College Is No Sanctuary For Lazy Draft Dodgers
It isn't difficult to convince most people that as
nation we must preserve our educational and traina nation we must preserve our educational and train-
ing facilities to meet the future demands for trained
men. It is however difficult to convince these same people that most college students are not seeking sanctuary instead of an education.

Promising students, under the new draft bill, will
et a chance to finish their college education, but get a chance to finish their college education, but
the final decision in each case is up to the individual draft board. Contrary to some misbelief, every col lege student will not automatically meet the specifi-
cations. Each student eligible for draft call, will be required to take an exam. These exams will be grad
ed by a national service set up expressly for this purpose, and each graded exam will then be sent to exams at their disposal it will be their decision that

A paradox exists, that defends our institutes of higher learning and attacks the students that attend
these schools. This situation didn't always exist. It used to be felt that college stace were ambitious group who worked hard to better themselves
Why the change in sentiment? Maybe, as with indi-
viduals who grow older, our nation too is becoming more and more skeptical. To those skepticse who
who feel that every one is getting a tast shu free and
that the days of indastrious youth are gone there
isn't much we can say to relieve them of this feeling. Yet let us never pass up an opportunity to prove that attending coll

To support any plan that would needlessly cur inviting a condition that would weaken our whole educational advantage. College facilities are no built overnight. A college grows through someone

Counselling college students who need aid in meeting adCounseling college students who need aid in meeting ad-
justment problems in social, academic, religious and be-present-day American colleges and universities. This is the present-day American colleges and universities. This is the Counselling" held reecntly at the YMCA by the Mahoning Valley Mental Hygiene Association.
Dr. Charles Winslow, of Kent
State University psychology Dept. acquainted panel members and
listeners with the results of a psychology clinic that has been available to KSU students for sev-
en y years. Dr. Winslow is one of

three professors who devote half
their time to counselling students who come to the guidance center Outlining the twoofold of the clinic as (1) to help students adjust to their problems at
the university and (2) to provide the university and (2) to provide
advance training in practical psychology for graduate and unde-
graduate psychology students, Dr. graduate psychology students, Dr.
Winslow stated that the counselors use the non-directive method
as much as is practically possible.
Advisor Is 'Sounding-Board'
Non-Directive Counselling was explained as a guidance method
in which the counselor helps th student understand his problems
more clearly and presents to him more clearly and presents to him
possible solutions. "There is no direct attempt to change the student's religious or moral evalua-
titons or concepts," Dr. Winslow
assured the assured the group. "The counselor acts as
flects the counselee's problems and offers
solving them.
