

Tuition for the courses is paid by the government, the student paying only for text books and supplies. Enrollment in each class is limited to 30 students. The purpose of the program is to train women and older men for jobs in industry where there is a shortage of trained workers. Applicants must have high school education or the equivalent, and must fulfill the specific requirements of each course to be eligible for enrollment

Those interested should make application as early as possible to the college offices. Offices are open daily from 8:30 to 5:30 p. m. and 6:30 to 7:30 p. m. daily, except Saturday when they close at noon.






