BIOGRAPHIES.

WENDY CASE has performed globally as a chamber musician and recitalist. She is the founding violinist of the Brahms' Ghost Piano Trio and has collaborated with prestigious musicians such as David Finckel, Amir Eldan, Kirsten Docter, Soovin Kim, and performed in ensembles including the Blossom Festival (Cleveland Orchestra), and the Atlanta Symphony. Her performances have been heard on NPR, in Carnegie Hall, the National Opera Center, the Kimmel Center, and Severance Hall. She studied at the University of Michigan, the Cleveland Institute of Music, and the Stony Brook University. Influential teachers include Andrew Jennings, Yehonatan Berick, Philip Setzer (Emerson Quartet), Soovin Kim, Hai Xin Wu, and William Preucil. Her current projects include several recording endeavors and a series of presentations on the interplay of advanced string technique and acoustical physics.

'CAROLINE OLTMANNS is fast becoming a star in the piano world, which is heavily evident in her refined, crystalline playing and charismatic persona' (Donald Hunt, Pianist Magazine). She reveals in her playing a deep connectivity between music and culture. Her impeccable musical phrasing combined with an engaging stage presence have attracted audiences both in the US and abroad. Event highlights of the 2020/2021 season include virtual and live concert appearances in Switzerland, the UK, and in China. Past seasons have included concerto appearances with Youngstown Symphony Orchestra, Johnson City Symphony Orchestra, Harburger Orchester Akademie, and Cleveland Philharmonic Orchestra in addition to the commission, premiere and recording of five new concerti for piano and large ensemble. She has recorded six solo CDs on the Filia Mundi label. Her latest concept album Ghosts features Robert Schumann's last work 'Ghost Variations', Oltmanns' playing has been broadcast globally on radio and television stations, and she was featured on the documentary series Living the Classical Life. She serves as a jury member of national and international competitions including the Cleveland International Piano Competition. As an International Steinway Artist, Steinway Spirio Recording Artist, Fulbright Scholar, and recipient of the Stipendium der deutschen Wirtschaft, she is Professor of Piano at Youngstown State University and holds degrees from the Staatliche Musikhochschule Freiburg and the University of Southern California in Los Angeles. Her musical mentors were Robert Levin, John Perry, Vitaly Margulis, and Malcolm Frager.

BIOGRAPHIES


TRUMAN LITTLER, a bass-baritone, is in his final year at the Dana School of Music where he studies voice with Ms. Susan Foster. Previously, he spent three years studying with Dr. Allan Mosher. In addition to voice, Truman studies conducting under Dr. Hae-Jong Lee. Under Dr. Lee, Truman serves as assistant director of the Stambaugh Chorus, an assistant section leader in the Dana Chorale, a member of Dana's newly formed Madrigal Choir, and was a Singing Scholar in the Warren Civic Chorus' performance of Handel's Messiah. Truman spent nearly two years as the choir director of the Ohltown United Methodist Church. While a member of the YSU Men's Chorus, he performed at the 2019 Johnny Appleseed Barbershop Harmony Convention in Columbus. In that same year, Truman was the winner of the Warren Music Club's annual scholarship. His professional affiliations include the American Choral Directors Association, the National Association for Music Education, and the Ohio Music Educators Association. In addition, he is Vice-President of the YSU chapter of the Ohio Collegiate Music Educators Association.

DIANE YAZVAC has been an adjunct faculty member of Youngstown State University since 1999, teaching introductory theory classes, keyboard musicianship classes, piano pedagogy, accompanying classes and piano lessons. Known especially for her accompanying skills, Diane toured Europe with the Dana Chorale playing in such countries as Italy, Switzerland and Austria. She has accompanied guest artists from all over the United States, China and South Africa, as well as countless area student and faculty musicians. She is a well-respected area piano teacher. Diane received her BM and MM in piano performance from YSU studying with Delores Fitzer and Dr. Robert Hopkins.


Stars and Stripes forever

Guest artist Emanuela Friscioni received a diploma in piano performance from the "Giuseppe Verdi" Conservatory in Milan, with full marks, and went on to study with Annamaria Pennella. Other teachers have included Paul BaduraSkoda, Aldo Ciccolini and Bruno Canino. Ms. Friscioni has won many national and international first prizes, including those at the Tortona, Moneglia, Camaiore, Chieti, and Kawai Piano Competitions. She has performed throughout Italy, in Switzerland, France and other European countries. She made her U.S. debut in July 2000 with Cleveland Orchestra violinist Gino Raffaelli. Since then, she has enjoyed a career that has seen her perform solo recitals, orchestral engagements and chamber music appearances. Ms. Friscioni's recent performances have included Rachmaninoff's Second Piano Concerto with the National Repertory Orchestra; Gershwin's Rhapsody in Blue with the Canton Symphony; chamber music and solo performances at the Music in the Mountains festival; and Franck's Symphonic Variations with the Lakeside Symphony Orchestra. She has also performed recitals in California, Nevada, New Mexico, New York and Ohio. Her piano duets with her husband, pianist Antonio PompaBaldi, have earned them many prizes and wonderful reviews. Ms. Friscioni is an accomplished professor of piano, first in Italy, where many of her pupils have won prizes and scholarships, and now in the U.S. As a teacher and artistic director, she founded and manages the Classical Piano Performance Academy at Cuyahoga Community College. She was appointed to the CIM faculty in 2004 and is a Steinway Artist.

GUEST ARTIST BIOGRAPHIES.


Jeanie Darnell is Professor of Music and Head of Vocal Studies at Florida Gulf Coast University's Bower School of Music. As a concert artist, Darnell has been hailed by critics throughout the United States and in Europe for her "wonderfully bell-like tones" (Wertheimer Zeitung). A regional finalist in the Metropolitan Opera National Council Auditions in 1998, she has been in demand as soprano soloist of major concert and oratorio repertoire. She has been a featured soloist with the Gesellschaft für Musiktheater (Vienna), Naples Philharmonic Orchestra, the Southwest Florida Symphony, Opera Naples, Patronato Peruano de la Música Centenarios, Operafestival di Roma, Corsi Internazionali di Musica, Omaha Symphony, Arkansas Symphony Orchestra, Denver Bach Festival, Naples Bach Ensemble, Fort Myers Symphonic Master Singers, Lindsborg Messiah Festival, Colorado Music Festival, and Rocky Mountain Music Alliance. A champion of new music, she has presented concerts of works throughout the United States by composers Robert Boury, Don Freund, Richard Hundley, Lori Laitman, Marcia Marchesi, Timothy Snider and Z. Randall Stroope.

An award-winning concert pianist, Michael Baron performs over 40 concerts each year, including annual tours of Europe and South America, and engagements throughout the United States and Asia. Equally at home as a recitalist, a soloist with orchestra, and a chamber musician. Baron commands a diverse repertoire, ranging from Baroque compositions to world premieres of contemporary pieces. His virtuosity and musicianship regularly garner the highest critical acclaim. Il Tempo (Rome) praised his "spellbinding recital. Baron kept the audience enthralled with a combination of touching poetry and superhuman virtuosity." Baron received his doctorate in Piano Performance studying with the legendary American pianist Earl Wild. He also worked extensively in Italy with the renowned pianist Orazio Frugoni. Dr. Baron serves as the Myra and Van Williams Distinguished Professor of Music and Head of Keyboard Studies at the Bower School of Music at Florida Gulf Coast University in Ft. Myers, Florida. He is also Honorary Professor of Music at Yantai University and Hubei University in the People's Republic of China. A distinguished educator, Baron has presented master classes and workshops at schools, festivals, and universities throughout the world. He regularly serves as a jurist on regional, national, and international piano competitions. Recent performances have taken him to Italy, Hungary, Switzerland, Belgium, Germany, China, South Korea, Serbia, Peru, Bolivia, and Taiwan, as well as U.S. performances. An acclaimed master teacher, Dr. Baron's students regularly win competitions throughout the United States and abroad. Baron is the director of several summer music festivals in Europe and is an official International Steinway Artist.





PROGRAM NOTES

Edith Sitwell was the oldest of three siblings who formed a prominent artistic circle in London in the 1920s. She began writing her collection of absurdist poetry, *Façade*, in 1918, shortly before composer William Walton graduated from Oxford and began boarding with the Sitwell family. Walton set a number of Sitwell's poems to music, incorporating elements of jazz and other popular styles of his time, and using an unusual combination of instruments to accompany a spoken-word text in strictly-notated rhythm—an experimental compositional style called *sprechtstimme*, created by composer Engelbert Humperdinck and soon made (in)famous by Arnold Schoenberg. The Sitwell-Walton **Façade: An Entertainment** caused a minor scandal at its premiere in 1922, with prominent literati storming out of the performance, and it was loathed by critics, one of whom described it as "relentless cacophony."

Igor Stravinsky achieved international recognition in the 1910s after the triumphs of several ballet scores written for Sergei Diaghilev, particularly in the years following the purported riot at the premiere of his *Rite of Spring*. Shortly after the start of World War I, Stravinsky moved to Switzerland, where he collaborated with Swiss poet Charles Ferdinand Ramuz in the creation of what has become one of his most enduring successes, the theatrical work **A Soldier's Tale**. Based on a Russian folk story, *A Soldier's Tale* tells of a soldier who meets the devil upon returning home from war. Like *Façade*, this piece is scored for a small stage band of unique instrumentation, and it blends classical and popular musical styles to accompany spoken text. Alternate versions of *A Soldier's Tale* include orchestration for only a trio of instrumentalists, as well as a fully-staged ballet with three actors; it has also been arranged into suites of various lengths. Today's performance is of the original 1918 version.

The Dana Ensemble is a flexible, modular roster of Dana School of Music faculty and the most talented regional guest artists, coming together multiple times a semester for brilliant live performances in Youngstown's finest concert halls. Upcoming concerts include the complete *Nutcracker* with Ballet Western Reserve in December, a collection of jazz and popular arrangements by David Morgan in February, and a children's concert of *Peter & The Wolf and Carnival of the Animals* in May, narrated YSU President Jim Tressel.





PROGRAM NOTES

From the 10th through the 17th centuries, the Boyars were the highest-ranking members of the Bulgarian, Romanian, Russian, and Ukrainian aristocracy, second only to the ruling princes. Halvorsen's *Entry March of the Boyars* depicts the ceremonial entrance of these aristocrats in a theatrical setting. A solo clarinet introduces the regal theme, and more instruments are added to represent the approach of the entourage. Woodwind ornamentation complements the brass fanfares. This piece did not receive national recognition until Grieg, who was the uncle of Halvorsen's wife, created an arrangement for piano in 1898.

Halvorsen describes his inspiration for this composition:

Got hold of an encyclopedia to find out what Bucharest was like. There I read about the art-loving Queen Carmen Sylva and the descendants of the rich, distinguished Boyars who invaded Bucharest so and so many years ago. 'This would look good in the newspapers,' I thought. And then there was the Queen! She would immediately summon me to the palace with my quartet. I had to find release, so I wrote a march and called it *The March of the Boyars*, and just when I had finished it, the same afternoon, Edvard Grieg came in. 'Now, how are you doing? Already in full swing I see.' He saw the manuscript on the piano, looked at it carefully and said: 'That is good!'

Dances in the Canebrakes is a suite of dances based on African-American melodies. Price originally wrote this piece for solo piano at the end of her life. Immediately after her death, it was orchestrated by none other than William Grant Still, widely regarded as the dean of African-American composers and a great admirer of Price's art. The orchestral version debuted in 1953, and you can hear quite a bit of Southern folk song and spiritual tradition in its three movements. They are, nonetheless,

dances, and lively ones at that. The piece is divided into three movements, each with its own title: Nimble Feet, Tropical Noon, and Silk Hat and Walking Cane.

A Light in the Ocean is a pure reflection of the wonders of life across our planet. As I composed the music, I consistently envisioned the beauty and spectacle of stepping into nature and seeing the flourish of life around me. And this is no more exemplified than in the underwater expanse of the ocean.

From the outset, I knew it was essential to give this seascape a melody that matched its innocence and wonder. This was very important to me because I feel like melody has become a lost art in much of the classical music being composed today. But there is a reason that so much music in our history is great, and that is largely due to a melody that connects it together. My melody, while intentionally simple in nature, slowly develops and changes over the course of the piece to help exemplify the ever-changing life cycle of the world.

Beyond melody, A Light in the Ocean also relies heavily upon the Dorian mode. This means that instead on emphasizing the traditional first note of a major scale, my music finds its foundation on the second note. In result, the Dorian mode has a minor quality but with an added brightness and "light" to its raised 6th note. Furthermore, I tried to create a sense of gentle movement in the orchestra to give each moment a water-like quality.

Being a native-born citizen of Fort Collins, it was an honor composing this piece for Wes Kenney and the Fort Collins Symphony, as well as sharing it with my hometown community. I cannot express how much appreciation I have for the incredible music teachers I had the privilege of being mentored by and can honestly say that my career would not have been possible without them.

Supermaximum is inspired by the unique and rich tradition of "chain gang" songs from the prison camps of the depression-era South. Stemming from a long and painful past, with roots in West-African folk song through generations of slavery and Jim Crow laws, this body of work serves as a singular example of an unlikely group of people resorting to, of all things, art for spiritual and, at times, physical survival under the most hellish circumstances. The word "Supermaximum" refers to the highest possible level of security for incarceration. In this sense, the hypothesis motivating this work is the idea of a directly proportionate need for discovering elements of one's own humanity in the face of an imposed denial of that humanity.

The work begins with the unpitched rhythm of chain gang work---the swinging and clanging of axes and hammers. The violas lead the call and response "singing" with the violins in chorus. The antiphonal setting of the group depicts the highly coordinated sequencing of both the work and singing by the inmates. Using this reference as a point of departure, the music is then transformed over the course of the work to suggest a transcending above the conditions of this harsh reality to an elevated, spiritual state of grace. The work ends full circle with a reiteration of the chain gang elements, but perhaps now with a galvanized, hopeful resolve.

The original version of **Supermaximum** was commissioned by the Brooklyn Friends of Chamber Music for the East Coast Chamber Orchestra, and was premiered May 1st, 2011 at the Layfayette Ave. Presbyterian Church in Brooklyn, NY.

He uses these experiences in order to teach young artists to do what he does, working as an Artist Educator at Refresh Collective in Downtown Cleveland.

LaNae' Ferguson is a singer-songwriter, actress, artist, dancer and writer. She is a Spanish and Music Recording double major at Youngstown State University's Dana School of Music under the vocal instruction of Dr. Misook Yun. She has previously been seen in shows with the Youngstown Connection (2017-2018), Opera Western Reserve (Macbeth, Lucia di Lammermoor, Porgy & Bess, Madama Butterfly), The Youngstown Playhouse (Nativity: The Hope) and has written music for and acted in the Easter plays at Rising Star Baptist Church (2013-2019). Ferguson was last seen in the show 'Legends' by Martha Robinson-Brogdon in June, 2021 and in The Color Purple Broadway Musical this past September and October. She will perform as a singer and dancer in the International Festival hosted by Martha Robinson-Brogdon in November.



PROGRAM NOTES

The **Vienna Philharmonic Fanfare** was written in 1924 for the organization's first benefit ball, which raised money for the musician's pension fund. Held on March 4 of that year, the ball took place during the holiday called Fasching in German-speaking countries and is known as Carnival or Mardi Gras in others. The piece was played while honored guests, such as the Matron of the Ball, arrived at the event. The work has been played every year since at the Philharmonic's annual balls.

AMEN! (2017) was commissioned by the University of Michigan Symphony Band and is a homage to my family's four-generational affiliation with the Pentecostal church. My intent is to re-create the musical experience of an African American Pentecostal church service that I enjoyed being a part of while growing up in this denomination. Pentecostal denominations, such as Church of God in Christ (C.O.G.IC.), Pentecostal Assemblies of God, Apostolic, Holiness Church, among many others, are known for their exuberant outward expressions of worship. The worship services in these churches will often have joyous dancing, spontaneous shouting, and soulful singing. The music in these worship services is a vital vehicle in fostering a genuine spiritual experience for the congregation.

The three movements in AMEN! are performed without break to depict how the different parts of a worship services flows into the next. In the first movement, I've imagined the sound of an exuberant choir and congregation singing harmoniously together in a call-and-response fashion. The soulful second movement quotes a gospel song, I'll Take Jesus For Mine, that I frequently heard in many services. The title, AMEN!, refers to the plagal cadence or "Amen" cadence (IV-I), which is the focal point of the climax in the final movement. Along with heavily syncopated rhythms and interjecting contrapuntal lines, this cadence modulates up by half step until we reach a frenzied state, emulating a spiritually heighten state of worship.

The composer's inspiration for this symphony was a gift of six bookmarks featuring famous works by Japanese artists. Ms. Giroux says, "My imagination was whirling with each scene painted on each bookmark. I knew right then and there that those little bookmarks would be the subject of my next symphony." Two of the six movements are based on selections from Hokusai's series of woodcut prints, 36 Views of Mt. Fuji. Four movements are based on prints by Hiroshige; three of them are from 53 Stations of the Tokaido Highway which depict the picturesque resting stations along the famous road between Kyoto and Tokyo, and the other is from an additional work.

Based on the bookmark "Evening Snow at Kambara" by Hiroshige Ando which is from the series The 53 Stations of the Tokaido Highway.

Hiroshige Ando (1797-1858) traveled the Tokaido from Edo to Kyoto in 1832. The official party he was traveling with were transporting horses which were gifts to be offered to the imperial court. The journey greatly inspired Hiroshige, for he sketched many of its scenes during his journey's round trip. In all, Hiroshige produced 55 prints for the series *The Fifty-Three Stations of the Tokaido*. Fifty three of the prints

represent the 53 post stations along the way. The additional two prints are of the starting and ending points. The post stations offered food, lodging and stables for travelers of the Tokaido Highway. "Evening Snow at Kambara" was the 15th station Hiroshige visited.

The subtitle *Light is the Touch* refers to snow softly falling on the skin. In this piece, the falling snow symbolizes spiritual healing. The piece starts with solo piano, harp and alto flute. The melody is simple yet haunting and grows with the slow addition of players. The piece ends with the same three soloists it began with. It is a song in structure, a song representing the soft touch of healing.

Give Us This Day was commissioned by Eric Weirather, Director of Bands at Rancho Buena Vista High School in Oceanside, Calif., which is in the greater San Diego area. Eric put together a consortium to support the commission. The score was finished in October of 2005, and the premiere performance was done at Eric's school in the spring of 2006. Since then, with publication of the piece, and a lot of word of mouth, *Give Us This Day* has literally taken off. It continues to be performed all over the U.S., and many places around the world.

The words "give us this day" are, of course, from the Lord's Prayer, but the inspiration for this music is Buddhist. I have recently read a book by the Vietnamese Buddhist monk Thich Nhat Hanh (pronounced "Tick Not Hahn") entitled For a Future to be Possible. His premise is that a future for the planet is only possible if individuals become deeply mindful of themselves, deeply connected to who they really are. While this is not a new idea, and something that is an ongoing struggle for everyone, in my estimation it is *the* issue for world peace. For me, writing music, and working with people to perform music, are two of those points of deep mindfulness. Music allows us to be immediately present, awake, and aware. "Give Us This Day"...Give us this very moment of aware aliveness so that we can build a future in the face of a most dangerous and difficult time.

I chose the subtitle "Short Symphony for Wind Ensemble" because the music really isn't programmatic in nature. It has a full-blown symphonic character, even though there are only two movements. The music of the slower first movement is deeply searching, while that of the highly energized second movement is at times both joyful and sternly sober. The piece ends with a modal setting of the chorale melody *Vater Unser in Himmelreich*" ("Our Father in Heaven"), #110 from the 371 Four-Part Chorales by J.S. Bach.







Director's Note

Thank you so much for joining us for this performance of *Little Shop of Horrors*. After a long hiatus, we are so thrilled to welcome you back to Ford Theater to present a live musical! What could be more perfect than to celebrate Spooky Season with a production of *Little Shop!* The cast and crew have worked tirelessly to present a unique take on this iconic show.

The original Off-Broadway production of *Little Shop* opened in 1982 and ran five years. When deciding how to approach the production, the design team and I decided to update the setting from the 1960s to the 1980s, because so much of the music is ingrained with the pop rock sound of the 80s. The urchins evolved from a Motown girl group into an 80s girl group ala the *Bangles*. Each urchin is inspired by a different 80s icon, whether it be Cyndi Lauper, Janet Jackson, or Madonna. What are you willing to sacrifice to get what you want? What do you do when you lose yourself in the process of getting what you want?

If the pandemic has taught us anything, it has given us all the time to reflect on what is important in our lives. I hope we all learn to make better choices than Seymour. In addition to moving the time period, we also moved the location as our Skid Row is situated in downtown Cleveland as opposed to downtown NYC and we have hidden some Cleveland easter eggs in the production.

Little Shop seemed like a perfect fit to perform at YSU because it highlights the Department of Visual & Dramatic Arts' puppetry minor. Wendy Akers has done an incredible job designing and building, with the assistance of a student team, all the puppets that you see in the production. Our version of Audrey II is unique and highlights both the effectiveness of puppetry merged with a live performer onstage.

While *Little Shop* is a musical comedy, we are cognizant of the difficult themes that exist within the production and worked with the students to make sure they felt safe dealing with both these topics and this subject matter. A director of both musical theater and opera productions, lan Silverman has traveled the country working with some of the industry's top directors and performers.

In addition to standard repertoire, he has extensive experience with new works that engage with today's social and political issues. He has worked on seven world premiere productions including assisting acclaimed director James Robinson on a triple bill of world premieres at Opera Theatre of Saint Louis and *The Knock*, a world premiere operatic film that will be released this Veteran's Day.

Silverman also specializes in crossover work, blending the lines between musical theater and opera. This past summer he made his debut at The Glimmerglass Festival assisting Francesca Zambello and Eric Sean Fogel on Songbird, a new adaptation of Offenbach's La Périchole as well as assisting Eric Sean Fogel on To the World: A Musical Theatre Revue. Other credits include Sweeney Todd (Pittsburgh Festival Opera, Eastman Opera Theater), Into the Woods (Ohio Light Opera), Girl Crazy (Ohio Light Opera), Candide (Brevard Music Center), and Sondheim on Sondheim (Brevard Music Center).

Each episode features the music of a different composing team. This winter, Silverman will serve as the Resident Assistant Director at Palm Beach Opera for their productions of *Carmen*, *L'elisir d'Amore*, and *The Merry Widow*. He has also served on the directing staffs of Opera Naples, The Ohio Light Opera, OnSite Opera, Brevard Music Center, Pittsburgh Festival Opera, Miami Summer Music Festival, Bronx Opera, and the Chicago Summer Opera, among others. He has also directed productions at The Rochester Fringe Festival, Miami Children's Chorus, Brevard Music Center and Eastman Opera Theater.

Silverman graduated from the Eastman School of Music in 2020 with a Master of Music Degree in Stage Directing and a Certificate in Arts Leadership. There, he assistant directed opera productions, taught opera theater classes, and created his own productions. He received his Bachelor's Degree in Music from the University of Miami, with degrees in both Classical Vocal Performance and Music Business. Upon graduation, he was awarded the Overall Outstanding Senior Award for the Frost School of Music.



PROGRAM NOTES

O Radiant Dawn is an original composition by James MacMillan, a Scottish classical composer. This song is about an ultimate hope in faith, longing for eternal light and affirming the light in the land of darkness and death.

Jonathan Dove, an English composer, wrote *In Beauty May I Walk* in 2001, adapting the Navajo Indian prayer. Throughout the composition, a six-note melody with the words, "in beauty may I walk," repeats in all voices in different rhythmic values creating delicate harmonic dissonances and rhythmic complexity, therefore helping the audience to feel a mysterious self-awareness as a whole being: "with beauty before me, with beauty behind me, with beauty above me, with beauty all around me. It is finished in beauty, ah!"

How Can I Keep from Singing is an American folk hymn written by Baptist minister Robert Wadsworth Lowry. Kirby Shaw's arrangement adds an inspiring spirit to the song with a syncopated and recurring rhythmic pattern and jazzy harmony. The core message of the song is that "through the tumult and the strife I hear that music ringing...in my soul." That's why we keep singing even in these dark times.

Idumea is a shape note hymn from the American Sacred Harp. This traditional shape note singing originated in colonial New England but has been preserved through the American frontier and rural south, where the four-part hymns and anthems were used in community revivals and camp meetings. The original versions of this music were written with specific note heads depicting the interval from the key pitch. Richard Bjella matches David Ananias' tune seamlessly with Charles Wesley's chilling text of what lies beyond death, not out of fear but out of confident anticipation.

Elaine Hagenberg's **To Thee My Heart I Offer** is an English translation of the 17th Century Christmas text, *Mein Herz will ich dir schenken*. This text affirms the Christian dedication of themselves to the Christ-child. Hagenberg's setting captures the awe and appreciation of Christ's birth and highlights the meaning of the Christmas story.

Stacey Gibbs has earned a reputation of arranging traditional spirituals in exceptional quality. **Get Away Jordan** is no exception to his great work. The colorful harmony and driving rhythmic force carry the same effect as the command "Get Away, Jordan", as the text is calling for a separation of the Jordan River, as they are ready to cross over to meet the Lord in the Promised Land.

Where Was the Show? is a powerful collaborative work that answers the question that has been on the hearts and minds of performers and audiences across the globe. Over the past year and a half, the pandemic put many plans, practices, and performances on hold and created a longing for the thrill only live performances can provide. This performance will be sure to bring you to the edge of your seat. Ladies and gents, this is the moment you've waited for!

Shalom is a tender, comforting ode to the power of wishing good-will and peace in our world. Forrest's beautifully simple melody gently unfolds with the text "Peace I leave with you, peace I give to you, not as the world gives; do not be afraid." The Hebrew word for peace, "Shalom," builds in the refrain over an elegant piano that ebbs and flows and a violin solo that perfectly captures the beauty of peace.

Svadba is a traditional Bulgarian folk hymn often sung at weddings. This piece offers a glimpse into the mindset of the lover's anxiety of the big day as the partner and the festively adorned wedding party approaches.

How Can I Cry? honors the cultures and individuals who have defied oppression and changed lives by raising their voices in song. This piece forces us to ask ourselves what songs we are singing and more importantly, why are we singing them. The text "tomorrow and justice" refers to South African freedom songs, while the phrase "sister singing songs of their pain" refers to laments of the Balkans. This heavy piece is about singing for those who cannot sing for themselves or who have been silenced in the face of oppression.

We Need a Word is a moving, soulful piece that addresses the longing for peace and love during hard times in our lives. The first verse explores a personal search for peace and love while the second verse explores the desire to project that same peace and love onto the world.

I Have Had Singing is a reflection of an eighty-five-year-old plowman's difficult child-hood memory. The introduction of the printed music notes, "I never did any playing in all my life. There was nothing in my childhood, only work. I never had the pleasure." But the composition concludes with these words, "There was so much singing then...and this was my pleasure too. I have had singing." This song will bring your fond memories of your childhood back, no matter how tough or cheerful.

Love Make the World Go Round is a charity single recorded by Lin-Manuel Miranda and Jennifer Lopez in response to the Orlando nightclub shooting on July 12, 2016. Released exclusively on iTunes in July of that year, all proceeds from the hit single were donated to the Hispanic Federation's Somos Orlando fund, which provided resources to the victims of that shooting. The song features both pop and social Latin dance grooves, while the lyrics call for understanding, compassion, unity, and love.

We Rise Again was written by Leon Dubinsky, a songwriter from Sydney, Nova Scotia, for a 1984 stage musical titled *The Rise and Follies of Cape Breton*, as an anthem of resilience and hope at a time when Cape Breton Island was going through an economic crisis. Stephen Smith's arrangement will bring you on a wild ride of ocean waves in a rare and natural balance between the dramatic melody and sensitive harmony, therefore, signifying the theme of this concert: WE RISE AGAIN!

Antonio Vivaldi's *Gloria* in D major is one of his best-known sacred works. The setting of the Gloria text begins with the Gospel of Luke's recounting of the words of the angels: "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to men of good will." This first movement is full of bright and triumphant exclamation. The seventh movement, "Domine Fili," is full of interwoven rhythmic phrases affirming the Jesus is the Son of God. The final movement, "Cum Sancto Spiritu," presents the closing and Amen in a grand double-fugue.

JUDGES' BIOGRAPHIES

Jay Villela holds degrees from the Eastman School of Music and Yale University where he studied with James Thompson and Allan Dean, respectively. He was a recipient of a full scholarship, the Sidney Mear trumpet award, and a Performer's Certificate from Eastman. He has studied with trumpet players affiliated with the Cleveland Orchestra, the Metropolitan Opera, Philadelphia Orchestra, Montreal Symphony, Pittsburgh Symphony, and Atlanta Symphony. He has performed in masterclasses for Clément Saunier, Jeroen Berwaerts, Thomas Stevens, Gabriele Cassone, Marco Blaauw, Ed Carroll, Stephen Burns, Paul Merkelo, Ray Mase, Jim Ross, and Kevin Cobb. Jay was a fellow at the Aspen Music Festival in Colorado and has performed at the music festivals in Chautauqua, NY and Norfolk, CT. He has instructed dozens of students of all levels and coached musical groups and classrooms in several states. He is currently 2nd trumpet of the Youngstown Symphony and an adjunct professor of music at Chatham University in Pittsburgh.


Jack Cozen Harel joined the faculty of the Cleveland Institute of Music in 2011. Active as a soloist and chamber musician, Harel has been recognized with numerous awards including Best Classical Soloist by Downbeat Magazine, winner of the Baroness Leni Fe Bland Competition, winner of the Yamaha Young Performing Artist Competition and the Guinness World Record for "Fastest Oboe Playing." Harel began his professional career at age 18 as principal oboist of the San Francisco Sinfonietta. He has also performed with the Jerusalem Symphony Orchestra and has served as oboe teaching artist for the Los Angeles Philharmonic. Harel is the solo oboist of the Solaris Quintet and associate professor of oboe at The University of Akron. Harel holds degrees from the San Francisco Conservatory of Music, Northwestern University and the Colburn School, where he was the first oboist ever accepted into the prestigious conservatory program. His teachers include John de Lancie, James Moore, William Bennett, Grover Schiltz and Allan Vogel.

David Bowlin has led a wide-ranging career as a soloist and chamber musician, garnering critical acclaim for his performances of a broad spectrum of classical and contemporary repertoire. First-prize winner of the Washington International Competition, he has performed as a soloist across the United States and Europe. His performances include dozens of premieres, including violin concertos written for him by Marcos Balter and Alexandra Hermentin and premiered at Lincoln Center's Mostly Mozart Festival and Carnegie Hall's Weill Recital Hall. Bowlin joined the Oberlin Conservatory faculty in 2007. In the summer, he teaches on the faculties of the Kneisel Hall Chamber Music Festival and the Bowdoin International Music Festival. Former students have won positions with the Chicago Lyric Opera, Milwaukee Symphony, Berlin Radio Symphony, Ensemble Modern, Komishe Oper Berlin, San Diego Symphony, New World Symphony, and Orchestra NOW, among others. Bowlin is a graduate of the Oberlin Conservatory of Music, the Juilliard School, and Stony Brook University, where he studied with Pamela Frank, Ronald Copes, Philip Setzer, Ani Kavafian, and Roland and Almita Vamos.

PROGRAM NOTES

La Procession du Rocio was given its premiere in Madrid in 1913. Every year in Seville, during the month of June, there is a festival in a section of the city known as Triana, called the Procession of the Dew, in which the best families participate. They make their entry in their coaches following an image of the Virgin Mary on a golden cart drawn by oxen and accompanied by music. The people dance the soleare and the seguidilla. A drunkard sets off firecrackers, adding to the confusion. At the sound of the flutes and drums, which announce the procession, all dancing ceases. A religious theme is heard and breaks forth, mingling with the pealing of the church bells and the strains of the royal march. The procession passes, and, as it recedes, the festivities resume, but at length, they fade away.

Composer Joaquín Turina (1882-1949) was a native of Spain but was influenced early in his career by the impressionistic harmonies of Debussy and Ravel while studying in Paris. Upon returning to Spain, he drew inspiration from Spanish folk music, with *La Procession du Rocio* becoming one of his best-known works. Alfred Reed's marvelous transcription created in 1962 remains an enduring staple in the repertoire for wind bands.

For as long as I can remember I've been involved in choral music. As a young student, I spent countless hours singing, rehearsing, accompanying, and conducting choirs. The lasting impact this had on my music cannot be overstated; so much of the way I compose is from the vantage point of the singer. Equally important to my musical upbringing, particularly in high school and in my early college years, is the time I spent immersed with wind ensembles. Some of my earliest compositions were written for my high school band.

The result is that I internalized a significant portion of the choral and band literature from a young age. In many ways, **A Solemn Place** is the converging of these two worlds at their greatest common denominator: breath.

In January 2013, I completed *O Magnum Mysterium*, an unaccompanied choral work, commissioned by my friend and long-time supporter Robert Gehrenbeck for his Whitewater Chamber Singers at the University of Wisconsin. At the

suggestion of John Lynch, to whom I owe much, I transcribed this choral piece for wind ensemble. A Solemn Place received its world premiere on October 31, 2013, by the Sydney Conservatorium Wind Symphony under John's direction.

As with much of my music, a seamless quality permeates the work. Though the harmony alternates between passages of tonal stability and those of transition, there is no pause, no complete cadence, for the four minutes of the piece. While the music begins mysteriously and ends triumphant, it is the exploration between these two destinations that I find compelling. To experience this piece is to be continuously in the moment, not completely aware of what lies ahead or where the piece may lead, until the final chord.

Though A Solemn Place and the initial choral work on which it is based do not share the same title, the contemplative, spiritual nature is preserved in the wind band adaptation. Both versions are dedicated to a great teacher and friend, Mary Anthony Cox.

I played trombone in wind ensembles from the 4th grade through college. This experience has contributed significantly to the life I lead now. I had the pleasure of being exposed to sounds, colors, moods, rhythms, and melodies from all over the world. Curiously absent, however, was music told authentically from the African-American experience. In particular, I couldn't understand how it was that no composer ever thought to tell the story of a black worship experience through the lens of a wind ensemble. I realize now that a big part of this was an issue of representation. One of the joys and honors of writing music for wind ensemble is that I get to write music that I wish had existed when I was playing in these groups -- music that told the story of the black experience via black composers. I am so grateful to Dr. Tony Marinello and the Illinois State University Wind Symphony for leading an incredible consortium that brought this piece to life. I can't tell you how much I'm looking forward to hanging with Tony and the group for a week in about a month's time!

Come Sunday is a two-movement tribute to the Hammond organ's central role in black worship services. The first movement, *Testimony*, follows the Hammond organ as it readies the congregation's hearts, minds, and spirits to receive The Word via a magical union of Bach, blues, jazz, and R&B. The second movement, *Shout!*, is a virtuosic celebration -- the frenzied and joyous climactic moment(s) when The Spirit has taken over the service. The title is a direct nod to Duke Ellington, who held an inspired love for classical music and allowed it to influence his own work in a multitude of ways. To all the black musicians in wind ensemble who were given opportunity after opportunity to celebrate everyone else's music but our own -- I see you and I am you. This one's for the culture!

Three Brothers (1951)

Michael Colgrass (1932-2019)

Michael Colgrass' first musical experiences were as a jazz drummer in the Chicago area (1944-49). In 1954 he graduated from the University of Illinois in music performance and composition, studying percussion with Paul Price. *Three Brothers* was the first percussion ensemble piece written by Michael Colgrass in Urbana, Illinois, where it received its first performance by the University of Illinois Percussion Ensemble in 1951. This was Colgrass's first composition. In his words, "*Three Brothers* is a drum solo that I had been developing for five years as a jazz drummer and soloist...the title is inspired by Woody Herman's 1940's composition *Four Brothers*, which featured four saxophonists."

Colgrass attended a percussion ensemble concert directed by Paul Price, who first introduced the percussion ensemble in American college curricula, at the University of Illinois in 1950. Price had invited Colgrass to attend the concert in an attempt to further engage him as a student, and after seeing the concert, Colgrass told Mr. Price "the playing was excellent but the music was terrible." Price challenged him to compose a work for the ensemble and *Three Brothers*, soon became a percussion classic.

The composer studied composition with Darius Milhaud, Lukas Foss, and Eugene Weigel. In addition, Mr. Colgrass won the Pulitzer Prize in 1978 for his composition Déja Vu for percussion quartet and orchestra. Colgrass died on July 2, 2019 and tonight's performance is dedicated to his great contribution to the world of percussion.

Rumba Clave (1989)

Roberto Vizcaino (b. 1959)

Featuring Owen Davis & Jo'El Harrison

Roberto Vizcaino Guillot is an adjunct professor at two of Cuba's leading institutions for higher music education - the Instituto Superior de Arte and the Amadeo Roldan School of Music, both based in Havana. He is a member of the faculty of traveling professors who teach in foreign countries through the Instituto Superior de Arte of Havana, Cuba. He began his musical studies at the "Escuela de Nievel Elemental Alejandro Gracia Caturla" interesting himself in the knowledge of the percussion world. He continued his studies at the Amadeo Roldan School of Music. As a percussionist he has worked with outstanding musicians such as Clark Terry, Luis Perico Ortiz, Peter Erskine and Dizzy Gillespie. He joined the group "Diakara" which accompanies the singer/composer Silvio Rodriguez.

Rumba clave is an asymmetric 5-note rhythmic pattern that is typically repeated and serves as the foundation (clave translates as "key" in Spanish) of much Afro-Cuban folkloric music especially the rumba, and various popular dance styles since the 1960's such as mozambique, songo, and timba. Although the rumba clave rhythm also serves a central organizing function in this piece, it is only heard once in its original form, near the end, where it is played in unison.

Javier Alvarez explains, the seminal idea for *Metro Chabacano* came from an earlier piece, *Cancion*, for string orchestra in 1986. Having heard a recording of that piece, my friends from the Cuarteto Latinamericano insisted that I should do a version for string quartet. In 1990, the sculptor Marcos Limenez approached me with the idea to use *Cancion* to accompany one of his kinetic installations, which was to be on display in one of Mexico City's busiest subway stations *Metro Chabacano*, and this provided the perfect motivation for me to revise the piece for the quartet and the first performance took place in 1991. *Metro Chabacano* has a continuous eighth-note movement from which short melodic solos emerge from each instrument. The repeated notes give a false sense of simplicity; although the rhythms, accents, and melodic fragments are intricately playful.

I first heard a transcription of this work performed by the renowned Mexican percussion group Tambuco, at the 2019 Percussive Arts Society International Convention in Indianapolis, Indiana. Note by Glenn Schaft

Meccanico from Trio Per Uno (1995/99)

Nebojsa Jovan Živković (b. 1962)

Meccanico is the first movement of the three-movement work. The outer movements possess similarities in manner and appear as if they would present a perfection of wildness in an archaic ritual cult. The second movement has its own special lyric and contemplative mood and serves as an isle of quietness between two volcanoes, in both atmosphere and instrumentation. This music expresses the principle: three bodies – one soul.

Hailed by the critics as one of the most unique and expressive marimba and percussion artists in the field today, Nebojsa Jovan Zivkovic has greatly influenced the international percussion scene during the last three decades – as both a masterful composer and virtuoso performer. A native from Serbia, Zivkovic completed his master's degrees in composition, music theory and percussion in Mannheim and Stuttgart, Germany, where he has resided since 1980. Currently based in Vienna , Austria, he tours throughout Europe, and performs frequently in the USA, Japan, Taiwan, Korea, Latin America, Russia and Scandinavian countries. Zivkovic performed in such prestigious venues as Vienna's "Konzerthaus", National Recital Hall Taipei, Munich's Herkulessaal, St. Petersburg's Eremitage Theatre, or Stockholm's Nybrokajen. He was also guest of the number of Festivals such as Gaudeamus Amsterdam, Schleswig-Holstein Musikfestival, Dance-in-your-head, Minneapolis, USA and several times at PASIC (Percussive Arts Society International Convention) in USA.

The Downfall of Paris

Traditional ca. 1790, Arr. Glenn Schaft (2021)

YSU Percussion Ensemble and Fall 2021 Percussion Methods Class

This past summer it occurred to me to write an arrangement of an old percussion standard - *The Downfall of Paris*. I first played this classic rudimental snare drum piece in about 1970, while in fifth grade. I have used it in my teaching since the late 1970's and wished to compose timpani, bass drum, cymbals, tambourine,

and triangle parts to accompany the traditional fife melody played tonight by marimbas, xylophones, and vibraphone.

My plan was to have my percussion majors and our percussion methods students (music education majors whose principal instruments are other than percussion) perform together in one mass collaboration, where we could rotate parts and learn how all the parts fit together.

"Forms Of Things Unknown" reflects my contemplation of the artistic possibilities inherent within various dichotomies, including pitched and "non-pitched" percussion, strict notation and improvisation, metal and wood, sticks and hands, harmony/melody and rhythm, loud and soft, tradition and innovation, cerebral and visceral, and space and time. A wide variety of music and artists are reflected and referenced in the piece, including ritual music of Northern Brazil, the Congo, and Egypt; global percussionists including Glen Velez and Nana Vasconcelos; jazz vibraphone artists such as Dave Samuels, David Friedman, Gary Burton, and Mike Manieri; the Minimalism of Terry Riley and Steve Reich; and seminal percussion works by Western composers including lannis Xenakis, John Cage, and Toru Takemitsu.
