## Student Council Ok's Formation Of Lambda Nu

Members of Lambda Nu club, a social organization for women, petitioned Student Council for permission to organize at Council's meeting Friday.

STUDENT Council accepted the petition, by-laws and constitution stipulating the usual conditions which follow such requests. The organization must submit a similar petition to Pan-Hellenic Council. The club will be notified by Council when four months have expired, at which time the club must seek to be chartered by Council. The sorority may at this time request affiliation with a national sorority.

THE DISCIPLINE Committee chairman announced at this meeting that members of the two fraternities which have been placed on social probation may attend the Snowflake Frolic, tonight. The chairman of the Discipline Committee also stated that the Publications Committee has placed the Jambar policy under consideration and will make a decision concerning this subject at a meeting this week.

He also sought Council's views on several subjects concerning a revision of policy toward the Jambar for the Publication Committee's consideration. Council in a straw poll recommended to limit Jambar advertising to profit-making activities, limit editorial comment and criticism to groups and organizations as opposed to individuals. 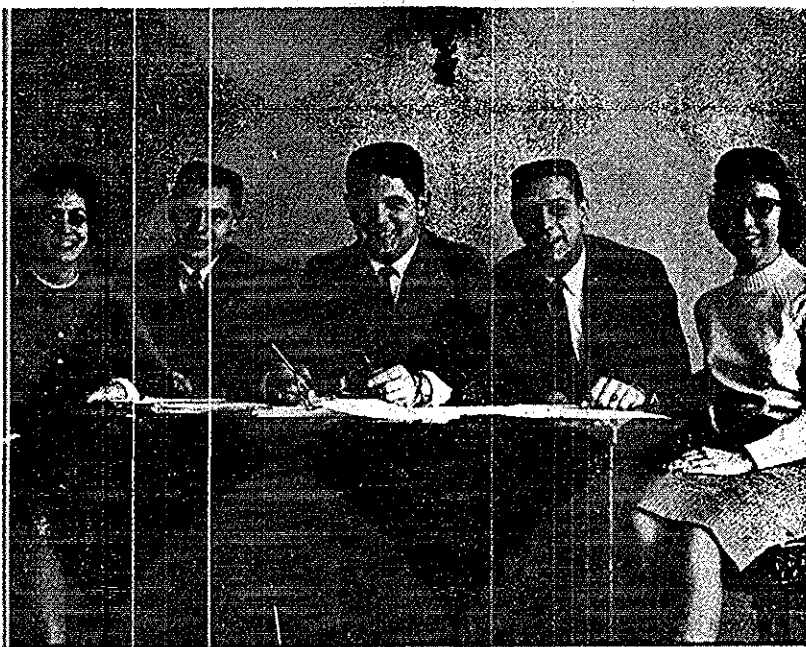
The spirit of Christmas is found in giving; giving of one's self. A relatively new organization on campus, Y.U.S.A. exists to promote spirit all year round.

## Research Group Elects Professor Dykema Trustee

Karl W. Dykema, head of the University English Dept. was elected a trustee of the Research Foundation of the National Council of Teachers of English at the Council's Golden Anniversary Convention in Chicago on Thanksgiving weekend. He was elected to a one-year term.

The Council's research foundation was established in honor of J.N. Hook, professor of English at the University of Illinois and executive secretary of NCTE from 1954 to 1960. Research conducted by the foundation will guide the Council in long-range studies and projects for improving the teaching of English.

The NCTE now numbers some 63,000 members and subscribers representing elementary, secondary, and college teachers of English. At its Chicago convention, it featured 475 program participants and attracted an attendance of over 8,000. Its headquarters are at Champaign, Illinois and James R. Squire is its executive Secretary.

The other trustees elected at the same time as Professor Dykema are: Helene W. Hartley, Professor Emeritus, Syracuse University, Robert C. Pooley, Chairman, Department of Integrated Liberal Studies, University of Wisconsin, Louise M. Rosenblatt, Professor, English Education, New York University, Porter G. Perrin, Professor of English, University of Washington.

No Independents Again

Why is it that the Youngstown University Student Council is made up almost entirely of "Greeks", members of fraternities and sororities? Why do we often hear the statement, "the 'Greeks' run everything-an independent doesn't have a chance"? The answer to both of these questions, or at least a very good indication of what the answer is, can be found in the fact that only one independent placed his name on the ballot for Student Council elections this semester - only one independent and 25 "Greeks".

In order to place one name on the ballot for the election, it is only necessary to carry a 1.75 (2.75 under the 4 point system) average, be a full time student, and have the time (from 3:00 to 5:00 p.m. on Friday free) to serve on Council. There are no other requirements to run for office on Council. One need not be a member of a "Greek" organization, he need not pay a poll tax, he doesn't even need a petition signed by a number of students - all he need do is sign his name to the roster of candidates which is located in the office of his respective dean, and he is in the running.

The question in our minds is, then, "why don't independents try to gain offices?" It can't be that, as is often stated, they are outnumbered; the Greeks are outnumbered by independents better than ten to one. The problem cannot be a lack of interest on the part of the independents, or they would not be constantly talking about their "lack of representation". It can't be the expense involved in an election, since the cost of one or two posters would, at most, be five or six dollars. The problem involved can't possibly be that there are not enough independents on campus to

supply the Council with one or two qualified members; there are over 3700 full time independents and less than 600 full time Greek organization members. The difficulty cannot stem from a lack of importance of the student government, since the Council has the power to legislate in connection with everything from school dances and discipline regulations to building projects. What, then, is the reason that independents do not attempt to gain office? The only answer that we see is that there must be a lack of information - a lack of knowledge about the entire situation. If that is the case, it is our hope that this letter, and future information bulletins that will follow, will solve the very pressing problem of non-participation by "independent" students.

This letter, in itself, should be sufficient indication of the fact that the Student Council members themselves are vitally interested in having "independent" membership among their numbers. We, as a legislative body, do not enact legislation on a basis of the affiliation of the members, we act as independent individuals, representing whatever school voted us into office. We would very much like to mirror this legislative fact in our membership by having a Council composed of "independents" and "Greeks" working together toward better, more efficient student government.

With the honest hope that the "independents" of Youngstown University will assert themselves and become active in their own government, we are Sincerely, The members of the Youngstown University Student Council.

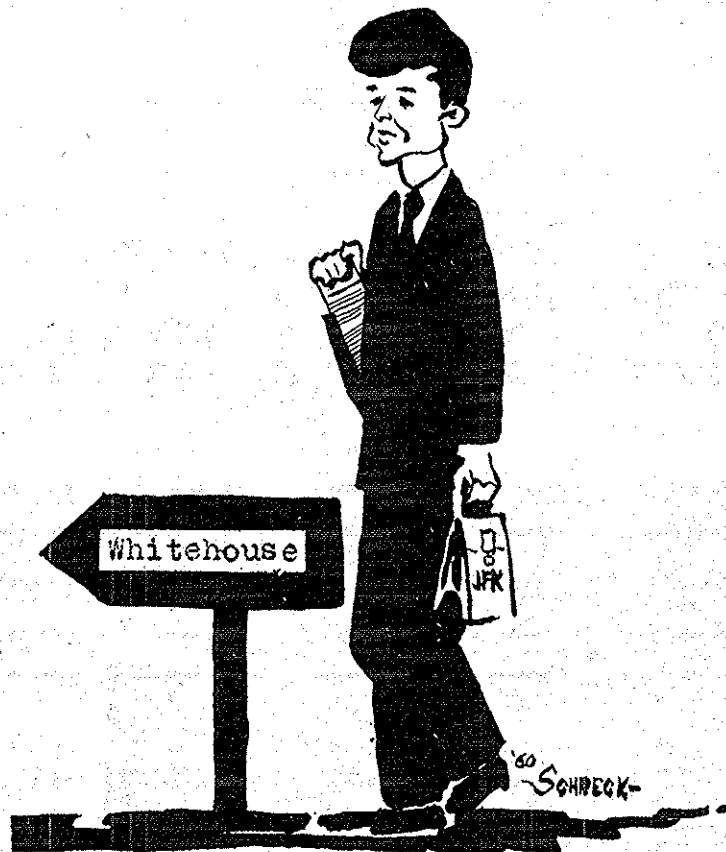
1961 Miss Neon Contest

JFK Choosing Cabinet; Plans Change in Policy

It looks as if President-elect Kennedy is making great strides toward the forthcoming transfer of administrations. The meeting with President Eisenhower last week was reported to be satisfactory to both men despite the strong pre-election differences.

The agenda for the 3 1/2 hour conference ranged from discussions with heads of state to a tour of the kitchens and dispensary area of that famous residence which will become home for Senator Kennedy on Jan. 20.

After the cordial session ended, JFK -- as the press has now dubbed him -- emerged smiling with comments on the generosity of President Eisenhower. This meeting marked the first of many conferences which will terminate when the gradual change-over of responsibilities occurs in January.

Until that time, the President-elect will be rounding out the cabinet. As this column goes to press three choices have been made, that include Governors Abraham Ribicoff of Connecticut, secretary of health, education and welfare; Luther H. Hodges of North Carolina, secretary of commerce; and Representative Stewart Udall of Arizona, secretary of the interior.

Kennedy's choices for the top positions in the nation will provide uncountless comments ranging anywhere from favorable agreements to apprehensive complaints. If he should appoint his brother Robert to the post of attorney general, the reactions will provide interesting reading. The cries of "nepotism" will chill the backs of patriots but won't delay the highballing Washington appointment process.

The Senator is energetic, accustomed to criticism and shown in the past his indifference to the prescribed politics to which history would make him adhere.

Kennedy is the symbol of a new age, the age of mandatory self-confidence.

He is an independent thinker and unlike many of his peers does not use the crutches of the party for support in his political undertakings. He represents a new type of leadership. A type of leadership that will demand from the men who adhere to it the courage to be different. Different in their outlook on party importance and different in their outlook on political compromise.

In his book "Profiles in Courage", the President-elect reviews the party pressures that burden the legislators of today. He refers to the obedient following of the party leadership as "going along". He states that, "the Senator who follows the independent course of conscience is likely to discover that he has earned the disdain not only of his colleagues in the Senate and his associates in his party but also that of the all-important contributors to his campaign fund."

He further adds that "men of conscience" must not "weigh each issue in terms of his chances for re-election ... or compromise away his principles on one issue after another for fear that to do otherwise would halt his career...."

Kennedy is the symbol of a new era in political thought. These critical years demand that he is free from the binding chains of "going along" party loyalty. He realizes the need for impartial decisions and has shown that he will not humble to political parties organized unions or any other power wielding organ simply for the sake of next elections votes -- to do so would be to lose "the very freedom of conscience which justifies his continuance in office".

**End This Confusion**

**Speed, Efficiency are Motives Behind Initial-Happy People**

A tendency for Americans to become initial-happy is readily evident. But this use of capsule comments didn't originate in the United States. In fact it began long before there was a United States.

THIS TREND has been a long time in the making -- oh, maybe not since B.C., but well into A.D. People have been dividing time into A.M. and P.M. at least since the 19th century. For a lot longer than that, B.A.'s, M.A.'s Ph.D.'s and other educated folk have been fond of sprinkling i.e. (that is), and e.g. (for example) throughout their discourse. O.K. has been an expression in the U.S.A. at least since 1828, yet few people have any notion of how this term originated. Even scholarly O.K.'ers aren't completely sure. Some say that O.K. derives from the Choctaw Indian word, OKE, meaning "it is so." Enemies of Andrew Jackson, a president as famous for his sketchy schooling as for his rugged leadership, said that Jackson coined the abbreviation from "all correct" as he spelled it, "orl korrek". Those who liked Jackson and his running mate, Martin van Buren (later elected President) maintained that O.K. came from van Buren's nickname of Old Kinderhook. (Van Buren was born in Kinderhook, New York.)

INITIALS HAVE become more and more O.K. ever since. In 1844, a group of idealistic Britons launched an organization which is almost never called by anything but its initials, Y.M.C.A. The same "short shrift" was given to another high-minded group founded 30 years later, the W.C.T.U. John D. (for David) Rockefeller, a frequent contributor to the YMCA, made an indirect contribution to the folklore of initials when the courts ordered the split-up of Standard Oil. Among the smaller companies formed were Esso (S.O. for Standard Oil) and Socony (Standard Oil Company of New York). Other business firms followed this lead and today most big corporations have initialed nicknames.

Sometimes it figures: who'd stumble through Batten, Barton, Durstine and Osborn when they can say a short, snappy "BBDO"? On the other hand, one of America's oldest, largest and most polysyllabic investment firms has never been known by its initials. We refer of course to Merrill, Lynch, Pierce, Fenner and Smith, formerly Merrill, Lynch, Pierce, Fenner and Beane, and sometimes known as "Merrill Lynch" or "Whee, the people."

PRODUCTS TOO, have often become known by their initials, sometimes to the point where people forget their actual names. Most Americans have seen the sleek, underling lines of the British MG sports car on highways, in showrooms or at least in the pages of a magazine, yet almost no Yanks know what the curious initials mean.

THE TRANSLATION: Morris Garages. When the first MG was

designed in 1923, the makers chose the initials as a tribute to William Morris, (later Lord Nuffield) from whose pioneer auto enterprise, "The Morris Garages", their own company had sprung.

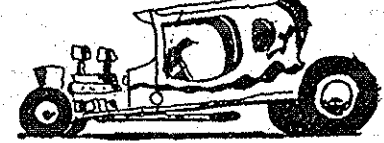
Other famous products known by their initials include the electronic "brain" UNIVAC (Universal Automatic Computer) and the radar upon which so much of our national defense depends. Did you know that RADAR stands for "radio detecting and ranging"?

The initial craze has gone even further. After the war, Americans developed a fondness for initials that spill out words. Some agencies, like SHAPE (Supreme Headquarters of the Allied Powers in Europe) and CARE (formerly Cooperative American Remittances to Europe and now Cooperative American Remittances to Everywhere) were long suspected of choosing their titles so that the first letters formed a word. A recent addition is the DEW (distant early warning) radar line that stretches across our continent's northern frontier.

THE GOVERNMENT Has always been an ace initial-coiner. The FBI was organized in 1908; the ICC (Interstate Commerce Commission) dates back even farther, to 1887. But it was in the Roosevelt era that "the letter of the law" really became a reality. The AAA, CCC, FTC, NIRA -- the list of acts and commissions goes on indefinitely. One legend has it that the National Industrial Recovery Act, which attempted to draw up codes of fair industrial competition, inspired thousands of Depression-battered parents to name their infant daughters Nira.

But don't get any ideas. The practice would be far from O.K. with your local cop (constable on patrol).

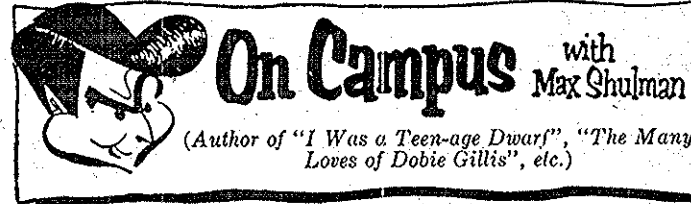

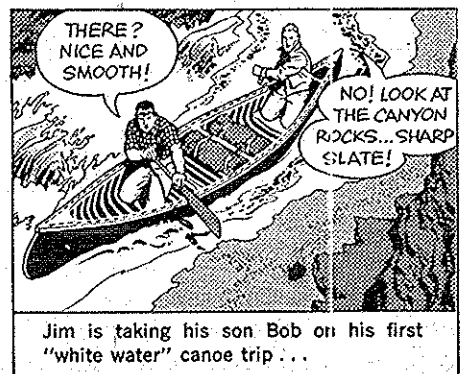

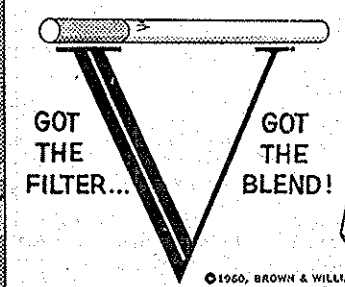

### Intramural Basketball Rules

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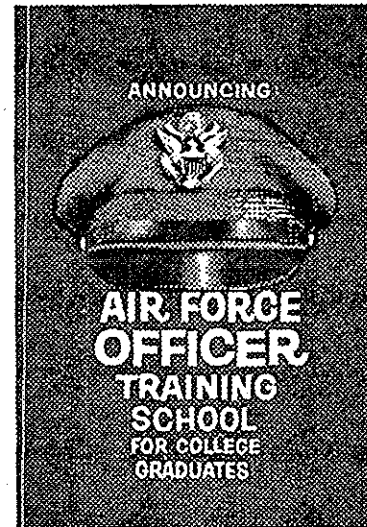
