place was its cleanliness. That's

visiting the mills in Youngstown), but it's so. From one end of the mill to the other, emphasis is placed on cleanliness and safety. It's really an example to any man-

ishing division, machin sho ishing division, machine shop, and
the electrolytic tin plating line. eWW note, in passing, that the walls of the machine shop are finished in two-tone light green. What a place to work. The most interest-

the tin plating line. There, they plate sheet steel with tin, in a continuous strip, moving at a rate of
