## Live at the forum

### Candidates close curtain on election campaign

Candidates hoping to make a favorable impression on voters in today's and Wednesday's elections spoke to a small crowd of some 75 Monday in Kilcawley.

Presidential candidates Bob Grace, Cynthia Beckes and Dave Tammaro and vice presidential candidates Jordan Dentscheff and Brenda Cipriano expanded on their platforms — detailed in the May 14 issue of the *Jambar* — and answered questions about their administrations.

Vice presidential candidate Diane Jeswald did not speak. Grace said she had a "prior engagement."

Members of the audience fired questions dealing with specific pieces of state legislation, issues on today's ballot, and the financial outlook for Ohio students for next year.

Some of the questions and the candidates responses:

*Don't you feel that being controversial is going to add to the problems of the presidency?*

Grace: "I do not. We have had, in the past, presidents who just went along with what they were doing but I feel that it is time that we have a person who is willing and who is not afraid of the administration."  
*I picked up in your stand an*

*attitude of confrontation rather than negotiation with the administration. Which of the two do you actually prefer?*

Grace: "I am not here to fight the administration just to fight. I'm not going to go into Tod Hall and walk into Dr. Coffelt's office and say, 'I'm here to raise hell; I'm tired of what's happening.' I'm willing to negotiate with the administration, but there are things happening. . . where the administration just ignores the students."

## Voting on issues begins today

Two issues, which if passed, will result in some restructuring of Student Council, will appear on today's election ballot along with issue #3 — a referendum which would disband Council within 30 days by a simple majority "no" vote.

The passage of Issue #1 would call for representation of graduate students in Student Government and Council, as well as granting them the right to vote in Student Government-sponsored elections.

Issue #2 is a correction of an error made during last quarter's Student Government elections. A

constitutional amendment which was supposed to have read, "Newly appointed members shall serve until the next election," had mistakenly been worded on last quarter's ballot as, "Newly elected members. . ."

The amendment would apply to those members of Council who are appointed to a position in place of a member who has vacated his/her seat midway through a term.

Both of these issues are in contrast to the third issue, which if passed, will completely dissolve Council and consequently, grant the newly elected executive

branch of Student Government, i.e., President and Vice President, "the duty to create a new form of the Legislative Branch."

It continues, "The newly created legislative Branch would then have to be ratified by a simple majority of the entire undergraduate and graduate student body at a Student Government-sponsored election no later than the end of the third week of Fall quarter 1982."

Cathie Pavlov, Student Council chairperson, said that when the referendum was first introduced, it was her understanding that the

## Council endorses bill granting students seats on Board of Trustees

Student Council unanimously approved a motion supporting the passage of House Bill 18, which would place two students on the Boards of Trustees of each state-supported university, at Monday's

meeting.

Student Government President Ray Nakley reported that the OSA passed a similar motion at its meeting in Athens over the weekend. Nakley urged Council members to write to their state

lawmakers supporting the bill.

"This bill has been kicked around for about 10 years now," Nakley said. "Each time, the vote's been a little bit closer. All we need now is one more vote to get the bill out of committee. Your support could make the difference," he said.

House Bill 18 has been sponsored by Mike Stinziano (D-30) of Columbus. The bill calls for campus-wide elections with the governor appointing two students from the top vote-getters to sit on the board. All trustees must be appointed by the governor.

YSU students currently have no voting power on the Board of Trustees, which is the ultimate decision-making body of the University.

Nakley also announced a nation-wide phone-in campaign to protest cuts in student financial aid. Several national student groups were urging students and their parents to call President Reagan at (202) 456-7639 on Friday, May 28 and tell him what they think about his proposed cuts.

In other action:

- Council passed a resolution congratulating Dom Rosselli on his fine coaching career at YSU and wishing him the best of luck during his retirement.

- Another resolution lauding Ray "Boom Boom" Mancini for capturing the world lightweight boxing crown also passed.

- Sharon Weber, senior, Business, chairperson of the nominations

committee, presented to Council the nominations of the students who will be members of the various University committees for the 1982-83 school year. Several members commended Weber for filling the nominations so quickly. In past years the committees were not filled until well into the academic year.

- Funding for the Young Democrats, \$112; the Apostolic Christian Fellowship concert, \$300 and the American Chemical Society, \$65 was approved by the Financial Appropriations Committee. Changes by the Constitution and By-Laws Committee requiring student I.D. numbers to be included on election and referendum petitions were also approved.

 issue was brought up because Council needed to be restructured.

"I agree," she said. "However,

I did not agree that the disbanding of Council was the correct road to take. This referendum has now become an issue of disbanding Council because it is

not worthwhile." Pavlov said that changes in the Constitution and By-Laws might have been a more reasonable approach and an Ad Hoc

Committee of concerned students would have been even better. "After I wrote a letter to the editor of *The Jambar* regarding the referendum, I got all sorts of

feedback from students who I had never even seen before. They suggested that we write letters encouraging suggestions from (cont. on page 9)

 Cynthia Beckes: "Not specifically in Student Government. In Council, but not in Government." You point out a distinction between the general fund and the general fee. Can you point out what that distinction is and explain to us how you might

prioritize what you see as important in general fee spending?

Beckes: "Rather than dazzle you with figures and pull out long reams of numbers for you, I think it would suffice to say that as an informed member of Student Government I do know the differ-

ence . . . and this is a priority with us - seeing that your money for student groups, for student activities, for homecoming . . . that we do get our money's worth for it."

Do you have any new ideas you would like to originate?

Dave Tammaro: "I do commend (the present administration) as far as their fight against tuition hikes. Believe me, they've done a good job. I feel we can be a little more visible and go out and get the students involved."

Could you explain in detail

House Bill 18?

Tammaro: "As far as right now, I couldn't go into it deeply; I'd have to look into it more. Then I'll be glad to tell you all about it."

[Dave Tammaro] could not explain to me what House Bill 18 is. Can you?

Dentscheff: "Sure. HB 18 is the bill to get students on the Board of Trustees here in Ohio. The only way we can get our need brought to those men who sit on the board is to have a direct input.

The bill will put at least one student on the Board of Trustees as a full voting member."

Can you tell me what the financial outlook is?

Dentscheff: "For YSU, out of a school of about 15,000, about 2,000 are going to lose financial aid this fall. One year from this fall, 3,100 more are going to lose it."

Can you explain House Bill 18?

Cipriano: "Presently, no, I can't. I know bits about it, but I have to do more research on it."

First of all, I'd like to comment you; you read very well. Secondly, if Issue 3 fails, how will your administration handle it?

Cipriano: "I discussed that with Dave. Dave knows how it would work, and I'm sure if we both work together, if we get elected, we would know how to handle it."

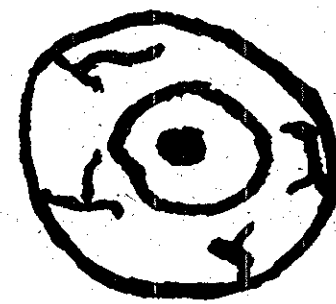

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## Editorial: To be or not to be?

What do we need with a Student Council anyway?

This question is being asked of students on today's election ballot in the form of a confidence vote, which if passed by a simple majority "no" vote, would disband Council within 30 days.

The issue arose when then Council member Jeff Hall proposed that Student Council put itself to a confidence vote. After Council voted down this motion, Hall and supporters of the issue went out and got over 1,000 signatures to place the question on the ballot through the referendum process.

Now, the issue is before the students.

*The Jambar* is divided in its stand. Of the five members of the editorial staff, three say yes, Council should remain in existence. Two are diametrically opposed and say no — disband Student Council.

And now for the reasons.

Those two members of the editorial staff who say disband Council list the following reasons:

- Council members play games. They bend the rules as they see fit and with no consistency whatsoever. For example: Over 1,000 students signed the petition to put the confidence vote on the ballot. Part of that petition

stated that two of the undersigned students be present at the verification and counting of signatures.

Council chose to ignore that, but had no trouble with bending the rules to allow candidates David Tamaro and Brenda Cipriano on the ballot.

- Council does nothing of worth. "In five years," said one staff member, "Council has done nothing that directly affects me."

Three editors list the following reasons for keeping Council in existence:

- Cathie Pavlov has brought a new seriousness to Council. Though members of Council have overruled her judgment in some cases — such as the notorious "shall we or shall we not wear campaign buttons during meetings?" — her judgment has been good, and she deserves a chance to turn Council around.
- The new executive committee has brought control to meetings and efforts to restructure the present form of Council.
- The new Council and chairperson have not had enough of a chance to prove themselves.

The opinion of the general student body is probably as divided on this issue as the staff of *The Jambar* is. We will cast our votes today for and against this issue.

Do we need a Student Council? You decide.

## Commentary: Russia converts Billy Graham

Although American evangelist Rev. Billy Graham's visit to the Soviet Union last week may have been conducted with the best intentions to promote peace, the trip has been marred by Graham's remarks which repudiate the notion that Russians have no religious freedom.

His remarks have stirred controversy among American clergy — and with just cause.

Graham intended to journey to the Communist country to spread the gospel and to speak out against the arms race. He must be commended for these efforts.

However, Graham must be criticized for his statements to the press last Thursday at

the end of his six-day stay when he said that Russians are not restricted to attend church services, based upon the large numbers of persons he saw wherever he preached.

Surely, Graham cannot be so naive to believe that such large attendances at church services occur every day in the Communist country. Surely, the evangelist has not accepted political manipulation and brainwashing as the truth.

In an Associated Press story, Graham spent his stay in the Soviet by preaching only to officially invited congregations and by dining on caviar with religious and government officials. However, when he visited six Soviet Pentecostal refugees living

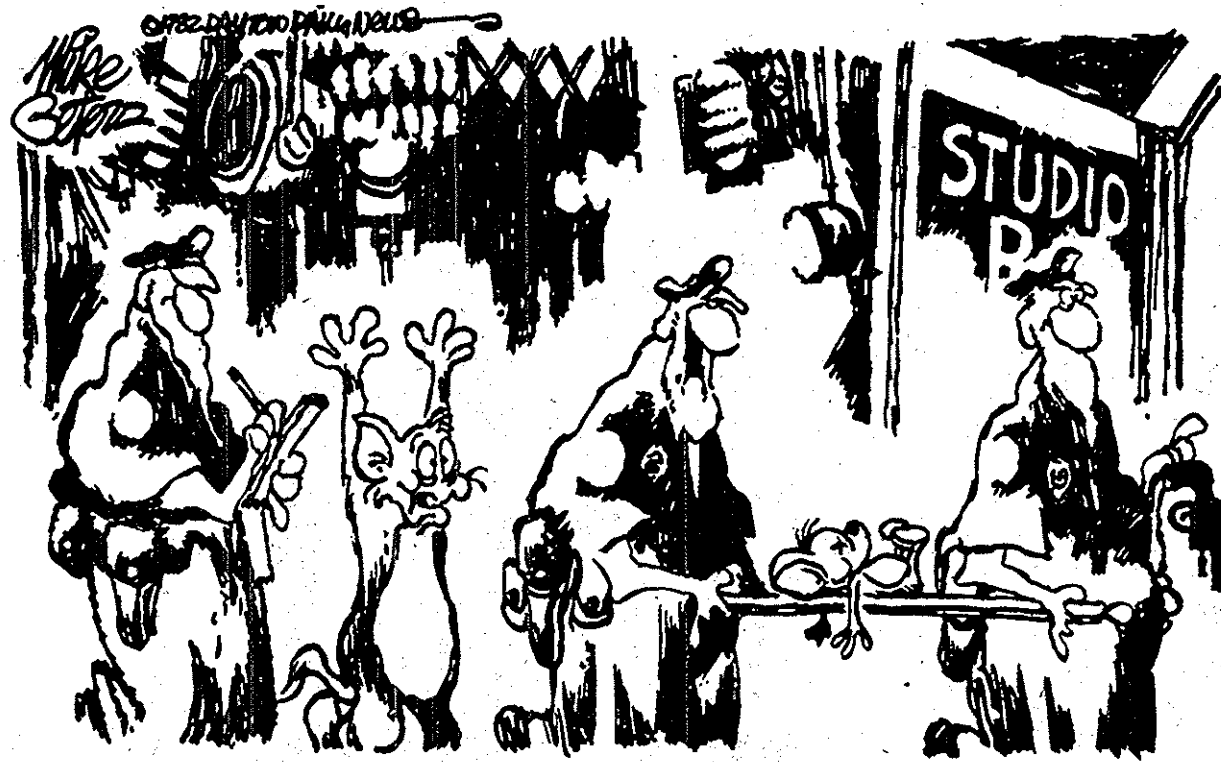
under humanitarian refuge at the US embassy in Moscow, Graham offered no aid to help them emigrate.

The most startling words of advice Graham told 900 "parishioners" was to "obey authorities." Does Graham really want these "parishioners" to obey authorities who restrict religious activity by insisting that persons worship in only state-registered congregations and who outlaw religious education classes for children?

I find Graham's assessment of religious freedom in Russia unbelievable, especially when I consider the remarks made by Soviet dissident Alexander Ginzberg, who spoke here at YSU last October. I covered

Ginzberg's lecture for *The Jambar*, and, based upon his assessment of religion in the Communist nation, I totally reject Graham's views.

Looking over my notes from Ginzberg's lecture, the Soviet dissident revealed, during the question-and-answer period, (cont. on page 9)

## Barbarians

Hollywood filmmakers produce similar versions, but achieve mixed success

Sorcerer's spells, beautiful witches, princesses and kingdoms to save and to conquer, and, above all, the clash of steel — these key ingredients are common to the latest Hollywood fad, sword and sorcery films.

In fact, there seems to be a formula that will turn-off even the most hard-core fantasy fan. The formula consists of a beautiful princess or damsel in distress who entices the hero with offers of money, jewels, or, most commonly, herself. The hero, a barbarian, ousted prince or warrior, agrees to save the heroine and rescues the kingdom.

Two of these films are currently playing in the Youngstown area. One is a very bad piece of formula schlock, *The Sword and The Sorcerer*, while

the other, *Conan*, shows how a film can be made with such excellence that it succeeds much beyond what is expected.

*The Sword and The Sorcerer* offers a rice paper thin plot, a decent leading actor supported only by the belt around his waist, and a lot of action. For those who appreciate action films, this show might appeal to you. For those who appreciate the challenge of an actor succeeding, despite the lack of a supporting cast, Lee Horsley's acting will intrigue you. But, for those

looking for an all-around multi-dimensional film, look elsewhere, such as to *Conan*.

*Conan* has three strengths going for it: acting, directing and a plot. In the casting of this film, the producer obviously consulted the Robert E. Howard novels.

Arnold Schwarzenegger is Conan, resembling the fictional character in looks and in actions. Schwarzenegger, formerly Mr. Universe six times, learned not only acting but also sword movement from a Japanese sword master. His portrayal brings to

live those Frank Frazetta covers that draw readers to the Howard novels at the bookstore.

Another touch of genius was added in selecting James Earl Jones as Thulsa Doom, the leader of the Set (a snake god)

Jones' role is comparable to that of the late Rev. Jim Jones in the power exercised over his followers.

Finally, for a female lead, there is Sandahl Bergman, the absolutely beautiful blonde from *All That Jazz*. You may remember her from the "Air Erotica" scene. In this film, she portrays a female thief who teams up with Conan. She, too, took sword lessons and looks very comfortable in this role.

John Milius excels as the director of the film. Milius, who



also directed *Apocalypse Now*, captures the horror of the period, with heads being chopped off and people's bodies being hacked at, without allowing the real gore that other films of this genre have emphasized.


Furthermore, as he did in *Apocalypse*, Milius intersperses the scenes of horror with comparable scenes of beauty and also shows the utter confusion of battle.

## A hit parade

### Penguin nine unleash strong offensive attack as several close in on record marks

In a rather inactive period of the YSU spring sports scene, the baseball team has been kept quite busy, and except for a brief two-game slip at Akron on Sunday, the Penguins have been feasting at the plate — you might call it a "Big Bat Attack."

After yesterday's 12-7 blasting of the Cleveland State Vikings, four Penguin hitters are in quite a dogfight for the team lead in hits, and when the dust clears in the season finale on Friday, one (and possibly more) will own or share in a new team record.

The school record for hits in a season is held by Chip Zitello (1970) and Bill Kozac (1971) who each zinged 43 safeties.

As of today, Mike Nitolli and John McAbeir lead the Penguins with 43 hits, and Mark Snoddy and Bobby Gardner are right behind with 41 and 39 hits respectively.

All Penguin hitters added to their impressive offensive statistics by pounding out 15 against the Vikings yesterday and

improving to 21-13 on the year.

Tom Abbas and Jerry Williams each smashed 3 hits, while Nitolli added 2 hits, including a three-run homer and five RBI's.

McAbeir, Gardner and Ken Aquilar also contributed to the attack with two safeties each.

Pitcher Bob Haseley won his third game of the year against four losses, but needed help from freshman Vince Santangelo. Santangelo hurled the final three innings, giving up only one hit

to pick up the save.

Over the weekend the Penguins slam-dunked Theil College by scores of 16-5 and 7-0 on Saturday, but were then thrown a curve from the Akron Zips who defeated the Penguins by the scores of 8-1 and 11-8.

YSU concludes its season this week, traveling to Cleveland State on Thursday, before returning home for a season-ending doubleheader with Baldwin Wallace.

that Russians are being persecuted on religious grounds. These include not only Christians, but also Jews and Muslims.

For example, Ginzberg cited that Christian churches are placed

within a distance of 300 kilometers while synagogues are placed 1,500 kilometers apart. The vast distance between synagogues, he pointed out, makes it impossible for most Jews to attend services.

**REFERENDUM**

**Shall the Legislative Branch of Student Government (i.e., Student Council) remain in existence?**

A simple majority "No" vote would disband Student Council within 30 days of this election and would give the executive branch of student government (i.e., the elected President and Vice President and the President's appointed Cabinet) the duty to create a new form of the Legislative Branch. The newly created Legislative Branch would then have to be ratified by a simple majority of the entire undergraduate and graduate student body at a Student Government sponsored election no later than the end of the third week of Fall quarter 1982.

A simple majority "Yes" vote would keep the present Legislative Branch (i.e., Student Council) in existence in its present form of 25 representatives.
