The Fourth Annual Junior Prom sponsored by the Junior Class of Youngstown College will be held in the beautiful ballroom of Stambaugh Auditorium on Friday, May 3. Dancing will be from ten until two o'clock to the mellow dance tunes of Jack Miles and his Band of Bands, who is coming to Youngstown direct from the Blackhawk Restaurant in Chicago. William Best is the general chairman.

Novel programs in silver and black, the Junior Class colors, have been selected by the program committee which is headed by Jack Herald. The members of his committee are Mary Boylan, Mary Louise Pleger, Aurelia Potor, Helene Snyder, and Jack Lynch.

Silver and black will furnish the motif in the artistic decoration of the ballroom. Decorations are in charge of Joe Margo, chairman, who is assisted by Marietta Bagnall, Joe Fisher, and Gene Powers.

From festivities will be climaxed at

midnight by an impressive ceremonial attending the coronation of the Queen of the Prom. The Queen will be one of the three junior girls nominated by the masculine members of the Junior Class and selected by the men of the college. The three candidates are two blondes, Helene Snyder, and Helen Robinson, and a brunette, Mildred Bothwell. Earl O. Smith, the President of the Junior Class, will reign as Prom King.

The Junior Prom is the most outstanding event on the social calendar at Youngstown College. It is formal and admittance will be by invitation

only. The invitations which are limited to one hundred and fifty couples are in charge of the ticket committee: George Schoenhard and Mildred Bothwell are the Co-Chairmen who are assisted by Helen Creed, Vera Jenkins, Guyla Maze, Jean Reid, Helen Robinson, Jack Herald, Russel Hofmeister, William Kirkner, Bob Lewis, Earl Smith and Stewart Wagner. Invitations have been extended to the Board of Governors of the College.

The officers of the Junior Class are: Earl Smith, president; Helene Snyder, vice-president; Mildred Bothwell, secretary; William Kirkner, Treasurer and Dr. Harold N. Burt, the class Advisor.

The publicity for the Prom is under the direction of Jack Kenaston. The members of his committee include Mathilda Gogesch, Lois Hart, Lois Shaw, Guyla Maze, Elvira Tarten, Laurabelle Wighton and Edward Donahue.

The Student Council in a meeting held April 10 voted unanimously that the nominees for Prom Queen shall not be eligible for May Queen. It is

also understood that, in order to be eligible for May Queen, the contestant must have had three successive semesters in School at Youngstown College and that she must be either a Junior or a Senior woman.

A list of those Junior and Senior women who are eligible will be posted on the bulletin board this week, in order that a vote may be taken by the men of the college. Further details will be posted on the main bulletin board.

Student Council Makes Several Important Rulings

"Watsit" Allowed to Continue

The Student Council has been very active in regard to several matters. The Student Council voted that \$75 be allotted to the Junior Class for the Junior Prom.

A special meeting of the Student Council and the "Watsit" staff was held. The purpose of this meeting will be to discuss the authority the magazine staff had to operate without permission from the Student Council.

It was decided that the magazine be allowed to continue until all its present obligations are fulfilled, at that time it will be terminated. If the magazine wishes to be published next semester it will be required to file an application to Student Council before publication.

May Queen Elections will be held April 24 and 25. Primary elections the men students will vote for one girl; final elections they will vote on one of the three highest. There are eighteen Junior girls eligible and eleven Senior girls.

The following rules will govern the May Queen elections:

1. A girl to be eligible for May Queen nominations must be a Junior or a Senior who has completed two successive semesters in Youngstown College and be in her third successive semester.
2. All irregular students so classified by the Administration are ineligible for nomination or election. All girls taking less than ten hours are ineligible.
3. The men of the college shall nominate and elect all candidates both in the primaries and final elections.

It was voted unanimously by the Council that one girl attending Youngstown College may not be eligible for both Prom Queen and May Queen honors in the same year.

Mr. Frank Evans and Miss Judy Herr were appointed co-chairmen of May Day which will be May 24.

Mr. Dan Petite and Miss Mary Francis Dignan are co-chairmen for the J. W. Bare Breakfast, May 2.
