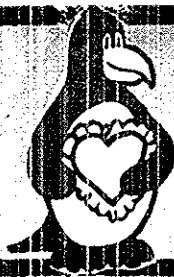

## Author relates black vet's woes

While the recently released film *Platoon* has been getting lots of recognition lately, one critically acclaimed author has also been getting recognition.

He is focusing attention on a part of Vietnam he said that *Platoon* didn't — the black soldier. Wallace Terry, prize-winning journalist and television personality, spoke to a small crowd Wednesday night on the plight of the black soldier in the Vietnam War and as his experiences as a journalist in that war.

The lecture was part of the continuing activities of Black History Month.

Terry is the author of *Bloods, An Oral History of the Vietnam War by Black Veterans*, nominated for the Pulitzer Prize by Walter Anderson of *Parade Magazine*. Anderson called it the best book so far written on the Vietnam War.

That book was a long time coming though, Terry said. "*Bloods* was not an overnight success."

Although he wrote the book right after the war, it was not published for 10 years. "My publisher told me that no one would publish it," he said. "I had picked two of the worst subjects to write on — an unpopular war and black men with guns!"

After 124 rejection letters over a span of 10 years, Random House asked for an oral history of the war, he said. He re-wrote it and

## Faculty leaves supposed controversy up to viewer

Red, white and blue symbolizes patriotic pride — imagine if those colors were replaced by the red and yellow of the CCCP.

Critical speculation looms in the wake of ABC's decision to air the mini-series, *Amerika*, depicting life in the U.S. 10 years after a Soviet takeover.

Experts have said that the mini-series encourages public awareness of a possible Soviet takeover. The mini-series has drawn criticism from those who have only seen clips and not the movie in its entirety.

The 14½ hour-long mini-series to be aired at 8 p.m. Sunday, Feb. 15 on the ABC network. *Amerika* is the fourth longest mini-

### Students act as extras during historic filming

COLLEGE PRESS SERVICE — Critics have called the upcoming ABC mini-series *Amerika*, everything from right-wing propaganda to a threat to arms negotiations with the Soviet Union to a great antidote to the left-wing propaganda of 1985's *The Day After* mini-series, but two Nebraska college students who are in the show say the critics are all wet.

"It's not slanted," insisted Shawn Dawson, a University of Nebraska film studies sophomore who says he "just fell into" a bit part in the movie when the crew came to film in Lincoln and Tecumseh, Nebraska.

The 14½ hour *Amerika* takes place 10 years after a Soviet

series to be aired on the major networks.

Early critiques of the film have been negative and many critics say the film shows the Soviets in a bad manner. Because of this negative portrayal, some critics say the film will hurt relations between the U.S. and the Soviet Union.

Laura Hanson, speech communication and theater major, said she doesn't feel our negotiations will be affected by airing the controversial film. "Seeing the film will jeopardize our relations, but it's a big burden to put on television," Hanson said.

ABC has had problems in gaining clearance for some of its news personnel in Russia, but it has never been reported if the filming of *Amerika* was the reason for shunning ABC correspondents.

## Security sends case to prosecutor's office

The NFL Super Bowl has been known to set some tempers flaring — and Kilcawley Center experienced some of those flaring tempers when a number of fights erupted over a Super Bowl bet.

The fights which involved a number of YSU students and one non-student who came to campus to collect on a bet, were recently reported to Campus Security.

The case has been turned over to the City Prosecutors Office.

According to Sgt. Greg Clementi, Campus Security, the parties involved were each issued a Prosecutor's Notice to appear in the Prosecutor's

Office.

"This appearance with the prosecutor allows them all to try and talk it all out. Hopefully things will work out and the case can be dropped," he said.

Campus Security reported that on Jan. 26, Samer S. Awadallah, Berlin Center, came to the YSU campus to get \$20 from Mike Marantis, freshman, A&S, that he said he won on a Super Bowl bet.

According to the report, Awadallah said he found Marantis in Arby's. An argument began when Marantis said he had heard rumors that Awadallah would start a fight if he was not paid.

The report continued that Marantis paid Awadallah. However, as Awadallah walked

away, Steve Tsarnas, freshman, A&S, a friend of Marantis', pushed Awadallah and a fight began.

After the fight was broken up by friends, Awadallah got into an argument with the girlfriend of another YSU student, George Poullas, senior, CAST, when she told him that students "could get kicked out of school for fighting," the report stated.

According to the report, Poullas then told Awadallah to apologize to his girlfriend and he refused. Poullas reportedly punched Awadallah in the mouth and slammed him to the floor.

Awadallah told Campus Security that a friend took him to St. Elizabeth Hospital and that he was admitted for a broken jaw.


One YSU student has a friend in the right place — the Liberty Police Department. That friend recovered the student's jean jacket stolen from the Stambaugh Sports Complex in January.

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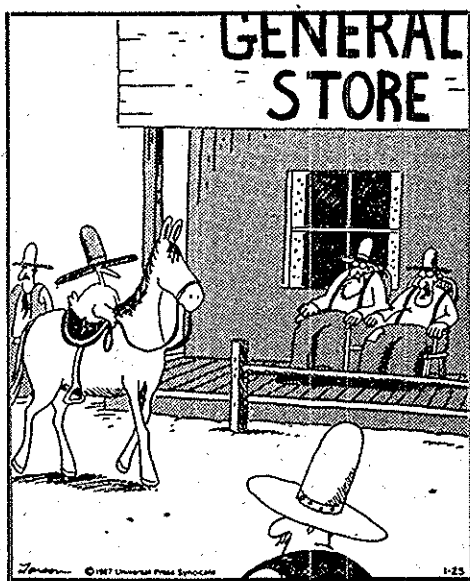
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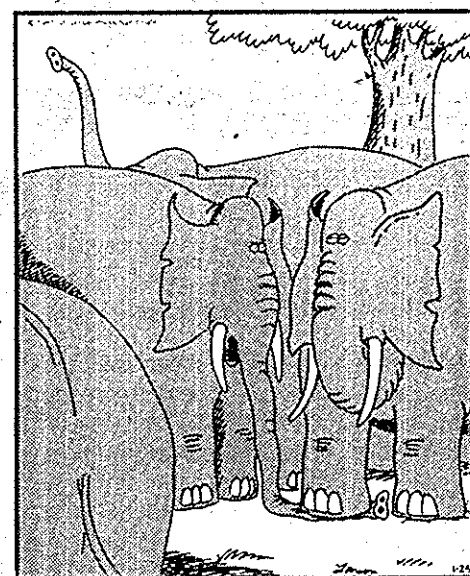
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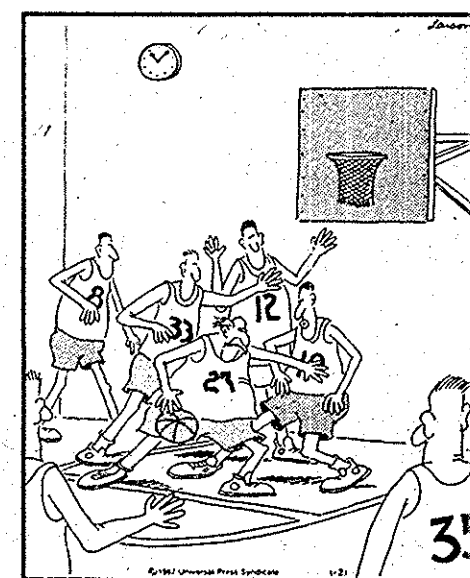

## Awards honor deserving writers

YSU — Two Robert R. Hare Awards will be given to YSU students who show talent in creative and critical writing and journalism.

The Robert R. Hare Writing Award for Distinction in Journalistic Writing and the award for Distinction in Creative and Critical Writing was established by Dr. Mary Virginia Hare in memory of her late husband Robert R. Hare, a member of the English Dept. faculty and former *Jambar* advisor at YSU.

The yearly award will provide \$250 to a full-time undergraduate student at YSU who has demonstrated distinction in journalistic writing.

Both award will be given at the end of spring quarter, with announcement of the winner to be made at the Honors Day Program.

Candidates for the award must be full-time students at YSU who have not won the award for the preceding year.

They must submit a dossier containing samples of their journalistic writing to Carolyn Martindale, Room 210, DeBartolo Hall, no later than 5 p.m., Thursday, March 5.

As many as five samples of writing may be included in the dossier. All types of journalistic See Awards, page 8

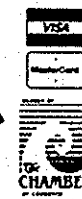

In broadcasting classes students learn about constructed mediated reality (CMR). This is what television is all about — media transferring images of our way of life to the screen.

The upcoming mini-series *Amerika* does not predict what America will be like in ten years it is taken over by the Soviet Union, but is a representation of what it could be like.

But many people who are voicing their opinions think the series is a direct blow against "life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness."

It's like when you were young and your parents told you television is pretend. This show is pretend but urges viewers to take another look in the land in which we live.

The series urges people to honestly think about what it's like to live in the United States, what it's like to have democratic freedom.

People try to imitate, emulate and act like characters on television but it's never quite right. Women really can't look like Joan Collins or Victoria Principle. And men don't really want to be like Larry Hagman or John Forsythe. But there are those that still try.

Keep in mind that television is not a true image of what life is really like. Maybe that's why networks, the government and advertisers are in such a huff — because they make their living off of television's huge influence over the American people.

But will the show make a dif-

ference after it is shown?

Guaranteed that's what will happen with *Amerika*. Everyone is in a huff about it now and the huff will last for a few days while the miniseries airs — and then people will go back to their old ways. And that's a shame considering networks offer television sitcoms such as "Alf" and "Head of the Class." If anything, maybe *Amerika* will provoke people to think.

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# Watson award recognizes chairpersons Commentary

YSU — YSU students aren't the only ones to be given awards for superior performance; YSU academic chairpersons receive recognition in the form of the Watson Merit Awards.

The criterion to be used in making the awards will be an emphasis on administrative performance rather than teaching

or research.

By rewarding good performance, the University hopes to encourage the attraction and retention of qualified persons; one element to be given weight will be longevity in the chairperson position.

Each dean is asked to

nominate deserving people from among the chairpersons. Chairpersons can make nominations through the nominee's dean.

The dean will then forward all nominations with his recommendations to the provost.

A committee including the associate provost, dean of graduate studies and research

and the vice-president of Personnel Services will aid the Provost in the selection of two to four awardees from those recommended by the deans.

Announcement of the awards will be made at the Honors Convocation on May 12, 1987.

Nominations for the Watson Merit Awards must be submitted to the Provost's Office no later than April 15, 1987.

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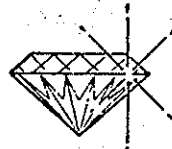


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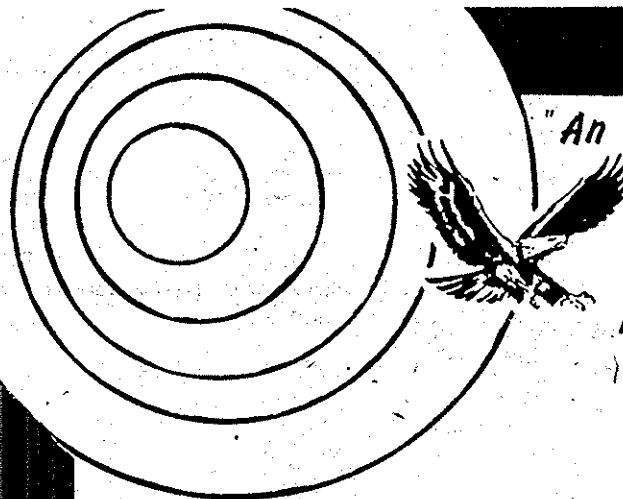


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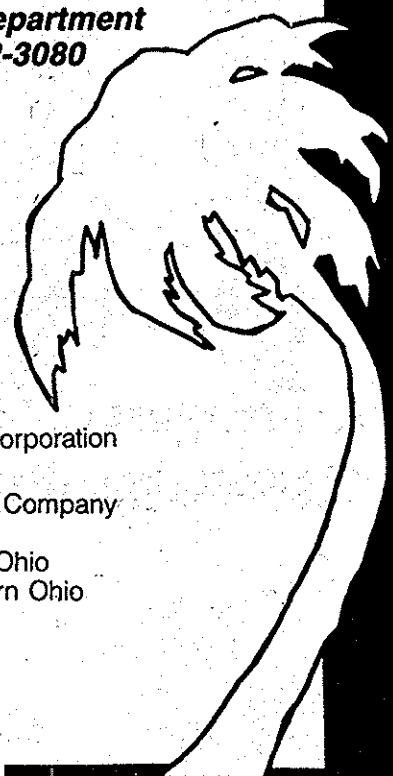

## Professor's aunt nears canonization

It will never be known if Edith Stein, better known as Sister Teresa Benedicta, was scared or carried her usual serenity when she was forced to walk into a Nazi gas chamber in Auschwitz during World War II.

It will be known that the Catholic church will declare her a saint during a canonization ceremony in May in Cologne, Germany.

A nephew of Sister Benedicta, Dr. Gerhard Stein, professor emeritus of electrical engineering, will attend the canonization ceremony with his two granddaughters. Through the 25-year-long effort, Stein has encouraged the beatification and canonization of his aunt.

Attaining sainthood is a three

step process: the first is sending word to Catholic officials in Rome; the second is beatification; and the third is canonization as a saint.

On Jan. 26, the Vatican Congregation for Saints' Causes declared Sister Benedicta "venerable," a title given to a person who has reached the first of three degrees of sanctity in consideration for sainthood.

In official decrees published on Jan. 27 the congregation declared the nun a martyr of the church and possessor of "heroic virtues."

Citing her show of compassion for others, Stein recalls his aunt during her teen years when she was instructed to help her nephew with his homework.

Born in Breslau, in what is now Poland, in 1891, Sister Benedicta was the youngest of

11 children. Sister Benedicta earned a doctorate and became a well-known writer, teacher and philosopher.

During World War I she interrupted her studies to work for the Red Cross taking care of typhoid patients and the German wounded.

She was baptized as a Catholic in 1922 and entered the Carmelite convent at Cologne in 1933.

An older sister, Rosa, also was baptized a Catholic and later entered the same convent.

The two sisters moved to Carmelite convent in Echt, Holland but were arrested in August 1942 by the Nazis when they invaded that country. The two were sent to Auschwitz for execution and died on Aug. 10, 1942.

Stein, who came to the U.S.

in the late '30s, said it was hard during World War II to find out what was going on in Europe. He said their family received word of Sister Benedicta's death by the U.S. armed forces.

Another YSU faculty member, Helen Vangorder, English, has been working on a book of Sister Benedicta's life since 1977. The work has been put on the "back burner" because of health problems but she said she continues her research.

Vangorder has visited five European countries in search of information regarding Sister Benedicta. Vangorder said she has visited the room in which Sister Benedicta was when the Nazis apprehended her.

Vangorder said many of the works she has been researching are in Italian and German which slows the process down. If the book is not completed, Vangorder said she intends to write a series of articles on the saint's life.

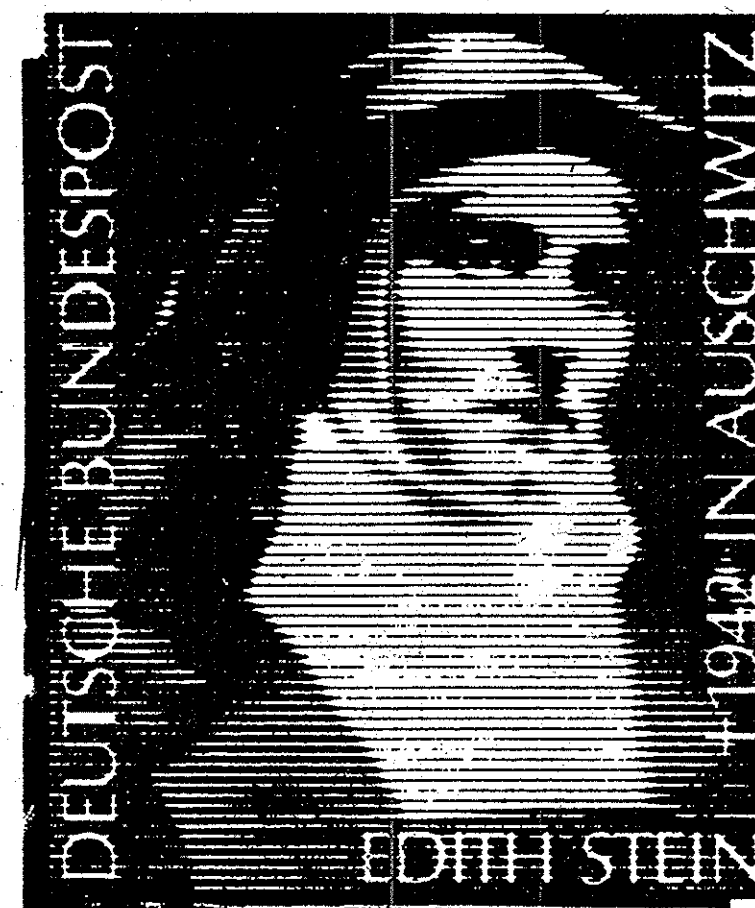

# Gifted students Area students find 'treasures' at YSU

If you happen to be on campus during a Saturday in February, you just might run into a different kind of student.

Fifty gifted students, grade four through six, are participating in an academic enrichment program called "Saturday Treasures on Campus."

The purpose of "Saturday Treasures" is to provide a different academic experience to gifted students whose interests surpass his or her grade level.

"The department of continuing education coordinates the program," said Dr. Juanita Roderick. "And I serve as an advisor to them."

Roderick, elementary education and reading department, is also president for the Ohio Association for Gifted Children and coordinator of the graduate program in

gifted education at YSU.

The program started four years ago and was limited to just 20 students. "Because of the program's growing interest, last year we had to turn away 67 kids," said Roderick. "We were only able to accept 60 kids."

There are as many kids this year and the interest in the program continues to grow.

The program gives the students a chance to attend two, 90 minute classes each Saturday for a total of eight classes.

According to Roderick, the classes are taught by full service YSU professors. The professors pick their own topics they wish to teach about.

Some of this year's topics include: "Hot and Cold Molecules;" "Art Anagrams;" "Mount St. Helen - A Later Look;" and "Digging Up the Past."

The classes also provide the students with hands-on learning about microscopes, microfiche, laserbeams, etc.

"The program is unique in three ways," explained Roderick. "First, instruction is provided by YSU professors. Second, the children go to different academic buildings on campus. Third, graduated students, who are teachers in the masters program, accompany the students back and forth to the buildings."

The students are not chosen by the University, however. The students are identified by the county coordinators of Gifted Programs in the Tri-county area.

Roderick stressed the students' ability is not determined only on IQ's. The students are already enrolled in a gifted program in their school and the teachers or principals recommend them.

 writings are acceptable, but the samples should include at least one news story.

There is no limitation on the length of a sample.

Each sample should be in the form of typed manuscript and a copy of the printed form of the story, if it was published, may be included. Both unpublished and published samples of journalistic writing are acceptable; published works should have been printed within the past three years in a university or professional periodical.

In order that the judging can be blind, candidates are asked to mask out their names, with masking tape or white-out, anywhere the name appears on the stories or papers they include in their dossiers. A separate sheet of paper bearing the candidate's name, address and phone number should be inserted in the dossier.

Criteria to be used in judging the samples include the writer's ability in meeting the accepted standards of journalistic writing, the difficulty of the type of writing done or subject covered and creativity with language and story structure.

Also considered will be the writer's versatility as evidenced by the variety of types of writing submitted.

A series of stories on a single topic may be submitted, although each story within the series will be counted as one writing sample.

The award for Distinction in Creative and Critical Writing will be given to an English major at YSU who has demonstrated distinction in writing ability.

The candidates must demonstrate distinction in creative and critical writing. Such writing is defined as including poetry, fiction, drama and exposition.

They must also be an undergraduate English major at YSU.

The candidate may not have won this award the preceding year, and must submit a dossier.

A candidate applies by submitting his dossier to Dr. Stephen Sniderman, DeBartolo Hall, Room 215.

The dossier must include a sample or samples of the candidate's writing. The maximum number of samples must be limited to three complete works with the exception that four or five complete short poems will be considered equal to one short story or other prose work.

No excerpts from longer works should be included. There is no restriction as to length.

The dossier may, if the candidate desires, also include any other evidence of the candidate's demonstrated writing distinction that he feels appropriate, such as publication record (limited to the last three years), awards or prizes won for writing, recommendations of faculty or experts in the field, grade on paper submitted for a course in an accredited educational institution, and evaluations by specialists (such as editor of publication or teacher of writing course).

Included with the dossier should be a separate sheet of paper bearing the candidate's name, present address and telephone number. Deadline for the 1987 Award is Thursday, March 5, at 5 p.m.

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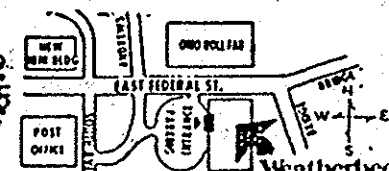

## Society shows breast cancer increase

YOUNGSTOWN — One in ten American women will develop breast cancer at some point of her life, marking an all-time high for incidence of this form of the disease, according to estimates announced by the American Cancer Society.

This is the first predicted increase in breast cancer incidence since 1980, when the Society's estimate rose from one in thirteen to one in eleven women.

In its annual publication, *Cancer Facts and Figures*, the society estimates that in 1987 approximately 130,000 women will develop breast cancer, 6,600 of those in Ohio.

Although lung cancer still holds first place as the leading cancer killer of both men and women, breast cancer is the most prevalent cancer among women.

According to Rich Morgan, the Mahoning County Unit President of the Society, the reason for this rise in incidence is unknown. "We are trying to determine why breast cancer is striking more women than ever," he said. "For now, we urge women to follow the three steps to detect breast cancer at its earliest stages, when the opportunity for successful treatment is

greatest."

The American Cancer Society's guidelines for early detection of breast cancer includes monthly breast self-examination for women 20 and over, as well as regular clinical breast examinations performed by a physician.

In addition, the Society recommends mammography, a low-dose x-ray of the breast, every year for asymptomatic women 50 and over and a baseline mammogram for those 35 to 39. Women 40 to 49 should have a mammogram every one to two years.

"Every woman should consider herself at risk for breast cancer," Mary Anne Ladigo, supervisor of Oncology Nursing, St. Elizabeth's Hospital Medical Center and ACS Vice President said, "and we must take the time and the effort to detect this disease at its earliest stage."

According to Ladigo, the use of mammography is essential in detecting early cancers. "Thanks to mammography, we are now able to locate breast cancers that are too small to be felt by either the woman herself or even the most experienced physician," she said. "Finding the cancer in a non-invasive state — before

it has a chance to spread — means that the patient, in almost 100 percent of cases and with proper treatment, will remain free of the disease," Ladigo said.

Patients with a localized form of breast cancer have a survival rate of over 90 percent. If the cancer has spread, however, the survival rate drops to 60 percent.

Despite the increase in incidence of breast cancer, Ladigo explained that the new advances in treatment have help stabilize the mortality rate for this form of cancer. "In the 1940's, women with localized breast cancer had a survival rate of 78 percent. Today, the rate is 90 percent or better."

Ladigo continued, "Because of the high survival rates when breast cancer is detected early, the local American Cancer Society will distribute breast cancer detection guidelines to Mahoning County residents during its April door-to-door campaign. We want to save as many Mahoning County residents from cancer as possible."

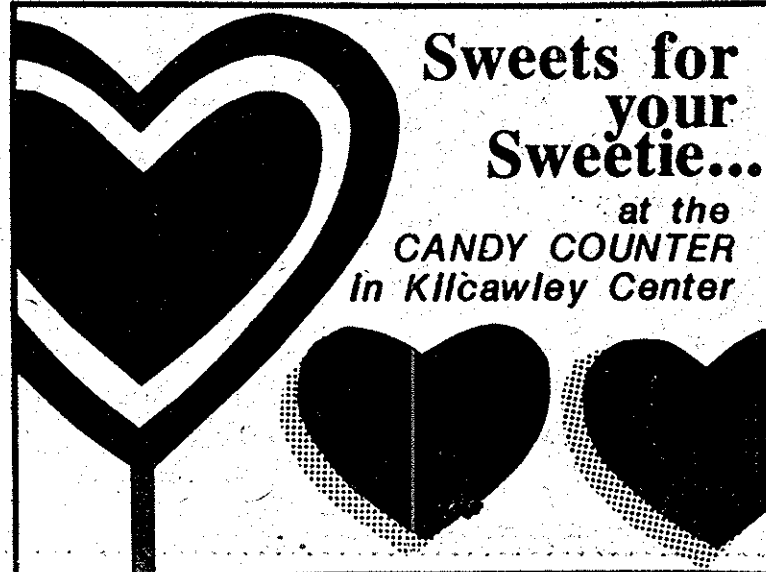

it was published. "It was time — people were beginning to talk about the war and what took place."

Why hold on to a subject for 10 years and 124 rejection letters?

"I didn't want the black soldier to disappear as they so often did in history," he said.

Terry attributed much of that lack of black history to Hollywood. "Hollywood missed the story — I didn't want to," he said.

"Hollywood made the white soldier invincible and the black soldier *invisible*."

Terry cited the popular film *Patton*. "There was one black soldier in Patton's army — and he was shining shoes."

While Terry found *Platoon* to be "a fine film up to the point of actual battle," he said that the movie's idea of human relations was "an abysmal, racist disaster."

Terry said his experiences in Vietnam as a correspondent for *Time Magazine* told a very different story than what the Hollywood movies portray.

"Blacks carried a greater burden in Vietnam. They were

discriminated against," he said. "They were the last to get the coveted rear line positions, the last to get medals and the last to get promoted."

However, Terry said that black/white relations on the front line were quite different.

"The great untold story is the brotherhood that existed on the front line. Blacks and whites shared water and food — blacks saved whites, whites saved blacks," he said.

"If we would emulate what happened on the front line, we could advance human relations immensely."

Terry's lecture featured a slide presentation of *Bloods* and anonymous voices told their own story.

"You knew you would go on night patrol because you were black," one voice said.

I had more fear coming back to the line than I did going out. The white guys always made jokes that they couldn't see us when we came back," said another voice.

I think of Vietnam every day..." said another.

But one voice echoed what Terry had said about the unity of the front line. A black man hurried to the side of a white man when he heard his cries for help.

"When I heard his voice, I didn't hear the color of his skin — I heard the color of the flag."

takeover of the United States, but focuses more on family problems and human character than real political ideology, Dawson and Nebraska education major Jeff Mirowski said.

"*Amerika*," said Mirowski, who plays an American as well as a Soviet soldier in the show, deals with "a very human aspect of the Russian side and the American side."

Dawson added, "It really bothers me that people who haven't seen it criticize it."

The criticism has been rabid

ever since ABC announced it would run the show. Physicians for the Prevention of Nuclear War, for example, said the program would "pour fuel on the embers of the cold war."

In recent weeks, Soviet newspapers have reportedly issued almost daily denunciations of the series.

Chrysler cancelled its agreement to buy a reported \$7 million worth of advertising during the Feb. 15-20 run, saying after a preview of the show its patriotic commercials contrasted with the program's tone.

Mirowski, though, said "the patriotic feeling runs high" in

the series, and in viewers watching it. "I think all the controversy was intentional; invented somehow, somewhere down the line" to draw attention to the series.

Both Mirowski and Dawson said their political views remain pretty much the same as before they read the screenplay by Donald Wrye and saw the world premiere in Tecumseh.

Mirowski said he now feels more strongly about the need for an adequate military defense, although, he added, "I would not like to see as much money spent, and I don't think we need the Star Wars project."

## Students perform in jazz ensemble

Four members of YSU's Jazz Ensemble I, which is directed by Tony Leonardi, have been selected to perform with the 20-member All-Ohio Intercollegiate Jazz Ensemble Feb. 14.

The students are nominated by their jazz ensemble directors and selected by a committee from the Ohio Unit of National Association of Jazz Educators. Each college jazz ensemble in the state is allowed to nominate up to seven members to the band.

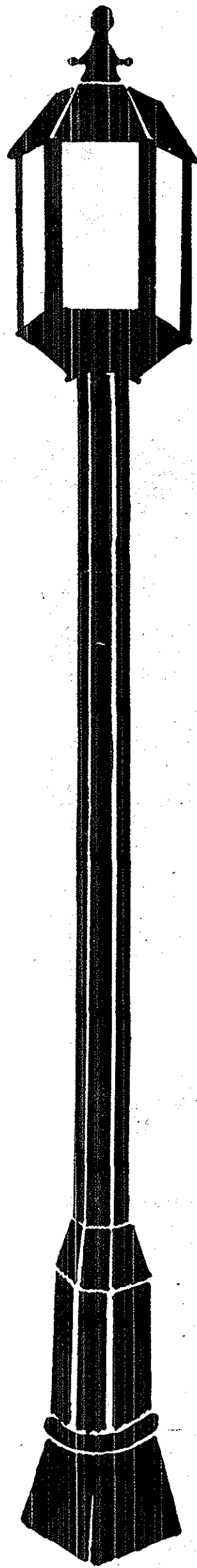

YSU — Youngstown State basketball players Tilman Bevely and Dorothy Bowers were ranked among the nation's scoring leaders heading into this week's action.

Bevely, who leads the Penguins' mens' team with a 23.7 points per game average, is 15th in the United States according to the latest NCAA statistics. His average is less than 1½ points away from cracking the top 10.

Bowers leads the Lady Penguins with a 24.5 scoring average, good for seventh in the country. Her average is less than four points behind first place.

69-66. EKU center Tyrone Howard hit on both ends of a one-and-one with 11 seconds left in the ballgame to seal the victory for the Colonels.

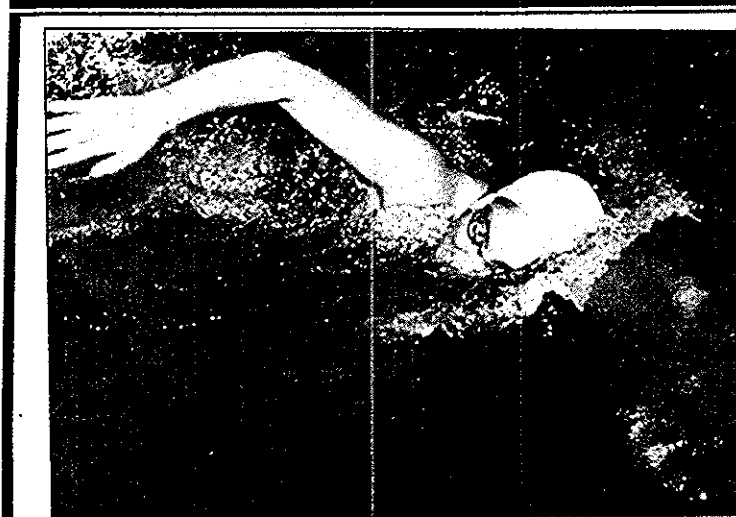

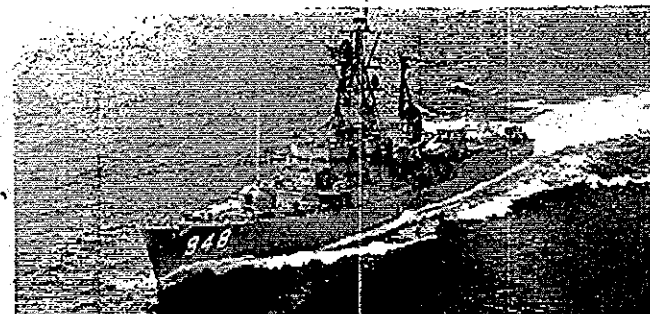

Hanson explained that she thinks the Soviet Union realizes how our government has no control over the media. "They understand how our media works and I don't think the Soviets will use this movie as an excuse during negotiations."

*Amerika* is not the first mini-series that has caused a controversial stir amongst critics, the American public and advertisers. Networks experienced controversy over other mini-series such as *Roots* and *The Day After*.

According to Hanson, the public accuses television of not addressing serious topics, but when it does, that is not good

enough either. Hanson noted that it is impossible to predict what the public will like.

The speech communications instructor said she wants to watch the series because she has read supporting and opposing views and is anxious to see which side comes the closest.

"A lot is going to depend on the first installment," Hanson said. "ABC will have a viewer percentage on Sunday night because of the hype that the series has caused. After that it will be up to the series to keep the audience."

The controversial topic is what networks sometimes strive for because of the high viewership. However, controversial television shows can deter advertising and show

sponsorship.

Such was the case with the series *Amerika*.

The Chrysler corporation pulled out its advertisement commitment from *Amerika* because the company thought its advertisements would be inappropriate in a film about a Soviet takeover, according to a recent *New York Times* article.

Chrysler was the largest sponsor of the mini-series. The car company's commercials cost an estimated \$7 million. ABC refused to announce the names of any of the other sponsors of the program, but said none of the other sponsors pulled out.

Dr. Jane Simmons, marketing, said that because of Chrysler's advertising image of

"The Pride is back. Born in America," that it makes sense for them to back out.

"There is no way of predicting how the public will react to a program, so Chrysler is taking a conservative stand by backing out," Simmons said.


"Chrysler has received a lot of free mentions in the media since its decision to pull out. It's up to the public to look upon this decision after seeing the movie to perceive Chrysler favorably or unfavorably," Hanson said.

Simmons added that any buy in advertising is a gamble. "Companies have to look at the program environment and decide whether it will be in its best interest to sponsor that

program."

According to Hanson, the show will sustain either complex matters that requires viewer commitment or it may be slow moving and dull.

"People who watch without serious interest may see a positive side to the movie, or they may only see negative scenes and come off with a negative impression of the movie. *Amerika* may be a piecemeal viewing," concluded Hanson.

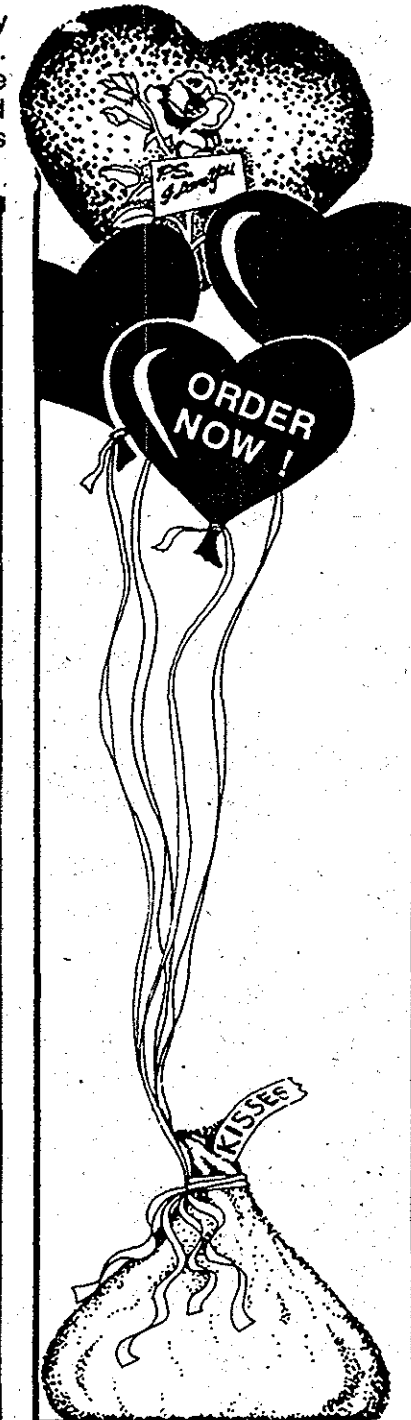
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
