shostakovich opened the concert with his *Festive Overture*. PROGRAM NOTES BY RYAN DORIN

The Shadow of Sirius for Flute and Wind Ensemble (2009)

Composer, Joel Puckett stated:

"I have always found comfort in poetry. While in school, I was the guy with a collection of Bukowski under one arm and a collection of Yeats under the other. I have always enjoyed the rhythm of other people's thoughts and feelings.

In the winter of 2009, my wife and I experienced a heartbreak that left me unsure of how to even breathe, let alone grieve. On March 1st, 2009, I found a copy of W.S. Merwin's, The Shadow of Sirius, and I began to feel myself heal. I have almost no idea what most of this poetry means. But I know that it fills me with a profound sadness that is, at the same time, brimming with hope.

I recently heard Mr. Merwin discussing the origin of the title of his collection. He related that scientists have discovered that the star known as Sirius is actually a star system. What looks to our eye like a single object is actually many. Merwin found himself wondering what is on the other side of Sirus, lying in its shadow.

A friend once said to me, "many concerti explore a virtuosity of technique but not many explore a virtuosity of expression." It was with that thought in mind that I began work on my, The Shadow of Sirius, for solo flute and wind orchestra.

Each movement offers my reflection on a single Merwin poem from the collection. Although the work is played without pause, the soloist plays unaccompanied solos to separates the individual movements.

A consortium of American wind ensembles led by Michael Haithcock and the University of Michigan commissioned The Shadow of Sirius. The work is dedicated to the fantastic Amy Porter."

ARTURO MARQUEZ (b. 1950) Set for wind band by Oliver Nickel

Danzón No. 2 (1998)

During his adolescence, (Jesús) Arturo Márquez (b. 1950) studied piano, violin and trombone before focusing on piano and theory at the Conservatorio Nacional from 1970 to 1975. After lessons in composition with Gutierrez Heras, Quintanar and Ibarra for the next four years, he studied with Jacques Casterede in Paris from 1980 to 1982. His career has included stints as leader of the Navojoa Municipal Band in 1969-70 and teacher of composition at the Escuela Nacional de Musica from 1986 to 1988, and again from 1990 to 1996.

Marquez has composed music for ballet and film as well as a number of chamber, vocal and non-programmatic orchestral works. Perhaps his best-known compositions are the series of *danzones* he penned in the 1990s, music fashioned from the sounds and rhythms of urban popular sources, cast in an accessible harmonic idiom far removed from the avant-garde elements of his early music. For Marquez, it is not the form of this *danzón*, but its spirit, and many of his "absolute" musical works, such as his concertos for harp and cello contain movements that derive from this popular dance with origins in Cuba. Its roots are fairly old; the earliest known examples date from 1789, the product of a Cuban composer, Miguel Failde.

As a living dance form, the *danzón* is very much a part of the Mexican urban landscape. In Veracruz, according to Marquez, there are special town squares where it is danced two or three times a week, and in Mexico City there are special dance halls where only the *danzón* is danced. Simply put, a *danzón* is a salon dance for couples, laid out in rondo form (A-B-A-C-A, etc.) with formal roots in the 19th century *habanera* and *contredanse*. In current Mexican usage it floats comfortably between popular and classical style.

Marquez composed **Danzón No. 2** in response to a commission from the National Autonomous University of Mexico. The main focus of this popular piece lies in highly varied rhythmic accents, creating a sense of changing tempos — though the score shows strict adherence to time signatures. A solo clarinet opens the piece over a percussive accompaniment of *claves*, piano and *pizzicato* strings. Soon an oboe supported by brass instruments answers the clarinet's theme and the entire ensemble erupts into the dance. As the music unfolds the pace and intensity increase to near-manic proportions before taking a deep breath to allow a central section of lyric inspiration featuring piano, richly expressive strings and a duet for clarinet and flute. The brass breaks up the respite with a resumption of the energetic dance theme, and the entire exhilarating piece ends with a stomping close.

ABOUT SOUTH RANGE HIGH SCHOOL BANDS:

When South Range Schools is mentioned in conversation, academics, football and the music program are consistently at the forefront of accolades. With the high school enrollment of 400 on average, the music program boasts 150 members and has sustained that enrollment for many years. South Range Local Schools is comprised of homegrown students from a combination of several communities - North Lima, Greenford, Salem, Columbiana and Canfield. With the addition of K-12 open enrollment next school year we hope to attract students from other area schools as well.

In 1990, the band was 2 members and has been increasing in size ever since. We continue to have a large number of quality students in the music program at South Range. As a result, we are able to provide opportunities to students that traditionally are offered in larger school districts. The South Range Music Department is very proud of their students and hopes that each member of the community as well as staff and students alike understand the importance of music in the public schools. Music is a valued part of a well rounded, balanced education and offers students opportunities that they otherwise may not experience.

The South Range Music Department has performed at Ohio Music Education Association Large Group Adjudicated Event for many years at the district and state levels, earning Superior ratings in classifications "C", "B", and most recently, "A". In addition, the band has performed at the Dixie Classic Festival in Virginia, earning superior ratings. One of the highlights of being a band member at South Range allows the opportunity for band members to perform on Main Street USA as part of Disney's Magic Music Days Festival. The band is planning their next trip to Orlando in the spring of 2015. Other notable performances include the cities of Toronto, Chicago and New York. The Raider Marching Band has also performed at two YSU football games.

ABOUT HOWLAND HIGH SCHOOL BANDS:

Howland Local Schools in Warren, Ohio established its band program in the 1920s. A tradition of musical opportunities and excellence has followed for the students of Howland for the last near century. In that time, Howland High School has had only five previous band directors: Roger Coe Sr., Robert Alexander, Charles Tewksbary, James Jackson, and Nancy Moore. The current directing team took over in 2009.

There are many facets to the Howland High School instrumental music program. "The Musical Pride of Howland" also known as the *Howland Tiger Marching Band* is over 180 members strong. All band students in grades 9-12 participate in this non-competitive show-style marching band. The *Tiger Band* performs at marching band shows throughout the valley and has also performed at Cleveland Cavaliers basketball games, Kennywood Park's fall fantasy parade, and the Spectro Magic parade at Walt Disney World in Orlando Florida. After the fall marching band season comes to a close, band students have opportunities to perform with the *Symphonic Band, Concert Band,* and *Jazz Ensemble*.

The *Howland Symphonic Band* is Howland High School's top instrumental performance ensemble. The group is composed of students in grades 10-12 who earn their chair by audition. The *Howland Concert Band* is another outstanding performing group composed of students in grades 9-12. Both bands receive instruction by all three instrumental music teachers during daily 45-minute rehearsals. *Jazz Ensemble* meets once a week after school and performs at local jazz festivals in the spring.

The Symphonic Band performs three concerts a year and has consistently earned superior ratings at OMEA district Large Group Adjudicated Event. All Symphonic Band students are required to play chamber music and participate in OMEA Solo and Ensemble Adjudicated Event. Many students from Symphonic Band perform in honor bands and orchestras throughout the state of Ohio. Howland band students in every grade have opportunities to study privately on their instrument with a very active private lesson program held after school. The students are very grateful for this opportunity to perform this evening and work with the Dana School of Music faculty. They are also looking forward to receiving instruction from faculty at Northwestern University when they travel to Chicago, IL this spring.

Howland students receive instrumental music instruction in grades 5-12. Band instruction begins in fifth grade at H.C. Mines and North Road Intermediate schools. Students are given group brass, woodwind, and/or percussion classes two days a week. Instruction continues in a full band setting at Howland Middle School in grades 6-8. The Middle School Bands rehearse for 45 minutes, 5 days a week. Band students have the opportunity to participate in Solo and Ensemble Adjudication in grades 7-8. The 8th grade band competes in Large Group Adjudication every spring and has received superior ratings for the past three years.

ABOUT THE YSU WIND ENSEMBLE & YSU BANDS:

The wind band program at Youngstown State University encompasses a wide range of performance groups, from concert bands and chamber groups to marching, pep, and jazz organizations. Over 300 students perform annually in one or more of these bands. Comprised from among the top wind and percussion students in the Dana School of Music, the Wind Ensemble performs a broad spectrum of music. The YSU Band program includes the YSU Marching Pride, the YSU Basketball Band, the YSU Wind Ensemble, the YSU Concert Band, the YSU University Band, and the Dana Chamber Winds.

The Wind Ensemble has been involved in numerous commissions and has had recent in-residence experiences with Michael Colgrass, Joseph Schwantner, Allen Vizzutti, Carter Pann, Karel Husa, Samuel Adler, Eric Ewazen, Frank Ticheli, Adam Frey, Anthony lannaccone, Donald Sinta, David Gillingham, James Keene, Don Wilcox, Brian Balmages, Jerry Ascione, and Ed Lisk.

Pulitzer prize winning composer, Karel Husa called the ensemble's performance of his music, 'inspiring." Frank Ticheli stated that the band "performed my music beautifully" and that the group was 'hot!" Schwantner complimented the ensemble for "their artistry, and for their care and consideration" of his music. Composer/ Pianist Carter Pann was very complimentary of the collaborative music-making experience with Concerto Logic and said that the Wind Ensemble's performance was "among the finest he had experienced" Composer and prize winning composer and author, Michael Colgrass thanked the band for its "wonderful performance and recording" of his Urban Requiem.

The Wind Ensemble has performed at the MENC National Convention, for numerous OMEA State Conventions, for CBDNA Regional and National Conventions, and for the ABSDA National Convention. In 2005, Dr. Gage and the band made their NYC Carnegie Hall debut. The group has released five independent and in-house CD recordings:

Lions, Jesters, and Dragons, Oh My! (1998); Star Wars and Other Scores (2000); Carnival (2002); Spin Cycle (2004); and Tipping Points (2006).

In June 2008, the ensemble released its first produced CD, Urban Requiem, on the NAXOS International label. In August 2012 NAXOS International released its second YSU Wind Ensemble CD, Old Wine in New Bottles" in its Wind Band Classics series. Dr. Umble has also served on the faculties of Bowling Green State University and Grove City College. She holds degrees from the University of Michigan, Bowling Green State University, and Michigan State University and was awarded the Prix d'excellence for Outstanding Musicianship from the Fontainebleau School of Music, France.

Kathryn Umble has also served as a National Flute Association competition judge and flute pedagogy panel member. She conducted the Dana Flute Ensemble in a full concert performance at the 2005 OMEA Conference and the 2006 and 2009 National Flute Association Conventions in Pittsburgh and New York City.

ABOUT THE CONDUCTORS:

STEPHEN L. GAGE has served as Professor of Music and Director of Bands at Youngstown State University's Dana School of Music since 1993. He holds degrees from the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign, the Eastman School of Music, and the State University of New York at Fredonia where he also earned the Performers Certificate. Stephen studied conducting with Harry John Brown, Donald Hunsberger, David Effron, Roy Ernst, James Keene, H. Robert Reynolds, and Paul Vermel.

In September 2012, Dr. Gage was appointed as the Conductor of the W. D. Packard Concert Band in Warren. Stephen begins his 21st a season as the Edward Zacharias Memorial Chair/Conductor of the Youngstown Symphony Youth Orchestra. In 2008-09, he served as the principal conductor of the Dana Symphony Orchestra. Previous teaching positions include serving as Director of Bands at Emporia State University (KS) and as Director of Bands at Auburn High School (NY).

Professor Gage has written numerous published articles on conducting, rehearsal techniques, and wind band literature, and he is an active wind band and orchestral guest conductor, clinician, and adjudicator of international repute. Stephen has guest conducted and cliniced high school honor bands and orchestras as well as a number of university wind bands throughout the United States. His list of guest conducting appearances includes the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra, the U.S. Army Band: "Pershing's Own", and the U.S. Army Field Band & Chorus among others. The list also includes experiences in Canada and Ireland. Dr. Gage has received critical acclaim from a number of distinguished composers, including Joseph Schwanter, Carter Pann, John Mackey, Samuel Adler, Karel Husa, Frank Ticheli, John Mackey, Michael Colgrass, Donald Grantham, D.J. Sparr, and David Gillingham for his interpretation and recordings of their music.

Stephen's professional affiliations include memberships in the CBDNA, NBA, OMEA/MENC, Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia, Kappa Delta Pi, Phi Beta Mu, Sigma Alpha Iota, and Phi Kappa Phi. Dr. Gage has been inducted into the prestigious American Bandmasters and was named as both *Distinguished Professor* and *Faculty Mentor of the Year* at YSU, and he is currently on the NBA Foundation Board of Directors. In 2012, Gage was awarded the *Marty Manning Faculty Mentor Award* at YSU. Stephen and the YSU Wind Ensemble made their Carnegie Hall debut in 2005 and the group has produced seven CD recordings. The sixth CD in this series, *Urban Requiem*, was released on the NAXOS International Recording Label in June 2008 with numerous outstanding critical reviews and the seventh; *Old Wine In New Bottles* was released by NAXOS in August 2012.

Professor Gage lives in Poland, Oh with his wife, Stephanie, and two of his three children, Claudia and Brendan; son, Matthew, and granddaughter, Zoey, live in Austin, TX.

Felix Mendelssohn (1809 -1847) The **New Amici Trio** has been in residence at the Dana School of Music of Youngstown State University since 1980. While the members have changed over the years, the core mission of the ensemble remains the same: music derives from good friendship - Amici. The trio has toured extensively throughout the United States and has been the recipient of grants from the Ohio Arts Council. In the spring of 2013, pianist Cicilia Yudha joined existing members: violinist, Hristo Popov and cellist, Michael Gelfand. Each member is a distinguished soloist in their own right performing concertos and recitals on a regular basis. The trio's repertoire spans works from the classics to lesser-known masterworks. Recent appearances include performances at Stambaugh Auditorium, the International Festival for Strings and More, Dana Concert Series, and a special appearance with Ronnie Wood from the Rolling Stones.

"Virtuoso-violinist extraordinaire" (Musical Horizons), Hristo Popov, brings tremendous experience to the concert stage. Popov made his orchestral debut at the age of nine and since then has performed throughout the United States and Europe as both recitalist and concerto soloist. His Carnegie Hall Debut was described by The Strad Magazine as "... rollicking and energetic." Hristo Popov is a prizewinner at the Kozian International Violin Competition, Silver Medalist at the California Young Artist Competition, winner of the Grand Prize at the International Institute of Music (Germany, USA), first place at the American String Teachers' Association Chamber Music Competition. He continues to receive rave reviews - as described recently by The Plain Dealer, Cleveland, "...the performance benefited from the elegant purity soloist Hristo Popov invested in every phrase. Popov traced the lyrical and vibrant lines (Mozart - Violin Concerto No. 5, Turkish) with unruffled assurance. He enabled the music to float where necessary and made easy work of the acrobatic demands." A fierce advocate for the arts in several communities in Ohio, Popov serves as Artistic Director of the Chagrin Valley Chamber Music Concert Series, which presents five Master Series per year and the popular summer program International Festival for Strings & More. Currently, he serves as Concertmaster of Opera Circle – Cleveland, Warren Philharmonic and Opera Western Reserve and teaches at the Western Reserve Academy.

Bios:

Michael Gelfand has been Professor of Music at the Dana School of Music since 1975. As a cellist, he has performed throughout the United States. Europe and Asia. He has performed cello concertos with the Youngstown Symphony, Warren Philharmonic, Richmond Chamber Orchestra, and International String Conference Orchestras and has performed under the baton of many of the world's leading conductors as cellist in the Cleveland Orchestra, Cincinnati Symphony, Nice Philharmonic (France), and Principal cellist of the Syracuse Symphony, Youngstown Symphony and Warren Philharmonic. He is a founding member of the AMICI TRIO since 1980, now renamed the NEW AMICI TRIO. Gelfand 's primary cello teachers include Janos Starker and Fritz Maag at Indiana University. As a guest conductor, he has led the Richmond Chamber Orchestra, West Virginia All-State Orchestra, Pittsburgh District 5 High School Orchestra, International String Conference Orchestras, and the South Dakota All-State Orchestra and Chorus at the Sioux Falls International Arena. He recently returned for the second time to Bulgaria and conducted the Vidin State Philharmonic and the Sofia Sinfonette. Michael Gelfand has been the Music Director/Conductor of the Greenville Symphony Orchestra (PA) in residence at Thiel College since 2002. In May 2013, after a 38 year teaching career at Dana/YSU, Michael Gelfand retired from full-time faculty status and he now continues teaching there as Professor Emeritus.

Indonesian pianist **Cicilia Yudha** made her debut with the Cleveland Orchestra at Severance Hall in 2003. As soloist and avid chamber musician, she has performed in the U.S.A., Canada, Austria, Germany, France, Cambodia, and Indonesia.

Passionate in music education and community service, Yudha has served as a piano faculty at the New England Conservatory Preparatory School and the Cleveland Institute of Music Preparatory Department, and as a staff collaborative pianist of Boston Children's Chorus and Eastern Music Festival. In the short time she has been back in Ohio, she established a class piano program at Chaney High School Visual and Performing Arts in the west side of Youngstown.

On full scholarship, Yudha earned a doctorate in piano performance at the University of North Carolina Greensboro. Upon graduation, she was inducted into the Pi Kappa Lambda honor society. She holds a Bachelor of Music degree and an Artist Diploma from the Cleveland Institute of Music, and a Master of Music degree in piano performance from the New England Conservatory of Music. Former teachers include Olga Radosavljevich, Wha-Kyung Byun, and John Salmon. In 2012, she joined the Dana School of Music at Youngstown State University as assistant professor and coordinator of keyboard musicianship.

University Band Program Notes:

Charles Edward Carter was born in Ponca City, Oklahoma, on July 10, 1926 and died . He grew up in Worthington, Ohio and attended Ohio State University, the Eastman School of Music, and Florida State University. He taught low brass and was arranger for the Ohio State University Marching Band. Later, he went to Florida State University as an arranger for its bands and was also a Professor of Theory and Composition. Along with numerous marching band arrangements, he has over thirty works for concert band. Well known pieces include: Chorale and Variations, Dance and Intermezzo, Sonata for Winds, and Symphonic Overture.

In 1952, he wrote his first two compositions designed for the educational market. The titles were *Metropolis* and *Overture in Classical Style*, both eventually published by Bourne Music, Inc. The publishers decided to rename *Overture in Classical Style* to *Overture for Winds* for sake of clarity. *Overture for Winds* is a tuneful overture in the familiar ABA form. The opening section's theme is robust and rhythmic. The second theme, slightly slower and expressive, is a free form based on the original idea. The last section is a repetition of the opening thematic ideas, building to a final climax. The work was composed in 1959.

Samuel R. Hazo, recipient of the National Band Association's 2001 Biennial Composition Award, has received commissions at the professional, university and public school levels in addition to composing original scores for television, radio and the stage. His original symphonic compositions include performances with actors Brooke Shields, James Earl Jones, David Conrad and Richard Kiley. The composer states:

In Heaven's Air was commissioned by, and dedicated to my friend, Dr. Robert Cameron, who had recently experienced the passing of his mother. Because the death of his mother was accidental, and therefore completely unexpected, there was never a true feeling of acceptance or closure. This piece was composed to help the process of healing.

University Band Program Notes:

Clare Grundman, a native of Cleveland, Ohio composed scores for films, radio, and television, as well as orchestrations for Broadway musicals. He also wrote a few works for various chamber ensembles and for full orchestra. However, he is best known for his many compositions and arrangements for wind bands.

In *Norwegian Rhapsody*, Grundman samples folk melodies from Norway. This was a hallmark of several of his rhapsodies written for wind bands as he also sampled folk melodies from, England, Finland, Japan and Scotland.

L'Inglesina is best defined as a concert march or marcia sinfonica, composed in a flexible form that does not adhere to the functionality normally associated with the standard military march. Its phrases and sections are often asymmetrical with various elements of the composition reintroduced to create dramatic effect. Additionally, the sudden dynamic shifts and wide-ranging expressiveness do not lend themselves to the accepted standard military march functions normally associated with the use of the compositional style outside of the concert hall.

The tempo marking in the edition, *Tempo di Marcia*, absent from the Pagani publication, leaves open a broad range of interpretation, as the musical character may be maintained within a metronomic range from quarter note equals 104 to 126. *Inglesina* gained popularity in a variety of polls about marches conducted by Karl M. Holvik and Norman E. Smith between 1961 and 1986, both in the United States and internationally. It remains an important part of the march repertoire, particularly of interest as an example of late nineteenth century, Italian concert march style.

Concert Band Program Notes:

"The Danserye" is a set of instrumental dances based on popular tunes of the time, arranged by Susato and published in 1551 as Het derdemusyckboexken. With more than 50 individual dances in a variety of forms, the collection is notable for its simple textures and strict homophony. Specific instrumentation is not indicated thus suggesting that the tunes were performed by whatever combination of winds and strings were available.

Selections from "The Danserye", is a setting for wind band consisting of nine dances fashioned into an extended "symphonic suite." The arrangement utilizes the full resources of the modern wind band featuring various sections (or consorts of instruments) in alteration with powerful tutti passages. While the wind parts remain faithful to the original material, the dances are energizes with a healthy dose of contemporary percussion effects and a significant part for acoustic guitar. This blend of sound generates a "new, but familiar element, thus making something very modern out of music that is more than 450 years old." The arrangement was created for the Florida State University Symphonic Band and was premiered on April 17, 2002.

A Childhood Remembered was inspired by my late partner Douglas Howard Vought, a very gentle, kind-hearted man who passed away from depression in 2010. About a year later I was playing the piano and this light, bubbly melody came to me. While writing the piece I thought about Douglas the entire time. It was a very emotional experience for me. Although the music evokes joy, energy, innocence, and hope, there is the slightest undercurrent of sadness. The one thing about Douglas was that he had a childlike spirit. He loved to eat dessert before dinner. He enjoyed amusement parks and funnel cakes. One summer he actually bought one of those plastic kiddie pools, filled it with water and would bask in the warm California sun. I believe all of us would like to re-live those joyous moments of our childhood, so close your eyes and let the music take you back to that simple time of life.

Concert Band Program Notes:

Pageant, a traditional staple of the wind band repertoire, was commissioned by the American Bandmaster's Association and was completed in January 1953. It is Persichetti's third work for band. It opens in slow tempo with a motive in the horn that is used throughout both sections of the piece. The slow chordal section is succeeded by a lively "parade" section introduced by the snare drum. In the final portion of the work the two principal subjects are developed simultaneously to a lively climax. The first performance of this work took place on 7 March 1953, at the ABA Convention in Miami, Florida. It was performed by the University of Miami Band, with the composer conducting.

For \$500 more, *The Liberty Bell* would have been named *The Devil's Deputy.* Sousa was composing music for an operetta of that name at the request of the celebrated comedian Francis Wilson. Sousa asked \$1,500 for the work, but Wilson offered \$1,000. When they could not come to an agreement, Sousa withdrew with his partially completed manuscript, which included a lively march.

Sousa and George Frederick Hinton one of the Sousa band's managers, were in Chicago witnessing a spectacle called "America" when a back drop, with a huge painting of the Liberty Bell was lowered. Hinton suggested that "The Liberty Bell" would be a good title for Sousa's new march. By coincidence, the next morning Sousa received a letter from his wife in which she told how their son had marched in his first parade in Philadelphia—a parade honoring the return of the Liberty Bell, which had been on tour. The new march was then christened "The Liberty Bell." It was one of the first marches Sousa sold to the John Church Company and was the first composition to bring Sousa a substantial financial reward.

According to a story told by the Sousa band's first soprano, Marcella Lindh, she contributed one of the themes of the march. Sousa had heard her whistling a catchy tune of her won and had asked her permission to incorporate it into one of his marches. Several years later she heard "The Liberty Bell" march being performed by a band in Europe and recognized her own melody in the march.
