be spent at North and South Side hospitals and the student nurses will be paid the
for their services.


Whdres says the cost will be ap-

and third years will absorb this. At the present time, the tuition is
$\$ 300$ but the girls are not paid tor their services.
Under the new system, the stu-
dent nurse will not only have the advantage of college life, complete most of the science subjects re-
quired in nursing, but also will establish her final interest in a nursing career:

In the recent local elections the Youngstown vindicator waged an extensive news and edf torial campaign against Mayor elect Frank
. Kryzan and in favor of incumbrnt Mayor Charles P. Henderson and his administration.
They also followed their long standing custom of endorsing a com-
nlete slate of candidates. In a surorising number of instances the piete slate of candidates. In a surorising number of instances the
VINDICATOR endorsement was, in effect, reversed at the polls. The local press deserves praise for being a conscientously thought provoking and intreprative news medium. Every worthwhile newspape in America, through editorials and intreprative news writing attempts to offer its reader an informed viewpoint on current issues. An almost complete rejection by Youngstown voters of those men
and things for which the VINDICATOR actively campaigned, migh and things for which the VINDICATOR actively campaigned, migh
be intreprated in many different ways. It is obvious, though, that cetizens everywhere do read and are effected by the local press.
There appears to be no basis for arguing that the vindicator's campaign, was ineffective, but rather a basis for arguing that th VINDICATOR'S campaign was adversely effective
It is of course no political novelty to find a medocratic adminisdemocratic stronghold, but this same democratica. stronghold returned a republican candidate twice on a "clean-up"'platform. We might have expected the same voters to support the same candidate on a plat form of "keep it clean". They did not.
We suggest that a number of potential Henderson voters resented
what they regarded as a dictorial policy on the part of a prominent newspaper in a "one paper"' town. They asserted their right to think for themselves, ous

## Political Parties

The returns in the recent class elections were disappointing, not rolled in each class cared enough to cast their votes in class elections.
What factors have consistently brought about almost complete apa-
thy in, not only class elections, but in all elections. The factors are many, Among them are; general lack of interest in all student activity lack of publication of election dates, candidates and results, and lack of activity and organization on the part of representatives and officers elected.
Individual and organization interests should be reflected in all
elections. These interests are alw but seldom are election considerations
Youngstown Colloge needs student political parties. Political part ir in a democratic society perform the functions, of selecting cand dates who stand for group interests, of enlisting the aid of groups with slightly divergent interests, of organizing varying group interes into party platforms and campaign issues,
support their platforms and their candidates
poiitical parties organized along group lines would be consolidated units forcefully standing for, what individual organization ineffectually stood for. A political party made up of groups wit similar interests could hold primarie
candidates for all school elections.
elected as members of political parties would reflec heir party supported campaigns.
All would benefit, not just the groups alligned with the party. Th ollege would benefit and students would benefit. Student council lections. When a number of students took issue, with party policie nd resented party control they would retaliate by forming their own party. A party system would then be firmly established.
