The Cycle of Counseling, the delivery system for Reality Therapy, will be presented and applied to resistant students and clients. The paradoxical methods reframing, restraining, positioning, and prescriptions will be described.

Participants will be involved in small group discussion, active observation of role play demonstrations, and plan making. They will derive ideas that can be implemented on the job. Dr. Wubbolding is a Professor at Xavier University in Cincinnati.



"Wellness in the '90s: Self and Others" Dr. Thomas Sweeney

Tom Sweeney is Professor of Applied Behavioral Sciences and Educational Leadership and Coordinator of Counselor Education in the College of Education at Ohio University in Athens, Ohio. A graduate of Akron University where he earned his Bachelors degree, he received his Masters degree from the University of Wisconsin (Madison) and his Ph.D. from The Ohio State University.

In addition to public school teaching and counseling, he has been a teacher and administrator in higher education for over twenty and ten years, respectively. The author of articles, monographs and books, he also developed and taught a telecourse on methods of guiding young people titled, Coping With Kids. An award winning series produced by Ohio University, it was distributed on film worldwide by the American Association for Counseling and Development (AACD) and has been broadcast via satellite throughout this country and abroad. His most recent book is Adlerian Counseling: A Practical Approact for a New Decade.

11. Increasing Test Scores Through Counselor Intervention Strategies
Counselors can have an effect on improving scores on ACT, SAT, Proficiency
Tests, and state mandated achievement and ability tests through group
guidance and individual strategies aimed at increasing test preparedness,
study skills and test taking skills. Available resources, classroom activities,
and other intervention aids will be discussed.

12. Meeting the Special Needs of the Deaf Population in Counseling

With the passage of P.L. 94-142 and the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, Section 504, there is an increasing number of deaf students being mainstreamed into the public schools, mental health centers, and other public service settings. This presentation is to help counselors, who are not trained in deafness, become aware of the special needs of these students. Both vocational and socio-emotional counseling will be discussed. Included in the discussion will be strategies and information about other agencies where the counsleor and/or student can get additional support and help.

Mass Screening as an Adolescent Suicide and Prevention Tool
This 1990 ASCA Grant funded project will familiarize school counselors
with the use of the Reynolds Adolescent Depression Inventory (RADS) and
the Suicide Ideation Questionnaire (SIQ) in building competency based
prevention programs. It will also demonstrate how counselors time can be
maximized in building groups for mass screened identified populations.
Counselors should bring their shopping bags to carry handouts that
include an 8-week group counseling program that covers stress reduction,
coping skills and assertiveness training and the ASCA funded proposal
and results.

The Best Kind of Team: Successful Parenting Programs
This workshop provides counselors with skills and techniques to involve parents actively in establishing positive relationships of mutual respect, responsibility, and love with their children. Counselors will receive practical suggestions on types of successful parenting programs, the nuts and bolts mechanics of such programs and a comprehensive model of "getting parents to attend." This workshop provides counselors with resources and sensible solutions for dysfunctional families and children "at risk" in these family situations.

Changing Problem Behavior Through Different Lenses

This presentation will illustrate an innovative approach to promoting positive change in student behavior and resolving teacher-student conflict by using "adult talk" in a classroom setting.
