H.I.F. Biber's most famous compositions are the *Rosenkranzsonaten*, fifteen sonatas for *scordatura* (re-tuned) violin and *basso continuo*, each representing a different mystery of the Rosary. The collection concludes with an unrelated *Passacaglia* (a kind of triple-meter dance with repeated descending tetrachord) for solo violin. I have transposed this piece downward to fit the range of the cello, but otherwise left it unchanged.

Certain styles of contemporary classical music can be a challenge for uninitiated listeners. Remains (Hecho en México) does not strive to be "beautiful" in the traditional sense, but I find it fascinating in its carefully controlled timbral development, as it morphs into new shapes and shifts colors. The accompaniment consists of pre-recorded cellos, with deliberate lo-fi "glitches" built into the tape part. I commissioned this piece from my friend Édgar in 2010 and premiered it in Morelia the following year.

#### BIOGRAPHY.

Born in Warren, Ohio, in 1991, Christopher Mrofchak began his guitar studies as a young child with his father. Mrofchak's formal studies continued at the Dana School of Music of Youngstown State University under the direction of François Fowler. He received several awards at YSU, including the Dana School of Music Talent Scholarship and 2nd prize at the James Stroud All-Ohio guitar competition. Mrofchak went on to study with world-renowned pedagogue Bruce Holzman at Florida State University. While working as a teaching assistant to Professor Holzman, Mrofchak placed in several competitions, including the Southern Guitar Festival and Competition, the Troy University Guitar Competition, the University of Louisville Guitar Festival and Competition, and the Indiana International Guitar Festival and Competition. In 2019, Christopher was selected as one of fifteen

guitarists worldwide to compete in the prestigious Parkening International Guitar Competition. He has performed in many cities in the United States, including Akron, Beverly Hills, Bloomington, Cleveland, Columbia, Columbus, Gainesville, Louisville, Malibu, Pittsburgh, Tallahassee, Warren, and Youngstown. Besides his soloist activities, Mrofchak concertizes as part of the Fowler/Mrofchak Guitar Duo with François Fowler. Mrofchak has been an active teacher by establishing the classical guitar at the North Florida String Festival with Dr. Kasia Bugaj and working with students at Mason's School of Music, Chipola College, and Florida State University. In addition to local teaching activities, Mrofchak has taught masterclasses at the Troy University Guitar Festival. He earned his Doctorate of Music at Florida State University in 2021.

Guitarist François Fowler has given recitals in the United States. Canada and Mexico, including concerts in Akron, Albany, Auburn, Beloit (OH), Canton, Cincinnati, Cleveland, Columbus (OH), Columbus (GA), Dayton, Denver, Grand Rapids, Hagerstown, Hartford, Jekyll Island, Kennesaw, Los Angeles, Montreal (Canada), Monterrey (Mexico), Ottawa (Canada), Pittsburgh, Rochester, Saluda (NC), San Jose, Sauble Beach (Canada), Seattle, Spartanburg, Springfield (IL), Syracuse, Tallahassee, Tampa, Tifton, Virginia Beach, Williamsburg, and Youngstown. Fowler is the recipient of national and international prizes including finalist in the 2001 Guitar Foundation of America (GFA) International Guitar Competition. A faculty member at the Dana School of Music (Youngstown State University, Ohio), he maintains an active guitar studio and coaches guitar ensembles. Dr. Fowler's students have been prizewinners in competitions and have been offered full scholarships and graduate teaching assistantships to attend graduate music programs including Columbus State University (Georgia), Florida State University, Indiana University Bloomington, the University of Cincinnati, and Youngstown State University. Fowler obtained his undergraduate degree from the University of Ottawa, Canada, where he studied with Ed Honeywell, and his Doctorate from Florida State University where he was a teaching assistant to the renowned pedagogue, Professor Bruce Holzman. François performs on a Thomas Humphrey guitar with D'Addario Strings, his compositions and arrangements are published by Clear Note Publications, and his recordings are released by CBC records, Canadian Music Center, Clear Note,

Novalis, and independently. His latest CD Sonata features music by C.P.E. Bach, J.S. Bach, Agustin Barrios, Gregorio Huet, and Domenico Scarlatti. Fowler is also a founding member of Duo Allant with flutist Kathryn Thomas Umble, as well as the Fowler/Mrofchak Guitar Duo with Christopher Mrofchak.

#### PROGRAM NOTES

As an Indonesian pianist trained in the Western Classical music traditions, I have always been drawn to the French repertoire. I believe it is partly because Twentieth-century French music imbeds the colors and soundscape of the gamelan–musical tradition that is deeply ingrained in my native cultural heritage.

In 1889, French composer Claude Debussy heard a Javanese Gamelan orchestra performed at the World's Fair in Paris. This exposure to new instruments and musical language led to Debussy's unique musical style and the birth of the Impressionism period in Western Music tradition. Both Kamal and Sjukur's musical training included time in Paris in the 1960s.







#### **LUCAS BEAVER**

Lucas Beaver is a Secondary Instrumental Music Teacher in the North Hills School District, where he teaches Middle School and High School Concert Bands and serves as Assistant Marching Band Director. Beaver is a 2017 graduate of Duquesne University and holds a Master of Music in Music Education graduate degree from Kent State University.

During his time at Duquesne, he studied bassoon with Philip Pandolfi of the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra. He also studied wind band conducting with Dr. Robert Cameron, earning the opportunity to rehearse and conduct the University Wind Ensembles in numerous concerts. Upon graduation, Beaver was the recipient of the PMEA-SMTE Award for Excellence in Service.

While at North Hills, he has conducted the North Hills High School Wind Ensemble at the 2019 PMEA/NAfME Eastern Division conference, 2020 Music for All National Concert Band Festival, and for the upcoming 2022 PMEA State Conference. He is also the recipient of two Citations of Excellence awarded by the National Band Association.

Outside of school, Beaver maintains a private bassoon studio, and is an organist and cantor at St. Raphael the Archangel Parish in Pittsburgh, PA. He is an active member of NAfME, PMEA, and a lifetime member of the Pi Kappa Lambda Music Honors Society, and he currently serves as President of the Allegheny Valley Band Association.

#### MICHAEL S. BUTLER

Michael S. Butler is Director of Bands and Associate Professor of Music in the Dana School of Music at Youngstown State University. He conducts the wind ensemble and orchestra, leads the graduate wind conducting program, and oversees all aspects of the university's band and orchestra program. He also serves as music director for the YSU Youth Orchestra.

Prior to his appointment at YSU, Dr. Butler served as the Director of Bands for six years at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point where the Symphonic Wind Ensemble was recognized twice by CBDNA as one of the finest small university wind ensembles in the nation, first in 2017 and second in 2019. The ensemble was also selected through blind peer review to perform at the 2019 Wisconsin Chapter of the National Band Association Conference in Eau Claire. Before teaching at UWSP, he had a multitude of experiences that included teaching and conducting at the University of Florida, serving as the Associate Director of Bands & Orchestra at Spruce Creek High School, and the Director of Bands at William R. Boone High School. Ensembles under his leadership flourished and received invitations to perform at the Florida Music Educators Conference and the prestigious Carnegie Hall.

#### ALEX KAMINSKY

Alex Kaminsky was appointed Director of Bands and Associate Professor of Music at VanderCook College of Music in 2019 after a highly successful tenure at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, FL. Previous to that, Kaminsky led the band programs at Buchholz High School, Lincoln High School, Auburndale High School, and Cocoa Beach Jr/Sr High School, all of which excelled under his direction. Throughout his 30-year career as a high school band director, Kaminsky's ensembles consistently earned Superior ratings at all levels of evaluation. In addition to earning straight Superior ratings at the Florida Bandmasters Association (FBA) State Concert Band Assessment beginning in 1997 for an unprecedented 21 years (the last 11 years with both his first and second bands), he is the only director in the history of the FBA to have had three concert bands from one school earn straight Superior ratings at State, which he achieved three times (2009, 2018, and 2019).

Kaminsky's high school bands performed at the Midwest Clinic (2005, 2009, 2014, and 2018), ABA National Convention (2014), CBDNA/NBA Southern Division Conference (2004 and 2014), FMEA State Conference (2014), Music for All National Concert Band Festival (2002 and 2012), and the National Wind Band Festival at Carnegie Hall (2009 and 2018). In 2018, the Stoneman Douglas Wind Symphony was named a Mark of Excellence National Wind Band Honors winner as one of only ten 6A bands in the nation. His marching bands consistently placed in the Florida Marching Band State Championship Finals, twice winning consecutive FMBC State Championships (2013 and 2014, 2017 and 2018) as well as being named a finalist band at BOA regional competitions.

Kaminsky is a Conn-Selmer Educational Clinician, an elected member of the prestigious American Bandmasters Association and the American School Band Directors' Association, and also holds memberships in CBDNA, NBA, NAfME, and Phi Beta Mu. He has served on many state and national committees, and currently serves on the ABA Sousa/Ostwald Award Committee and the ABA School Bands Task Force. Kaminsky is a National Board-Certified Teacher and has been featured in several periodicals including The Instrumentalist, Teaching Music, Halftime Magazine, School Band & Orchestra Magazine's "50 Directors Who Make A Difference" and Home Magazine's "12 Exceptional Educators."

#### LEN LAVELLE

Len Lavelle is Director of Bands at North Hills High School in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, and also serves as the Music Department Curriculum Leader. He has taught instrumental music from the elementary through the college level and served as conductor of the Three Rivers Young Peoples Orchestra Wind Symphony. In the last decade, Lavelle's bands have been featured at the Music for All National Concert Band Festival, the PMEA All-State

Convention 5 times, and NAfME All-East Convention 4 times, all in different years. He has been recognized with the Citation of Excellence from both the Pennsylvania Music Educators Association and the National Band Association, and has served as a guest conductor and clinician for school and honor groups and at all levels. Lavelle has presented at various conferences, been interviewed for *The Instrumentalist*, and is a founding board member of SLAM, the Servant Leadership Association for Music Education. Since returning to his alma mater, enrollment in the marching band and orchestra programs have nearly doubled. Both are at historical highs while school enrollment is at its historical low. He lives in North Hills with his wife Sarah, who is the Director of Orchestras at North Allegheny High School, and their two daughters Grace (clarinet, voice, and piano) and Annie (horn, clarinet, and piano).

#### THOMAS M. RUGGIERI

An alumnus of Boardman High School and the Boardman Bands, Thomas Ruggieri is in his twenty-second year as only the fourth director in the history of the Band. Prior to this, he taught for two years in Liberty and for eight years at Youngstown's East High School and North Junior High. He began his teaching career with a half-year service with the Boardman Band.

He graduated from Youngstown State University with a bachelor's degree in music education in 1988, and from Marygrove College with master's degree in 2004. Ruggieri is a member of the National Association for Music Education and the Ohio Music Education Association.

He is honored to have been a five-time quarter-finalist for the GRAMMY Music Educator Award. Over 30,000 nominations come in from across the country every February. The Foundation and selection committee narrow the list to about 200 quarterfinalists each year. Ruggieri was a quarter-finalist for the inaugural award in 2014 and advanced to the same level for the 2016, 2017, 2019, and 2020 awards.

As a performer, he is a free-lance drummer/percussionist in the area. He is a member of the WD Packard Concert Band, the Big Band Sound of Packard, and the Packard Dixieland Band.

#### **GLENN SCHAFT**

Glenn Schaft is Professor and Director of Percussion Studies at Youngstown State University, performs with the Faculty Jazz Group, is founder and faculty advisor of the Youngstown Percussion Collective, a student organization, and is a longstanding member of the Percussive Arts Society. #### ABOUT THE BOARDMAN HIGH SCHOOL BAND PROGRAM

Band has been part of the Boardman Schools since 1926. The Boardman Bands have had only four directors in that time. Thomas Ruggieri, an alumnus of the Band, took over in 1999 when Thomas A. Groth retired.

The 160-member Boardman Spartan Marching Band remains the most visible aspect of the instrumental music program. The non-competitive show band performs regularly at high-profile band venues across the country. It has appeared in the Tournament of Roses Parade, the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade, the Citrus Bowl Parade, the Chicago Thanksgiving Parade, the Indianapolis 500 Parade, and the NYC Veterans Day Parade, America's Thanksgiving Parade in Detroit, and the Gatlinburg "Fantasy of Lights" Parade to name just a few. The marching band rehearses as a complete group daily as part of the school schedule throughout the fall marching season.

In November, the group splits into two concert bands. The Wind Ensemble and Symphonic Band have had great success at OMEA District Large Group Events over the past several years. The Wind Ensemble has been selected to perform at the OMEA State Conference. It holds the distinction of being one of the first high school bands to perform at Carnegie Hall.

The Boardman Jazz Program is equally impressive with two complete jazz ensembles that meet daily as part of the school schedule and a pop/rock band that rehearses after school. The groups have performed regularly at famous jazz clubs in Ohio, Pennsylvania, and New York City. Jazz Ensemble 1 has been an opening act for Gordon Goodwin's Big Phat Band and the Buddy Rich Big Band. Guest artists at the annual BHS Jazz Fest include Bernie Dresel, Roger Ingram, Mike Tomaro, Andy Martin, and Eric Marienthal.

Band, Jazz, Orchestra, and Chorus at Boardman High School have earned it GRAMMY Signature School status. They have also repeatedly led to Boardman being listed as one of the 100 Best Communities for Music Education.

#### ABOUT THE NORTH HILLS HIGH SCHOOL BAND PROGRAM

The North Hills Bands have a long and storied history. At the center of the program are our concert bands. The North Hills Wind Ensemble (formerly Symphony Band) has been featured at conventions around the country including the Midwest Convention (six times), the National Concert Band Festival, the MENC/NAfME All-Eastern Convention (nine times), and the PMEA State Convention (fifteen times). The bands were awarded the Sudler Flag of Honor from the John Philip Sousa Foundation as part of the inaugural group in 1983. Guest soloists, conductors and clinicians have included over the years William Revelli, Arthur Fieldler, Arnald Gabriel,

Vaclav Nelhybel, Alfred Reed, Allen Vizzutti, Urbie Green, Fred Hemke, Louis Bellison, Stephen Gage, Fred Allen, Tim Lautzenheiser, Timothy Mahr, Stephen Peterson, Scott Tobias, Scott Rush, and Peter Boonshaft, among many others. Most recently, the program was recognized by the National Band Association as a Program of Excellence and was awarded the American Prize in the High School Band Division.

The North Hills Marching Band is a traditional, "Big Ten" style marching band. A completely extra-curricular ensemble, the band strives to support the community and entertain audiences as the band performs numerous different shows each season. The band has performed in the Presidential Inaugural Parade, Chicago St. Patrick's Day Parade, New York City St. Patrick's Day Parade, Washington D.C. Cherry Blossom Parade, NFL, MLB and NCAA games and on Main Street of Walt Disney World. The North Hills School District has adopted the marching band's motto of "Pride, Tradition and Excellence."

The North Hills High School Bands have maintained an annual commission series since 1965, making it the longest-running series of its kind in the United States. Through the support of the North Hills Instrumental Parents Association, the series has resulted in the creation of over 50 works for band. Works from the series have been recorded by the Tokyo Kosei Wind Orchestra with Frederick Fennel conducting, D.C. service bands, the University of North Texas Wind Symphony, and college ensembles throughout the country. They have been featured in the series, *Teaching Music Through Performance in Band*, and the series is references in the Meredith Music publication, *The New Winds of Change*. Recent composers have included Michael Daugherty, Philip Sparke, Julie Giroux, Dana Wilson, Timothy Mahr, Jack Stamp, and Jack Frerer.

The bands extend our gratitude to our former directors, Mr. James Caruso (1946-1960), Mr. Warren Mercer (1961-1992), Ms. Areta Kalogeras (marching band, 1989-2008), and Mr. David Matthews (1992-2011).

#### ABOUT THE YSU PERCUSSION ENSEMBLE

Notable YSU Percussion Ensemble performances include the Percussive Arts Society 2018 International Convention in Indianapolis, Percussive Arts Society Ohio Chapter Days of Percussion at Capital University, Ohio Northern University, Youngstown State University, and Ohio Music Education Association Conferences in Cleveland, Columbus, and Cincinnati.

An important part of our mission involves collaborations with composers in the commissioning, premiering, and critically acclaimed recording of their works. Our 2005 release "Dark Wood" includes six premiere recordings and commissions. Our commission project with New York

City-based percussionist/composer John Hollenbeck on his "Ziggurat" for

The group has released a total of seven professionally produced and critically acclaimed CDs.



Individually, we are Saul, Aron and Alvaro Bitran, and Javier Montiel. Together, we are known as the Cuarteto Latinoamericano. Our audiences have lots of questions about us. For example, whether that big case that we carry with us is a *guitarrón*.

No, it's a cello. And we are not a mariachi band; we don't play with ponchos or guitars, despite what many people ask. We know that our name may be a bit misleading, but there are reasons for it: not only do we hail from Latin America, but mainly, we have made an almost forty-year-long career by mostly playing concert music by composers from countries South of the Rio Bravo. This music "the music of our continent" is as varied as its culture, its geography, its food and history. Some of these composers undoubtedly draw from Latin America's rich popular music tradition, while others write music that sounds universal, and could have been written anywhere in the world. Having said that, it does seem that a lot of the Latin American repertoire prominently features rhythm (or so we are told). But in any case, our only criterion for selecting our Latin American repertoire is its artistic quality.

Of course, like any budding string quartet, in the distant year of 1982 in Mexico City, we started with Mozart, Beethoven, Brahms, Borodin, Ravel, etc. But soon thereafter we began to discover the wonderful repertoire awaiting us in our own neck of the woods and, in parallel, we found out that it was very much appreciated in different parts of the world. This is how this music, which we have recorded on over 80 CDs, has gotten us many awards, such as two Latin Grammys, multiple Grammy nominations, and the coveted Diapason d'Or in France, among others and has brought us to renowned halls such as the Teatro alla Scala in Milan, Carnegie Hall, the Concertgebouw and other marvelous concert venues in Israel, China, Japan, New Zealand, and practically all of Europe and the Americas.

This is how, until this very day we continue to travel the world with our beloved scores by Villa-Lobos, Revueltas, Ginastera, Piazzolla and many other great Latin American masters in our briefcases. Sometimes we wonder ourselves how it is even possible to have lasted for so many years together. We think we owe this to several factors, not least among them good luck. A musician's career is fragile by nature, as it is totally dependent on the performer's good health. When multiplied by four, this situation turns even more delicate. Thus, fate has been generous with us, not to mention other very relevant issues: the love for what we do, having incredibly supportive families, the affection amongst us four and, last but not least, the sense of humor with which we approach our career and especially our travels, which delight us with plenty of hilarious and absurd situations.

Equally important for our long career has been the support we have received from many institutions which we cannot thank enough. In particular, we are indebted to Mexico's National Fund for Culture and Art (FONCA), which has supported us uninterruptedly since 2004 through its Mexico en Escena grant. We are also thrilled with our teaching activities at the multiple music schools, universities and conservatories with which we collaborate regularly, as well as the numerous international festivals in which we participate year after year. And, undoubtedly, we have been inspired by our collaborations with brilliant artists, such as Janos Starker, Eduardo Mata, Rudolf Buchbinder, Manuel Barrueco, Itamar Golan and many others.

As our fortieth anniversary approaches, we keep traveling around the world. Our hair has become grayer and scarcer, and our instruments seem to weigh a bit more each day. But our desire to keep performing the marvelous Latin American and mainstream string quartet repertoire, and of course the mutual rapport among ourselves, keep us together, full of energy and forever thinking about our next concert. All this seems like a miracle to us, and we feel incredibly lucky and grateful to have made an entire life out of our Cuarteto Latinoamericano.




Robert Casadesus, the renowned French concert pianist, was also a prolific composer. Student of harmony and composition at the Paris Conservatory, Casadesus pursued composition with his performing career. He composed throughout his lifetime. Yet, it is an enigma that Casadesus did not promote his own compositions in public until the 1940s. Thus, his music is still rarely performed today. In quality, these works stand alongside pieces by Poulenc, Prokofiev, Copland, and their contemporaries. His opus also provides another window to the musical time period. This outstanding pianist left not only a legacy in performance, recording, and pedagogy, but also: sixty-eight original works, including seven symphonies, three concerti for solo piano, one concerto for two pianos, one concerto for three pianos, and a large body of duo sonatas and chamber music. Casadesus wrote expressively, revealing a keen understanding of the physical demands and enormous color possibilities of each instrument. This evening's performance of Robert Casadesus' Piano Trio No. 1, Op. 6 is a part of an international tribute to Casadesus, marking the 50th anniversary of his passing (Sept. 19, 1972).

#### **ABOUT THE COMPOSERS**

Praised by the Cape Times as 'highly original,' South African composer **James Wilding's** work has been enthusiastically championed in Zimbabwe, Lesotho, Senegal, Germany, Holland, France, Switzerland, Britain, Canada, South Africa, and the USA. He has received commissions from Bayerischer Rundfunk, the South African Music Rights Organization, the Tuesday Musical Association, and the Orange County School of the Arts. His music has been prescribed for the UNISA-Transnet International Piano Competition and the Hennie Joubert Piano Competition, and he has won the Oude Meester Prize and Potchefstroom University's Chancellor's Trust Prize. Wilding is Professor of Instruction and Co-Chair in Composition and Theory at the University of Akron.

Described by the New York Times as "yearning melody in a rapturous surge," music by **Elliott Bark** (b.1980) has been performed in many venues, such as Stern Auditorium of Carnegie Hall. Elliott, two-time recipient (2012, 2014) of The Korean National Composer Prize, has worked with Cleveland Orchestra, Pacific Symphony, and many others. Elliott received

The music of **Cara Haxo** juxtaposes delicate, sparkly textures with the gritty and the grotesque. Haxo is the winner of the 2022 NWMF Emerging Women Composers Competition. She has received commissions from the May Festival Youth Chorus, Quince Ensemble, and Splinter Reeds. Haxo is currently a Visiting Assistant Professor in Music at The College of Wooster.



#### **BIOGRAPHY**

**Joachim Reinhuber** serves as Professor of Piano at Texas A&M University, Kingsville, and is in high demand as solo and collaborative performer, clinician, and adjudicator in the US and his native Germany. He studied with his grandfather, Franz Calvelli-Adorno, Robert Levin (University of Music, Freiburg), John Perry (Rice University, Houston TX), and Nancy Garrett (University of Texas at Austin).

Recent activities include three performances of Brahms' first piano concerto, Mozart's piano concerto in A major K 488 (with improvised cadenza), the Schumann concerto, Bach's concerto in D minor, Beethoven's first concerto, the Stravinsky concerto for piano and winds, and Gershwin's Rhapsody in Blue with the TAMUK Wind Symphony. In 2012 and 2014 he was the pianist for the Texas Music Educators Association's All-State Men's Choir. 



#### **GUEST ARTIST BIOGRAPHIES.**

A solid fixture of the New York jazz scene and respected world-wide, **Ralph Lalama** embodies the best of the jazz sound ideal – great time, great swing, expressed through great melodic ideas. Everything he says and plays comes out of his deep connection and appreciation for "the Beat." Jazz critic Zan Stewart put it succinctly: "Lalama is a grand, modern-minded storyteller...a first-class jazz soloist." He excels in a chord-less trio format with his amazing command of the harmonic progressions articulated through his horn. But on top of being a great jazz soloist, Lalama is equally a solid veteran of jazz ensembles and orchestras. Over his impressive career starting with Woody Herman, Buddy Rich, and the Mel Lewis Orchestra – now the Vanguard Jazz Orchestra – he has honed the craft of sonic blending. Lalama is a three-time Grammy winner through his work in the Joe Lovano Nonet and the Vanguard Jazz Orchestra. He has nine CDs out as a leader and is on more than sixty recordings as a sideman. He has received praise from

the likes of critics Gary Giddins, Stanley Crouch, Ben Ratliff, Ira Gitler and Stuart Troup, among others. His latest release as a leader is the 2012 "Bop Juice: Ralph Lalama Trio, Live at Smalls." Ralph Lalama's playing reveals an enormous depth of musical heart and knowledge. With his muscular, free-wheeling sound and masterful ability to tell a story through his horn, one understands why he so thoroughly connects with musicians, students and listeners alike. Equipment: Selmer Mark VI Tenor Saxophone; Buffet Crampon Clarinet; Altus Flute.

Praised for her "brilliance and maturity" (The Guardian) Misato Hanawa is invited to give recitals and to participate in festivals in the most prestigious venues all over the world such as the Tokyo Opera City, Ariel Opera House and Mito Art Tower. She is also regularly invited to master classes in Pittsburgh, Columbus and Galipolis. Hanawa performs with numerous orchestras including the Israel Soloist Orchestra, Japan Century Orchestra and Wien Chamber Orchestra. She explores a wide range of repertoires, from the baroque to works by contemporary composers. Her repertoire spans from Saint-Saëns Violin Concerto, to Introduction et Rondo capriccioso. Hanawa graduated with a Gold Medal from the Conservatoire de Cergy-Pontoise, Conservatoire de Cambrai in 2011. She is the winner of several prestigious international competitions. such as the International Music Competition Leopold Bellan, World Music Competition, International Music competition U.F.A.M. and International North Music Competition. She has recorded two CDs: Hommage a Edith Piaf and Rondo Capriccioso by Octavia Record.

**Big Blitz** is a Pittsburgh-based band that was born from the sounds of dance, rock, and jazz improvisation. This trio is comprised of current YSU students Lucas Ciesielski (Baritone and Tenor Sax), Nick Grabigel (Drums and Guitar), and Mason Ciesielski (Tenor Sax and Synthesizers). They are inspired by the sounds of saxophone and percussion-based bands known to busk in the subway stations of New York City. The band writes and performs original music, which contain a spacious, powerful, hip sound. They regularly appear at music festivals and clubs regionally and throughout the country, and have shared the stage with major touring acts including Moon Hooch, Too Many Zooz, and many more. Some of their YouTube videos have garnered several hundred thousand views.

#### **FACULTY BIOGRAPHIES**

**Dr. Glenn Schaft** has performed and recorded with myriad artists throughout diverse idioms including: classical, new music, ballet, opera, modern dance, jazz, pop, rock, blues, funk, fusion, Broadway musicals, Afro-Caribbean, Brazilian, and traditional West African styles. He is an artist endorser with the Zildjian cymbal company, Vic Firth sticks & mallets, Remo drumheads & world percussion, an educational consultant with Black Swamp Percussion, and a member of the Percussive Arts Society where he serves on the Drumset Committee. Schaft is Professor of Music and Director of Percussion Studies at Youngstown State University's Dana School of Music in Ohio where he teaches applied percussion and directs the Percussion Ensemble. He is artist in-residence with the Dana Ensemble, a collective of faculty and freelance colleagues who perform an eclectic blend of contemporary music. He is also the co-founder and faculty advisor of the Youngstown Percussion Collective. percussion.ysu.edu

Dr. Kent Engelhardt holds a BM and MM from Youngstown State University and a MA and PhD from the University of Pittsburgh. He is a member of Phi Kappa Phi, the Society for Ethnomusicology, and Jazz Education Network. Engelhardt is an active performer, composer, arranger, editor, scholar, author, and educator. His Charlie Parker research, including two books, is published by VDM, Oxford University Press, and the IAJE. He can be heard on recordings by Madd For Tadd, Paul Ferguson Jazz Orchestra, Cleveland Jazz Orchestra, and Blossom Festival Band. He is a Conn-Selmer Artist and a Remle/Beechler Representative Artist. Engelhardt was awarded YSU Research Professorships in 2011-2012 for "The 'Head' Arrangements of the Count Basie Orchestra 1937-1939;" in 2012-2013 for "Musical Contextualization of Charlie Parker's Solos with The Jay McShann Orchestra," and Cliffe College re-assigned time in 2013-2014 for "The Music of Tadd Dameron for Harlan Leonard and his Rockets." He received a Research Professorship for 2016-2017 for "Tadd Dameron: The Magic Touch" which was completed for the centennial of Tadd Dameron's birth in Cleveland and performed at the TRI-C Jazz Fest. "Tadd Dameron: The Magic Continues" was recorded by Madd For Tadd on Tighten Up Records and can be heard on most internet music services. Madd For Tadd recorded 22 of Engelhardt's new editions and arrangements of Tadd Dameron's music in January of 2020.

**Dr. James Umble** is Professor of Saxophone at Youngstown State University where he has twice been awarded a *Distinguished Professor Award for Teaching*. He is an internationally recognized teacher, soloist, clinician, chamber musician and author. *Cleveland Plain Dealer* Music Critic Donald Rosenberg wrote that Dr. Umble..."must be one of the most elegant exponents of his instrument...he was virtuosic in every way." Umble has recently presented Guest Artist recitals and clinics at The Hartt School of Music, the University of Florida's International Saxophone Conference on Performance and Pedagogy, Oakland University, the

University of Mississippi, and was a guest clinician at the American Saxophone Institute at The University of Iowa. He regularly presents performances, clinics and lecture recitals at regional and national Conferences of the North American Saxophone Alliance. He also annually presents performances and lectures at the U.S Navy Band Saxophone Symposium. He has been a featured soloist with the U.S. Navy Band in Washington D.C. His many former students are in teaching positions and graduate programs around the country. Umble has a passion for teaching and for creating and incorporating innovative pedagogy in his teaching, particularly on tonal and artistic development. His teachers included Professors Londeix (Bordeaux Conservatory), Sinta (University of Michigan), Sampen (BGSU) and Donald Beckie (SU). He has performed extensively with The Cleveland Orchestra under such conductors as Pierre Boulez, David Zinman, and many others.



An alumnus of Music Academy of the West (Santa Barbara), he has performed in numerous music festivals and masterclasses, including Interlochen Center, Music Academy of the West, Source Song Festival, Hawaii Performing Arts Festival, SongFest, SPLICE Institute, and New Music on the Point. He is currently on the piano faculty of Bay View Music Festival (Petoskey, MI).

He has worked extensively in recitals and masterclasses with renowned artists, such as Warren Jones, Alan Chow, Jonathan Feldman, Margo Garrett, David Geber, Ricky Ian Gordon, Richie Hawley, Martin Katz, JACK Quartet, Miró Quartet, Paul Roberts, Roger Vignoles, and many others.

A strong advocate of new music and technology, Qiang has been commissioning and performing new music written for Piano exclusively. He serves on the Board of Directors and performs regularly with "Onethirteen Composers Collective", a new music organization based in Twin Cities, Minnesota.

Qiang is currently an Associate Professor of Piano at Central State University, (Wilberforce, OH). He holds a Doctor of Musical Arts from the University of Minnesota, a BM and a MM in Piano from Sichuan Conservatory of Music (China) and the University of Washington (Seattle) respectively. His principal teachers include Dr. Timothy Lovelace, Lydia Artymiw, Craig Sheppard, and Dr. Cheng-Gang Yang. He has also worked extensively with Jonathan Feldman and Margo Garrett of the Juilliard School.



#### **BIOGRAPHY**

Kirill Gliadkovsky's performances have been met with great enthusiasm by both audiences and music critics in Europe, Russia and North America. Josef Woodard, a critic at the Los Angeles Times, wrote: "...the intensity and a nicely honed musicality left the audience stunned...enthralling...all in all, a gripping and masterful performance". "Fine dramatic sense... appealing range of emotional effects and pianistic devices...wonderful" writes Fort Worth Star-Telegram; "The most impressive...memorable... deep musician... fine interpretation" - Izvestia (Moscow, Russia).

Since making his first public appearance in Moscow at the age of six, Gliadkovsky has toured extensively on three continents performing piano and organ recitals and as a soloist with orchestras in various cities in Russia, and throughout Europe, Asia and the United States. The venues included Purcell Hall in London, Merkin Hall in New York, Jack Singer Hall in Calgary, Royce Hall in Los Angeles, Orange County Performing Arts Center in Costa

Mesa, CA, Centers for the Arts in Scottsdale and Chandler AZ, National Gallery of Art and Catholic University in Washington, DC, First Congregational Church in Los Angeles, Philharmonic Hall in Poznan, Poland, and many others. He has performed at numerous significant music festivals, such as Aspen, Ventura, Music in the Mountains, Redlands Bowl festivals in the USA, Credomatic Festival in Costa Rica, Orfeo Festival in Italy, and worked with well-known conductors Pierre Boulez, Mehli Mehta, Gordon Johnson, John Farrer, Mischa Semanitzky, Patrick Flynn, among others. He has recorded seven CDs, and his music has been broadcast on both TV and radio.

Gliadkovsky combines his busy concert schedule with teaching at Saddleback College as a Professor of Piano and Director of Keyboard Studies. He had previously been on the piano faculty at USC and Santa Monica College and served as the Head of the Piano Area at Southern Utah University in Cedar City, UT. He has been in demand as a masterclass artist-teacher, guest lecturer and piano adjudicator in piano competitions throughout the United States. His students have won prizes at various piano contests and have been accepted to schools such as USC, UCLA, Manhattan School of Music, Northwestern University, Peabody and San Francisco Conservatories, and others, often with fellowship and scholarship awards. He has given lectures and demonstrations at many music conferences, published an article on artistic pedaling in California Music Teacher Magazine (March 2018) and presented an interview about piano technique. In 2019, he performed and gave masterclasses throughout the United State, and at Orfeo Music Festival in Vipiteno, Italy, he was on the piano artist faculty roster. During 2020, he continued to perform both live and online, to teach masterclasses, adjudicate competitions and make recordings.



#### **BIOGRAPHIES**

Mark Sparks is an American solo flutist, orchestral artist, teacher, and writer. He is the former Principal Flutist of the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra. During his tenure (2000-2021) he served under Music Directors Hans Vonk, David Robertson, and Stéphane Denève, and appeared as soloist with the orchestra numerous times. He has toured and performed with many orchestras, including the New York Philharmonic, the Chicago, Dallas, Bergen Philharmonic, Detroit, Cincinnati, Houston, and Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestras. Prior to his appointment in St. Louis, Sparks served as Associate Principal Flutist of the Baltimore Symphony, Principal Flute of the Memphis and San Antonio Symphony Orchestras, and began his professional career as Second Flute of the Caracas Philharmonic.

Sparks maintains an active solo career, having appeared in recital and with orchestras on 5 continents. He presented the world premier of Katherine Hoover's Four Winds Concerto in 2014. Sparks can be heard as solo recording artist on the Summit, Pesen, and AAM labels and has recorded with many orchestras on the Sony, Telarc, Nonesuch, and Decca and other labels.

Sparks is a faculty member of DePaul University in Chicago, and the Aspen Music Festival. He has coached many of America's emerging orchestral artists at top orchestral training programs such as the New World Symphony, National Youth Orchestra, National Orchestral Institute, and the Pacific Music Festival. A frequent guest at major U.S. music schools and flute courses, many of his students occupy chairs in American orchestras. Recent activities include classes and performances at Rice University, Interlochen, New World Symphony, Eastman School of Music, London's Royal Academy of Music, the British Flute Society, Cleveland Institute, Texas Flute Society, University of North Texas, and regular coaching at the Oberlin Conservatory.

Sparks writes and publishes several acclaimed book series for flutists, including Exploring Sound: Tone Development Through Orchestral Repertoire, Orchestral Excerpt Practice Books, Excerpt Duos, and Mozart X2. He is a Contributing Editor of Flute Talk Magazine, and publishes arrangements with Theodore Presser and his own sparksflute publishing. Mark Sparks is a Pi Kappa Lambda graduate of the Oberlin Conservatory where he studied with Robert Willoughby.

Armenian pianist **Vahan Sargsyan** is an alumnus of the Komitas State Conservatory in Yerevan Armenia, where his teachers were Elza Tandilyan and his father, renowned pianist and professor Villi Sargsyan.

Mr. Sargsyan is a Laureate of the International Piano Competition in Rio-de-Janeiro, Brazil. as well as numerous Winner of Pittsburgh Concert Society Major auditions in solo piano and chamber music categories. He has concertized in Armenia, Georgia, Italy, Russia, Austria, Argentina, Brazil, USA and Canada. His recordings have been released by Alanna Records, Aerophon, Ablaze and Suzuki labels.

Having performed piano solo concerto with the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra had led to Vahan's regular appearances at the orchestra keyboards in the past decade. Currently Mr. Sargsyan, in addition to manyfold concerts and festival engagements, works as an Artist Lecturer in collaborative piano and chamber music at Carnegie Mellon University School of Music.

**Kathryn Thomas Umble**, Flutist, greatly enjoys performing and sharing the moment with fellow musicians and the listening audience. She also highly values teaching and the process of helping others grow and find their musical "voice". She is Professor of Flute at the Dana School of Music, Youngstown State University.

Umble has presented recitals in Europe and throughout the United States, including venues such as Alice Tully Hall, New York, the Cleveland Institute of Music with members of the Cleveland Orchestra, and the Cleveland Art Museum. Umble is a founding member of Duo Allant, a flute and guitar ensemble. She was featured a guest artist of the Pittsburgh Flute Club, guest artist in recital with the Aurista Ensemble in New York City, winner of the Pittsburgh Concert Society Major Auditions Competition, and she has performed in recital at numerous National Flute Association conventions.

Kathryn Umble has given many master classes and presentations at schools and universities including Penn State University, University of Florida, Bowling Green State University, Michigan State University, Renova Festival, Dana Flute Festival, Pittsburgh Flute Club, and National Flute Association conventions. She can be heard on the Naxos, Dana, GMMC, and Access Labels.

Lebanese-American tenor **Karim Sulayman** has garnered international attention as a sophisticated and versatile artist, consistently praisedfor his sensitive and intelligent musicianship, riveting stage presence, and beautiful voice. A 2019 GRAMMY® Award winner, he regularly performs on the world's stages in orchestral concerts and opera, as well as in recital and chamber music.

A native of Chicago, Karim's musical education began with violin studies at age 3. He spent years as a boy alto at the Chicago Children's Choir and was hand selected by Sir Georg Solti and Leonard Slatkin as a soloist with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra and the St. Louis Symphony. He graduated with highest honors from the Eastman School of Music and earned a Masters degree from Rice University. He later moved to Paris, France where he studied with renowned tenor/haute-contre, Howard Crook. He also studied improvisation at the Second City Training Center in Chicago.

His diverse performing career has included roles with the Drottningholms Slottsteater in Stockholm, Houston Grand Opera, Florentine Opera, Boston Lyric Opera, Chicago Opera Theater and New York City Opera; orchestral appearances with the Chicago, Pittsburgh, and National Symphony Orchestras and the Australian

Brandenburg Orchestra; and engagements at Hamburg's Elbphilharmonie, Carnegie Hall, Lincoln Center, the Kennedy Center, Ravinia Festival, International Bach Festival, the Aspen Music Festival, and the Aldeburgh Festival, as well as the Marlboro Music Festival in collaborations with Mitsuko Uchida and Richard Goode.

His growing discography includes his debut solo album, Songs of Orpheus, which was released in April 2018 to international acclaim on the AVIE label. Named "Critic's Choice" by Opera News, and praised for his "lucid, velvety tenor and pop-star charisma" by BBC Music Magazine, the album debuted at #5 on the Billboard Traditional Classical Chart and #3 on the iTunes Classical Chart, and was honored with the GRAMMY® Award for Best Classical Solo Vocal Album in 2019. He is also featured in the ARTE documentary Leonard Bernstein – A Genius Divided, which premiered throughout Europe in the summer of 2018 and was subsequently released on DVD. His performance of Bernstein's Mass with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra was recorded live for PBS Great Performances, premiering in May, 2020.

Additionally, Karim created a social experiment/performance art piece called I Trust You, designed to build bridges in a divided political climate. A video version of this experiment went "viral" on the internet, and was honored as a prizewinner in the My Hero Film Festival. He has been invited to give talks and hold open forums with student and adult groups about inclusion, empathy, healing from racism, and activism through the arts.

Pianist and historical keyboardist **Yi-heng Yang** has been noted for "astonishing skill and vividness" (*The New York Times*) and "absolute mastery" (*Boston Musical Intelligencer*).

As a guest soloist and collaborator, she performs frequently with groups such as the Sebastians, The Knights, and The Raritan Chamber Players. Her debut album of Mendelssohn violin sonatas on period instruments (Olde Focus) with Abby Karr garnered critical praise, as did a recording of the Brahms cello sonatas

and pianos pieces op. 76 (Deux-Elles), on an original Stretcher piano, with Kate Bennett Wadsworth. Her album of 18th-century fortepiano-harpsichord duos with Rebecca Cypess, "Sisters, Face-to-Face: The Bach Legacy in Women's Hands (ACIS)," won the 2018 AMS Noah Greenberg Award for contributions to historical performance.

She has appeared with the Boston Early Music Festival, the New York Philharmonic Ensembles Series at Merkin Hall, The Serenata of Santa Fe Series, Sunday Chatter Albuquerque, The Dayton Early Music Series, The Frederick Collection, The Finchcocks Collection, The Cobbe Collection, The Metropolitan Museum of Art, the Apple Hill Chamber Music Festival, and the Utrecht Early Music Festival Fringe.

Ms. Yang holds a doctorate in piano from the Juilliard School, and studied there with Robert McDonald, Julian Martin, and Veda Kaplinsky. She studied fortepiano with Audrey Axinn, and with Stanley Hoogland at the Amsterdam Conservatory. She has received grants from The Mustard Seed Foundation's Harvey Fellowship, and The Dutch Ministry of Culture's Huygens Award. Ms. Yang is on the faculty at The Juilliard School, where she teaches fortepiano, chamber music, and piano. #### ABOUT THE COMPOSERS

Praised by the Cape Times as 'highly original,' South African composer **James Wilding's** work has been enthusiastically championed in Zimbabwe, Lesotho, Senegal, Germany, Holland, France, Switzerland, Britain, Canada, South Africa, and the USA. He has received commissions from Bayerischer Rundfunk, the South African Music Rights Organization, the Tuesday Musical Association, and the Orange County School of the Arts. His music has been prescribed for the UNISA-Transnet International Piano Competition and the Hennie Joubert Piano Competition, and he has won the Oude Meester Prize and Potchefstroom University's Chancellor's Trust Prize. Wilding is Professor of Instruction and Co-Chair in Composition and Theory at the University of Akron.

The music of **Margi Griebling-Haigh** has been characterized as haunting, charismatic, yearning, wistful, lyrical, colorful, and insouciant! She is concerned with conveying emotions and moods, but firmly believes in the powers of memorable melodies and rhythms and strong formal structure. Griebling-Haigh has been Composer in Residence at the Kent/Blossom Music Festival since 2011. Her music was recently featured on American Public Media's "Performance Today" as performed by Cleveland Orchestra Associate Concertmaster Peter Otto, violin, and Randall Fusco, piano.

The music of **Cara Haxo** juxtaposes delicate, sparkly textures with the gritty and the grotesque. Haxo is the winner of the 2022 NWMF Emerging Women Composers Competition. Other awards include the IAWM Libby Larsen and Ellen Taaffe Zwilich Prizes and the NFMC Young Composers Award. She has received commissions from the May Festival Youth Chorus, Quince Ensemble, and Splinter Reeds. Haxo is currently a Visiting Assistant Professor in Music at The College of Wooster.

The music of American composer **Andrea Reinkemeyer** has been described as, "luminous," "haunting," "clever, funky, jazzy and virtuosic" (*Fanfare, Detroit News, Daily Gazette*). Her music explores intersectional feminist narratives, natural phenomena, home, and grief; it is distributed by Murphy Press and the ADJ•ective New Music Composers' Collective. She is Associate Professor of Music Composition and Theory at Linfield University.

Described by the New York Times as "yearning melody in a rapturous surge," music by **Elliott Bark** (b.1980) has been performed in many venues, such as Stern Auditorium of Carnegie Hall. Bark, two-time recipient (2012, 2014) of The Korean National Composer Prize, has worked with the Cleveland Orchestra, Pacific Symphony, and many others. He received his doctoral degree from Indiana University where he also received the Dean's Prize and served as an Associate Instructor in the composition department. (www.elliottbark.com)

Ragtime Robin from Xylophone Rags (1924) George Hamilton Green

(1893 - 1970)

Diane Yazvac - piano

George Hamilton Green was one of greatest xylophonists. He played in many different groups including the All-Star Trio and Green Brothers' Xylophone Orchestra. His most well-known pieces include The Ragtime Robin, Charleston Capers, and Caprice Valsant.

Sonata in A minor (1720)

J.S. Bach (1685-1750)

Arr. Leigh Howard Stevens (b. 1953)

Leigh Howard Stevens is an internationally renowned marimbaist, educator, publisher, inventor, and entrepreneur. His 1989 arrangement of the Bach solo violin sonata transposed the piece down a minor seventh, to A minor, to better function acoustically on the marimba.

Frederic Chopin (1810 - 1849)

This etufr demonstrates Chopin's use of double octaves. Chopin was a virtuoso pianist and one of the greatest composers of the Romantic Period. His other famous works include the Heroic Polonaise, Preludes, Op.28, and Berceuse.

Brett Weigel is currently a freshmen at Youngstown State University majoring in percussion performance where his principal teacher and advisor is Dr. Glenn Schaft. At YSU, he participates in the marching band, pep band, wind ensemble, Dana symphony orchestra, and percussion ensemble. Brett began playing drums when he was 8 years old studying with Dan Wilkens. At age 11, Brett started piano lessons under the direction of Christine Lucas. At age 13, he began attending Lincoln Park Performing Arts Charter School in Midland, PA, studying under Rick Parsons for percussion and Sean Baran for piano. Brett played in the percussion ensemble, steel drum ensemble, orchestra, wind ensemble, and piano ensemble. Outside of high school, Brett played in the Beaver County Symphonic Wind Ensemble, West Hills Symphonic Band, and the Pittsburgh Youth Philharmonic Orchestra. In 10th grade, he studied under P.J. Gatch who is the percussion teacher at Westminster College. Under his direction, Brett learned the Stevens grip and the traditional four-mallet grip. In 2019, Brett attended the WVU percussion camp where he studied under George Willis and Michael Vercelli. In high school, Brett played several classical pieces from composers including Beethoven, Bach, Mozart, Chopin, Lizst, and Debussy.

#### ABOUT HAROLD DANKO

In a career spanning more than a half century Harold Danko has established himself as a distinguished pianist, composer, and band leader, fortified by an impressive resume of collaborations with legendary artists at prestigious jazz venues all over the world as well as in recordings, television, and video. His work is well documented and readily available on multiple internet platforms. These include Chet Baker's classic 1987 Tokyo concert with more than six million hits, as well as featured performances with Thad Jones/Mel Lewis, Gerry Mulligan, Lee Konitz, and on James Moody's version of "Giant Steps". More than thirty of Harold's own CDs have been released on the SteepleChase and SunnySide labels and his catalog of original compositions has earned ASCAP awards yearly since 1980. Based in NYC during his freelance days in the 1970s and '80s he performed and toured internationally with vocalists Liza Minnelli, Chris Connor, Anita O'Day, Sheila Jordan, Dee Dee Bridgewater, and Mel Torme, composed music for off Broadway and television productions, and participated in well over one hundred recordings.

Beginning his piano studies at the age of five, he became serious about pursuing a career in jazz at the age of fifteen when he commenced studies with Gene Rush in Youngstown, Ohio. After classical studies with Delores Fitzer he set his sights on the Dana School of Music, where brothers, Joe and John, were saxophonists in early extracurricular jazz big bands. At Dana he studied piano with Morris Risenhoover and Robert Hopkins and majored in Music Education while playing gigs and teaching in the area. Among musicians he worked with in those days were fellow Dana students - bassist Tony Leonardi, drummers Bill Tragesser, Mike Smith, and Tony Pushcar, cellist Ron DeVaughn, organist Emmanuel Riggins, and saxophonist Bill Lawrence, along with other professionals in the region - drummers Phil Laughlin, Tommy Voorhees, and Shedrick Hobbs, bassists Steve Zordich, Pete Bettiker, John Petrovich, and Tom Dorsey, saxophonists Mike Fogarty, Tom Frabotta, and Dennis Hill, and vocalists Maureen McGovern and George Galip. After graduating cum laude in 1969 with a BME degree from Youngstown State University and a stint in the First U.S. Army NY Band, Harold landed the piano chair in Woody Herman's Thundering Herd, which launched him in high profile as a much sought-after jazz pianist. In 2021 he returned to YSU where he gave a commencement address and received an honorary doctorate in music.

Harold holds Professor Emeritus status at the Eastman School of Music in Rochester, NY, where he chaired the jazz studies program for eleven years and established the Jazz Performance Workshop curriculum. In 2007 he received a Bridging Fellowship for research in the Linguistics Department of the University of Rochester on the relationship of speech and music. Prior to his appointment at Eastman he served on the faculties of the Manhattan School of Music, the New School/Mannes, Hartt College, and other institutions. Harold's featured column, "Solo Piano", appeared in Keyboard Magazine for more than five years, and his improvisation method, "The Illustrated Keyboard Series", is a highly regarded reference work. In the early '90s after moving with his family to New Haven, CT, he co-founded Jazz Haven, a non-profit jazz advocacy organization that remains active in the community.

His newest quartet CD, released in March 2021 on the SteepleChase label, is entitled "Spring Garden" and "Rite Notes", a follow up solo piano CD will be released in June of this year. Both were inspired by the music of Igor Stravinsky's Rite of Spring.

#### TUESDAY, APRIL 12, 2022

Rite Notes/Spring Garden Harold Danko, piano Ford Theater, Bliss Hall, 7:30 p.m.

Rite Notes/Spring Garden is a suite of compositions inspired by Igor Stravinsky's music from the monumental Rite of Spring. I wrote Spring Garden for the quartet I co-lead with saxophonist Rich Perry, and the CD was released in 2021 on SteepleChase SCCD 31909. Rite Notes is my solo piano follow up and will be released in June of 2022 on SCCD 31931.

In total there are seventeen pieces designed to be combined and integrated in the general order of musical events in the *Rite* as determined extemporaneously in performance. My intention was to create a chamber work with improvisation generated from the original source, but one that could always be fluid and evolving in the moment.

**Premonitions and Reflections** sets up some of the harmonic environments found in the *Rite's* introduction and integrates with **Spring Winds**. Ab is used as an axis for several prominent phrases

in mirror piano counterpoint that have a connection to content in the *Rite* and a pianistically inverted fragment of its first theme used as a sendoff for soloing. This material is further developed as the improvisations unfold and other content is introduced.

A short bass ostinato with variations opens **ENVISAGE** with harmonic elements of the "Augurs" chord providing the foundation for improvising; and **Future Cast** is a further exploration of that Augurs (or Tolchok) chord, which permeates the atmosphere of the *Rite* in ingenious ways. I treat this sound as a manifestation of the V and VI chords of both Ab Harmonic Minor and Major. The final section is an improvisation on another progression from a different source.

**ADDRESS UNKNOWN** cobbles some phrases from the rival tribes and abduction game scenes over a twelve-bar form (not a blues) borrowed from the tune "Annie Doesn't Live Here Anymore" from an enjoyable old Tony Randall LP. It was fun trying to combine elements from these widely different sources and bringing a calypso feel and some good humor to the improvisations. It was first performed by the quartet in *Spring Garden* and made a reappearance in *Rite Notes* in a funkier version with a bit of New Orleans influence.

**No Escape** makes references to Stravinsky's alliance with Woody Herman, along with other borrowings including from one of my own tunes. I employed the seldom used sostenuto (middle) pedal in order to play on both the keyboard and strings in the coda, which leads to the following piece.

**BLOSSOM TANGO** utilizes themes from the spring rounds scene, which came from folk sources, together with a nod to the quartet's Argentina trip, complete with the blooming Jacaranda trees.

**Rival Revelries** generates a musical game of many items on loan from various sources and concludes with one belonging to me. The meter is a loose 5/4, and the opening harmonies signal the start of combat and foreshadow those in the next track.

**EARTH DANCE** begins with a reference to the sage adoration and earth kiss scenes, and then goes into a bass pattern with various melodic and rhythmic interjections. It is coupled with an homage to my favorite raga, *Nirigama*, traces of which somehow surface in the works of both Stravinsky and Bud Powell. I first heard it on a Nonesuch Explorer LP performed by Carnatic vocalist K. V.

Narayannaswamy in a composition by Tirukkokarnam Subbarama Bhagavatar, dating from the early 20th century, a surprising parallel with the origins of the *Rite*. Again the sostenuto pedal provides the means for strummed strings to support the raga melody played on the keyboard.

**SECOND ACT** takes clues from the harmonies of the pagan night scene and grafts these on to the form of the standard "You And The Night And The Music", which remarkably shares some of these same elements in its melodic content.

**RISING ASPIRATIONS** is a twelve-bar blues that features the dominant raised nine sound and some melodic fragments found early on in the *Rite's* second act. For its reprisal in *Rite Notes* there is a more proper introduction from the Khorovad and Cortege du Sage themes, as well as a clearer harmonic ascension to finish, utilizing both whole tone/augmented and double diminished chords that add more challenges for improvising.

**Mystic Dancers** utilizes the Khorovad melody in various harmonic guises presented by Stravinsky in a cyclical format that I designed to invite thematic improvisation.

**NEVELE's** opening statement and melodic line are extrapolations from the rhythms and harmony of the pounding chords preceding the glorification scene. It suggests night thunder and lightning to me while the rain and fog that follow might be inferred from the impressionistic improvisations.

elements from the ritual scene along with some humorous aspects, and leads directly into **THE CHOSEN**, which is my adaptation of the final dance of the ballet. Although the *Rite* has a sacrificial ending, I tried to keep a lighter sense of renewal. Its companion piece **Sprung** takes a swift journey through Stravinsky's octatonic and dominant seventh configurations from the final dance with other flavors I chose to add from harmonic minor and double harmonic scale systems, as well as some references to a piano piece that may have influenced Stravinsky. It is all held together in triple meter and leads to combinations of motifs in mirror concluding with a chromatic flourish I came up with long ago and never had a chance to use.





Take Anything You Want is part of a series of pieces called Aliens with Extraordinary Abilities.

Songs I-IX (1980-82) Stuart Saunders Smith (b. 1948) Nick Grabigel - Actor-Percussionist

Stuart Saunders Smith began playing percussion at age 6 and writing experimental poetry at age 12. As a composer, Smith is not interested in inventing new music, rather he attempts to create timeless music. Songs I-IX for Actor-Percussionist, was commissioned by Brian Johnson (a student of Smith's at the Hartt School of Music). Today we are gathered together, to witness the marriage of speech and percussion. Words as percussion music; everyday conversation is comprised of pitch, timbre, rhythm, melodic contour, articulation, and structure. Although these elements are most frequently associated with music, they are inherent and inseparable components of human language. Smith has realized this phenomenon and created music that intertwines percussion and phonetics. The text serves as a road map for the performer, and the percussion parts function as accompaniment to, extensions of, or interruptions within the text. The work, a Triptych, divides into 3 structural units consisting of Songs I-III, IV-VI, and VII-IX. The outer sections were derived from a somewhat formulaic process of associating words through their definitions. The inner three Songs are a product of free associative poetry. Upon repetition "nonsense becomes new-sense." "We are an inexact species and we should embrace that in music."



#### STAGE DIRECTOR'S NOTE

L'amico Fritz, an opera in three acts by Pietro Mascagni, premiered on October 31, 1891 at the Rome Opera House in Rome, Italy and was generally well received during the composer's lifetime. The libretto is by P. Suardon and based on the French novel L'ami Fritz by Émile Erckmann and Pierre-Alexandre Chatrian. Today, however, the opera is not as frequently performed outside of Italy with the exception of small opera companies and university settings. Certainly, the most enduring of Mascagni's operas is Cavalleria Rusticana which he wrote in 1899 and was premiered in 1890 after winning the Sonzogno one-act opera contest. L'amico Fritz, his second opera, was written during a time of Italian opera known as verismo which Mascagni began with his first opera Cavalleria Rusticana and continued with Tosca (Puccini), Andrea Chénier (Giordano), La Bohème (Puccini), and Pagliacci (Leoncavallo) among others. This work represents less drama (toil and death) associated with verismo and more emotion and the enduring qualities of friendship and love as found in a pastorale opera. These operas focused more on a gentle life outside the harsh reality of city, set in a countryside or small village with the simple joys and living associated with common ordinary people.

This delightful opera sets us in a small province where Fritz is the local benefactor whose generosity provides for its town's orphans, wedding dowries, employment for many and even entertains his many friends. He has but one potential misgiving, he is a bachelor and seems to be stayed in his determination to remain so. However, the town's rabbi and his friend, David has other designs in mind for Fritz.


