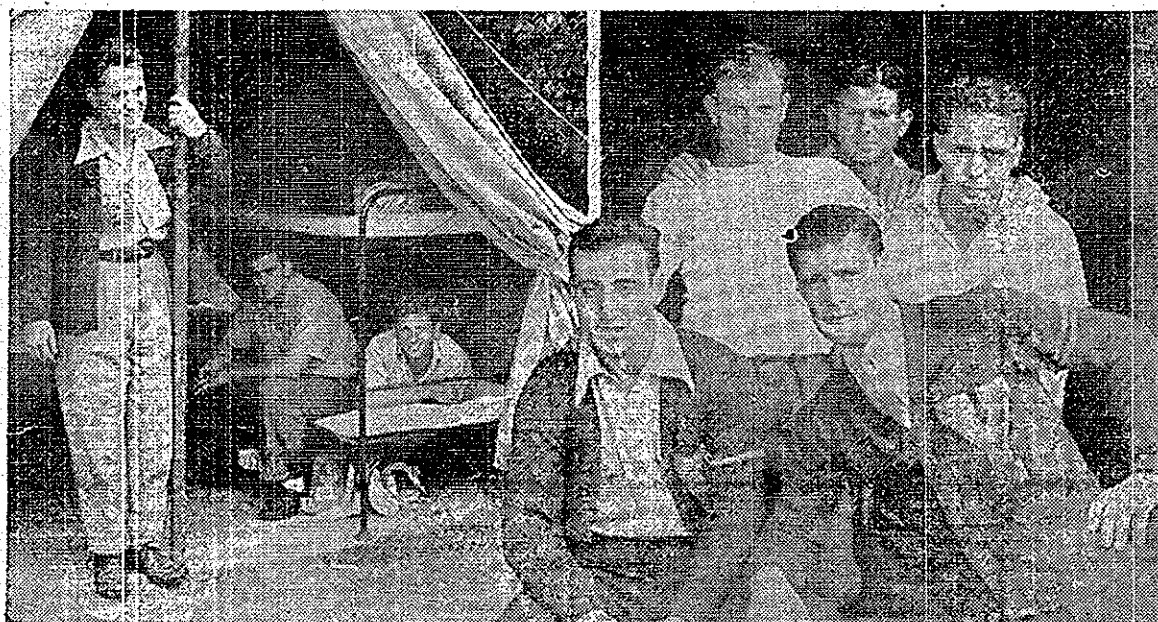

## Beedemen to Open Season Tomorrow

### Geneva Again to Oppose Veteran Penguin Line-up At Rayen High Stadium

Coach "Dike" Beede's 1941 edition of Red and Gold gridders will take the field tomorrow evening at Rayen Stadium to launch Youngstown College's fourth year of inter-collegiate football. The Geneva College Covenanters, traditional opening game rivals, once again will furnish the opposition for the initial fray. Game time is 8:15 P.M.

Training-camp observers, without making any predictions, have shown great optimism in speaking of the Penguins' chances for a very successful campaign. This confidence is derived from the brilliant performances of several newcomers and of most of last year's mainstays.

## New Instructors Added to Staff

Because of the increase in enrollment, new instructors have been added to the day-time faculty.

Hans W. Weigert, professor of political science and sociology, is now a full-time instructor at Youngstown college besides carrying hours with the Hiram college staff.

Mr. Weigert studied law and economics at the Universities of Tuebingen, Freiburg, and Berlin, getting his Ph. D. in law at Freiburg. After being judge in Berlin, he was appointed a member of the International Division of Prussian Ministry of Law where he dealt with problems of the Versailles Treaty.

Being in the United States only 2 1/2 years, he has made himself well known by publishing books and articles in the field of law and political science. His latest article on German Geopolitics will be published in the November issue of Harper's magazine.

Donald Bostwick, a part-time instructor last year, will now carry a full load with the math department.

The new theory course in home economics being offered this semester will be taught by Miss V. Faroz.

## Halls Jammed as YoCo Opens Doors

Over 700 students crowded the corridors Monday morning when Youngstown college opened its doors for the fall term. The pre-enrollment is 1,250 which included students in both day and night school, business school and the music conservatory.

The enrollment for full-time students is about 10 per cent under that of last year, but night school enrollment has topped last year's by 15 per cent.

Classes were cut short the first day, allowing students to make last minute adjustments. The book store was swamped as payments and purchases were made and locker assignments received. Registration shows that the engineering course is by far the most popular this year, with elementary teaching running a close second.

Transfer students enrolled for this term are from Ohio U., Miami, Muskingum, Columbia C., Wooster, Mt. Union, Ohio State, Whittemberg, Indiana Tech, Kent, Case School of Applied Science and many others.

## Freshman Edict

Greetings, Freshmen:

We, as upperclassmen of Youngstown College, bestow upon you freshmen the responsibilities, cooperation, and school spirit which fundamentally make up a college education. In order to initiate you into this great institution of ours, we have created this Freshman Edict which must be accepted and carried out with the proper school spirit.

All freshmen must comply with the following rules:

1. Official caps shall be worn at all times by all men and women during freshmen week.
2. Enter and leave only by the rear door and rear drive. Only the stairs facing Wick Avenue may be used.
3. Women shall use no cosmetics; men shall not shave.
4. Conversation between the opposite sexes is prohibited.
5. The Alma Mater and history of the college should be ready for presentation at all times.

6. Every student shall bring firewood each morning to be used at the bonfire. It shall be stacked beside the drive near the faculty parking lot.

Heber, Sontag, Aiello, Perantoni, Wolansky, and Warden will be on hand for backfield duty, while "All-Ohio" Rosselli, Sloko Gill, Bob Burns, Colclaser, and others of proven ability will man the line.

For the first time in four years Geneva College comes here under the leadership of a new coach, A. C. Ransom, better known as "Slim", has replaced "Smiley" Weltner as head coach and will be assisted in an advisory capacity by Cal Hubbard, at present an American League baseball umpire.

Visitor's Strength Unknown

Both are famous Geneva athletes. Ransom is the only Geneva man ever to win 12 letters in three major sports, while Cal Hubbard is Geneva's only All-American and later All-Time All-Pro. end.

With a new coach and only a small number of experienced lettermen, Geneva's strength will be an unknown quantity. Coach Ransom will be depending a great deal on his veteran quarterback and captain Bill Joyce who will be starting his fourth year with the Geneva squad.

In all likelihood Geneva will use the modified Warner system of play, with a short punt formation.

Aerial Attack forecast

As in the past, forward passes are expected to be one of the visitor's main weapons of attack. In fact, more so this year, because Cal Hubbard is a graduate of the professional grid ranks which advocate the airplanes as the best means of ground gaining.

When Geneva uncorks their passing attack, the Penguins can be sure to have a tough time in bottling-up the Covenanters' star end Bob Masneri who in the past has been on the receiving end of many a touchdown pass.

An interesting sidelight of this annual Geneva game is the fact that "Dike" Beede is a former Geneva coach, and both his assistants, Dom Rosselli and Willard Webster, are Geneva graduates.

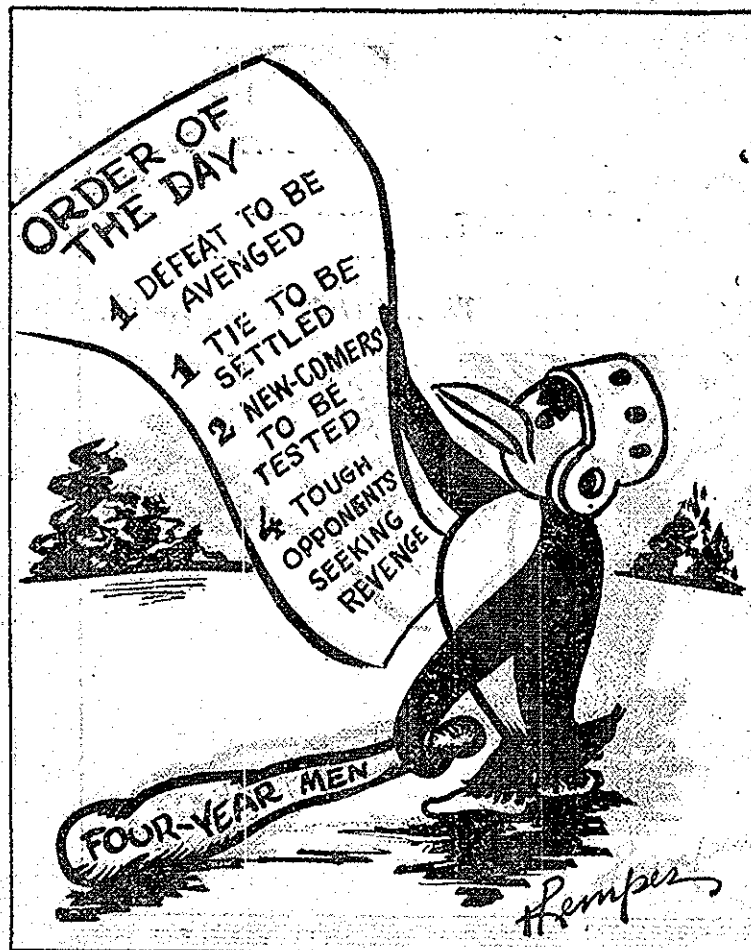
